

Dr. Margaret Mead, anthropologist gives informal "Rap on Race" talk

"Rap on Race," an informal evening of conversation and encounter with Dr. Margaret Mead, is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Monday, April 3, in Room 2100 of the Basic Science Building, School of Medicine, at the University of California, San Diego.

Dr. Mead will "rap" with Carlos Velez and Hope Logan of San Diego in the same freewheeling style used in her dialogue with author James Baldwin last year.

Her discussions of the many facets of racism resulted in a best selling book, "Rap on Race," published last year. Dr. Mead brings to the discussion her reputation as the most influential world figure in anthropology and one who has -worked for a unity of academic disciplines.

Velez, a graduate student in anthropology at UCSD, is the former chairman of the Chicano Studies program at San Diego State College. Ms. Logan, formerly an assistant professor of social work at San Diego State College, currently heads Special Programs for the YWCA in San Diego.

The program, sponsored by the University of California Extension, is open to the public for a \$3.00 admission charge. Students will be admitted for \$1.00.
