

## **Robert Scheer, the distinguished national correspondent, will be a Regents' Lecturer at the University of California, San Diego during the last week of October**

Robert Scheer, the distinguished national correspondent for the Los Angeles Times and the founding editor of "Ramparts," will be a Regents' Lecturer at the University of California, San Diego during the last week of October.

Mr. Scheer will deliver a series of three public lectures, under the sponsorship of the UCSD Department of History, during his visit. The series is entitled "The American Establishment and American Foreign Policy Since Yalta." It will begin on the evening of Monday, October 24, and continue on Wednesday and Friday evenings, October 26 and 28. All lectures will be a 8 p.m. in room 104 of Third College Lecture Hall on the UCSD campus. There is no admission charge, and no tickets are required.

Mr. Scheer will also participate in individual classes during the week on American foreign policy, national security planning and journalism.

A graduate of New York City College and the University of California, Berkeley, Scheer has written or edited six books. His book on the Reagan Administration's nuclear war strategy, "With Enough Shovels" (Random House, 1982), stirred national controversy. He has also written "America After Nixon," "How the U.S. Got Involved in Vietnam" and "Cuba: Tragedy in our Hemisphere" (with Maurice Zeitlin). He has edited the diaries of Che Guevara and the writings of Eldridge Cleaver, and his essays have appeared in "Esquire," "Playboy" and "New Times."
