



Fun With Lesbian Safe Sex!

ROOM# 217A

Think you know it all about lesbian safe sex? With an interactive game show, this workshop will explore the often ignored topic of lesbian safe sex. Come to learn, have fun, and win prizes!

Presenter: Karen Oberg & Erin Harrell, UCSD LGBTA Principal Member

Karen Oberg and Erin Harrell are actively involved in the queer community at UCSD, working as Principal Members of the LGBTA and as Peer Couselors for Psychological and Counseling Services. We recognize the need for more discussion and education surrounding issues that concern young queer women. Karen and Erin are both very fun, ethusiastic, and excited about interacting with new people.

Party Drugs ROOM# 222

How much do you know about the risks and dangers of drugs commonly ingested at parties? Specifically, this workshop deals with 5 of the most common drugs that are used: MDMA, Ketamine, GHB, LSD, and Methamphetamine. Come and find out how the drug scene and party scene can affect you and what you can do about it.

Presenters: Lizette Rha & Ernesto Moreno, Alcohol and Substance Abuse Peer Counselor & LGBT Peer Counselor

Transgender Issues and Experience

ROOM# 201

Mark and Eric introduce the concept of transgender and discuss their embodied transgender experience in relation to several themes: the difference between, and interrelation of, gender and sexual orientation; transgendered bodies; transgendered sex; institutional pitfalls for transgendered people (transgender pitfalls for institutions); and relations to wider communities.

Presenters: Eric Nathan Peterson & Mark Anthony Ocampo

Mark Anthony Ocampo is a 20-year old Hispanic who transitioned from female to male at age 12. He is a resident of San Diego County. He loves to share his experiences in order to educate the public. Eric Nathan Peterson is a 30-year old white/Jewish transgendered stonebutch philosopher, activist, and lover. He doesn't care if you call her "she" as long as you get that he's a guy- a butch.

Cancion del Mariquita: The poetry of Federico Garcia-Lorca and Queer Verse in Spanish ROOM#

The purpose of the workshop is to expose Queer Youth to the creativity of Federico Garcia-Lorca's poetry and to make this workshop accessible to English/Spanish bilingual speakers. It will look at some of his verse and will have a discussion on queer poetry in Spanish and give an opportunity for the participants to write some creative verse themselves..... and hopefully share it with the rest of the participants.

Presenter: Ricardo Hernandez, La Familia de UCLA

Ricardo Hernandez is a third year student at UCLA working on a double major in Spanish Literature and Sociology. At 20 years of age, he is in his third year as an active member of La Familia de UCLA, a queer Latina(o) organization. He has helped organizations from Mexico in order to help La Familia de UCLA expand to a more international level of programming and coalition building.

The workshop will be a roundtable discussion exploring (1) experiences of students who have joined traditional fraternities and sororities and advice for those considering "rushing," (2) information about gay Greek organizations, and (3) ways that LGBT campus organizations can work cooperatively with the campus Greek community.

Presenter: Douglas Case, Coordinator for the SDSU Center for Fraternity and Sorority Life Past President, San Diego Democratic Club (an LGBT advocacy organization). Past President, Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation/San Diego. 1998 San Diego Lesbian & Gay Pride Man of the Year. Faculty advisor for San Diego Chapter Delta Lambda Phi (fraternity for gay/bisexual and progressive men).

Session #2 Workshops

Let's Chat ROOM# 207

During this session one will learn the "in's and out's" of HIV- what it is, how it works and how it's transmitted. Participants will also learn the importance of talking about safer sex and have the opportunity to see the advice put into action!

Jih-Fei Cheng graduated from UCSD in June '99 and is now working full time. He will be attending UCLA as a graduate student in the Asian American Studies program in the Fall '00.

Frisley Juarez graduated from UCSD in June '99 and is now working full time at a private company, as well as volunteering at Bienestar Hollywood.

Becoming an Effective Ally

Is machismo a cultural deficiency or a structural dimension? We will examine how masculinity, or machismo, is linked to homophobia. We will discuss some theories of masculinity/machismo that will either be questioned or supported by experiences/testimonies.

Presenter: Luis Villanueva, Queer People of Color

Luis Villanueva is a senior at the University of California, San Diego. He is sociology major. He grew up in the Coachella Valley. He is a UCSD McNair Scholar currently working on a research project titled, "Gay Latino Cultural Formations: Structural forces that affect the Latino male homosexual's gender/sexual relations."

Hate Crimes on College Campuses

ROOM# 217B

Due to the recent increase in hate crimes and hate incidents on college campuses, Student Affirmative Action and Human Relations program has established a Hate Free Campus Campaign. The workshop will inform students regarding the statistics of hate crimes on college campuses and how the inability to recognize and respond to them has posed a potential danger to students of diverse populations. The workshop will cover some of most targeted groups along with procedures to take when one feels the victim of a hate crime or incident. The workshop will include written information, definitions and stereotypes that we all have, how to deal with those stereotypes and how we encourage them. There will also be an opportunity for discussion along with facts and myths regarding hate crimes.

Presenter: Adam Jeffers, Program Coordinator for Student Affirmative Action & Human Relations Adam Jeffers is a graduate of SDSU with a Masters degree in counseling. He recently coordinated the Hate Free Campus Campaign at UC San Diego and has a passion to inspire youth from diverse groups.
