- 5. Turn in your verified "Passport(s)" to the SOLO Center after you have attended <u>TEN</u> seminars before May 19, 2000.
- 6. Seminars may not be carried over to the next academic year and there will be no make-up sessions.



# Think about it.

#### The Kinsey Scale

Alfred Kinsey was famous for his research on human sexuality. In the Queer community, he is known for the 7-point scale he developed. Zero: Exclusively heterosexual. Three: Equally heterosexual and homosexual. Six: Exclusively homosexual. This effort to make sexuality more of a continuum is seen as lacking by some, since there are only 7 possible positions on the scale. The biggest flaw in this theory is that sexuality is not accurately defined. Is it defined as behavior or identity or both? Despite scientific flaws, Kinsey's scale has succeeded in breaking down the dichotomy of gay versus straight.

#### Faggot

Webster would say it is a bundle a sticks. Why is a bundle of sticks equated with a gay man? In the inquisition of Europe, when witches were being burned, among those sought out for burning were gay people. They were required to gather the very "bundles of sticks" (the real meaning of a faggot) with which they would be burnt. When the faggots (sticks) were running out, gay men were thrown on the fire to keep it going for the witches. Faggot came to mean "gay man" to force them into the closet for fear of death. Scary, huh? Think about what you are saying -- who you are offending when say this word, even if in jest to a friend.

#### The Rainbow

Designed by Gilbert Baker in 1978, the rainbow flag was a colorful and optimistic alternative to the pink triangle. In its first year, each of the eight colors had meaning: hot pink for sex, red for life, orange for healing, yellow for sun, green for nature, turquoise for art, indigo for harmony and violet for spirit. When mass-produced, hot pink was not an available color. Pink and turquoise were removed and indigo was replaced with blue. The six color rainbow flag is even recognized by the International Congress of Flag Makers. The flag has become a symbol of pride and the rainbow represents the diversity of the community.

#### The Black Triangle

Lesbianism was not included under Paragraph 175, the clause that made homosexuality illegal in Germany. Lesbians therefore did not get a pink triangle when sent to concentration camps. The black triangle, for anti-social behavior, was given to women who did not bear children and work in the kitchen. Lesbians, prostitutes and women refusing to bear children were considered anti-social and wore an inverted black triangle.

#### Transgender

Transgender refers to someone who transgresses the gender spectrum; gender referring to societal expectations of males and females. An umbrella term for an individual who identifies as a cross dresser, drag queen, drag king, transsexual, intersexual or bi-gendered. Recently transgender people have been left out of the "main stream" Gay Rights Movement because they were farther from the "center." But in fact, they were a big presence in the Stonewall Riots of 1969 that sparked the modern American movement.

#### Dyke

Possibly derived from Boudicca (Bou-dyke-ah), a Celtic queen who organized a revolt against the Roman Empire in 67 CE, this empowered woman was seen as a threat to the power structure. Later, as its connotation changed to refer to lesbians, a harsh stigma remained. In order to take the punch out of the word, Dyke has been reclaimed by some lesbians. Even today, said in a hurtful manner, it can be a painful word. How do you use the word?

Are you offending someone?

#### The Pink Triangle

Prisoners of the Nazi war camps were given a triangle, color coded to their offense or origin: yellow for Jews, brown for gypsies, black for antisocials, green for criminals, and pink for homosexuals. Pink triangles were larger than the other triangles so that the "scum of the scum" could be easily recognized. Jews, gypsies and homosexuals were given the worst treatment of those at the camps. Today, the pink triangle has been reclaimed as a symbol of pride.

#### Coming Out

Also, "coming out of the closet" or "being out," this term refers to the process in which a person acknowledges, accepts, and in many cases appreciates her or his lesbian, gay or bisexual identity. This often involves the sharing of this information with others. The process of coming out to oneself and to others occurs for different young people (and adults) in a variety of places and ways.

#### Lesbian

The word lesbian stems from the Greek stories about Sappho, a teacher known for her poetry celebrating love between women, who set up a school for young women on the Isle of Lesbos. Now it refers to a woman who is sexually attracted specifically to other women. This word is a positive word and has been used to identify women within the Queer community. They were silenced as only men were recognized as homosexuals. This word helped give them a voice.

#### Gay

This word used to mean "happy," but its meaning changed when homosexuals used it as code. They were thought of as clinically ill and were thought only to exist as homosexuals. The word "gay" gave them a smaller word that was an adjective, not a noun. This allowed those who used it to identify as homosexual in addition to other identities. Some people use it to include bisexuals and lesbians. Now that bisexuals and lesbians are gaining a separate voice, it usually refers only to homosexual men.

#### Heterosexism

A magazine reveals the top ten steps for a woman to find Mr. Right. What happens when that woman is looking for Mrs. Right? Or what if that Mr. Right is also looking for Mr. Right? The picture is slightly different, now. Heterosexism is a belief that heterosexuality is better to other sexualities and can refer to the active promotion of it as the only desirable way of life. This includes the blanket assumption that everyone is heterosexual. Who do you presume is straight? Parents? Friends? Professors?

#### Homophobia

Homophobia is the prejudice against people perceived as gay. This prejudice includes the belief that all homosexuals fit the media- portrayed stereotypes. It can also refer to name- calling with intent to hurt someone. In a school setting, even if someone is thought to be gay, it can be enough for bullies to attack. The result is detrimental to the victim, causing them to withdraw and sometimes drop out of school. Some states have made strides in protecting students. In other states, teachers sit in silence while this abuse continues.

#### Queer

Queer has been used as a highly stigmatized word in the past to denote someone who was thought to be gay. Today it is being reclaimed in more political and academic realms by younger members of the community to reduce the harshness in the word. It is being used to include gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, those who chose not to identify with a label and those who have yet to decide. Some older generations, both queer and straight, and many communities still view this word negatively and use it as such. Are you offending someone when you use this word?

#### Stonewall Riots

Riots that broke outside the Stonewall Inn, a gay bar in Greenwich Village, June 27, 1969. Despite payoffs, corrupt police arrested patrons of the bar-the patrons fought back. The riots were over by 3:35 am Saturday morning, but by night, after word had spread, thousands of people crowded the streets. Police were unable to prevent the gathering, as the rioters chanted: "Gay Power!" The riots are thought to be the beginning of the Gay Rights Movement, despite previous organizations' prior attempts. June 28th became Gay Pride Day.
