

It's Government Interference.

Thank you for being here today. We are here opposing two statewide propositions that will appear on the March 7th ballot, Propositions 21 and 22.

Proposition 21, the so-called Juvenile Justice Initiative, will have devastating effects on California youth. This initiative is 43 pages long! If approved, it would make hundreds of drastic changes to the law, primarily designed to incarcerate youth for longer periods of time. Proposition 21 expands the three strikes laws to make sentences much longer for youth. Proposition 21 expands the death penalty. If Proposition 21 passes, youth as young as 14 years of age will be tried as adults and executed as adults. This initiative does not provide funding or support for prevention programs. Instead, CA will be spending hundreds of millions of dollars on incarcerating youth. That's right, hundreds of millions of dollars will be spent on incarcerating youth if this initiative passes according to the California Legislative Budget Committeel California already spends nearly \$4 billion a year on prisons. Since 1984, our state has built 21 prisons and only one university campus. A prison guard makes about \$51,000 a year. A first year professor makes just \$41,000 in the California University System. Instead of California is here there the professor makes just \$41,000 in the California University System. Instead of

California is better than this, we can do better by our youth!

imprisoning our youth we should be educating them

Just like Prop 184, 187, 209 and 227 this initiative will hurt people of color, the poor, working class, and immigrant children the most. We must vote no on this divisive and unfair initiative.

I would also like to briefly tell you about another divisive and unfair initiative that you should vote "no" on. Proposition 22 is an anti-gay ballot measure sponsored by state senator Pete Knight. This initiative is only 14 words: "Only marriage between a man and a woman is valid or recognized in California." Supporters of this initiative will tell you that they are not condemning anyone. They are not anti-gay, that they are merely trying to protect the institution of marriage. No, they are wrong. The Knight Initiative is not about protecting marriage; it's about singling out a group of Californians for discriminatory treatment. Let me tell you how. The Knight Initiative is unfair; it threatens hospital visitation rights, inheritance rights and local anti discrimination ordinances. The Knight Initiative threatens the equal rights and protections that any two people in a committed relationship deserve. This is not a symbolic change to the California law that is being proposed here. If this initiative were to pass, it would have devastating effects on real people.

Are they not good enough? Is my family not good enough? Though we might not agree on the issue of same sex maininge, we can agree that discrimination is wrong and that we should live and let live. Don't be fooled. If you vote in favor of this initiative, you are not just merely protecting maringe. You are siding with those who would like to bash me and hurt my family. Voting yes on Knight means siding with people who would like to see gay and lesbian livelihoods destroyed. Vote no on Knight. By voting no, we can all stand together and say that we value all families in CA, not discrimination.

Thank-you for bring-here today: By being here you have taken an important step towards defeating these initiatives. We have some excellent speakers here today to talk about Proposition 21 and 22. We also have voter reg forms and volunteer sign-up sheets. We have to get out and vote. There are too many of us here on this campus that do not.

I'd like to introduce our first speaker, who will be speaking against prop 22: Dolores from Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays. We are delighted to have her here today.

KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

Carla Trujillo was born in New Mexico and received a B.S. degree in human Developement from U.C. Davis, and a Ph.D. in educational psychology from the University of Wisconsin, Madison. She is the editor of Chicana Lesbians: The Girls our mothers warned us about. The anthology is now in its third printing and won the LAMBDA Book award for the best Lesbian Anthology and the Out/Write Vanguard Award for the best pioneer contribution to the field of Gay/Lesbian lifestyle literature in 1991. Trujillo is also the author of various articles on identity, sexuality, and higher education. She works as an administrator in diversity education and advocacy, and as a lecturer at the University of California, Berkeley. She is currently working on a novel about identity and survival.

Kevin Jennings a native of Winston-Salem, North Carolina, cum laude from Harvard College, where he delivered the Harvard Oration at the 1985 Commencement. In 1992 he was named one of the fifty "Terrific Teachers Making a Difference" by the Edward Calesa Foundation. Kevin has become best-known for founding the Gay, Lesbian and Straight Education Network, which brings together gay and straight teachers, parents, and community members who are in K-12 schools. GLSEN is the largest organization of its kind in the United States, with chapters in over 60 cities.

Candace Gingrich has emerged as one of the most thoughtful and effective spokespeople advocating for gay, lesbian, and bisexual equal rights since she "came out" in 1995. Her 1996 autobiography, The Accidental Activist, was a bestseller in the gay and lesbian community and offers insight into the passion and noteworthy wit that has made her one of the most popular lesbian speakers in America. Gingrich has been profiled in The New York Times, The Washington Post, Newsweek and she has also appeared on such notable television shows as Good Morning America, Larry King Live, PrimeTime Live.
