

Plaques honoring four men associated with history of University of California's Scripps Institution will be unveiled at ceremonies on May 18

The ceremony honoring the beginning of construction of the University of California's new graduate School of Science and Engineering in San Diego on Thursday, May 18, has been rescheduled so that Governor Edmund G. Brown can participate, it was announced today by Roger Revelle, Director of the Scripps Institution of Oceanography.

The ceremony was originally set for 4:45 p.m. on Thursday. It has been rescheduled for 1:00 p.m. It will last approximately half an hour. The ceremony will take place at the site of the new School, just southwest of the intersection of Miramar Road and Torrey Pines Road. President Clark Kerr of the University of California will preside. Governor Brown will be among the speakers.

Later in the afternoon, at 4:30 p.m., four new buildings on the campus of the University's Scripps Institution of Oceanography will be dedicated.

Mrs. Harald U. Sverdrup, widow of the great Norwegian oceanographer who was the third Director of Scripps (1936-1948), will unveil the plaque dedicating the new Harald U. Sverdrup Hall.

Mrs. Francis B. Sumner, Chula Vista, will dedicate the new Francis B. Sumner Auditorium to the memory of her husband who was a Professor of Biology on the Scripp's staff.

Mrs. W. W. Hawkins, Miramar Ranch, widow of the late Robert Scripps and daughter-in-law of one of the founders of the Institution, E. W. Scripps, will unveil the plaque dedicating the new wing of William E. Ritter Hall. Ritter was the first Director of Scripps.

Mrs. J. G. Johanson, La Jolla, will dedicate the George H. Scripps Building. She is a niece of the late Mr. Scripps.
