Lee Shippey's "The Luckiest Man Alive," and copies of both the American and Japanese editions of her own "Exploring the Deep Pacific."

Richard Pourade has agreed to serve as Chairman of the San Diego Authors Committee of the organization.

Mrs. Raitt says that during the first month of its existence, the Friends group has arranged for the donation of more than 400 books to the UCSD Library. The books cover a wide range of topics, including fiction and the arts.
