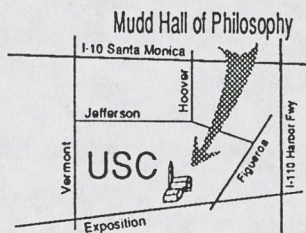

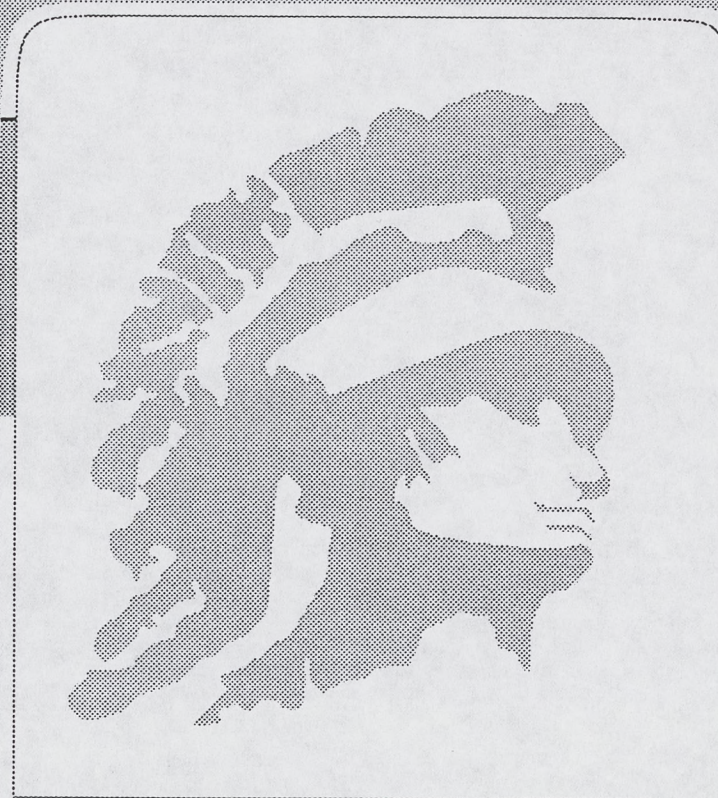

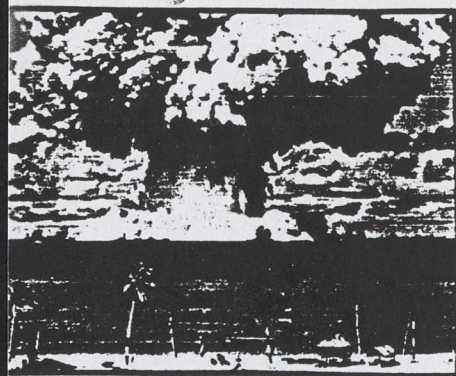

Are We Winning, Mommy? America and the Cold War

May 13

An exploration of the roots of the cold war era and its effects on American life. The film uses images and historical footage from the US and Europe to support the thesis that war is not inevitable, but is rather constructed by various peoples, ideologies, fears and actions. Directed by Barbara Margolis; 87 minutes; 1986.

Carry Greenham Home

This film focuses on the women who have for years camped at Greenham Common to protest the deployment of US cruise missiles in Great Britain. Directed by Beban Kidroy and Amanda Richardson; 66 minutes; 1984.

A Great Wall

This critically acclaimed film tells the story of what happens when a San Francisco businessman takes his thoroughly Americanized family back to the Chinese homeland he left thirty years ago. The clash of the two worlds is striking, ironic and often very comic, and gives insight into two very different cultures. Directed by Peter Wang; 100 minutes; 1986.

Becoming American

This film records the odyssey of a family of Laotian refugees as they travel and attempt to resettle in the US. They face cultural shock and prejudice and their story provides a rare personal insight into refugee resettlement issues and American society in general. Directed by Ken and Ivory Waterworth Levine; 58 minutes; 1983.



Manos a la Obra

Styles Wars

A documentary on the amazing subculture of art, music, and dance as it is performed and displayed in New York's subway train system. The film examines the issues of art and politics. Directed by Tony Silver and Henry Chalfant; 69 minutes.

Hellfire: A Journey From Hiroshima

Hellfire traces the lives and art of painters Ira and Toshi Maruki who witnessed the devastation of Hiroshima in the aftermath of the atomic blast. We witness not only their painting, exhibition and the impact of their Hiroshima murals, but also the Maruki's personal and artistic journey to comprehend the Holocaust, Japanese WWII atrocities, and other crimes against humanity that should not be forgotten. Directed by John Junkerman and John Dower; 58 minutes; 1986.

Rosa Luxemburg

A film on the life of Rosa Luxemburg, the legendary leftist leader who was active in most of the major movements of early twentieth-century radicalism. Margarete von Trotta's work provides a sweeping, richly detailed panorama of a turbulent era in European history, including the rise of socialism and labor unions, the 1905 Revolution, pacifist opposition to WWI, and the ill-fated German Spartacist uprising of 1918. Directed by Margarete von Trotta; in German and Polish with English subtitles; 122 minutes; 1985.

La Operacion

This powerful documentary explores the controversy of sterilization as a means of population control. In Puerto Rico, where over one third of all women of child bearing age have been sterilized, the operation is so common that it is referred to as "la operacion". Directed by Ana Maria Garcia; 40 minutes; 1982.

Manos a la Obra: The Story of Operation Bootstrap

An in-depth investigation of Puerto Rico's "Operation Bootstrap", the highly vaunted economic development program undertaken in the 1950's to provide a role model for economic development throughout Latin America. The film explores the historical background and the resulting economic crisis. Directed by Pedro Rivera and Susan Zeig; 59 minutes; 1983.

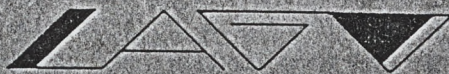

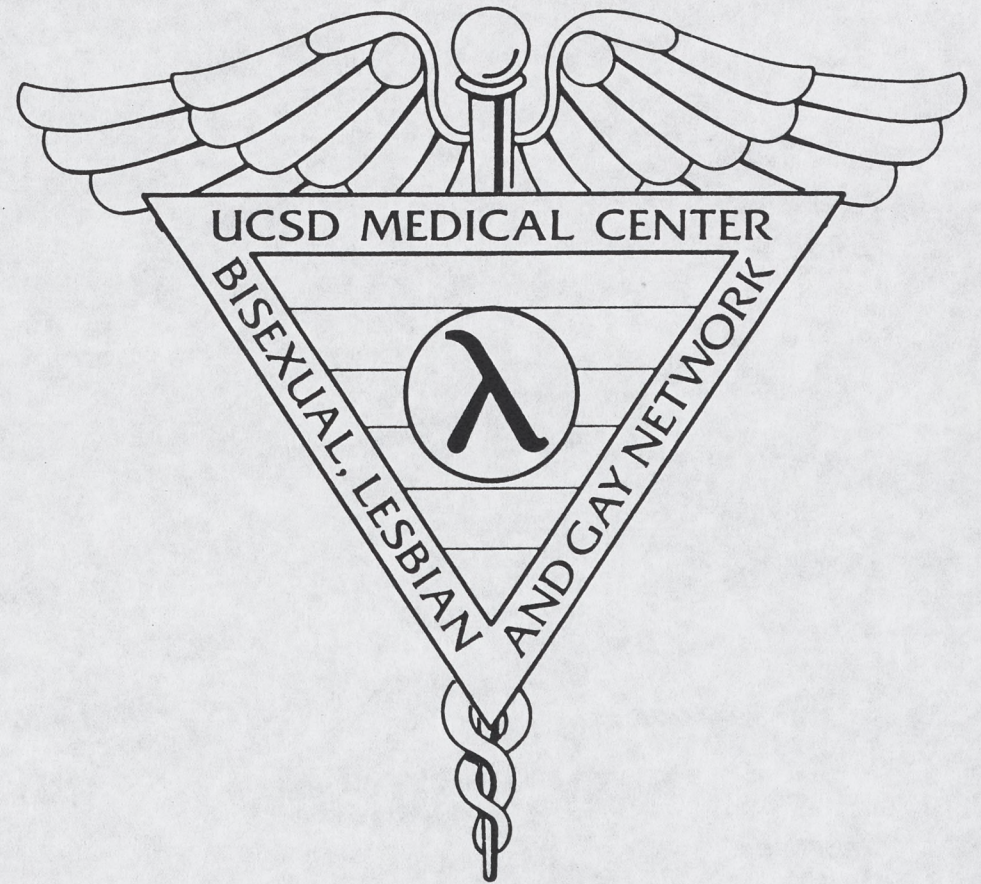
MISSION STATEMENT:
