My letter to you of July 19th, this year, still remains unanswered. I regret having to again call your attention to the note we still hold of yours given for Mr. Albright. We understand that the Albright family have disposed of most or all of their holdings in Los Angeles at a very fair price and we are surprised that you have not taken steps to protect yourself against this indebtedness.

As you know, the old firm of Wright & Callender no longer exists and we are very desirous of dis-incorporating immediately and yours is practically the only matter that has not been settled, and we will regret very much to have to place the matter in the hands of one of the banks or collection firms if some attention is not paid to this within the next ten days.

My dear Mr. Wright:

Answering yours of October 18th, on my return from the North will say I have written to Mrs. Albright's attorney.

They owe me over \$2,000. I have notes guaranteed by Mr. Albright which they turned over to me in payment. As a personal favor to me, will you please not let me assign to you a note guaranteed by Harrison Albright, and you have your attorney bring suit. I am hard up for ready money, but I will personally agree to pay the note if it is not paid by Mrs. Albright or the attorney for the Albright estate and on demand.

If the above is agreeable I will send you a note properly assigned, and I would like to see you file suit immediately. The estate is good for the note and good for every obligation it owes. They have owed me \$2500 for over a year and a half, represented by notes guaranteed by Albright and I have only collected \$500 out of it, and I need the money. I believe if you simply file suit to collect, or threaten to file suit to collect on this \$500 note which I assign to you, guaranteed by Albright, they will pay immediately.

It was foolish of my ever giving my note to you to pay Albright's indebtedness and accepting a note from him of like amount, but I believed he was 100% square and would pay his obligations when due and I did it purely as an accommodation.
