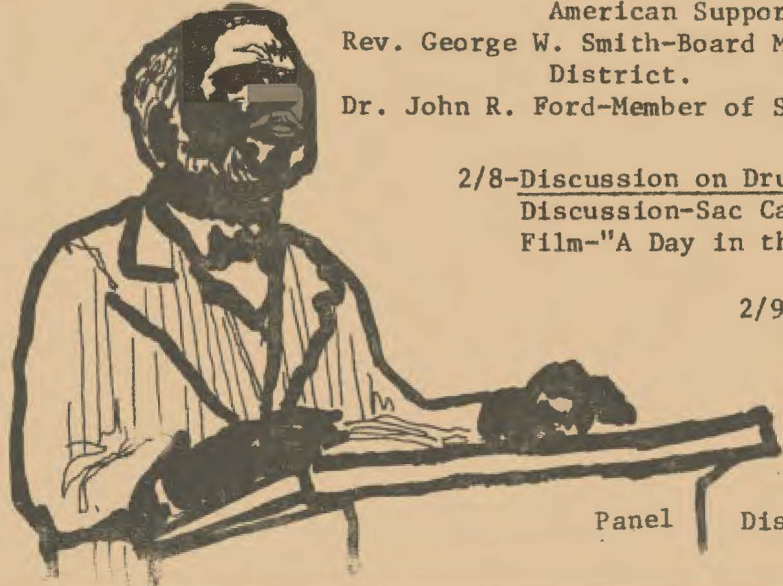

General Assembly

On Tuesday, January 18, the first Lumuba Zapata General Assembly Meeting of the Winter Quarter took place. The topic of discussion was the composition of the Board of Directors, which has been on the agenda since last quarter. At one point in the meeting, those present who were not Lumumba Zapata College Students were asked to leave.

In order to vote to change an item in the by-laws, there must be a quorum of students present for the voting. Then, the amendment is presented to the students by mail ballot. Therefore, the problem of the composition of the Board has not been resolved, as there were only 96 students present at a given time, and a quorum is 108 students, faculty, etc.

At present, the Board consists of 3 students, and others including faculty, staff, and the Provost. Some of the students feel that they are not properly represented because the Board is comprised of one Black, one Chicano, and one "other" student selected by the remaining students. As a result, one ethnic group may end up being represented by a person from another ethnic group, which some feel is an impossibility. Others feel that since the Blacks and Chicanos are the majority of students at L-Z College, that they should have more representation than the other ethnic groups at the college.

A motion was made to extend the Board to one Black, one Chicano, one Asian American, one Native American, and one White. Another motion was to extend the Board to two Blacks, two Chicano, one Asian American, one Native American, and one White. Then the question comes up whether or not the Board can function properly at this size.

We can't properly express the feelings of all the people, so we invite anyone to submit an editorial to the L-Z Bulletin staff. After you have gathered the facts, think about the importance of attending the General Assembly Meetings. Other people are working hard to get this college together, so ask yourself if you're doing your part.

dorm Info...

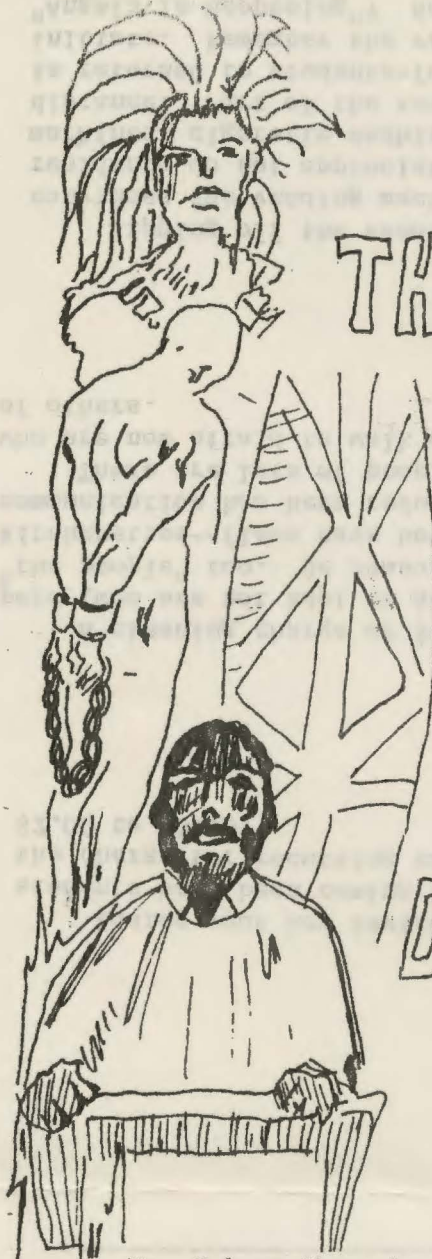

TOWARDS THE RIGHT OF BLACK MEN TO SHAPE THEIR OWN DESTINY

BOB MOSS

Mr. Robert Moss is a new faculty member with the Physical Education Department at UCSD. He is also the Faculty Representative on the Third College Admissions Committee.

Bob, age 32, has lived in San Diego all his life. He has a beautiful family of two children, Anita and Parry, and wife, Edna. He has a BA in Physical Education from San Diego State College. Formerly, he was a motivational counselor for Black students at San Diego High School. Working on his Master's in Counseling Education, Bob hopes to equip himself so he can continue to create some effective innovations in counseling training programs to make counseling more real to Afro-American students. In addition, Bob is pursuing an umpiring career in pro-baseball in the spring and summer.

Bob feels that the typical approach to counseling is the "Wizard-of-Oz" approach, where the counselor is one who has all the answers. In my interview with him, he expressed a desire to achieve more than this. "I would like to build Black identity that everyone says they have and use that as the basis for building self-esteem and self dignity. One thing that Black students on this campus have to deal with, is too many brothers and sisters walking around with Afro-hairstyles and "processed minds."

As a member of the Physical Education Department, he wants to make the department more relevant to Black students. His work with the Black Hawks (basketball team comprised of Blacks) is certainly a step in this direction. (Bob is the administrator of the team's activities, but says that Mike Haney, who has on-court responsibility is doing a great job.)

Bob is in the process of forming a basketball team which consists of "sisters" to add some beauty to the basketball court! The sisters from UCSD will play the sisters from State on February 18 at a special exhibition.

Bob is available anytime for brothers and sisters to come in and "rap." His office is located in the UCSD Gym (mezzanine) at the "sunny side," facing Revelle College. Once you meet him like I have, you will agree that he is a qualified and a concerned brother.

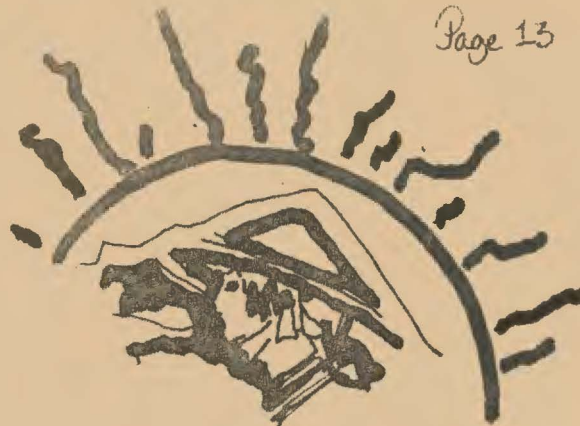

A program in dental research was designed to provide college students with the opportunity to engage in basic research related to oral health and to become familiar with some of the scientific areas in which dental research presents challenge and opportunity. It is hoped that some participants in the program will choose careers in dental research as a result of this experience. On January 20, 1972 at UCSD, 252 Black students, faculty and staff were tested for sickle cell anemia. The testing was implemented by Professionals, Pre-med students, and specially trained undergraduates attending UCSD. Continued testing will occur at San Diego State College February 17 & 18, plus selected high schools in the San Diego area. A clinic in Southeast San Diego is being set up by the Black Action Council and the National Black Science Students Organization at UCSD, for the purpose of reaching the community for sickle cell testing.
