Anderson speaks to 3,000 at Balboa Park gathering

Before an enthusiastic crowd of 3,000 in Balboa Park, independent Presidential candidate John Anderson Saturday told supporters that "Jimmy Carter and Ronald Reagan are the real spoilers in this 1980 campaign" and that on election day next month "we're going to know it was here (San Diego) that we won."

Anderson drew wild cheers as he attacked the Carter Administration's handling of energy and economic crises. "Three and a half days of hoopla in Madison Square Garden is not going to obscure three and a half years of misrule in Washington," he said.

"We think we ought to be willing to tax ourselves rather than have OPEC continue to tax us," he said as the crowd broke into cheers

of "Anderson, Anderson!"

"It is time to start rebuilding the essential greatness of America," Anderson continued. Such a rebuilding does not require a defense posture that includes an MX-missile program or peacetime military registration, he said.

But the scene was not so optimistic several hours earlier during a press conference following Anderson's speech to the National Savings and Loan League at the Hotel del Coronado.

Anderson's financial advisors failed this week to get bank loans to finance a network television campaign in the last weeks before the election. The Federal Election Commission said Thursday it will provide federal funding to Anderson after the election if he garners more than five percent of the vote.

"In my anxiety to please

you (the press) and give you all definite answers, I said I'd hoped I would have something to say...I was just too optimistic to be honest about it. I thought that this thing could be negotiated more quickly," he said. "I'm going to have to wait and be patient."

Anderson also attacked new Department of Labor statistics that show an improvement in the producer price index and unemployment figures.

"We have a right to look behind these statistics," he said. "I wonder if Mr. Carter would be willing to come before the American people on the basis of a single

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SDSP hearing, trial postponed

No judge to hear case

A pre-trial hearing for three San Diego Students for Peace members arrested during an anti-draft demonstration was postponed Friday until Oct. 17.

The "San Diego Three," Mitch Sosna, Ahuva Novak and Fred Peck, were detained by police on Aug. 1 for their activities during an anti-registration demonstration at a downtown post office.

While driving in the SDSP's "anti-draft mobile," the three were cited numerous times on what they call "totally made-up" charges of unlawful riding, unnecessary use of horn, no side view mirror, no front license, obstruction of the driver's view by passengers and obstruction of the driver's right side view.

At one point during the day, all three were arrested and taken to the police station for questioning. Although they were not booked or further detained, Sosna says they were not told why they were arrested until after the fact.

National Lawyer's Guild attorney Ted Bumer, who represents Sosna, Novak and Peck, was not surprised that the hearing was put off until later this month. Due to a docket mistake in the court clerk's office and the fact that only three judges were available to hear cases on

Friday, presiding judge Richard Hanscom was forced to continue the case until Oct. 17.

A picket line of five SDSP students was set up in front of the County Court downtown just before the 1:30 hearing. About 30 San Diego Police Department officers watched the demonstration while a police photographer recorded the group's activities.

One SDSP member thought the police had "overreacted" in anticipating a large crowd and was told by one officer that police "intelligence isn't as good as you think it is."

In a document filed with the court, the defendants are seeking "discoveries" against SDSP concerning their activities and conduct at the demonstration. The defendants also filed a demurrer which points out discrepancies between vehicle code sections and the written description of the

Education Abroad offers 'the world'

Mysterious lands, exciting new places, and a definite change in academic routine are just some of the things the Education Abroad Program deals with.

Sponsored by the International Center and The Education Abroad Program (EAP), students have the choice of going to 46 centers situated in 20 different countries. These countries range from Scandinavia, USSR and Europe to Africa, Asia and the United Kingdom. UC staff members

are located in every center to guide and advise students.

To be eligible for EAP, one must be a student of UC and have a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0 at the time of application. A completed course of language study may be mandatory depending on the country one wants to go to.

A good evaluation by the EAP Faculty Selection Committee is also required. They base their decisions on interviews and the completed application. Lastly, the student needs 84 units by the end of their sophomore year.

According to Hannelore Malone, EAP counselor, "It is an excellent opportunity to learn about other cultures, to learn about oneself, and to travel. We have a 99 percent

A lot of you are going to be in for a real surprise when you go vote on campus Nov. 4. That "Tom Metzger — small businessman" you see on your 43rd congressional district ballot is the same Tom Metzger who became the first California member of the Ku Klux Klan to win a major party nomination.

Some of you will miss that surprise because you haven't registered to vote, and you will be at fault if Metzger wins or even does well enough to capitalize on the race in other political and social areas.

There is still time to register, though. Today is the last day, and the Registrar of Voters has geared up a major effort to get you on the voting rolls. They've established information booths all over the county, including on campus, and there are scores of independent efforts on behalf of political candidates and causes.

If Metzger's not enough, Ronald Reagan, Paul Gann (whose Prop. 13 has gutted the university) and various other conservatives are threatening to get elected. There are also a number of candidates or propositions you might even want to support.

So there is a reason to vote this year. It's quick and easy to register — you can still do it by mail. And you can save yourself and the county a lot of pain.

Joe's: an escort, not dating service

As the director of Joe's Escort Service, I was greatly disturbed with the story about our organization which appeared in *The Daily Guardian* on Thursday, Oct. 2, 1980. The reporter who interviewed us did a very thorough job; however, there are some misleading statements in the article which I would like to clarify. First, our organization is not just for the female students on campus, but

instead is for the use of all students, staff members, or any other person on campus who does not feel safe traversing the campus at night.

Second, concerning the anti-discriminatory form which must be signed by every Associated Students organization: In no way are we discouraging women to join our service as escorts, and any woman who wishes to become an escort, either working alone or with another woman, is more than welcome to join. Our only concern is that we are providing a service based on the fact that an attack on a woman is less likely to occur when she is with someone else, and in having one woman escort another person, our "strength in numbers" theory would no longer be applicable for our escort. It is for this reason that we would prefer women escorts to go in pairs rather than alone.

Next, as a point of clarification our members do not "pick up girls," but rather we escort any woman or other person who wishes to have an escort. By stating that we "pick up girls" we are made to sound like a dating service, which we are most definitely not.

I would like to apologize to anyone who may have been offended in any way by the printing of Thursday's story, and I hope that any misunderstandings have been clarified.

Surprising outcomes possible in war between Iran and Iraq

How the Iran-Iraq war ends could also spell victory or defeat for the State Department or the National Security Council, who have been battling each other over whose understanding of the world situation is right ever since President Carter came to power.

But, as Iranian resistance toughens and the revolutionary spirit helps mobilize the population, new outcomes are possible that could confound both these views and lead to entirely new, barely imaginable situations.

If Iraq wins, then National Security affairs adviser Zbigniew Brzezinski's views will have proven to be correct. At the very least, Iraqi victory means giving Baghdad control over the territory in the oil producing region already taken. However, it is widely believed that the real reasons for the Iraqi attack were to bring down the Khomeini regime in Iran.

Many in Iran believe that a US signal to Iraq and the anti-Khomeini Iranian forces there unleashed the attack. If so, that signal would have come from the Brzezinski side that has always held the Khomeini regime to be brittle — a quick jab at it would bring about a quick collapse. Brzezinski believes that only tough, elite regimes can control countries. Further, he believes that Khomeini's regime is going to fall only to be succeeded by tough leftists unless the United States gets in first with pro-US exiles, like General Oveissi, now in Iraq.

On the other hand, the State Department is trying hard to bring about a different outcome. It is consulting with the Soviet Union and all the regional powers to put pressure on both Iran and Iraq to end the fighting and withdraw within their own territories.

The State Department line, first held by Cyrus Vance and now by Edmund Muskie, does not believe the Khomeini regime is doomed. Not only could it survive, but like other revolutionary regimes elsewhere, it could switch from radicalism to pragmatism. The essence of the State Department line is

that international pressure can bring both combatants to their senses.

But if the unexpected should happen, namely, that Iran not only holds up under Iraqi attack, but succeeds in routing the Iraqis, then drastic changes could occur. It could lead, not to the disintegration of the Khomeini regime, but to the downfall of Saddam Hussein, the ruthless Iraqi leader.

Saddam Hussein evidently shared Brzezinski's quick jab/quick collapse view on Iran. Early reports coming out of Baghdad reflected the supreme confidence of the Iraqis that victory would follow a few days' fighting.

Hussein runs one of the toughest dictatorships in the world. While having achieved considerable economic development though oil revenues that have improved living standards, Saddam Hussein has also murdered all opposition.

One of his most heinous acts was the execution of the Shia religious leader in Iraq, a close friend of the Ayatollah Khomeini. Saddam Hussein attacked Iran hoping that a tough new leader might take power in Teheran, someone like the former shah's General Oveissi now fighting on the Iraqi side with pro-shah exiles.

Much of the rest of the Arab world supports Iraq more because the ruling elite supports the ruling elite rather than pan-Arabism. Syria, whose leader Hafiz al-Assad is a Shiite, wavers. Saudi Arabia has lined up with Marxist Iraq. Both regimes fear the populist and revolutionary zeal spreading out from Iran.

Overthrow of the Khomeini regime would satisfy the Brzezinski line. It would score points with once hostile Iraq and would have a good chance of seeing a pro-US regime come to power in Teheran. And such a regime would, like that of the late Shah Pahlavi, be friendly to the Soviets at the same time.

But the increasingly irritating 'fly in the ointment' is the evident fighting power of the Iranians. Former enemies in Teheran are making peace with each other. A powerful general mobilization is going on. And Iraqi forces on the front line are encountering stiffer resistance.

Saddam Hussein and his new found supporters elsewhere may have forgotten or ignored the lessons

of history — that revolutions have the power to ignite hitherto passive and inert peoples into defending their revolutions, bravely and passionately.

Continuing Iranian ability to fight has raised another possibility. Iran is fast running out of jet fuel and spare parts for its weaponry. If Teheran were to offer a trade off of US hostages for resupply, the US would be in a very painful position.

If the US rejected the offer in order to give not the slightest appearance of tilting to one side, it could mean the death of the hostages. If it accepted, it could trigger a similar resupply by the Soviets to the Iraqis. The Iraqis are almost entirely outfitted with Soviet weapons and the Iranians with US weapons.

President Carter has implied that the Iranians, now largely isolated in the world diplomatic community, needs friends and could get friends if they first released the hostages. But the Iranians, involved in a life-or-death struggle, would obviously want something more tangible than that.

This new situation envisions a two way settlement of the disputes between the US and Iran. On the one hand it could conceivably lead to a US-Iran rapprochement that now appears as unlikely as that between the United States and China seemed a decade ago. Many in Iran ironically believe that the United States secretly support the Khomeini regime, at the same time that others are convinced the US played a hand in egging Saddam Hussein on to the attack.

On the other hand, supply arms again to Iran and Iraq please turn to page 10

Schmidt apparent German winner

BONN, West Germany — The left-liberal coalition of Chancellor Helmut Schmidt appeared headed for a solid victory yesterday over conservative challenger Franz Josef Strauss in first results from the West German election.

With 100 of 252 precincts reporting, unofficial returns showed Schmidt's Social Democratic Party with 43.1 percent of the vote and the Free Democratic Party with 10.1 percent, to give the coalition 53.2 percent.

If the initial trend continues, Socialist-Free Democrat coalition would control 270 of 496 Parliament seats and assure Schmidt of a new term as chancellor.

West German radio said the turnout nationwide was approaching that of 1976, when 90.7 percent of the nation's 43 million voters cast ballots.

The broadcast said the turnout was higher in left-leaning northern Germany, Schmidt's homeland, than in

the south, the stronghold of conservative challenger Franz Josef Strauss, the Bavarian State Premier.

Schmidt voted early yesterday at a polling station in a suburb of his native Hamburg.


Strauss voted at the town hall in the Bavarian village of Rottach Egern near the Austrian border.

Late public opinion surveys pointed to last minute gains by the coalition of Schmidt's Social Democratic Party, or SDP, and the Free Democrats, or FDP, led by Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher. The coalition has governed Western Europe's richest and most populous country since 1969.

The Allensbach Institute predicted that the SPD-FDP coalition would capture about 53 percent of the vote in races for 496 seats in the Bundestag, or lower house of Parliament. Those elected to four-year terms will select the chancellor at a special session next month.

Paris bombs fascists' fault

PARIS — Another bomb explosion rocked Paris yesterday as French police, faced with the discovery of fascists within their own ranks, questioned right-wing militants about a recent wave of anti-Semitic violence and a deadly explosion at a synagogue.

Police said a female Dutch tourist was seriously injured when a bomb ripped apart her car, parked on Boulevard St. Germaine in the Latin Quarter. They said Carmelia Van Pusselen, 33, of Brunssum, may lose both legs.

Iraqi truce doesn't hold

BAGHDAD, Iraq — Iranian jets attacked Baghdad and other Iraqi cities at dawn yesterday, breaking an Iraqi cease-fire moments after it went into effect. The Iraqi high command announced the war would go on into a third week.

In Tehran, the Iranian Parliament which had been scheduled to take up the issue of the 52 American hostages in their 337th day of captivity yesterday, canceled a public session.

A senior Iraqi official announced two Iranian air raids on Baghdad and attacks on other cities.

Death penalty halts murders

WASHINGTON — Capital punishment acts as a deterrent to murder, but only for about two weeks after a highly-publicized execution, according to a new statistical study.

"On the average, homicides decrease by 35.7 percent immediately following a publicized execution," according to Dr. David Phillips, a sociologist at the University of California, San Diego.

The deterrence question has been at the center of the capital punishment debate in the United States for decades.

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month's statistics and tell us once again as he did in Columbus, Ohio, last May that we have turned the corner on unemployment and inflation.

"There is more bad news to come," he continued. "It is unusual to note that for the first time, the Labor Department has included year-end auto discounts and rebates in its figures."

Anderson noted that if these factors were removed from consideration "the producer price index did not go down at all - it went up eight tenths of one percent."

Following the rally, Anderson and his staff flew back to Washington, DC, to finalize their "National Unity Campaign" strategy for the final four weeks before the election.

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offense listed on the citation. Sosna says the demurrer will show the court the arbitrary nature of the police charges, in that the officers involved "were just making up charges" in order to harass the defendants.

The court may grant a motion to dismiss the case at the request of the prosecution, but Sosna sees this as unlikely.

"If they dismiss the case, it would be a total victory for us," he says. A dismissal would mean that the police would not have to answer to the discoveries asked for by the defense.

On Friday, the prosecution was prepared to go forward with their case, as the three

"most involved" officers of the eight listed by the defense were present to testify.

The three officers, Larry Wright, Dick Coulsen and M. Parga, were overheard discussing the case outside the courtroom, but when approached by reporters, they refused to comment on the case, and denied that they were there for the hearing.

However, Novak and others identified Wright as the officer who handcuffed her when she could not produce identification. Wright claims he was not even at the demonstration.

Sosna expects that the three officers will return for the hearing but he doubts that their testimony will be credible in court.



Triton soccer squad under new management

Drop first match to Cal Lutheran

Tre Conrique, starting his first season this year as soccer coach of the Tritons, is hopeful the players will soon become accustomed to his system of coaching.

UCSD will play in an aggressive, controlled style, which Conrique hopes will eliminate the stupid mistakes that lose soccer games. Working the ball from the back to the front, his plan is to keep the ball away from the opposition's collective feet. This takes time to learn, but Conrique has confidence in a group of athletes he considers "excellent individuals and smart, hard workers. We've got a young

squad (there are only two seniors on the team) and we're going to have to build from game to game."

Conrique is a native of San Diego, and has played at Point Loma College and coached four years at Kearny High. With this background he can see potential for a powerful program at UCSD. Because NAIA (National Association for Intercollegiate Athletics) rules allowed Conrique only two full weeks of practice before

the first match last week, the team lost their initial contest at Cal Lutheran 3-1.

On Saturday against fourth ranked Westmont College, the Tritons dominated part of the game but couldn't manage to put the ball in the net and lost 3-0. In Tuesday's home opener against Biola College, the Tritons fell behind 2-1 at halftime and then worsened matters by playing away from Conrique's specified style.

Even though the soccer team is 0-3, Conrique is still confident that the team will take each game as it comes, each with a new attempt at triumph.

by the two super powers could lead to a US-Soviet proxy war being waged on the eve of the US election. It could lead to the most serious confrontation between the two super powers since the end of World War II. Clearly, the frantic diplomatic moves now underway in world capitals are designed to forestall such an eventuality.

Should Iran gain the upper hand, it will mean that it was the Ayatollah Khomeini and the Islamic Revolution that gave the Iranians unexpected new strength. It is not likely that Khomeini will then call a halt to please powers he considers "satanic." He has a revolutionary vision for cleansing all Islam. President Sadat of Egypt, who presides over a country where the rich and powerful rule, knows this and has called the overthrow of the Khomeini regime a top priority goal in the Middle East.

The program costs are approximately equivalent to the costs of one year at UCSD. The prices vary dependent on which country the student goes to, how long he or she stays and what kind of housing he or she can acquire.

Dorm situations are not always available. Malone explains, "If there is no student housing on campus the staff at the centers will have a list of apartments or

rooms. There is always housing to be found."

There are also students who come to UCSD from foreign countries. They are called reciprocity students. They may join the International Club and meet other students from all over the world.

During holidays there are many places for the students to go, both reciprocity students and students abroad. For students in the US there are host families

willing to share their Christmas and Thanksgiving. For students abroad there is travel or being with other US students. Haas stated, "Most of us had friends we could go home with. I spent Christmas with a friend who lived in my dorm."

Even though lifestyles were different in Germany Haas said she had no real problems adjusting. "It's the little things that were really different."
