The long term answer will be in voluntary migration; probably to the near coastal region near the Pual River Valley if the owners of the land agree.

At present their only asset is their labour and even though the figures quoted appear high there is no cause to worry these fluctuate from time ti time. However, we will control recruiting.

MONDAY 6/3/67:

After quick preparation the patrol left for IBURU at 6900hours. After walking through few mud patches the patrol arrived IBURU at 1200hours, Walking time recorded as 22hours. Takedwith councillor slept there over night. Census was revised at 1600hours, and retired to rest house at 1600hours. 1600hours and retuned to rest house at 1800hours.

TUESDAY 7/3/67:

Departed IBURU for Miniaburu et 0830hours.

Miniaburu is only 45mmetes minites walking kmm time.

Census was revised followed by village inspection. Recommendations were given about building new house for the old women and two new latrines with the lid over the top over the pit. Councillor was told this will be check before the next patrol, Returned to lburu at 1200hrs.

AT 6800hours we inspect the villagent at Iburu and proceeded to the station at 0830hours. The patrol arrived at the station at 1250 hours.

Thursday 9/3/67:

Departed for Usari at 0810 hours. Departed for Usari at 0810 hours. After walking through swamp patches and slippery logs laid parallel the patrol arrived at Usari at 1100 hours. Ceasus was revised at Usari and the village was inspected. The village was im found to be in satisfactory condition. Departed Usari for the Patrol Post at 1300 hours and arrived at the station at at 1530 hours.

Friday 10/3/67:

Left station for Samanai at 0830hours and arrived at Samanai at 1020 hours. Census was compiled followed by village inspection. The village was found to clean and tidy. Red from the station to Samanai was must better compared to other appart from the road jaining station and Dieru. Departed Samanai for station at 1200 hours and at the ** station at 1400 hours.

Saturday 11/3/67:

Departed station for Abaru at 0800 hours.
Abaru is 20 minutes walk from the station . Bensus was compiled followed by village inspection.
Just like any other village in census area Abaru tillage was found to be clean and tidy. After inspection the patrol left for the station at 1000hours. The time arrival was 1020 hours.

Monday 13/3/67:

Departed station on motor sydle for at Dieru at 09:0 hours and there arrived there at:000 hours. Police and carriers arrived there \$ 45 minutes later. Cesus was rivised in the afternoon at 1600 hours. Slept Dieru over more night.

Tuesday 14/3/67:

Inspected Dieru village at 0866 hours. The village was found clean and tidy. After inspection the patrol left Dietu at 0900 hours. Due to rain that had fallen priviously the road was in shocking condition. Waded through three feet of water in most part of the road. Arrived at 0gru at 1200 hours. Census was compiled in the afternoon at 1500hours followed by village inspection. Slept 0gru over night.

Wednesday 15/3/67:

Departed Ogru for station at 0800 hours, arrived Dieru at 1045 hours. Departed Dieruma on mobar-cycle and arrived at the station at 1135 hours. Police and carriers arrived what at the station at a hour later.

The area covered by the patrol is the GREEN RIVER CENSUS DIVISION which is the part of the GREEN RIVER CENGUS DIVISION which is the part of the GREEN RIVER LOCAL GOVERNENT COUNCIL. It comprised the villages of A ARU; IBURU; MINIARUSH; SAMANAT; OGRU; SUGUMORU; DIERU; SIMIA MORTHER DEPRESSION and IS Grained by the part of the great Northern Depression and is grained by the three main rivers of GREEN; FIRINGT (Dio) and HAUSA, with quete a number of large streames ¶ what looked like streames but actually swampi feeding into them.

Canoes were only used few times during the crossing of rivers.

RECEIPTION:

The receiption of patrol in all the village visited was a healthy one. The village were notified before the actual arrival of kx the patrolling party, so there was always preparathom made to make the patrol an efficient one. firewood and water and sometimes, fresh food was prepared before the patrol arrived.

In all the village visited by the patrol the standard of housing judging by the general standard of the people, is extremely please Hygiene and senitation is also very good. very good.

Some places like Iburu, Miniaburu, Dieru, Ogru and
Samanai have good water supply from the riverstrations
that flows just close by the villages.

Sthers also have good streames which provide adaquate
supplyef water that the people need.

NATIVE AFFAIRS:

The whole area covered by the patrolis classified as under the Administration control. An indication of the degree of influence of Administration is shown by the number of influence of Administration is shown by the number of complaint been brought to the station by the councillors, who had succeeded the old Tultuls and Luludis, for adjudication. AGRICULTURE: The area, especial xxxx three the plains are The area, especial xhar there the plains are often swaps. Sago palm trees have plainted in the area of swamp near the villages and often grows wild as well.

These sago palms provide main diet of the people.

There is a large number of these trees which guarratted no shortage of food for the people.

Ag substitute for a meal of sack sack the around Dieru and Ogru have large candens in which they plant becames, sugar cane, gardens in which they plant benamas, sugar came, sweet potatoes and jams. The surplus of this crops is carried to the market in

There is a lot of game in the area and a fair supply of ment and fish is eaten. This includes, wild pigs, wild- fowls, vellabys, cassowery, possums and bendicoots.

There are few scattered consequent trees growing idlely around village which as substitute for other food.

COMMERCE and INDUSTRY:

Commerce and industry are little known in the area patrolled. The only way of earning money for the people is byrecruiting them as labourers mostly to plentation in the islands.

Most of the absentees encountered during the census were labourers of whom quete a large number of them are working in plantation in NEW EMITAIN, NEW IRELAND, and BOUGAINVILLE. Others are children who are attending either mission or Government school in Green River:

The people from the argulatorilled here very limited chance of starting any, of industry. Looking at it from the angle of starting an industry base on agricultume, the soil lacks fertility. Although coconumt is growing well in some places it cannot be done on large scale bases because of the limited acreage of fritte fertile land suitable for planting coconut trees. Looking it four from view of starting a trade store is again out reach? Decause here we have to consider air freight and distance they have to carry from Green River.

Although it was mentioned once by the councillor from Dieru that people grom Dieru do humt crocodiles for sale of skine, which is very rare to be mentioned, there are no other ways of earning money for this people except by being recruited as labourers outside the district:

The people are willing to but there, not much work to be done by shakkx such a large number of of people. There eagerness to work is shown by the great streamed of native who have been coming to the station asking for a jobs, but thier requestres has been rejected.

CENSUS:

The last census of the area patrolled was in 1963. Due to fact that the cli Tax Census Sijeets were lost new lot has been made. How ever there has been mammal normal increase in population of 43. There is no over mecruiting oflabourers from any one village appart Minlaburu.

EDUCATION:

The educational facilities available in the area is supplied by the Christian Missions OF Many Lands and Government school at Green River station. Both the Mission and Government ximms school teaches up to Standard One, beyond the children either send to Vanimo or Ageugumat in case of Mission School. The Mission is in taught by the European Missionery fsuals teacher, with the help of few mission teachers. Following census figers show the number of children attending either Mission or Government schools

CARRIERS:

Obtaining carriers is no problem in the arts patrolled People always volunteef freely when ever the carriers ere required during the patrol. They were mostly, employed two or three days at most and were, at the set rate of 10c an hour.

Ther willingness showed that they are prepared to save every, they possibilly can.

VILLAGE and HOUSING :

In practically all the villages visited was done the village whre exceptionally clean and tidy. Inquirries were made in Samanai if the village had been cleaned up just because the patrol was coming. They replied that the villages were always like that.

Most the houses were newly built and there were constructions coming up to replaced the old ones that were still standing up In practically all the villages visited

There was no insufficiency of latrine in the area patrolled, except Miniaburu. They were to xwxxxx build two for men and two for women. There he doubt that councillors are doing xway thier work well. All rest houses and police berrack are well maintained. HEALTH:

The healh of the people in generalis verygood. The patrol did not come acress any particular deseases that the people from. Therewere only three cases of elephantissis in Iburu. One of them is child whose head had swollen into twice the size of any normal child. Appart from these cases all the people seemed to be healthy. Dieru, Miniaburu warz and Iburu higgstramk have big rivers into which they take plump now and and then. Usari, Samanai, Ogru and Summoru also have streames which supply adequate water for washing and drinking.

ROADS and BRIDGES:

There is one vehicular road in the area which runs from for a distant of five miles from the station through Dieru to Firingi (Dio) River. Fair tracks connected the station to the villages of Usari Samanai, Abaru, Iburu and Miniaburu . The road from Usari samanai, maru, iburu and riniacuru. Ine road irom Dieru to Ogru was in badz condition when the patrol was done. Because the patrol was conducted during rainny season the road was covered with water and patrolling party had to wade through waste deep of water and zitter ring along slippery logs which were at that time floating around. Description work at that time floating around. Bridges in most streames was nothing more than a tree mbeing felled across the streames. Quete a large distant of this road is over grown with grass.

The MISSION:

The only in the area censused is the Christian dissions to private of lany Lands, with their permanent establishment. The degree of influence of the mission is clearly shown by the number of children going to mission school. The attitude of the people is a healthy one, and willing to help the dission in of need like true felling logs for their small sawmill. Small Chaple also noticed in most of the village, which showed that christianity is groundly taking its root in them.
