

Sir Denis Brogan begins Mandeville Lectures

The second year of the Mandeville Lecture Series at the University of California, San Diego will be opened Wednesday, April 5, by Sir Denis W. Brogan, Professor of Political Science at Cambridge University, England.

Sir Denis will speak on "The Crisis in America's Relations with Europe" at 8:00 p.m. in Sherwood Hall, La Jolla. The program is free and open to the public.

The Mandeville Lecture Series, which began in February, 1966, is sponsored by the UCSD Committee for Arts and Lectures and is underwritten by retired businessman, author and publisher Ernest W. Mandeville. Last year's series included talks by Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas, historian Louis Morton, and columnist Max Lerner.

Mandeville, recently named as a Fellow of John Muir College at UCSD, was born in Elmira, New York in 1896. In his distinguished career he has served as public relations counsel for the governments of Nova Scotia and Bermuda and as President of the Mandeville Press Bureau.

Sir Denis, born in Glasgow in 1900, attended Glasgow University, Balliol College at Oxford, and Harvard. He has served as a Lecturer in University College, London and at the London School of Economics. He was knighted in 1963.

His publications have included books dealing with American history and politics, French politics and development, and world-wide political trends. Among his most recent works are "America in the Modern World" (1961), "Political Patterns in Today's World" (1963), and "American Aspects" (1964).

On May 10, the Lecture Series will present Harrison Salisbury, Assistant Managing Editor of the New York Times.
