

Dr. Sir as I wrote to you some time ago, have the less at present but comes with my kind love & respects to you dear precious and all the rest of the good family, I return you my hearty thanks for all your civilities to my children, we have had a long and troublesome time of it on account of the rebellion for these three months past, but hope please God the worst is over as they have killed & destroyed many of those vile villains, but still many out who fly like deer which gives us great trouble and when it will be at an end I cant tell tho there is many parties after them night & day, my wife her Mother and Miss Bennet was at your mothers about 12 weeks during the height of the rebellion as most people left their habitations to go there and next to the sea tho I never left my plantation, I praise god none of mine nor Johnson's Negroes were in the rebellion if they had we might been all destroyed, as my house is so nigh to the mountains, tho often threatened to come down upon me but I praise God they never did, Coll<sup>n</sup> Barclay & your mother treated my wife and family with such severity that its never to be forgot, I used to go once a week to see them & return home again the next day, for as my people was all quiet, I stayed by them in order to keep them so, I go on but slow at St. James's occasioned by this rebellion, as I have not been there these four months past, and of late have had a severe fit of illness this ~~3 weeks~~ past but I am in great hopes the worst is over as the fever has left me, as soon as ever I'm able I shall go over there

I like the land and situation of the place mighty well, & believe it will make a fine estate, the works in general are all framed and fit to raise, but as yet have not fixed a place where to set them, as the center of the land where they ought to be is too good to set works on which requires some thought & judgement before they are set down. I am not as yet drawn on Mr. Cleveland but for £70 but much fear before long I shall be obliged to draw upon you for I shall have great sums of money due to me, but the people are very backward in paying, I shall not draw upon you if I can any ways avoid it, and if I do it will be some time first, Mr. Cleveland has promised me to pay whatever money I draw upon him for but believe it won't be for more than the interest, the first good opportunity I must be obliged to buy me 20<sup>th</sup> good new Negroes for New Canaan, If I do I shall then be obliged to draw upon you for some money, which I don't doubt will meet with due honour and am with kind loves & respects to you and family and all friends in general, from Dr. Sir your affectionate & honored
