KONGA PATROL REPORT NO. 1 OF 1966/67. SIWAI CENSUS DIVISION.

Attached please find the abovementioned report submitted by Mr. R.E. Dargie, Patrol Officer, Konga Base Camp.

The main purpose of this Patrol was to obtain necessary information for the revision of the Common Roll for the 1968 Elections before Mr. Dargie departed for Port Moresby to attend No. 5 Training Course at the Administrative College. Of necessity, and at my request, the report had to be submitted in a hurry just before Mr. Dargie departed, otherwise it would have been out of date by the time he returned. In spite of this, however, Mr. Dargie has adequately covered the general information required.

Referring to the Political Situation, the alleged cargo cult activities are being carefully watched to ensure they do not go beyond the moral "Company" stage. This matter will be taken up with the Assistant Redstrar of Co-operatives, Rabaul, with the view of having the "Company" organised in the proper manner. Most of the people concerned are those who are dissatisfied with the Siwai Rural Progress Society and are probably of the opinion that more can be gained from the new "Company". There has been to reason given for the participation by the Arawa people in the Kieta Sub-Matrict. Whilst dissuasive measures usually result in a more determined effort on the part of those concerned, especially with these particular Siwai goups, they can only be warned that any business activities should be properly organised. Should any harmful activities arise from this recent move, necessary action will be taken and you will be advised accordingly.

INTRODUCTION

The patrol was carried out to bring up to date the Common Roll for the House of Assembly Elections in 1968. This was done by means of the Tax / Census Register. Due to lack of time, the sixty six villages were covered in sixteen days. On an average, a little over four villages were covered each day.

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The SIWAI Census Division is situated West of Buin, being bounded by the MOBIAI River on the East, and the SIROKORO River near Boku Patrol Post on the West. The country in mainly undulating, and the majority of villages situated below 200 feet above sea level. The main exception is IRU, which is inaccessible by road at the moment, however it would not be impossible to build a road at least part of the way to this village.

During the patrol a survey of attitudes was made in relation to the Siwai Local Government Council. It was pleasing to observe that people did have opinions regarding the functions of the Council, either constructive criticism, or appraisal. It is imperative that people should take an interest in the Local Government of their area.

RECEPTION OF PATROL

Due to the short notice given to the people concerned, the patrol was recieved well in all villages. All people were ready when the patrol arrived in each village.

VILLAGES

Throughout the Siwai there is an adequate supply of sago palm, the leaves of which are used in roofing and wall materials in houses. Because of the climate in the Siwai, bamboo does not grow in large quantities, and thus sago palm leaves are the main material used in the construction of walls. There can not be seen any disadvantage in the use of sago palm leaves as a material for wall rather than bamboo, of sago palm leaves as a material for wall rather than bamboo, except that bamboo walls would be stronger and more durable. As there is a good supply of building materials, it was found that the majority of houses were well kept.

ILLIAGE SITES
All village sites are quite satisfactory in regard to health re sons.

Throughout the Siwe! there are numerous small streams which adequately supply villages with good water. MAMAGOTA, which adequately supply villages with good water. 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POLITICAL SITUATION

villages, sixty four of these villages are members of the Siwai Local Government Council, and the remaining two villages members of the Banoni / Nagovisi Council. People within the Siwai Council have expressed the opinion that the Council has achieved little since its inception in 1960. During the past seven years the Councils average recurrent revenue has been in the vicinity of \$4,000, however during the past three years much of this revenue has gone into repaying losms on an "88" type Land Rover, and an aluminum Council Chambers. These two loans will be repaid at the 30th June this year, except for an emount of \$161. Which is to be repaid on the Council Chambers loam during 1967/68. It is unfortunate to relate that there are certain people who do not appreciate the services of the Council's Land Rover which carries out infant welfare clinics in the villages each day. This Land Rover is the most subitious project the Council has undertaken to date, and it is not encouraging to note that certain members of the community do not appreciate the infant welfare services carried out by this vehicle. This dissatisfaction can only be attributed to the fact that people are tending to look to the Council for material wealth, and not community services. I am glad to say that this attitude does not predominate.

It was reported by the Council President, Tom, that eargo cult activities may be currently active in the village of KOTU. The activities are suspected to involve worship of ancestors in cemeteries so that cargo may appear. It seems that the whole village may be involved, and thus it has not been possible at this stage to obtain sefinite proof of such activities. A man named Paul Tupana is suspected of having some connection with these activities. Paul Tupana has established a "company" called Paul & Co., Kotu, which is believed to have financial assets to the extent of \$1,200. This money has neen collected from people in seven villages surrounding Kotu, plus village people in the ARAWA area of the Kieta Sub-District. It does not seem natural that Kieta people should put money into the Siwai. I have personally examined Paul Tupana's register of share-holders. I found that some men have invested as much as \$20 in Paul's company. In other villages of the Siwai the people expressed the opinion that the Council should purchase a tractor so that wet and dry bean cacao could be carried to the Siwai Rural wet and dry bean cacao could be carried to the Siwai Rural Progress Society. In general it can be said that the peoples attitude towards the Administration and missions is good. Currently towards the Administration and missions is good. 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The main cash crop in the Siwei is cacao. Although an accurate figure can not be obtained at this time, D.A.S.F. estimates a little more than 500,000 cacao trees are in the area. Cacao blocks are being well maintained, and new plantings are being carried out. Coconuts do not grow well in the area, except on the coast, but a small amount of copre is produced. Coconut plantings are, in the main irregular, there being few blocks of coconuts.

This strip varies between 2 and 4 miles wide, and about 10 miles long. To date this land has only been used to a small extent, mainly for gardens. Thus a large amount of clearing of virgin bush must take place before plantings can take place. This area of land is a great asset to the Siwai, and could prove to be a major factor in the development of the Siwai. At least ten villages have shown interest in development of this area. MEDICAL AND HEALTH

During the patrol I discovered that at least twenty children under seven years had died of either dysentry of dehydration as a result of diarrohoea during the past two years. It appears that the people do not know the difference between lysentry and diarrohoea; I understand that the people forbid water to any child who is suffering from such an attack, and thus a death as a result of dehydration. In this light it may be necessary for a Medical Officer to explain or educate these people furthur towards prevention of furthur child deaths as a result of possible unsanitory eating habits.

A Rural Health Centre is situated at Konga. It is currently staffed by one Medical Assistant, two infant welfare nurses, and an A.P.O. It is from this centre that the Council Land Rover works on infant welfare clinics. The Land Rover is used entirely for health work. Other medical facilities in used entirely for health work. Other medical facilities in the Siwai are the mission hospitals at Catholic Mission MONOITU, and Methodist Mission TONU. Medical services carried but by both these missions are adequate. For any serious or difficult case the patient in sent to the hospital at Buin.

ROADS AND BRIDGES

An adequate road network covers the Siwai. almost all villages can be reached by Land Rover or tractor. AIRFIELDS
