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



SOUNDING BOARD Round-Up

In case you missed the first of the 1st Thursday-of-themonth "Sounding Board' lunch and lecture series" for 2004-2005, the speaker in October was Dr Melissa Fitzgerald who explained how TTIPS (Technology Transfer & Intellectual Property Services) licenses much UCSD research into useful products, which may turn out to be lucrative for both the University and the developer.

Right after the presidential election, November 4, Gary Jacobson, our distinguished Professor of Political Science endeavored to explain why people voted as they did.

He was followed December 2 by Stuart Anstis, Professor of Psychology who gave fascinating demonstrations of how the eye and brain can produce illusions in motion perception

February 3, James Pokorny, an aviation attorney and UCSD alumnus gave dramatic examples of forensics that determined the causes of plane crashes—something as small as a tiny piece of tubing breaking off & jamming up an engine.

We hope you will not miss the next three talks. March 10, Hugh M. Davies, PhD, Director of the Museum of Contemporary Art, San Diego will talk about contemporary art in San Diego—assured, or controversial.

Lawrence Krause, Professor Emeritus and Founder of IR/PS, is one of the world's foremost authorities on the Pacific Rim. On April 7, he will speak about the current "hot spot" in that area.

Our May 5 speaker will be Jeffrey Kirsch, PhD, Director of the Fleet Science Center and President of the Museum Film Network (large format films). He would like to tell us about strategic planning for Balboa Park, with which he is deeply involved and a bit about the 'Fleet's interactive exhibits, films and educational programs.

Faculty members bring \$7.50, non-members \$11. Come after 11:30, select lunch from the buffet, bring it to the meeting room where we eat & hear the talk. The talks and discussions are finished by 1-1:15pm.

Oceanids Huntington Library Fund Raiser Tri





On April 2, 2005 join us for a trip to the Huntington Library and Museum in San Marino. Created by Henry E. Huntington in 1919 it is one of the true treasures in Southern California. The Library collection of rare books and manuscripts is nothing short of extraordinary. Among the items open for viewing by the public are the Ellesmere manuscript of Geoffrey Chaucer's Canterbury Tales (c.1400-1405), one of the existing Gutenberg Bibles on vellum in two volumes (1455), the double elephant folio edition of the John James Audubon's Birds of America (1827-38), a world class collection of the early edition of William Shakespeare's works, a page from Benjamin Franklin's Autobiography, a letter from Abraham Lincoln to Ulysses S. Grant, April 30, 1864, and the Annunciation miniature from the Book of Hours produced in the workshop of the master of the Duke of Bedford, France. The art museum contains one of the most comprehensive collections in this country of 18th and 19th century British Art. It is the home of Thomas Gainsborough's "The Blue Boy" and Sir Thomas Lawrence's "Pinkie". The Virginia Steele Scott Gallery of American Art contains works of John Singer Sargent and Mary Cassatt.

On 150 acres of the Huntington are twelve gardens. Among the most remarkable are the Desert Garden, the Japanese Garden, and the Rose Garden. The camellia collection is one of the largest in the country. Other important botanical attractions include the Subtropical-, Herb-, Jungle-, and Palm Gardens. We will have time to explore this part of the Huntington and the Library at our leisure.

A special exhibition that will be available for us to view is called "An Eye for Beauty: Collectors and the History of British Watercolor." It is located in the Boone Gallery. It includes more than 100 watercolors by 18th and 19th century masters, including J.M.W. Turner, John Constable, John Robert Cozens, and Thomas Girtin. This exhibition is drawn from two important collections: The William Spooner Collection from the Courtauld Institute Gallery in London and the Gilbert Davis Collection from the Huntington. Many of these watercolors have never before been shown in the United States.

In the West Hall of the Library will be the special exhibition "All Was Light: Isaac Newton's Revolutions". Over 70 of Newton's manuscripts and related materials will be on display including Newton's own copy of his monumental treatise, "Principia Mathematica" (c. 1687), complete with his hand written corrections and annotations. Also included in this display are works that influenced Newton: the 1663 Latin translation of Galileo's "Dialogue of the Two Chief World Systems" and the 1649 edition of Rene Descarte's "Geometry". This exhibition is drawn primarily from The Huntington's science holdings, but includes additional works on loan from Cambridge University Library, UCLA's Clark Library, and Caltech. It is curated by Mordechai Feingold of the California Institute of Technology.

Henry Edwards Huntington ran the Southern Pacific Railroad. In 1902 he moved his business to the Los Angeles area. There he greatly expanded the existing electric railway lines creating an extensive inter-urban system, providing the transportation necessary to encourage population growth. At one time in his life he served on as many as sixty corporate boards throughout the United States. He was one of the country's most prominent collectors of rare books and manuscripts. In 1920 the Library was completed to house his outstanding collection. He died in 1927 and is buried in the mausoleum on the estate which was designed by John Russell Pope. Pope used this design as a prototype for the Jefferson Memorial in Washington, D.C.

We will leave from the UTC Macy's parking lot at Genesee and Nobel at 8:00 a.m. April 2, 2005. There will be a pick up in North County at the La Costa "Park and Ride" at 8:20. We will return to our cars at 6:30 p.m. that evening. The basic cost for the trip is \$50 which covers the bus trip and general admission. For those wishing a one-hour docent tour there is an additional charge of \$8. (Only the first 20 will be able to sign up for the docent tour).

If instead you would like to partake in the very special formal "High Tea" in the Tea Room (\$20.00), sign up quickly. (Docent tour and High Tea are scheduled for the same time). Only the first thirty-five to sign up for the tea can be accommodated. So be certain to get your reservation in early. There is a restaurant in the garden for those who wish to eat lunch on their own. Only two buses will be allowed; so reservations are first come first serve in the order of

postmark.

APRIL'S SPEAKER: Lawrence Krause, PhD
International Economist, Professor Emeritus IR/PS
The US Role in the Pacific Rim

Prof. Krause wears several "hats". Most of us know him as Sallye's husband and Emeritus professor of IR/PS graduate school and first holder of the endowed Pacific Economic Cooperation Chair in International Economic relations. Some of us know that he founded, and was Director of IR/PS Korea-Pacific Program, but the world knows him as the foremost authority on Pacific Rim trade and economic issues.

After teaching economics at Yale, he became a senior fellow with the Brookings Institution, was a senior member of the White House Council of Economic Advisors in the Johnson administration, a consultant to the State Department and the US Government's Special Representative for Trade Negotiations. He is the author of many publications on the economy of the Pacific Basin and recipient of many honors and awards during his illustrious career. He is also an entertaining, delightful public speaker.


