

MENDI FATROL REPORT NO. 1 OF 1963/64.

Thank you for the above mentioned Report which was received on the 27th August, 1963.

Your attention is again called to the unnecessary delay between receipt by you of this Report and its submission here. Twenty seven days between offices 100 yards apart is ridiculous.

The unwillingness to work on other peoples land is understandable, however, as the land is apparently in the Western Highlands District, I will request the District Commissioner of this District to liase with his opposite number in the Western Highlands. Of course it could well be that the Western Highlands (New Guinea) border is considerably further north of the position now assumed by the Mendi people as being their border. The Papuan and New Guinea people when referring to the border refer to their tribal border and NOT the actual political border. This matter too will be taken up with the District Commissioner.

Mr. Speed has again carried out a first class piece of work; I have personally inspected the progress to date and it is most satisfactory.

MENDI - TAMBUL ROAD.

Mendi Patrol Report No. 1 of 1963/64 refers.

Some difficulty is anticipated when work is required on the Tambul section of the road. The Hendi rople are expected to refuse to progress beyond the traditional border.

This being so, would you please consider approaching the District Commissioner, Western Highlands, and request him to have made available Tambul people for this section of the road.

It is my opinion that the actual border between New Guinea and Papua in this area is considerably further north of the recognised traditional land boundaries, but even if this was determined to be so, the problem of Mendi people working over Tambul land would still prevail.

PATROL DIARY

Menday 186, 2017, 1963

C930 Sre. legarted Mends arriving Romis 1100 arm. Spent the rest of the day engaging natives (above 300 males and 70 females), to haul a convey of vehicles from Mailgt to Romis - the females being engaged to carry food-stuff for the men. Camped Romis.

Twedey and. July, 1963

Set out to meet the convoy from Mailgi. Prepared a diagramatic skatch showing the work necessary for the construction of the road. Heard that the convoy has not yet left Mailgi. Returned to and camped at Koria. Tednogda y 181. July, 1901

Commenced thecking gradients of the existing road, which is being re-

Thursday 4th. July, 1963

Packed tents and food-start and at 0820 hrs. set out to meet the vehicle convoy. *** 1300 hrs. met the convoy about 5 miles this side of Sailgi. Accompanied the convoy. Camped under canvas about 9 miles from Kemis.

Friday 5 Ch. July, 1963

The convoy consisting of 3 Landrowers, 2 3-ton trucks and 1 tractor, proceeded along the track towards acomia. 1330 hrs. the 3 Landrowers arrived Komia - the other venicles remaining over night in the bush about 5 miles from Komia. Camped Komia.

Saturday oun. July, 1963

The remaining vehicles proceeded to Komia, arriving about 1800 hrs. The vehicles then proceeded to kends. The patrol remained camped at Komia. Sunday 7th. July, 1963

13th. July to the 21st. July, 1963, was spent at Mendi, owing to the necessity for medical treatment, working in the sub-dist. office. Monday 22nd. July, 1963

Returned to Komia. Speny all day re-routing sections of the Mendi-Tambul road. Camped Komia.

Tuesday 23rd. July, 1963

All cay spent re-routing the Mendi-Tambul road. Camped Komia.

Wednesday 24th. July, 1963

Re-routing the Mendi-Tambul road - Work ceased about 1330 hrs. due to rain. Camped Komia.

Thursday 25th. July, 1963

Completed re-routing the Mendi-Tambul road as far as the Kumbemi Creek.
From here to the boundary of the ground owned by the Tambul people, none or very little re-routing is necessary. Camped Aomia.

Friday 26th. July, 1963

Broke camp and raturned the patrol to Mendi, arriving 1600 hrs.

END OF DIARY

INTRODUCTION

The primary object of this patrol was the re-surveying, re-routing, where necessary, and the re-construction of the Mendi-Tambul road, between Komia and Mailgi. Also, the organisation of the various groups who were to be working on the road. A bull-dozer, grader and tractor-trailer were also to be engaged on the re-construction of the road.

Secondary object of this patrol was the organisation of the labour force necessary to bring a convoy of wehicles from Mailgi (in the Tambul Administrative area of the Western Highlands) to Komia and hence to Mendi.

M ative Affairs

A. General.

The response for labour to help with the vehicle convoy was sufficient but by no means overwhelming. Those who did turm up worked very well. The councillors too, who accompanied the convoy, worked well and did a good job in keeping the men working together as a single unit.

I will coment further on the sponse to requests for labour for the road in the section headed "Roads and Bridges".

The patrol was well looked after by the people of Komia, who kept us

The activities of the Local government Council in this area are followed rith interest by the majority of the people. The councillors are, on a whole, well respected by the people and both the councillors and the people are very interested inthe coming council elections.

B. Village Officials

The councillors, who I came in contact with on this patrol, were allvery conscious of their responsibility, not only to the council but to the people in whose hands their fate as councillors rests.

2 Roads and Bridges Mendi-Tambul Road

The desire to push this road through appears to have come from two sources - one the obvious necessity for a vehicular road between Mendi and Mt. Hagen, and two, the desire expressed by the councilions of the Upper Mendi Local Government Council, to get cracking on the road and get it finished. The councillors, however, appear to have got abit carried away in their enthusiasm, to construct the road through to the Mailgi rest house and conect it up with the Mailgi-Tambul-Mt. Hagen . The people who are to build the road refuse to construct any road on the Tambul side of the traditional boundary between the ground of the Tambul people and that of the Mendi people. They claim that section of road going through the ground of the Tambul people is the Tambul people's responsibility. The trouble is, though, only this district has funds available for this road and therefore any labour engaged on it must be paid from Mendi. If, by the time the road on the Mendi side of the boundary has been completed the people of this wass area have not changed their minds about working on the Tambul side, then the only solution that I can see is for the Tambul people to be engaged by Mendi to work on their (Tambul) section of the road. road

The groups that are at present engaged on the are KOMIA, NEN, KELTA, ABUA, WAPARAGA, SEMERA, DIMIFA, KLAREG, ANGAMANDA, EGARI AND BIROP. The councillors of these groups have divided the section to be re-constructed (between Komia and the boundary) amongst themselves according to the size of their respective groups. None of the groups concerned have gardens or houses in the vicinity of the road site, in fact there are no native analydellings at all in the area through which the road is to be constructed. Each group has therefore constructed temporary houses on their respective sections so that they may "sleep on the job". They are working 4 days a week - on the remaining 3 days of each week (Friday, Saturday and Sunday) they will return to their houses in order to gather food for the coming weeks work.

The first five miles of road outwards from Komia is a series of very steep climbs. The old track had to be re-routed several times before it became of a feasible gradient for the normal type of vehicle used in these parts. The construction of the road is a long job but there are no major obstacles, that I could see, to be overcome. Never-the-less, I feel that it will be necessary for some one to keep an eye on the job.

3. Native Agriculture

Sweet potato is as yet the only cash crop (apart from a small emount of vegetables), this being sold at *** Mendi. A pyrethrum plot has been established at Komia which is being well cared for.

4. Medical and Health

Most of the medical needs of this area are well attended to by aid posts and the hospital at Mendi - the majority of the natives taking advantage of these. I came across no sickness apart from minor cuts and sores.

CONCLUSION. The read has been surveyed to the Mendi-Tambul boundary and is now well under construction. A chain and compass traverse will probably be desired - this will best be done when the read has been completed.





PATROL INSTRUCTIONS.

Please prepare to depart on a patrol to the Mendi Anga gorge road as previously discussed with you. You can depart
Mendi on Monday 1st July, 1963.

The purpose of the patrol is to make the road from Mendi to the Lumbi Rest House trafficable in order that timber from the Tutame timber stand may be able to be brought to Mendi. This timber is urgently need for construction projects at Mendi.

The District Officer states that there are five substantiat road land slides which are to be cleared.

I suggest that you commence you patrol in the area between Kiburu and Oiyarip. This portion of the road has been badly eroded and is practically impassable to heavy timber

I understand that the District Commissioner will issue a declaration permitting you to use your accompanying police as supervisors on the road where necessary. Until such a declaration is received do not use your police as road supervisors.

You will be accompanied by three members of the R. P. & N. G. C. and interpreter KEI.

The District Officer has instructed that ou are to continue working along the road right through to the Ialibu border if time etc permits. However the main object of the patrol is to make the road trafficable to timber jinkers.

I suggest you read memorandum 10-4-1 of 27th June, 1963, from the District Officer to the District Commissioner and un-sumbered memorandum from the D.O. to myself . Both are to be found on file 10-4-1 .

Any native complaints or disputes which are brough to you and you cannot settle please refer to this office. Any difficulties which you may encounter please advise me of them immediately.

No work in the morning as the A.D.O. visited the WA, MOIS, KIBURU, and OFFARIP groups to give the necessary propaganda talk for the forthcoming House of Assembly elections. Work in the afternoon finished at 1630 hrs. Received report of trouble in the Undiri c/d proceeded to Mendi to report to the District Officer. REturned Kiburu.

Explained situation to A.D.O. and returned to Kiburu and work.

Friday 19th July.
Left for road at 0730 hrs all going wellwith no rain finished everything at 1540hrs. Departed for Mendi.

INTRODUCTION.

The purpose of this Patrol being to clear landslides between the Kiburu and Ciyarip sections of the Mendi-Ialibu road and to make this road trafficable to timber jinkers and what ever other traffic that may need to use this road. Then to proceed along the road making what ever repairs and new work may be necessary.

ROADS and BRIDGES.

The Patrol camped at Kiburu between July and 21st, a total of twenty days. During which time a large section of new road was laid and the three land-slides were cleared. The approaches to and from the Andoa creek were surfaced with creek gravel and where the corners were too hard for the tractors etc. to negotiate easily the, were widened and resurfaced. Also on the ascent out of the gorge much of the oad remained as the original bench and was in a very water-logged condition. Where necessary on this portion stone and gravel was laid and drains cut. The work at Kiburu being finished the Patrol moved to the Lumbi section of the road.

On arriving at Lumbi work began on removing the numerous weeds which had over grown the road descending to the River Anga. This job occupied one week and on its completion a start was made on resurfacing the road from the Oiyarip-Lumbi mark, working towards Lumbi. This continued until August the 12th and resulted in approximately three miles of road being surfaced.

This work being completed the Patrol moved to the Yebi rest house and the secondobjective was begun. At Yebi, due to the size of the population it was more convenient to engage a picked group of young men and women, these being selected from the Yebi No. 1 and No. 2 groups. The Yebi No. 1 group was required to work between the Anga Gorge and the Yebi rest house. The Yebi No. 2 group worked between the Yebi rest house and the Yebi Omai boundary.

The Yebi No. 1 group began by putting stone and gravel on the road from the River Anga working towards the Yebi rest house. This occupied them all the time that the Patrol stayed here and through their efforts a section of five miles a was completely surfaced. After completing two bridges the Yebi No. 2 group began cleaning the bench allready cut. This bench ascends to the range of hills which is the boundary between the Yebi and the Omai groups. This being completed work began on cutting the new bench which crossed the above range, the line of this road had been previously marked by Mr. P. Crowe in May of 1962 but unfortunately I could find only two of these marks. This meant re-levelling the whole road route once again. At the same time as the Yebi No. 2 group were working on this section the Omai group were completing theirs. This new portion of road was completed in one month. The Yebi No. 2 group then began surfacing the road from the Yebi rest house up to the Yebi-Omai mark, this is to be their sole work, as far as roads are concerned, until its completion.

After having completed their section of the new bench the Omai group began clearing the old previously cut road going down to the Omai-AisAisa border this included the construction of five bridges ranging in length from fifteen to thirty five feet. Due to the absence of nails in Mendi a further four bridges had to be left, to be constructed when nails were available

The small bridges which were teft should provide no difficulty when the local men come to construct them. However the bridge spanning the BIANO creek, which is the Omai Aisaisa border is seventy four feet long and I felt that this would be a little difficult for them to do entirely on their own for this reason all the bearers were placed into position and the decking was cut and left at the bridge site. This left only the nailing of the decking to be completed.

The Patrol spent six days at AisAisa cutting the approaches to these bridges. The road descending to the River Angorais completed except for eight minor culverts which will be completed when nails are available.

There was a total expenditure of £735 for the work completed, and the Mendi-Ialibu road is now open for a distance of Twenty two miles past Mendi. I feel that fairly xixix frequent visits by a D.N.A. car are necessary for the consolidation of the work completed by this Petrol.

NATIVE AFFAIRS.

General.

The people of this Census Division have the reputation of being lazy and indifferent towards work and progress, however apart from a few individual exceptions I found them to be both interested and willing to improve their position in all aspects of life.

The proposed extension of the boundaries of The Upper Mendi Local Government Council has been well received by those who will benefit by it and a certain amount of jealousy by those who have been left out. This feeling was illustrated by the two Yebi groups when their Village Officials and headmen approached me and asked me to see what could be done to have them included in the new area. They point out that they not only have the best ground and the largest population (1139)of the census division, but they were in times long ago recognised as the leaders of the whole Kambiri area. This attitude shows a good deal of promise as far as future plans are concerned.

The amount of young men wishing to enter the Highlands Labour Scheme is far in excess of the reasonable limit as far as over recuiting is concerned. Also I encountered a fairly general wish to gain positions with the Administration either as Interpreters or as general labourers. The reason for this I was told was that everyone else has a man in the Administration and we feel a bit left out.

There is still evident the old inter clan rivalry and in some cases ill feeling. In most cases they are based on the death of influential head men who have allmost invariably been poisened by the rival group. Rather than avenge the death by force, they resort to giving 'shame' to the accused group. This is done by beginning competitions in which live animals are bought and kept within the Clan, these animals range from Tree Pythons to Ant Eaters. At the time agreed upon for the conclusion of the competition all of the accumulated wealth of the groups are massed and the M.O.P. shell value of each animal is estimated, the wealthiest group is the winner and protes his point.

It proved to be fairly difficult to get any one group to under-take work belonging to another wether this group was alligned with them or were their traditional enemies. The fact that the work done would be of benefit to every one and that who ever did the work would receive the pay for it seemed to make no difference. These people seem to have no concept of anything larger than their own Clan. For this reason I feel that any large scale programme for any type of community development would be of little successif left entirely to their own efforts.

Concerning the forth coming elections for the House of Assembly, there is stilla deal of confusion between these and Local Government Council Elections An indication of this confusion is the statement made by the Yebi Village Councilor, after I had spent an hour explaining it to him, he said "All my people will vote for me and I will sit in the Council House at Bela!" Bela being the headquarters of the Mendi Local Govt'. Council.

From this attitude there appears the idea that every group will elect one candidate, and vote for that candidate. The man representing the largest Census Group will poll the most votes and could end up being the representate ive of his Electorate. As far as I can see this is what will happen unless the whole aspect of the voting systym is explained until the time of the elections.

There are at present two fairly large Land Disputes active in this area, the first and the most serious concerns an area of land on the Kagua side of the Angora River, this dispute has already been dealt with by the O.I.C. of Ialibu and on a previous patrol to this area with Mr. F.E. Haviland a group of antagonists were apprehended. We left the area fairly quiet but I fear that once again the right to the land is being protested. An incident of this kind occurred while I was camped at AISAISA, a group of men from Tagenda in the Kagua Administrative area walked through the disputed area breaking trees and gardens on the basis that other people were using their land without their knowlege, or approval. The people occupying the land at present (Omai Group)were very upset as they feel that the land is theirs. This dispute would involve some thousand people and if it ever came to a matter of force could prove very serious.

The second of the disputes concerns the people of the MOITUP group, who prior to Administration influence were driven off their land by a series of attacks by various other clans. This Moitup group then settled over a wide area of in land allready held by other people with whom they were related, one of these groups are the Aibunda people of the Yebi No. 1 Census Group. These people living with the Aibunda group now wish to re-claim their land which is that ground bounded by the Mendi and Anga Rivers and also by the Tutama rest house

Previously the ground was split into three sections, the first section, that closest to the junction of the two rivers was given to the USA group of the Kagua area, the middle section was given to no one but left undecided while the third section was given to the TUTUMA group. This Tutama group has now begun to build houses and gardens upon the middle section which the Moitup group claim as theirs. The Moitups have broken the houses and gardens and erected their own. As yet this is not a serious dispute, but it would certainaly bear investigating.

The people of the AisAisa, Limbiali and Pundia census groups are I feel still wary of the Administration and its objectives. In the six days that I spent at Aisaisa no food was forthcoming from the people and there was a marked absence of the usual group of men coming to the rest house for a talk. The general attitude towards work, although not grudging could hardly be called eager.

Perhaps this uncertainess could be accounted for by the fact that there has been trouble here on a previous occasion resulting in the death of one man and the wounding of two influential headmen. Although every assurance was given me that nothing of this kind would ever occur again it may still account for this coldness.

This may also be because of the fact that these groups lie at the extremes of the Mendi and the Ialibu areas. Thus they are not subjected to the amount of Administration influence that those groups closer to the two stations are. However I feel that with the completion of the Mendi-Ialibu road and the increased volume of traffic resulting from it will serve in some way to settle these groups and to extend Administration influence.

Village Officials.

Generally the standard and conduct of the village Officials in this Census Division is up to standard, however the Village Constable from Tutama is openly using his authority to feather his own nest, by way of threats of a court if the people do not comply with his wishes. On two occasions he has not only disregarded the ruling of a Court but has also instituted his own ideas for his own benefit. For these reasons his dismissal is recommended.

Agriculture.

Native agriculture throughout the Census Division is retarded by the nature of the soil, it being an extremely well leached clay and devoid of any plant nutrients to any degree, as is shown by the size of the sweet potatoes produced in this area as compared to that grown in the Council area.

There are almost no European type vegetables grown in this area. However upon request I procured seeds from the Agricultural Officer and distributed them amongs't the Lumbi and Yebi.groups.

At Yebi there was several requests for a visit of the Agricultural Officer in order that some advice could have been given concerning the establishment of cash crops, this being mainly Coffee. At the time however other committments prevented the Officer from visiting the area.

Mission establishments in this area are not very numerous, being only of the Lutheren and Roman Catholic denominations. There seems a good deal of teaching being done by the Native teachers of both denominations, however one incident of the teacher telling his congregation that if they did not keep him supplied with food etc. they would be punished with both fire and floods. This seems hardly the way to win any- ones confidence.

Health.

I found no evidence of any form of disease apart from a few minor cutsete.

In this Census Division of over four thousand people, there is only a one Medical Aid postwhich : situated at AisAisa and serves only one quarter of the areaeffectively, Whereas at Yebi with its population of over a thousand people there is no form of Medical care available. The institution of an Aid Post hore would be of tramendous value.

Conclusion.



The Mendi-Islibu road is now open for a distanceof twenty two miles and I expect it to be completed by the end of the year. 

Patrol Instructions.

Please prepare to depart on patrol today commencing at KIBURU Rest House and covering the whole of the road from Mendi to the ANGA Gorge.

The purpose of the patrol is to improve the present road and repair bridges and culverts. Mr. Briggs has recently patrolled this portion of the road and improved it but further improvement is still required and in addition repairs are needed after the last fortnights heavy continuous rain.

Small landslides have occurred blocking side drains and small culverts. These are to be cleared out and made servicable again. In addition on portion of the road an overhanging bank has been left which is most likely to collapse and block the drains and ther road. This overhanging bank is to be sharpened off.

Your first task is to have the people near Mendi collect materials for the complete reconstruction of the second large bridge from Mendi along the ANMA Gorge road. The materials must be ready on the bridge site by Monday 30 th September. The construction of this bridge is to be used as a demonstration to the people attending the present leadership course at Mendi. As yet it is uncertain just who is to supervise the construction of the bridge but the District Officer is going to request Public Works Department to do the job. There is also a bridge on the other side of OIYARIP to be replaced and we also hope to get Public Works to supervise construction although we must arrange collection of materials. Please arrange for the OIYARIP people to assemble materials on the site. Both these bridges are dangerous to anything more than light traffic.

I suggest that you commence at KIBURU and work from there at the beginning. I will send the landrover to you as much as possible to enable you to move along the road supervising work.

The District Officer has intimated that the District Commissioner will give authority for police to be used as supervisors etc. on the road maintenance.

I will visit you from time to time to see what progress you are making. You will be accompanied by three police and one native to act as interpreter.

- (b) Repair bridges (actually two large bridges were entirely reconstructed) and culverts.

INTRODUCTION:

The purpose of this patrol was the supervision of road maintenance from the MENDI Station boundary to the ANGA Gorgo, along the MENDI - IALIEU road. Also to have the local people collect sufficient materials for the complete reconstruction of the rather large bridges at KIBURU and OIYARIP. It was initially anticipated that the supervision of the rese bridge reconstructions would be carried out by the Department of Public Works. But the final decision was that the supervision would be the responsibility of this patrol. These two bridges were completed, although owing to the time and labour that had to be spent on them the intended amount of road maintenance was not accomplished. In actual fact only five miles of the road was repaired to high degree of satisfaction.

The area covered by the patrol is situated in a general south -easterly direction from MENDI and whilst the main tasks of the patrol were being carried out any other administrative problems that occurred in the area were given prompt and generous attention.

There was a slight break in the patrol when I was recalled to)I to act as interpreter in a Supreme Court Case. However during my nce the progress of the work appeared to continue smoothly.

0800 hrs informed the District Commissioner Mr. Skinner that the old KIBURU bridge could now be demalished as both the wooden abutments had been completed and filled with stone. Also arranged with the D.C. for a landrover to be loaned from the transport pool. The intention was to have the vehicle placed on the far side of the KALONK river, for while the bridge was undergoing reconstruction the landrover would be of convenience to whom ever might need it.

0900 hrs returned to KIBURU in the landrover and had it placed on the far side of the river.

Placed three of the new large stringers into position and commenced the demolition of the old bridge - completed this by I700 hrs

Tuesday 15 th October.

Supervised the building of the new bridge throughout the day.

Wednesday I6 th October.

Continued supervision of the reconstruction of the KIBURU bridge - the days work resulted in the two bearers being placed into position and also eight heavy stringers. This then completed the frame-work of the bridge and all that remained was the task of embedding the eight stringers (ie the ends of these stringers which lay on each side of the banks of the river) with stone and spiking into position the new decking.

Thursday I7 th October.

0735 hrs at WA supervised the cutting of the timber that was to be used for decking.

II00 hrs returned to MENDI and obtained a tractor from P.W.D. with the intention of using it for the transporting of the timber from WA to KIBURU. The tractor departed for WA II30 hrs.

Returned KIBURU 1300 hrs and supervised road work, also the unloading of the decking timber.

Friday 18 th October.

Started the workers at KIBURU cutting the decking

timber to the correct dimensions.

1000 hrs visited the workers at OTYARIP and they appeared to have sufficient timber at the OTYARIP bridge site for its reconstruction. Returned to KIBURU 1600 hrs.

Saturday 19 th October.

Remained at KIBURU.

Sunday 20 th October.

0735 hrs departed KIBURU and inspected the road work at WA. Returned to KIBURU 1215 hrs.

Some of the workers at KIBURU were still engaged in cutting the decking to the correct size.

0800 hrs supervised the spiking of the decking to the stringers. This was completed 0400 hrs as a considerable amount of time had to be spent in getting the deck planks to lie correctly on the stringers. The KIBURU bridge is now completed and is now accessible to heavy vehicular traffic.

Arrived MENDI 0900 hrs and returned the landrover which had been placed on the far side of the river while the bridge was undergoing reconstruction, to the transport pool.

Obtained further bridge building supplies from P.W.D. - arrived back at KIBURU 1200 hrs.

Supervised road maintenance at KIBURU until 1600 hrs.

1700 hrs visit by the District Commissioner who requested me to return to MFMDI on the morrow for interpreting in the Supreme Court. D.C. departed I830 hrs.

Thursday 24 th October.

Arrived MENDI 0900 hrs. Assisted in the preparations for United Nations Day - attended the ceremony II00 hrs.

0800 hrs departed KIBURU and arrived OIYARIP 0845 hrs. The amount of progress being made with both the road repairs and the bridge abutments was extremely favourable. Returned to KIBURU 1330 hrs.

Supervised road repairs at KIBURU during the afternoon.

Tuesday 5 th November.

Supervision of road maintenance at KIBURU throughout the day.

Wednesday 6 th November.

0800 hrs supervision of road maintenace KIBURU.

Demolished the old OIYARIP bridge and placed the seven atringers into correct position and embedded them in stone. There seven

heavy stringers lie on the tops of the abutments which are built on both banks of the river. The stringers are therefore the main beams that span the river.

Instructions were given to the workers to cut timber to the correct dimensions for decking.

I300 hrs visited LUMBI and inspected the road repairs that were being carried out there - arrived back at OIYARIP 1700 hrs.

Slight rain during the night.

Thursday 14 th November.

Spent the morning supervising the spiking of the decking to the stringers. The bridge at OIYARIP was completely reconstructed by 1300 hrs.

Spent several hours hearing complaints.

Onset of rain 1700 hrs.

Friday I5 th November.

0800 hrs several more complaints heard and settled.

0930 arrival of landrover with a message from the A.D.O advising termination of the patrol if the bridge was completely reconstructed.

Patrol returned MENDI 1130 hrs reported to A.D.O.

and stood down.

END OF PATROL DIARY

NATIVE SITUATION:

This patrol supervised groups of local people who were working on the MENDI - IALIBU at WA, KIBURU, and OIYARIP.

WA is situated in an area which lies adjacent to the south eas boundary of the MENDI Station. The number of groups working in this vicinity amounted to four they being UMBIMI, TAITA, LONK and KAMBEGIBU. These groups were engaged purely in road maintenance and had nothing to do with bridge reconstruction work. On the whole they worked extremely well, although at times friction did occur. However such unsavory instances were promptly controlled and the progress of the work once again continued smoothly.

KIBURU is approximately three miles from WA and it was here that the patrol was camped for the majority of its duration. The groups working in this area were WA, MOIS, and KIBURU. All of these groups were initially engaged in the reconstruction of the KIBURU bridge and after its completion their energy was channelled into road maintenance. They appeared to york well and on mano occasion were there upsets amongst them.

At OIYARIP which is roughly six miles from WA, a bridge was entirely reconstructed and in conjunction with this task road maintenance was carried out. The group; responsible for these activities were OIYARIP, MOIT, IAMI, TUTAME, and LUMBI. They worked very satisfactorily and seemed to have a desire to complete the projects with a minimum amount

NATIVE SITUATION Cont.

of delay.

A considerable number of complaints were brought to the notice of the patrol and each dispute was given prompt and thorough attent-ion.

My assessment of the native situation in the area covered by the patrol, is that generally it is most satisfactory. The people appear to be content and on the whole they are working well.

BRIDGES:

As stated previously in this report two rather large bridges were wan reconstructed under the supervision of the patrol - one at KIBURU and the other at OIYARIP.

The amount of attention and effort that had to be expended on these two reconstructions was extremely time consuming and stremueus. The hard suitable timbers that were required could only be located at distances up to one and half miles from the bridge sites. Moreover owing to this problem of distance and the rugged terrain which the timbers had to be dragged manually over, the task to be accomplished was vibtually herculean.

In the case of both bridges large wooden abutments were erected on each bank and filled with river stone. The purpose of the abutments was to reduce the considerably the span of the river and by so doing subdue the amount of stress which is placed on the stringers when vehicles are crossing the bridge.

Both these bridges are accessible to heavy vehicular traffic and should remain in good condition for a considerable number of years.

ROADS:

Five miles of the MENDI - IALIBU road were repaired during the course of this patrol. It was the original intention to supervise the maintenance of some twelve miles of this road covering the section between the station boundary and the ANGA Gorge. Unfortunately owing to my impending xixixxxx transfer to NIPA which is to materialise within the next few days and the amount of time and labour that had to be expended on the two bridge reconstructions it was not possible to repair the road beyond OIYARIP except in the case of a bad corduroyed section which was attended to at LUMBI.

Generally the road from MENDI to the ANGA Gorge is in a reason -able condition. There are of course certain patches that need attention but there are other large sections which are in first class order.

A few years previously the road had been stoned and this made it impossible to repair by cutting, emphasis then had to be placed on filling with large stones and gravel and where ever possible attempting to obtain a camber like appearance on the surface of the road.

On the completion of the patrol all the groups that had been working under its supervision were given an issue of tools such as shove is

ROADS Cont.

buckets, sledge-hammers and picks. These items should provide an excellent incentive for future road maintenance. Actually all of these groups have volunteered to do a certain amount of road work each week and it is jutend -ed that a cash payment will be made to them for their effort during the period they were under the supervision of the patrol.

HEALTH:

The health of all the people the patrol contacted appeared to be extremely good and in only one instance was a person despatched to MENDI for medical treatment and that was in the case of a woman suffering from severe burns.

EDUCATION:

There is a primary T school at KIBURU and another at OI-YARIP. Both these schools are conducted by European Education Officers who have under their supervision indigenous teachers. The schools provide for four grades and the attendance seems to be reasonable.

R.P.&.N.G.C.

The patrol was accompanied by three members of the R.P.&.N.G.C. all of whom carried cut their duties to my entire satisfaction R.S.I forms have been completed for the three of them and forwarded to the Commissioner of Police, while duplicate entries have been made in their records of service.

Attached harete please find two copies of a report on the above patrol as submitted by Mr P.A. Briggs, Cadet Patrol Officer. The submission of this report has been delayed as it was hoped that I would be able to report on the completion of payment of money to those involved in working on the road and thus bring the whole business to its conclusion as far as this department is concerned. As the necessary money has not yet some to hand I do not wish to delay presentation of the report any further.

The purpose of this patrol was to repair the existing road between Komia and the Western Highlands/Southern Highlands boundary and to construct such a road where no road existed and also to construct bridges and culverts.

Por the shele period Hr Briggs was camped at 5000 ft above sea level in one of the most imbospitable and mirrorable places imaginable. Rain fell on practically every day the patrol was in the area and working conditions were most uncomfortable.

The road is now trafficable after a spell of dry weather as far as the District border and the Public Works Department is about to commence work on stoning the surface of the road.

The difficulties experienced by the councillors in getting work done are understood and their problems would appear to be similar to those of politicisms in Australia.

It appears that when the Local Government Council was instituted the peoplesexpected a change for the better evermight and they are just begining to discover that this has not happened.

The desire for money is pleasing but I agree that their source of values is distorted.

For a young inexperienced officer Hr Briggs has done an excellent job under the most trying conditions.

Mr Briggs presentation of his report is far from satisfactory and his typing requires improvement. His spelling is also not what it should be. More care should be taken with his reports.

PATROL INSTRUCTIONS.

Further to discussions between yourself and myself and the District Commissioner you are to continue with the construction of the Komia to MAILGI road.

You will be accompanied by two members of the R.P.N.G.C. and interpreter KISOMP. The District Medical Officer has intimated that he will make available to you a Medical Orderly stationed in the Komia-Birop area.

I consider that with the five groups, KOMIA, BIROP EKARI, ANGAMANDA and Klareg you should have sufficient able bodied men to do the job. Any more could become too unweildy. Whereever possible you should work through the Councillors of the groups concerned. Your plan of each group working separately on defined 'marks' should work out the best as know that the people prefer to work in that manner.

The District Commissioner has instructed you that he requires a twenty four foot road whereever this is possible. Her has also told you that he has the matter of payment for the road work in hand.

I realize that the people of the Komia area have proved to be difficult to work with in the past so you may require lot of patience to get what you want done. You are aware that Mr. Speed has previously pegged certain detours on the road and these should be followed as far as possible except where you consider that another route is better than the pegged one.

The people from this district should construct their section of the road as far a s the MINABEL Ck. but if you have any difficulty please consult me before pressing the matter. The District Commissioner has advised me that he will get in touch with The District Commissioner of the Western Highlands concerning the construction of the road in that District.

Should you strike any difficulty please get in touch with me immediately and in any case please keep me regularly advised of your progress.

Patrol Diary:

Nov. 13th 1963. Morning spent on final Patrol preparations, departed Mendi at 1350hrsby car for Komia rest house. Camp madeand Police inspected. Heavy rain in afternoon.

Nov. 14th Left rest house at 930hrs for a camp site known as Nemaret. all cargo being carried by prospective workers from Komia. Arrived Nemaret at 1300 hrs after a sairly long walk up the prospective road route. It looked to have several difficult sections which will need major changes. Camp made at Nemaret.

Nov. 15th. Waited for a small group of Komias to arrive in order that a start could be made on the construction of the houses that will be needed for the workers to sleep in for the duration of the job.

Nov. 16th Saturday today, spent the day with Policemen doing minor jobs around the camp-site.

Nov. 17th. Sunday again spent on camp chores.

Nov. 18th. All workers arrived today, had a discussion with the Coursil lors from the various groups. Also with the people as a whole, straightened out several things and also marked out the places for the house. Each group builds its own house in a straight line, also the womens house, one long building, divided into separate rooms for the various groups. A.D.O. arrived and spent night.

Left in company with A.D.O. for Mailgi (W.H.D.) in order to inspect the income and the work that will need to be done. Arrived at Mailgi at 1130hrs after a 3 hour walk. Rested for a half Hour and then began the return walk. Housing all finished today.

Nov. 20th. A.D.O. departed at 930 hrs after a talk with the Councillor work began in earnest today, and went well, no rain.

Nov 21st. Work began at 645hrs, continued well, everyone wants to follow the old road route rather than the marked detours, this will no doubt prove to be a tricky point as time goes on

Nov. 22nd. Walked along the route of the road, spent roughly two hours with each group, all still urging to follow the old route, however have started two groups on a new detour. Work finished at 1600hrs. Workers went back down to thier Willages today to collect Kau-Kau for the next week's work.

Nov. 23rdPolicemen spent the day rearranging the campsite, also building themselves a cook-house. Rain in afternoon.

Nov. 24th. Sunday today, no work policemen to Komia to attend Church.

Nov. 25thwork today at 0630 hrs, final figures taken for payment as het below, Anative Medical Orderly arrived today to take care of the many sicknesses that will occur.

Nov. 26th. Work at 630hrs generally very good progress made today however, a little bit of difficulty with the Birop group's section as far as the grading 15 concerned. Very heavy rain caused the finish of work at 1400hrs.

Nov. 27th. Birop group are o.k. now general progress indicates a conclusion of this first section before Christmas.

Nov. 28th. Today spent with the groups on the job, all going very well all the women are carrying stines necessary for surfacing later on. Rain again today.

Nov. 29th. Friday today all under control extremely good progress today as for the whole week. People went back to the Villages for the their food supplies. Rain again. Went to Mendi for discussion with DO

Dec. 2nd. Left Mendi for Nemaret at 1330 hrs. Arrived at 1500hrs, general roud work very pleasing, women also doingwell.

Dec. 35d. Women started today on the garden which will be used for the maintenance of future work gangs. Much advice given that the Sweet potatoe will not grow due to height and cold, with which am inclined to agree.

Dec. 4th. Women still on the garden, general road work going ok. Rain again today.

Dec. 5th. Two P. WD. road engineers throught from Mailgi today, a ccompa nied them down to Komia, raining heavily all the way.

Dec6th. Today work stopped in order that I could attend the lectures dealing with the forthcoming House of Assembly Elections, all cargo carried down to Komia and stored. Proceed by car to Mendi.

Dec13th. Left Mendi by carfor Momia and thence to Nemaret by foot rain again today.

Dec. 14th Sunday spent in rearranging the camp again.

Dec15th. All the groups have how finished their own individual sections and are now working together in an attempt to get the remaining section completed before christmas.

Dec16th. Great progress today due to the absence of rain, and a special group of fourty men have now completed two bridges and have st started on the many culverts. Have now finished the climbing section and am on the straight level section which forms the divide, at an altitude of 9,800ft.

Dec17th. Komia group working extremely well at breaking the stone which is in a large deposit at the Kumbami Greek, this will also be usefull at alater date.

Dec18th. Second of last section of work begun today will be finished before Christmas. Bridges doing well. Rain again today.

Dec. 19th. Final clearing of the road and general tidying up, road has now been completed up to my camp with all bridges and culverts. Rain again today as usual.

Dec. 20th. This mouning broke camp at 0700hrs and walked down with all cargo to Komia. Met the D.N.A vehicle and proceeded to Mendi.

CHRISTMAS BREAK.



Ja noth. Departed Mendi at 1000 hrs for Komia in order to resume work and to pay the workers for the section allready completed. Started payment at 1430hrs there was a fair deal of quibbling over the pay but finally settled spent the night at Komia.

Jan. 7th. Today proceede to Nemaret by foot heavy rain made it a bit difficult but arrived with targo and proceeded to make camp, heavy rain.

Jan. 8th. A. D. O. and D. O. arrived today to speak to the people about pay and w ork in general, D. O. walked to the Minabel Ck. while A. D. O. addressed the group. Heavy rain in afternoon.

Jan9thToday demonstrated the length of one mile and the pay equivalent to it for the workers benefit. Walked with the group over a previously chained one mile section and then showed them three hundred small sticks which represented the pay equivalent to this section.

Jan 10th. Work as usual today, one bridge completed and thelogs pulled for another also two culverts finished. People went back to their villages for food at 1430hrs.

fan 11th. Began chaining the section from Nemaret to the Kondo Ckso that it can later be sub-divided into suitable working sections

52612th. Today Sunday observed Sabbath at Nemaret, all returned by night

Jan. 13th Today completed two more culverts and a good section of the road. It is proving to be difficult to get these people to put a camber on the road.

Jan14th. All the creeks and bridges now completed up to the road head Mr. F. E. Haviland arrived today from Mendi for the purpose of compiling data about the clan boundaries for the extent of the road. Rain again Mr. Haviland slept Nemaret.

Jan. 15th. Today accompanied Mr. F. E. Haviland P.O. along the road from the Komia rest house to the Minabel Creek. Compiled a fairly comprehensive chart of the Clai boundaries.

Taday: Mr. wiland adeparted

Jan 16th. Today Mr. avilanddeparted for Mendi. Road work in general coing

o,k. and road is now starting to get something of a semblance of a camber

on it. Rain again.

Jent7th. Tractor to Mendi today for service also two policemen accompaning. Today pulled the necessary timbers for the bridge over the Waltaga Creek a span of over 50 feet.

San18th. Today spent in general camp duties.

Jan 19th. Sunday today spent resting.

Jan 20th. Today bridge construction and general roadwork, bridge nearly sar completed. Exari group sent lack to complete a section which they failed to finish satisfactorily in the first instance.

Jan. 21st. Ekari group still completing their section. Bridge finally completed. It is still hard to get them to form the road with camber. Policeman and Interpreter dispatched to Pirop Village to find a man who it is alleged stole a pig from one of the workers.

Jan22nd, Today all workers went to the Kondo Creek to retrieve a vehicle which has broken down, owner agreed to pay 3/- per man for the work involved in pulling the vehicle to the road head.

Jan23rd. Today work as usual without any interuptions, a bit better tita attempt at a camber made. No rain until after 1600hrs which made things far easier.

Jen. 24th. Very good progress today at last the Idead of a camber seems to firmly in the workers heads. Received note from A.D.O requesting my presence at Mendi, proceeded there1400hrs.

Jan. 28th. Left "endi by car with Mr. G.A. Speed, had difficulty with the slippery road surface and wass forced to walk for the majority of the ascent.

Jan29th. Today assisted Mr. Speed with his lectures on the House of Assembly elections. Afternoon spent in work supervision

Jan. 30th. Today work again however two deaths of influential men causeda bit of a distraction, as far as work was concerned.

Jan. 31st. All workers left for the mourning ceremonies at o8co hrs. D.c. D.O. A.D.O. R.W.O arrived this morning by Helicopter for inspection of the road both here and on the ".H.D side.

Febist. Saturday today spent in investigating possible sand and gravel deposits.

Feb. 2nd. Sunday.

Feb 3rd. Today everyone started work on the approaches to the Waltaga Ck. Once again a mental battle of wits trying to get anything resembling a samber on the road.

Feb. 4th, Once again a bit of trouble with the cambering, however finally succeeded in straightening it out satisfactorily

Feb5th. Today a small group working to complete the last of the first one mile section. Women spent the day straightening the approaches to the Waltaga bridge.

Feb6th. Men still working on the road going down to the Waltaga creek all satisfactory . No rain.

Feb7th. Camp broken and cargo assemble d, on the move at 0830hrs arrived Komia 1000hrs. Then proceeded mendi for the forthcoming elections.

Feb. 14th. Today Friday. left Mendi for Komia rest notse, in order to be ready for an early start on Monday.

Feb. 15th, Saturday at Komia.

Feb 16th. Sunday at Komia.

Feb17th.
Departed Komia for road head and new camp, all stores carried as the road was too slippery for the tractor. Have only the as the road was too slippery for the tractor. Have only the Komia and Birop groups working as the other two groups are involved with the elections. Arrived Kagoba at 1430 hrs and established camp and also the men built their own and their womens houses.

Feb. 18th. Workwar very pleasing today norain and progress was quite considerable. Seems to be a better attitude towards work than therewas before. Work finished at 1500hrs in order that the housescould be completed.

Feb. 19th. Today work began in earnest and a good deal of progress was made. No rain again.

Feb20th. Today D.C. visited by Helicopter and a good deal of consternation was caused by the 'balus'. no rain and work went ahead.

Feb21st. Work again much persussion applied on me to send everyone back to their places at 800hrs on Friday mornings, based on the increased distance; mile further too walk.

Feb 22nd. Saturday today

Feb23rd. Sunday spent on A.S.O.P.A. assignments. Karel

Feb24th. Today all Kamis and Ekari groups arrived to their Villages where they had been voting. They began built their houses immediately and had most of them finished by

Feb. 25th. Today one policeman dispatched to Karel and one to Ekari to see what is holding up the rest of the workers from these places. Rain again today.

Feb26th. Today work went ahead well and the bridge on the Kombami Ck. is now completed. The road is now open 72miles past Komia.

Feb27th. Today logs and abuttments placed for the next bridge over the Sugamaga Ck. A good section of road completed.

Feb 28th. Today work began on the second mile section of the road leaving only a small section of 12 miles to complete.

Feb 29th. Saturday spent with the policemen on camp maintenance. Warchol st Sunday spent resting.

March 2nd. Today work proceeded well all groups given an individual section to complete.

March 3rd. Again all going well, logs for another bridge cat and pulled into position, another garden begun by women.

March 4th. Another lot of logs pulled for another minor creek while road went shead well.

March 5th. Today a minor dispute between myself and several of the Councillors as to the way that the road should be built, I pointed out that the only person responsible for the construction of the road was myself, finally resolved itself. Rain again.

March 6th. Work still going ahead o.k. there is now a shovel shortage so all the shovels have had to be put in the store after work finishes on Friday.

March 7th. Again Saturday spent on assignments.

March 8th. Sunday spent resting and on assignments.

March 9th. A good turn up again, everyone stilldetermined not to w work past the Kondo Ck. But it may be possible at some tatered later date to persuade them otherwise.

Merch 10th. Work old, a conference with the Councillors from Komia and Birop, persuaded them to complete the road to a point of the way between the Kondo and the Minabel Ck.

March 11th. Today walked over the section in dispute as above and placed a mark to everyones satisfaction.

March 12th. Visit today by two P.W.D. officers a few helpful comments on the road and its construction, only a few small bridges and and a little section of road to complete now.



March 17th. Today a heavy mist making conditions difficult, however managed to put the logs for the Kagoba Ck into position

March 14th. Saturday today also a heavy mist.

Murch 15th. Sunday all returned on time.

March 16th. Monday today constructed the abuttments for the Kondo ck. a very wide bridge made the abuttments so as to shorten the overall span in all satisfactory.

March 17th. Completed the abuttments today heavy rain again, the workers on the ondo and inabel section going extremely well indeed

March. 18th. Wednesday again the women working on the abuttments of the Kondo ck. filling up the area with stone.

March 19th. Work o.k. again today abuttments all most full and no sign of weakening.

March 20th. Today the workers of the Birop and Romia groups decided to stop the weekend and complete their section in aneffort to finish the job at the same time as the other two groups which are also very close to completion.

March 21st. Saturday today, work going ahead well, with the irop and "omia groups, purchased Sweet Potatoe and other vegetables from a group of Tambul people, this food to be given to the two groups who spent the weekend working.

March 22nd. Sunday today, work again put us within striking distance of the finish for to, orrow if there is no rain. People from Karel and kari arrived back o.k.

Komia and Birop groups completed their section about 1600hrs. The Karel and Fkari's finished at 1700hrs road now open to the Minabel ck. completed by this patrol, 600-1000 yds short of the Minabel.

March 24th.0800hrs camp broken and proceeded to Komia by foot waited for the Sub-District Office car to arrive and told the people of the fine job they had done, Car arrived at 1000 hrs proceeded to Mendi; 1500hrs Fatrol stood down.

ROADS and BRIDGES:

Previous to this Patrol there we no effective road link between Mendi and any other District Readquarters, consequently supplies of all types had to be brought in by air and all the vehicles which are now in Mendi were pulled over a roughtrack by paid labour, this was a far from satisfactory arrangement due to the difficulty at times in obtaining labour. The purpose of this Patrol then was to construct a trafficable road between Mendi and the W.H.D. border.

The road leaves Komia and travels in a N.W direction along a fairly level stretch of ground for a distance of 32 miles, then it begins to ascend from 7000ft unilit reaches its highest point of 9,800ft at Remaret which is a further 3miles from the start of the ascent.

As can be imagined the grading of this section proved to be a rather difficult job as it was necessary to ensure that there was not too big a rise on any one of the corners and the number of corners, due to the narrowness of the spur up which the road travels, is quite considerable. The soil types have and will continue to as play an important part in the amount and type of traffic that can use road in any given period. In the majority of cases, after the topsoil has been removed a fairly strong surface can be formed, however in some places there are deposits of heavy black loam which will prove to be troublesome both now and when the stone surface is laid.

bridges with an average span of 40 ft and 6 earth and timber culverts also 27 minor culverts over cross drains used to clear the water away from the edges of the road. All the major bridges were decked with 91t-sawn planks and nailed with 9" spikes. The planks were bought from local sawyers at a rate of 30/- per hundred superfect. I expect these bridges to last aminimum of five years without any damagings deterioration. The approximate cost of constructing a fourty foot bridge under these conditions and when transport and other costs are considered is around the \$245 mark. The earth culverts built over the smaller streams which run through wide gutters, will last as long if not longer than the larger bridges.

The road for its entire length has an average width of 23feet from gutter to gutter. The last four and a half miles past Komia are cambered, however the first section which climbs so steeply is a level bench. This is due both to the width and to the grades which together would make a camber allmost ineffective. Drains have been dug on both sides of the road for its entire length and at regular intervals cross drains have been cut in order that the water could be effectively cleared from the road edge.

The labour for this job was drawn from the Birop, Komia, Karel, Ekari and Angamanda groups. These people comprised the younger i of the total opulation of their own individual groups and when combined into a solid work force they numbered 327, this includes the young unmarried females who worked on the construction of two gardens and several other smaller jobs.

The labourers supplied their own tood, going from work on the Friday afternoon to their villages where they collected a weeks supply of Sweet Potatoe, and returned on the Sunday afternoon During the week they lived in houses that they themselves constructed in two central spots (Nemaret&Kagoba)., these houses are still standing and will be of use for further maintenance.

At the beginning of the work the people were supplied with, 750 shovels, 15 crowbars, 25 picks and 300 feet of steel cable, on conclusion of the job these tools were distributed (see Relative Village Books) amongst the groups for further maintenance

The D.N.A. tractor began carrying the atone necessary for the surfacing of the road and succeeded in completing 11 miles, this stone was carried from the Komia Ck. which has an allmost unlimited supply, and should prove useful in future work. There was also a light John Deere buildozer lent by P.W.D. this was used for pulling some of the timber bearers necessary for the bridges and also on some light earthworks.

The total cost of labour for this job was £1475, being distributed between the five groups previously memfloned. These five groups worked fairly consistently for three and a half months and feel that in the future when it is decided to surface the road that it should be undertaken by labour drawn from the following groups, Abua, Nen, Kelta, Dimifa, Sol and Waparaga. As these groups will benefit from it as much as anyone.

During the construction of the road there was a dispute as to the end of the Mendi section and the start of the XXX W.H.D. portion. The Mendi section, so the people stated finished at the Rondo Ck. however on further investigation I found that the land between the Kondo and the Minabel Cks (which is held to bethe District boundary) is owned by four groups, two from Tambul and two from Mendi, under these circumstances I thought it better to compromise and to put a mark in the middle of this section and to make the road up to this point.

On the last weekend the last weekend of the Patrol
the people decided to work both Saturday and Sunday in order to the
complete the job before Easter. During these two days. Sweet
Potatoe was purchased from the Tambul people by myself and
issued to the labourers from Komia and Birop.

It would be advisable, to wait for at least three months before patting any heavy traffic over the road, or before work is begun on surfacing it with stone this period would see the now loose soil settled to a fair degree of firmness. In all it was a very good effort on the part of both the workers and their respective councillors. Councillors Pondo of Komia and Ku of Sa ara are to be especially commended on their work.

NATIVE AFFAIRS.

The ative Affairs situation in this Census Vivision is in most respects quite satisfactory. The area is within the boundaries of the Upper mendi Local Government Council and as such it is necessary for purposes of administration to work through the elected councillors. These gentlemen, the majority of whom are past Village Constables have raclised the change in their position and rank. They know that they cannot be given a direct order, but have to be asked rether they will do a thing, or if it would suit them to do it whereas previously the as Village Policemen they were bound to do some things which they did not like. Not realizing exactly what the Officer has in mind they often do the opposite to what they have been asked with sometimes frustrating results.

The Councillors are very often the headmen of their groups and hold quite a deal of influence with the people and can therefore be of great assistance and also a great help to the Vallage itself. This also backfires, the Councillors enjoy their position and realise that if they do not do as the majority wishes them they may not be reelected in a future e lection, and so they win the peoples favour (in some cases) not by good work, but by protecting the in various ways from the Government and its legal purposes once again this is extremely frustrating. I have had several Councillors say to me, " We agree with your ideas and policy, but if we carry them out and make everyone do so then we will not be missingly their time!"

It is pleasing to see that money has becomes amajor form of currency, I would not as yet say that it has outstripped the traditional M.O.P. shell, but it does rank equal with it. Money is recognised as the means by which one gains most of the Government' wealth. M.O.P. shell is used only for the traditional transactions of a mans everyday life. This is not only pleasing, but also rather difficult at times, these people are money hungry' they are beginning to demand rather exhorbitant prices for allmost worthless things, eg;5/- fo a small bundle of watercress.

people's to see that the old animosity and fears are still present although hidden under a heavy layer of good intentions. One prominent Councillor axpressed it very clearly when he said, when the local Government Council was instituted we expected all the old fights to finish, but they are still here and now I am afraid to go to Bela" I might add that this men was a very prominent fight leader years ago and not the type to scare easily

There are several minor dispute based on the supposed poisoning of influential men of one group by a second rival Clan, how these people decide that one has been poisoned and by what group is beyond me . Based on this there were several minor incidents resulting in a few scratches , over the duration of the Patrol

Generally speaking there were quite a few dispute brought to me for arbitration during the patrol the majority of these concerned the ownership of Pandanus trees and also marital trouble the more serious disputes were forwarded to a more senior officer in the Sub-District officer if they warranted couft action

Land Disputes:

Are fairly numerous in this area, as usual advantage is being taken of the arbitry method of decicing these issues, In times long gone by one group would not challenge another's right to land unless it felt sufficiently strong enough to succeed. Now however realising that a weaker side may often defeat a stronger one ina court, more and more previously settled matters are coming to the surface and hence the increase in the number of disputes. None of these disputes are as yet in the arms stage and it does not appear takely that this will ever be the result.

Agriculture:


Due to the position of the area patrolled which is for the most part uninhabited, I had no chance to inspect any gardens or other agricultural attempts. However I did plant a Sweet Potatoe garden at one of the places where the Patrol camped. This garden is at an altitude of 9,800ft and as such is subjected to some very low temperatures. It wil be interesting to note how these plants act to this temperature and altitude.

Health:

Over the duration of the Patrol I saw no contagious sickness, there were the usual cuts and scratches and for this purpose a Native ATd Post orderly accompanied. The attitude of these people to the Doctor Boy is very pleasing. The orderly Kandep-Pon is to be commended on his ability and willingness to work

Forretry: The patrol which covered the s lopes of Mt. Giluwe, was naturally very close to some of the previously inaccessible timber stands on these slopes. I noted several very extensive stands of timber presumably of the Pinus variety. These stand occur close to the road and will no doubt be of future economical adventage to their owners.


Conclusion:

Introduction:

This is my first patrol since my appointment as a Cadet Patrol

Officer. The objects of this patrol were, Electoral Education Program, Advise on Road and Bridge Work, Conduct Land Investigation Reports and General Administration.

Please refer to instructions for MENDI Patrol No. 15-63/64 rried out by F.E.Haviland P.O.Z. who I accompanied.

1220 Lunch on road- continued nailing bridges - 16 finished.

1405 Tractor had puncture - took spare wheel from transport and fixed tractor - returned U/S wheel to MENDI - stayed night in MENDI.

Monday 16th December, 1963.

0835 Left MENDI in Land Rover for PINJ.

1000 Arrived PINJ.

Rest of day spent investigating a riot between ESKAMPS and MILS over a piece of land, IEBI.

27 people convicted of riotous behaviour.

Tuesday 17th December 1963.

Moved to TUMIA rest house. Spent rest of day inspecting road and bridge work by TUMIA line.

Wednesday 18th December, 1963.

Day spent advising or road and bridge work.

Thursday 19th December 1963.

Spent day erecting a Polling Shelter at KIP.

Friday 20th December 1963.

Again gave advice on erection of Polling Shelter at KIP.

Saturday 21st December, 1963.

Tractor again punctured - F.E. Haviland drove Land Rover to MENDI and brought anothe, wheel to TUMIA. Both tractor and Land Rover proceeded to MENDI.

Mative Affairs:

In general native affairs were fairly good, and the people seem very keen to bring their troubles to the Patrol Officer.Any complaints that were brought forward were dealt with by Mr.F.E. Haviland, Magistrate for Native Matters.

In all cases the people seemed to be glad to see the patrol and co-operated with the patrol in all ways.

On Friday 13/12/63 there was a riot between ESKAMP and MIL groups over a piece of laud (IEBI), that is before the Native Lends Commission. The following is the history of the land, IEBI, gathered from the investigation following the riot:

- 1. Back in the 'dark ages' PAGON of MIL died and the ESKAMPS were accused of sorcery.PALANK, headman of MIL, killed PONALT of ESKAMP as pay back for the death of PAGON.
- 2. PAGULAM, headman of ESKAMP?declared war on MIL. The ESKAMPS cleared all the MILS off the land, IEBI? and claimed the land for themselves. PAGULAM claims they burnt all of the old Pandanus and that they planted new ones.
- 3. MIL's claim they offered compensation to the ESKAMPS but their offer was rejected.PAGULAM says (during the investigation) that he used PONALT's death as an excuse to get the land, IEBI. He said he could not care less about PONALT's death but that he used it to get the land, IEBI.

The position as it stands now:

ESKAMP's claim the land as their conquest.
MIL's claim the **taxtheirs** land is theirs stolen by the
ESKAMBS

As a result of the investigation 27 people were convicted of riotous behaviour and assult.

The people have been asked to abide by the advice given to them by Mr. P.Barber P.O. and to await the decision of the Native Lands Commission.

These people seem very keen to build the road and finish it very quickly. The main reason for this seem to be because of the expected economic development mentioned under Roads and Bridges.

These people have seen that all the other bridges on other roads around MENDI have been paid for with M.O.P. shells. Because of the shortage of this shell it is taking a lot of explaining to get these people to understand there are no shells left. They say they are prepared to wait until there are sufficient shells found but they do not understandthat there probably will never be sufficent.

The Village Constable from PINJ approached the patrol and said he would like to build a 'half way house' at PINJ so that anyone using the road could stop there at night time. This is a good site for a house for this purpose because it is 2hrs. drive and 42hrs. walk to MENDI. The Village Constable was told he could build this house after the road and bridges on his mark where up to standard.

Roads and Bridges:

A general pattern of road and bridge work is covered in the Patrol Diary.

A great deal of advice and instruction was given on bridge work. The bridges had been built by Mr.C.Sanderson P.O. but the decking on the bridges had not been finished because he had had no nails. This was done on this patrol. Stones and gravel were put on the approaches to the bridges so there is no space between the bridge decking and the road surface. Pieces of timber were secured along both sides of the bridges to stop any slipping when driving over them in wet weather.

Since the last patrol was in this area the road bench has been finished from PUMI, up the Lai Valley, to TUMIA. The road is now trafficable, in wet or dry periods, from MEEDI to TUMIA, a distence of 26 miles. This has shown that these people can work on their own quite well. Some corners and hills on this section had to be cut again because these sections were untrafficable.

The tractor and trailer on the patrol were used for carring stones and gravel which were used on hills and the approaches to the bridges. The time the patrol was, in this area did not allow the tractor to stone the road completely.

The people are very keen to finish the road so a tractor can come along the road and buy their sweet potatoes and European vegetables. They seem to think when this happens there will be a complete economic change.

Electoral Education Program:

Talk; on the House of Assembly Elections to be held in 1964 were given by Mr.F.E.Haviland P.O. at PUMI, PINJ, TUGUP, KAMB, KIPand TUMIA. This is the first elections for these people and I find they are taking a great interest in these talks and are asking questions.

Shelters are being built, at the Polling Cenres, to act as Polling shelters during the Elections. The people aree also taking a greatminterest in these buildings when they were told they can be used for a court house, census taking, talking to the Patrol Officer and also for showing pictures if the portable projector is taken on patrol to these shelters.

PONT, a native of NIPA, a prospective candidate for the elections, accompanied thee patrol for the first few weeks. He gave several talks to the people and here again there was a good response. The people asked many questions, all of which PONT seemed capable of answering.

Village Officials:

The Village Constables seem to be doing do reasonable job especially when the patrol was in the area. have a feeling that several Village Constables are entirely different people when there are no patrols present but I have so good reason to back this up.

The Village Constable from ENDOWA, ONARAP, has joined the Highland Lebour Scheme and TOBIRI has been appointed his successor. The appropriate form has been filled in and dealt with.

Health and Hygiene:

Native Medical Orderly? PIM, accompanied the patrol and saw to any in each group that needed treatment.

It was noted that they came forward readily for treatment but seem to think that if they are sent to the hospital at MENDI they will die. It was explained to them that they were sent to the hospital for treatmentand not because they were going to die.

There were several minor injuries treated but in general health in this area is fair. One male native was brought to the hospital at MENDI for treatment of a cut on the foot. The injury was received as the result of an accident.

Education and Missions:

There are no Government schools in this area. The Methodist Overseas Mission has establishments at TUGUP and KIP the Catablic Mission has establishments at PINJ and between PINJ and TUGUP. These establishments ,in both cases, are not schools but more like Bible classes or pre-schools. From these the children learn Pidgin-English, learn to count and are taught Christianity. If some children show promise they are sent to the mission headquartersin MENDI. Here they are educated to, a much higher degree.

Housing and Sanitation:

Housing and pit latrines were not inspected because all the people are working on the road full time. It can be seen from past reports that the people in this area look after their housing and that they use pit latrines to a fair degree.

Highland Labour Scheme:

Seven recruits from KAMB approached me and said they would like to join the Highland Labour Scheme. They did not wish to join at this time but early in the New Year (1964). They were told to come to MENDI when they wished to join and they would be looked after.

Land Investigations:

There were two CI 235 investigations done. Both of these were for the Methodist Overseas Mission applications.— one was at IUGUP and the other was at KIP. Both groups were willing to sell ground.

Agriculture and Livestock:


These people grow the usual native vegetables plus introduced European vegetables. The native foods grown are sweet potatoes pit pit, pandanus, bananas and pineapples. The European vegetables grown are cabbages, tomatoes, potatoes, carrots and some spinach.

The live stock in this area consists of native pigs and som; fowls, mostly found on mission establishments.

The experimental coffee plots in this area seem to be clean and lookeed after. It was noted that the coffee at PINJ was very poor and that the leaves were all yellow. The District Agriculture Officer was approached on this matter and he informed me that two reason could affect the coffee in this way. He also informed me that he would inspect this coffee early in the New Year(1964).

MENDI PATROL NO. 19 - 63/64 HAVING BEEN COMPLETED.

NATIVE APPAIRS:

A. GENERAL.

The primary object of this patrol was the education of the native people in all aspects of the coming House of Assembly. The main points being voting procedure and the functions of the House of Assembly.

The attendance of the people to these meetings was far from being 100%. In fact the attendance of some groups was most disappointing. I think the poor attendances can be attributed to the fact that there was no role call at any of the meetings. This would then lead one to believe that there was a lack of interest in the coming elections. However, from my observations I would say that there is considerable interest being shown in the elections. The retarding factor is the lack of appreciation of the importance of the formation of the House of Assembly.

Mock-elections were held and it became evident that the people have quite a firm grasp of the actual voting procedure.

There is a certain amount of unrest in this area at the moment, stemming mainly from the murder which took place on the 18th December, 1963. This unrest is evident by the fact that the people of the area will not walk far from thir own group by themselves and by the increasing number of bows and arrows that are being carried. I think, though, that with a firm hand and a watchful eye nothing will develop.

B. VILLAGE OFFICIALS.

This area is in fact the Upper Mendi Local Government Council. Therefore, the only officials found in the are a are the Councillors. The Councillors don't seem to have the respect they should have from the people. The majority of the Councillors are all young men and as the strongest influence in the area still comes from the older generation of the traditional leaders etc. it's not surprising that the progressive ideas of the Councillors are somewhat dempened and suppressed by the people. Most of the young people in the area are in favour of fellowing the Councillors but do not feel able to do so against the opposition of the elders.

G. ROADS.

The roads in the Council area are not in good repair but they are certainly no worse and in many instances are a lot better than the rest of the roads in the Sub-District.

CONCLUSION:

Every group in the two census division (the Council Area) has been instructed on the function and importance of the new House of Assembly and on voting procedure for the coming elections. I feel that the majority of the people in this area are now adequately equipped for the coming elections.

The work performed by the Lai Valley people on the vehicular read is most creditable. The read will open up the valley to speedy inspection visits and will thus facilitate the establishment of schools and Aid Posts. Three weeks ago I visited the FUHI area with the District Education Inspector and I believe it is his intention to open a school in this vicinity next financial year.

From my own observations in this Division I too believe that the people are showing quite considerable interest in the Elections. There is also a possibility that candidate KOMIA (D.N.A. Interpreter) encouraged the Ini people to nominate RBI for the purpose of splitting the fote and gaining to himself the second preferences.

Mr. McQuilty has worked hard, however, he could improve his Report by endeavouring to write in a more smooth and flowing manner. His observations are quite sound but he fails to express himself fully. He should not be discouraged by this criticism which is intended to be of assistance.

Introduction:

The objects of this Patrol werethe Electoral Education Program and to do two Land Investigations, one at Homeo and the other at Mapkebol, both for the Methodist Overseas Mission Applications.

Other objects of the Patrol were to advise on Road and Bridge work and to carry out General Administration.

For the Patrol Instructions of this Patrol please refer to the Patrol Instructions for MEND® Patrol 15-63/64 carried out by Mr.F.E.Haviland P.O.2.

Mr.F.E.Haviland P.O.2 was to lead this Patrol but at the last moment, due to unforseen circumstances, he was unable to do so.

The Lai Valley is situated North-West of MENDI between the KARINT Census Division and the NIPA Administration Area. It lies in a North South direction from PUMI and ESKAMP in the South to PELEPUL in the North.

In the Southern section the valley is a wide open valley with undulating hills on the valley floor rising to steep rugged mountain ranges on either side. In the Northern section the valley is divided and consists of many small creeks and rough hilly country.

Native Situation:

In all cases where the Patrol visited a Rest House the people were very glad to see it. The people, especially in the Northern section of the Lai Valley, co-operated with the Patrol in every way.

The people came readily forward and spoke about any troubles they had or bought forward any problems that needed straightening.

There were no people brought back to MENDI for Court of Native Matters.

I was approached by the people of PUMI who asked me if I would appoint a Village Constable for them. The present Village Constable comes from SUMIA which does not have a Rest House but go to PUMI for Census and talks. I think this would be a good idea and the next Patrol to this area could appoint the extra Village Constable.

While at the HOMEP Rest House the people told me that they would like to break away from TUMIA which is where is where they now have their Census taken. If they do this it will mean only approximately 200 people will be in this area but they live in houses scattered over a large area of land, about one hours walk from TUMIA. The next Census Patrol to visit TUMIA could attend to this matter.

In the course of the Patrol I was approached by people from SOBA, WINJA, KUIANDA, WADIBA, MALALA and LIBI. These people asked me to appoint some Village Councillors for them so that road work will be much easier. As a result HUK-SONGOL and UBIL-TEHEI of SOBA; KOLUMBE-HALABE I and UNDIBIAL-PUN of KUIANDA; AMINJA-PAGOLT of WINIA; PUKA-PUNIN of WADIBA; HADUT-KUNI of MALALA and LEMILA-KIWI of LIBI were appointed as Village Councillors.

U

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Electoral Education Program:

A talk on the House of Assembly Elections was given at HOMEP, MAPKEBOL And SOBA. They were told at the same time who the five candidates are for the Open Electorate and who the two candidates are for the Special Electorate. They were also told when the Elections are to be seld.

These people seem to have taken a great interest in these Elections. I am under the impression that they are talking a great deal amongst themselves on this subject.

There were Polling Booths built at PUMI, KIP, SOBA and WINJA. Those Booths are built out of native materials.

Village Constables:

AS a result of this Patrol I do not recommend any appointments, except those mentioned under "Native Situation", or terminations.

The Village Constables in the Lower Lai Valley, who have on an average about 400 people in each group, do not do as good a job as the Village Constables in the Upper Lai Valley who have up to 600 people to look after. I think this weakness, in the Lower Lai Valley, could be attributed to the preximity to MENDI Sub-District Office. If they have a problem they come to the Office and it is talked over with the A.D.O. where in the Upper Lai Valley the Village Constables find that they can straighten the small problems themselves.

Roads and Bridges:

There was very little advice given on Road and Bridge work but at every opportunity the importance of the road was stressed to the people.

The MENDI-KANDEP road is now open to four-wheel drive vehiclesas far as TUMIA, a distance of 26 miles. The bench is cut from TUMIA to SOBA and the bridges are in the process of being built. From SOBA to KANDEP the bench is cut at different points but not completely finished. Work is continually progressing.

The people from SOBA to PELEPOI have very few spades and asked me if they could be issued with some more. There are 200 spades available so the next Patrol to this area after the House of Assembly Elections could distribute these amongst these people.



Housing and Sanitation:

Housing and Pit Latrines were not inspected because of the heavy loss of time by the people working on the road full time. The houses that were noticed were clean and had a Pit Latrine erected a short distence away.

This fact and from past reports these people look after their houses and use Pit Latrines to a fair degree.

3.

Health and Hygiene:

aid Post Orderly TUNU accompanied the Patrol and saw to any in each group that needed treatment.

These people realise the "wonders" of Medicins and come forward readily for treatment.

There were several minor injuries and "sores" treated by the A.P.O.It was noted that the health in this area is fairly good.

There was no one bought back to MENDI Hospital.

The people at WINIA asked me if they could have an A.P.O. stationed at WINJA Aid Post again. I have been informed by the District Medical Officer that one will be as soon as possible.

Highland Labour Scheme:

I was approached by about 20 young men who said they would like to join the Highland Labour Scheme. These people did not wish to join up immediately but sometime after the Patrol returned to MENDI. They were told when they wished to join they could come to MENDI Sub-District Office.

Land Investigations.

There were two CI 235 investigations done during the course of the Patrol. Both fo these were for the Methodist Overseas Mission Applications—one at HOMEP and the other at MAPKEBOL. Both groups of people were willing to sell the land.



Education and Missions:

There are no Government Schools in the Lai Valley but bt there is a possibility of some being established in the near future.

The Methodist Overseas Mission has establishments at TUGUP, KIF, HOMEP and MAPKEBOL. These schools are run by trained native teschers. English is taught but there seems to be very little advancement because no one seems to be able to talk English, as of yet.

PUMI, PINJ and SOBA. These establishments are not schools but more Bible classes. The children are taught Pidgin-English and Christianity.

If some of these children show promise they are sent to the appropriante Mission Headquarters at MENDI.

Agriculture and Livestock:

The se people grow the usual native vegetable plus introduced European vegetables. The native foods grown are sweet potatoes, pit pit, pandanus, bananas and pineapples. The European regetables are cabbages, potatoes, tomatoes and some the usual native vegetables carrots and roinach.

The livestock in this area consist of native pigs and some fowls, mostly found on Mission establishments.

The trail Coffee Plots in the area seem to be growing very well. Where the plots were found to be not looked after the appropriate instructions were given. It was noted that most of the Coffee bushos had matured and the Coffee berries had started to ripen.



Thank you for the above pentioned Report which was received on the 12th inst.

I am not satisfied with the quality of this Patrol.

Prior to patrolling this area, I presume Mr. Cornhill would have read previous deports and discussed the area in general with you, if such is the case he has failed to show any appreciation of the attitude of the PABARONGA-DEL-FUMBERA Groups. These people have long showed a marked reluctance to co-operate and it is therefore the duty of the patrolling officer to remain in the area and assert Administration influence. These are primitive savage people who respect strength, whether it be of force or character, and I consider the latter can be imposed on the people by a resourceful Officer. It is not good enough to visit the area and report "lack of interest by the people", that is only the problem, your duty is to accept the challenge, for that is what it is and endeavour by all lawful means to overcome it. Please instruct all your Officers accordingly and if they are unable to understand what is required of them, show them personally.

The next patrol to this area should be instructed to "tighten up" on the observance of the Regulations and the people put to work on local roads under their own leaders. The patrol should stay in each area several days and supervise this work, therby giving open and active support to those leaders. Time elements should not normally be considered by the Patrolling Officer, it is the job in hand vis. gaining effective control which should be of paramount importance.

Word sent to WAREMESA to appear at Pabaronga tomorrow. Discussions with Village Constables of Pabaronga, Waremesa, Ubural, Unja, Del and Pombadl.

Sat, January 25 Electoral talks to PABARONGA and WAREMESA groups - poor attendance. On to DEL, but only a few people assembled. DEL, UNJA and UBURIL groups assembled, but poor attendance for electoral talks.

Sun. January 26 Observed at DEL.

To POMBADL, after waiting till 0930 for carriers at Del. Electoral talks at POMBADL. On to Mon. January 27 PUMBERA in afternoon.

Tues, January 28 Poor attendance at PUMBERA for electoral talks. On to ESKAMP, where the Village Constable informed me that he had been summonsing his group for two days, but afew wished to hear electoral talks. Waited for an hour, but still only three men and a dozen women present. Village Constable promised to renew his efforts and endeavour to persuade his group to attend discussions at Pumi on Friday. 1400 on to ENDOWA. Discussions with Endowa people and leaders from Mil, Pinj and Pumi.

Electoral talks at ENDOWA. To MIL - electoral Weds, January 29 discussion. Complaints.

On to PINJ. Poor attendance for electoral Thurs, January 30 discussion. Proceeded PUMI in afternoon. General discussions and complaints.

Friday, January 31 Electoral discussions at Pumi - a number of Eskamp natives present. Returned to Mendi; arriving 1300.

The Patrol was to prepare the people of the Undiri Census Division for the forthcoming elections. A number of villages near Mendi were previously completed by me.

Most of the villagers near Mendi have been fairly well informed of the elections and their significance. In these villages I gave them an outline of the New Legislative Assembly and its composition and reminded them that adults were entitled to vote in both Open and Special Electorates. Much time was spent on the intricacies of 'preferential voting', and this was illustrated by 'mock elections' in which five 'mock' candidates were selected from the audience. I think these 'mock' elections were of benefit in illustrating the Preferential Voting system, and should enable a speedier turnover of voters in the election proper.

The position for the 'bush' villages in the Del and Lower Lai River areas was more difficult as these people do not seem to have absorbed much of previous electoral talks. Added hindrance was that they are only generally familiar with one Open and one Special candidate. I tried to explain the 'Preferential Voting' system, but the people informed me that they knew whom they were going to vote for in the Open Electorate and they did not want to vote preferentially for the other candidates, whom they have not even seen. Consequently, I think it likely that from the 'bush' xixxigas villages, those who wish to vote in the Open Electorate will probably not enter preferences against all five candidates on their ballot papers.

I was distappointed with attendances in some villages, particularly Pabaronga, Del and Eskamp, where the men showed little interest and women listeners outnumbered men by two to one. I report that most who attended my discussions are, in my opinion, familiar with the following:

- 1. The administration of T.P.N.G. functions through a 'council' which has Territory wide powers.
- 2. Briefly the duties of Council Members and the functions of the Council.
- 3. Next month the composition of this Council is to be changed to provide for increased native representation.
- 4. They are concerned with electing two Members (Open and Special) for the new Legislative Assembly.
- 5. The approximate boundaries for the two Electorates.
- 6. They have been told the names and occupations of all candidates, but unfortunately most of them are not personally familiar familiar with all candidates. Most of the 'bush' people are in fact familiar with only one candidate from each Electorate.
- 7. Groups having knowledge of more than one candidate in the Open Electorate have a working knowledge of the Preferential Voting method (illustrated by 'mock' election) and I expect that they shall avail themselves of this system during the Election proper.

Polling booths are under construction at ONE and MEGI, and the PUMI booth is completed.

Mast of my time was spent giving electoral talks. Mostly, two villages were completed in a day, leaving me little time for routine native administration. A number of complaints were heard, but other matters such as inspection of houses and latrines, talks on Mealth, etc. were neglected.

There were no untoward incidents, and general native matters appear to be in order. I have no explanation to offer for the poor attendances at some villages (see 'Diary'). All villages had ample notification of the Patrol's visit. The Village Constables appeared enthusiastic but some villages (particularly the Pabaronga, Del area) the people take little notice of them. Women were generally more co-operative than the men in attending my discussions.

Ample supplies of food were purchased. Carriers came forward willingly in all villages except DEL.

TOMBO of PUMI was used as an Interpreter. He says he will be available if required during the elections.



INTRODUCTION:

The sole object of this Patrol, in asmuch as a Native Affairs Patrol can have a sole object, was the collection of votes for the House of Assembly Elections from the areas of PUMI and MEGI and the surrounding groups. In such an area as the Southern Highlands where contact has been relatively recent the resultant percentage figures of this 'Polling Patrol' may appear incredibly high. This does not reflect, as indeed it may in other regions, a high degree of political awareness, (although there is a meagre knowledge among younger men and women) but merely a reflection of the interest and stimulus resulting from a Native Affairs Patrol in the area. Previous 'Education Patrols' have achieved an awakening of interest in these elections among many people but also to many the aim and proccess has been completely beyond their understanding. That this lack of comprehension has in no way prevented any one person from lodging his or her vote must surely support what has been stated above.

Due to the nature of this Patrol, the report will be confined to the Elections and observations relating to such.

ELECTIONS AND POLITIAL SITUATION:

The polling at both MEGI and PUMI was conducted without incident, the tendancy being to use only one preference in both the Open and Special Electorate. It became apparent also that such candidates had been 'pre-selected' by groups who had some understanding of what the whole thing was about. Such groups possibly influenced the indecision of others though such influence certainly had no political motivation.

Percentage voting figures were extremely good, a fact which has been accounted for elsewhere in this Report. On such a topic it is very easy to be negative and cynical without attempting any apposite comments whatsoever. Solutions to this problem, as with so many others, are difficult to provide and certainly far more difficult to implement. Perhaps the most positive way of overcoming ignorance is by education, and this premise must hold true in the present context. This does not, however, infer gathering a group of students around some specially appointed Officer who may or may not be capable of imparting a degree of political knowledge. A reasonably successful education programme was in operation prior to these elections; now that these are over this programme must not be allowed to disappear along with the little red Ballot Boxes. Political amelioration is not tantamount to democratic elections, but can only be achieved by interest and knowledge. These elections have created the interest, and if we are to be honest with both the native people and ourselves we must make it our busziness to supply the knowledge. And this is the business of Mative Affairs, by definition.

Figures for the Polling Booth at MEGI showed that 61% of eligible voters exercised their right. This was so inspite of the reluctance of people from DEL and UBIRIL whose concern was more for the hazards of crossing the LAI River than for any representation in the House of Assembly. At PUMI 79% of Certified Voters lodged their votes and good representation from all groups in the area was noted with interest and satisfaction.

CONCLUSION:

An extremely interesting though unnecessarily long patrol. It was found that a great proportion of voters did their voting within the first three days of the Polling Booth opening in their area.

It was also very pleasant to Patrol with equipment that was not only new but functioned as new. Unfortunately the 'Meccano Set' type chairs ceased to function at all after a few hours use; - the one hazard encountered throughout the Patrol.

APPENDIX II:

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VULCANOLOGY REPORT:

During the course of the Patrol an opportunity was given this Officer of walking down to the junction of the LAI and MENDI Rivers'. At a point on the right hand bank of the MENDI River some 800 yards upstream from its' junction with the LAI, an outcrop of what appears to be shale, replaces the surrounding country rock of weathered limestone.

This outcrop is not perhaps outstanding in itself; what is outstanding is that at various points small fissures interlace leaving the surface rock around such places extremely unstable. Here sulphur fures escape from the earth and have apparently permeated the country rock enabling the area to be ignited by a small flame. The rock burns with a blue light and when disturbed blazes vigourously to a degree that is suite alerming. to a degree that is quite alarming.

Similar fissures occur throughout the mass and local reports tell of occassions in the past when the whole mountainside has been alight.

Rock and earth samples have been gathered for forwarding to the Government Geologist; cf covering letter 94-1-1.

INTRODUCTION

Prior to the commencement of the Patrol we conducted House of Assembly Elections on the 15th and 17th February at Lonk booth, Mendi.

The purpose of the Patrol was to conduct Elections at Bela and Pembi polling places in the Upper Mendi Valley.

ELECTORAL

Both Bela and Pembi booths were open for their Gazetted periods; viz. ten days at Bela and six days at Pembi.

Most people from Bela, Mulim, Marep, Semp, Kambirip, Hier, Sol, Waparaga and Kombal groups elected to vote at Bela. Villages preferred to attend 'en masse', and these nine groups were completed in four days. For the remainder of the period there were only occasional voters who neglected to attend previously. For most of this thme we were sitting in the environs of the booth with virtually nothing to do.

For the six days at Pembi the position was somewhat the same. Pembi, Oria, Pasurim, Kusi and Pingirip groups attended 'en masse' in their village units and voting was largely completed in two days.

Overall, names were easy to locate on the Roll. We found that one Officer could locate 50-60 names an hour. Only an average of one name in 25 provided much difficulty and required processing under Sec. 130(1) of the Ordinanco.

In view of the secretive nature of the voting I cannot divulge much information. Generally the people showed interest in both Open and Special Electorates. There were almost 2,000 voters in the Mendi Electorate, and only one of these was capable of marking his own ballot paper. It was, therefore, almost a completely illiterate vote. The people know whom they without availing themselves of the Preferential System. Slightly over 80 percent of eligible voters on the Roll voted. The Upper an hour's walk of a booth. Thus, many old people were generally within vote.

The methods used by the Administration in the conduct of the Elections proved to be effective when put into and can process 50-60 voters an hour. This is much speedier than anticipated, and hence polling was largely completed in less than half the Gazetted polling days for each booth.

All ballot boxes, unused ballot papers and electoral discrepancies, etc. are covered in the Special Memo book provided. I request that the Returning Officer hold this in case later reference is required.

The three interpreters used were of mediocre anality calibre, and are not recommended for future employment.

CONCLUSION

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Pembi. There were no untoward incidents. Polling was conducted without hitch or event.



INTRODUCTION:

The sole object of this patrol was to carry out the House of Assembly Elections at SOBA and KIP in the Lai Valley Census Division. This was MENDI Election Team No. 6.

The Lai Valley Census Division is situated in a North-West direction from MENDI. The Lai Valley lies in a general North-South direction from PUM/ and ESKAMP in the Southern section to PELEPOI in the Northern section very close to the PAPUANEW GUINEA border. The valley is bordered on the East by the KARINT census division and on the WEst by the NIPA Administration A area.

The Southern section of the Lai Valley is a wide open valley with an undulating floor rising to very steep mountains on both sides. The Northern section of the valley is much divided and as a result consists of many small creeks and rough hilly country.

VILLAGE OFFICIALS:

KIMISI-FORE the Village Constable of KIP approached the patrol while it was at KIP and said he wished to resign. This is because of his age. The new appointee is BADIBIDI-WADIAL. He is a fairly young man but I think with the supervision of KIMISI he will work well. The Village Constable's Record of Service Form has been completed and sent to the Director of Native Affairs, KONEDOBU.

ELECTIONS AND POLITICAL SITUATION:

On MENDI Election Team No. 6 Mr.N.C.McQuilty was the Presiding Officer; BAE TAU was the Assistant Presiding Officer and MUROMAKE was the Poll Clerk.

At the Polling Booth at SOBA 56% of the people eligible to vote did so. This small per centage of voters can be subjected to the fact that the people at SOBA and North of there wanted to vote for a man who had not been nominated. It had been explained to the people on MENDI Patrol 20-63/64 how many candidates there were and who they were. They were told this again before the Elections started. In this "ignorance" cannot be blamed on the lack of Political Education in this area but on the people calling a "bluff" because they wanted their own man. Before the patrol left SOBA the people were told that if anyone else wished to vote they could go to WINJA(MENDI Election Team No. 7).

The voting at KIP netted 88% of and eligible voters for this area. EBI-WALI a candidate from KAMB had carried out a heavy canvassing program in this area and this could be the reason for the high per centage of votes in this area.

It could be seen from the way the people voted that they have a great political awarness. When the people entered the Polling Booth they knew who they were going to vote for Also I am sure they have been talking about the Elections amongst themselves a great deal and that they know it is a big opportunity to do something for themselves. This can be seen from the fact that people from different parts of the Electorate want a man from their own group.

I am now advised by the District Medical Officer that WEP has left hospital and gone home and the D.M.O. is afraid that he may attempt to remove the plaster and thus destroy all chances of the break healing. WEP has completed his term of imprisonment but you are to try and persuade him to return to hospital until his leg has healed. The surgeon at Goroka also wishesto re-examine WEP in some three months time.

On your return way back to Mendi please attempt to locate the detainee ENAROP who escaped from the Mendi Corrective Institution last week. Make attempts to recapture him and return him to Mendi.

You will be accompanied by one N.C.O. and four Constables.

Please be back at Mendi by Friday 27th or Saturday 28th March at the latest.

TERRITORY OF PAPUA AND NEW GUINEA.

INTRODUCTION:

The main object of this patrol was to locate and to try and persuade WEP-PENDIP of MALA to return to the MENDI Hospital.

The second object was to try and recapture the escaped ENAROP, ex-Village Constable of ENDOWA and return him to the MENDI Corrective Institution.

For further information concerning these objects please refer to Patrol Instructions for MENDI Patrol No. 27-63/64 and to 'Native Situation' in this Patrol Report.

The section of the UNDIRI Census Division covered by this Patrol is situated in a Westerly direction from MENDI.

The Eastern section of the area patrolled, which is the Southern section of the Lai Valley, is an open valley with an undulating valley floor rising to steep Limestone mountains on either side.

The valley floor is covered with Pit Pit and Kunai grass with stunted scrub along the water courses. The Limestone mountains are covered with Tropical Forests.

The Western section of the area patrolled consists of mountainous and hilly country disected by many small streams.

This area is mainly covered with Tropical Forest but spaced throughout this area there are native gardens and area s of Pit Pit and Kunai grass.

NATIVE SITUATION:

WEP-PENDIP was arrested and convicted of Riotous Behaviour on the 16th of December 1964. While serving his sentence in the MENDI Corrective Institution he was involved in a tractor accident. The tractor passed twice over WEP's legs and as a result one of his legs was broken. He was taken to the MENDI Hospital on the 2nd broken. He was taken to the mentand then sent to GOROKE January1964 for initial treatmentand then sent to GOROKE Hospital. A plate was inserted and a full leg plaster was applied, WEP then returned to MENDI Hospital where he was under supervision waiting to return to GOROKA Hospital for further treatment.

On the 14th March 1964 the people convicted and serving a sentence in the MENDI Corrective Institution for the same offence as WEP were released. WEP heard of this and decided ke to go home. He absconded from the MENDI Hospital on the 15th March 1964 and removed his plaster. He crawled to TURIRI and some of his friends carried him to MALA.

WET was easily persuaded to return to the MENDI Hospital after explaining to him that it was for his own good. It was explained to him if he stopped where he was leg would never heal properly and he would never be able to walk the same as his friends. If he came back to MENDI there was a fair chance that his leg would heal properly.

Native Situation Contd.

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It was also explained to WEP that his term in the MENDI Corrective Institution was finished and that if he returned to MENDI it was for treatment only and not to finish a term in the Corrective Institution.

On the 9th March 1964 ENAROP-IABA was arrested and sentenced to three months imprisonment with hard labour for committing adultery. On the 11th March 1964 he escaped while in a working party cutside the Corrective Institution. He returned to the Lai Valley.

Two policemen followed him and caught him but he managed to escape the same night.

Since his escape ENAROP had been living the life of an outcast. He was not liked in his group so he stopped in the bush in the day time and only came out at night time when he came to get his food from his wife.

When the Patrol arrived in the area all the Village Constables and headmen were asked if they would co-operate with the Fatrol in helping to recapture ENAROP. These people did this very readily.

Because of the limited time the Patrol could be in the area there was little hope that ENAROP would be brought back to MENDI with the Patrol. The Village Constable and headmen from MIL were asked if they would go to ENAROPs wife's house and wait for ENAROP to arrive. The Patrol then returned to MENDI.

This planning was successful. On the 31st March 1964 the Village Constable and some headmen from MIL arrived in MENDI with ENAROP as their captive.

This was an extremely interesting Patrol and a lot was learned by it. These people co-operated with the Patrol in every way possible. This can be seen from the way they recaptured ENAROP and also from the purchase of native foods. In most cases the Patrol arrived at a Rest House late in the afternoon unannounced but native foods and fire wood was always available.

Thank you for the above mentioned Report which was received on the 30th June, 1964.

NATIVE AFFAIRS:

Mr. Cornhill states "the Del area badly needed native contact", by this embiguous statement, I presume he means the people needed contact in their own area by a Department of Native Affairs Patrol. You should instruct Mr. Cornhill that when making observations or criticisms he should support his statements with facts, thus enabling the reader to assess the validity of the conclusion drawn.

MISSIONS:

The remarks concerning "Cargo Gult" appear to me to be unnecessary - the original application specified the land was required inter-alia for an air-strip, thus I fail to understand why the people should entertain any idea of bargo cult".

ROADS AND BRIDGES:

Mr. Cornhill has failed to present facts regarding the Lai Valley Road. In the first instance the people asked for permission and assistance to build this road (See Mendi Patrol Report No. 4 of 1961/62, page 18 para. 3 and Mendi Patrol Report No. 12 of 1961/62, Roads para. 5.).

Secondly the journey by Land Rover from Mendi to Pinj is no more than I hour 20 minutes and the road passes through the villages of Pororo, Tubiri, lore, Pume, however the direct route by walking track climbs directly from Mendi over the 8,000 feet ridge dividing Mendi from the Lai Valley and does not pass through any other villages. In addition this road provides rapid access to several thousand people by Officers of Technical Departments, thus enabling inspection of crop nurreries, Aid Posts etc, to be carried out well within one day. Without the road two days or more would be spent travelling to these points for the sake of perhaps 2 hours work.

This Report is disappointing; Mr. Cornhill should be instructed to check his facts and refrain from making rash statements

Attached hereto please find three copies of a report on the above Patrol as submitted my Mr. M. C. Cornhill, Patrol Officer Grade 1.

Delay in forwarding this Report is regretted.

Mr. Cornhill has conducted a thorough patrol of this area which should show lasting results. Two Officers working together certainly make the compilation of tax-census sheets a less onerous task.

Ten days were spent altogether in the general area of DEL and PABARONGA. The people of this area have shown a marked lack of cooperation in the past but with this leisurely patrol the attitude appeared to be different and the people much more cooperative.

The Catholic Mission is showing great interest in the DEL area, as is also the Methodist Mission. However the former Mission has been operating in a small way for some time and may have the advantage. In addition, the Christian Union Mission is applying for land near UDJABIA on the other side of the Nembi River. This increase in mission activity should have nothing but a beneficial affect on the area, although this quite obvious mission race is not pleasing to see.

The people in the DEL area realise that they are in an untouched pocket between Mendi and Nipa and are most enthusiastic about having a Capuchin Mission Station in their midst.

The vine bridge over the Lai River at POMBADL is a means of cutting some two hours from the walk to the Nembi Valley, and will be of great use to both village people and patrols alike now that it has been repaired.

Payment for the road to the Lai Valley is being arranged as soon as possible. Admittedly it is further by vehicular road to the Lai, but it is an access to Nipa Patrol Post.

I will make a separate recommendation regarding an aid post in the DEL area and also a recommendation concerning the break-up of the & DEL census unit.

END OF PATROL

NATIVE AFFAIRS

The Patrol was over the Undiri Census
Division, comprising the Lower Mendi and Lower Lai River
valleys. The objects of the Patrol were Census revision,
preparing proper Peccords in Tax-census sheets, and general
administration. Mr. N.McQuilty, Cadet Patrol Officer,
accompanied, and I found him most useful, particularly in
assisting with census work and copying names into the new
Tax-census sheets: this process is very laborious and without
the services of two Officers working together, census revision
would take twice the normal time.

There were no untoward incidents and attendances at census were good. The two or three days spent at each Megi and Del were unavoidable as this is the 'singsing' season, and ceremonial accasions had been arranged long in advance. Natives from throughout the Division came to Megi for the occasion, and this was a good opportunity for sittling complaints, discussing our patrol program, etc. The Del area badly needed native contact, and our stay there was not wasted time. This 'problem area' shows signs of improvement: I shall discuss this further under 'Missions' as it is evident that the Catholic Mission is going to be most influential in the area,

During the Excourse of the Patrol, Mr. Haviland, P.O., was conducting Local Government Elections in the villages of Poramanda, Sebisunda, Sunda, Tubiri, Pororo, One, Iagen and Exe Iore. These villages are situated immediately South of Mendi and the Upper Mendi Local Government Council has been extended to include them. The remaining villages in the Division will continue to be administered under the Village Constable system. Unfortunately they have little avenues available to them for earning money, and this is likely to remain a barrier against Local Government.

I paid carriers and purchased food with cash, distributing £55 in the area. Should the Catholic Mission become properly established at DEL, then that will be a further avenue for cash income. 129 males are working on coastal plantations. These people will obtain both monetary and social benefits from this.

Ample supplies of food were bought, and there is a good variety of produce. The people living near Mendi realise that variety is necessary in order to capture their share of the Mendi market.

Village Constables are of average calibre, the best being UNDIN of MIL. The Young Councillor, MORIS of TUBIRI also impresses me. No changes in Village Constables are recommended.

MISSIONS

Father Benjamin from Mendi Capuchin Mission is acquiring increasing respect and influence throughout the Division. The Mission has applied for a 40 acre lease at DEL, with the object of developing this to a permanent station complete with airstrip. The Del people are very enthusiastic, and when we discussed it with them they expressed their willingness to sell the land and cooperate with the Mission. The main attraction for them is possibly to have their own airstrip, but I do not think there is any cargo cult' connected with this. They have a realistic

attitude towards the actual benefits which could accrue to them through the Mission.

It is to be hoped that the Mission lease will be processed as soon as possible, as this is the logical answer to the Del-Pabaronga area. The Mission, being permanently on the spot, could quickly develop improved attitudes. Cooperative work in developing airstrip and Mission station would largely achieve this end.

The Methodist Mission is active in the Division, but its influence is far behingd that of the Capuchin Mission.

ROADS AND BRIDGES

We have strengthened the vine bridge over the Lai River at Pombadl. It is adequate for transporting patrol gear, and will be useful for patrols requiring a direct route to the Nembi Valley.

Walking tracks are satisfactory, except in some very steep country where the terrain does not permit good tracks.

The road from Mendi - Tubiri - lore Pumi - Pinj - and thence on to the Upper Lai Valley provides
a problem. The people say that they constructed this on the
faith that they would be paid for their labours. They have not
been paid, and the attitude expressed by Village Constables
is: The people will not hear our talk and come to work
on road maintenance days. If they were paid for what they
have done, then they will be more enthusiastic. Ithink
their attitudes are understandable as they themselves can
see little benefits which will accrue to them from the road.
For instance, the Pinj to Mendi trip by car takes four hours
along its roundabout route. The more direct walking track takes
2 hours. Thus one can walk to Mendi in half the time it takes
to drive. In my opinion this roundabout route to the central
Lai area greatly reduces the advantages to be derived from the
road.

The bad section from Mendi to Tubiri is at present undergoing repair.

HEALTH AND AJD POSTS

Malaria is very evident in the Southern villages, ie. Iaria to Del. Many people, both children and adults, have died. They evidently have no resistence to the disease. Once they become sick they just have to hope for the best, as there are no medical facilities available to them. A Native Medical Orderly accompanied the Patrol and we used two bottles of malaria tablets. However, flecting visits by medical patrols are of little use. There are over 3000 people within two hours walk of Del. An aid post in this heavily populated area is a 'must'. Perhaps the Capuchin Mission, when they become properly established at DEL, will be able to provide medical facilities.

There is a new aid post at PINJ in the central Lai area. Villagers near Mendi can go to Mendi for treatment. Thus only some facility at DEL is needed to complete adequate benefits throughout the Division. A Del post would also serve people from the lower Nembi Valley.

CENSUS AND STATISTICS

We have revised the census for the Division. The population now stands at 6841, an increase of 97 on 1963. Note that our figures are not complete for Del, Onja and Uburil. The Village Constables from Onja and Uburil claimed that they were not given books after the last census: I am inclined to think that they lost their books, though they will not admit this! The Del Village Constables admit that one of their three books was accidently burnt in a fire. New censuses were taken at these three villages. This unfortunately prevents proper comparison with last years figures. All names are now transferred to the Tax-census Sheets, so the problem of lost books will not affect future census work.

The Del group is too large to be censused at the one sitting. There are two Village Constables controlling two separate groups, which may properly be termed DEL-ORIA and DEL-MURI. I have separated these groups in the Tax-census sheets. I recommend that authority be obtained from the Director to split DEL into these two census units.

A new rest-house is under construction to serve Uburil and Del-Muri.

The large reduction in the population of IARIA is due to an entire clan group returning to their traditional land in the Yebi - Omai area.

CONCLUSION

(compared to my visits to the area in September 1962 and January 1964). Very encouraging was the almost 100 percent attendance at census, and the interest shown at having their names recorded. The incident with census books referred to is evidently a genuine loss, and not an attempt to defeat cemsus revision.

Improved attitudes will be continued by:

- a) Routine patrolling;
- b) Responsibilities associated with the extension of Local Government into part of the Division; and
- c) The proposed permanent Mission Station at Del.

Mr. McQuilty is equiped to do routine census work by himself.

Thank you for the above mentioned Report which was received on the 30th June, 1964.

The native situation in this Division is quite good, however, I agree that the people living close to the Town are lacking in gratitude but they do respond to firm treatment.

I note that under the date heading, Thursday, 30th April, "Census evaders were sent to the Corrective Institution, Mendi". I presume a Court of Native Matters was convened.

The figures under Medical and Mealth are alarming. The first report of malaria in the Tutama area was made, I believe, by Jister Darch of the Infant and Maternal Welfare Section during February, 1964. It is pleasing to note that the District Medical Officer is personally investigating the outbreak.

The Census figures have been carelessly computed and indicate that they were not checked for accuracy after being submitted to you. Kiburu, Lumbi, Omai and Umbimi Village totals have been incorrectly added, please check your copy of the Register and amend accordingly.

Please ensure that all future Reports are signed.

The delay in forwarding this report is regretted but all the copies were inadvestently filed in this office.

The native situation in this area is quite pleasing as reported by Mr Briggs. The attitude of the people living in the immediate vicinity of Mendi station is not as good as it should be but such an attitude is unfortunately quite common in people living right on a Government station.

The census for the division was revised and tax census sheets compiled. This is the first time that these sheets have been compiled in this Sub District. They were only made out in one copy and have still to be typed in three copies.

The health position has caused some concern and the District Medical Officer has the matter in hand although the present epedemic has practically run its course.

Mr Briggs has carried out a satisfactory patrol through an area which has had quite a lot of contact of late.

PATROL DIARY.

Morday 27th April. Departed Mendi at 0930 hrs for Umbimi rest house arrived at 0945hrs all the people ready and waiting begun Census and Tax Census sheets. Heavy rain at 1430 hrs caused finish. Slept at Umbimi.

Tuesday 28th. Today finished TeTe Lonk and Kambegibu, after conclusion of work a few minor disputes heard. Departed 1430 hrs for Kiburu walked in the rain and arrived at 1545 hrs. Rest house and barracks in a mess. Slept Kiburu.

Wednesday 29th . Census etc started at 0800 hrs for the Wa Mois Diyarip and Klburu groups. Told these people to wake up to themselves a bit and also exhorted them to do alittle bit of work on the Kiburu school grounds. Departed for Tutama at 1400 hrs. arrived 1600 hrs. A reasonable reception. Slept Tutama.

Thursday 30th. Today called Census etc. for this Tutama group, a housing inspection showed a horrible mess. Some Census evaders

aprehended and sent to the Corrective Institution Mendi. Slept Tutama.

Friday 31st. Today to Yebi. Departed Tutama at 0900 hrs.Plenty of carriers and arrived Yebi at 1100 hrs. A good assembly waiting. Due to the large number of deaths recently there were many absent mourning, so they were told to present themselves in force on Monday. Slept Yebi.

Saturday 1st May. Plenty of food arrived today. A few disputes heard rest of the day spent in rest. Slept Yebi.

Sunday 2nd. Spent day at Yebi.

Monday 3rd. Today Census revised and Tax/Census sheets completed for this Yebi No.1 group. Dr. Mathews and A.D.O. visited. Sickness very invensive here. Plenty of food again and two disputes heard. Slept Yebi.

Tuesday 4th. Departedc Yebi for Omai at 0800 hrs arrived Omai at 0930 road in good condition. All the Omai population assembled so began wor, immediately. Finished at 1300hrs general chat with old men and a few courts heard. Slept Omai.

Wednesday 5th. Today went down to Mogura (Ialibu Area) to make an investigation on a land dispute no people present, all having run away to Iaria and Iore (Mendi Area) 5 new houses erected. Persuaded a few who I did see to return to Omai with me to discuss this matter. Arrived Omai at 1430 hrs and departed at 1530hrs for Ais Aisa. Arrived at 1630 hrs and slept AisAisa.

Thursday 6th. Today began and finished the Census Revision and the Tax/Bensus Register for the AisAisa groups. General attitude seems o.k. plenty of food available. Slept AisAisa.

Friday 7th. Today departed AisAisa for Pundia arrived910 hrs after a 12 hour walk. People all gathered so began at once finished at 1230hrs. A couple of courts and a talk with the people about Local Government Councils. A request for an Aid Post. Slept Pundia.

Saturday 8th. To Limbiali at 0800 hrs Census Revised etc one court about long unpaid debt . Walked back to Pundia.

Sunday 9th. Today departed Pundia for Yebi at 0800 hrs arrived Yebi at 1210 hrs food there and Slept Yebi.

Monday 10th Census revised etc for here . Work begun on new Aid Post heavy rain in afternoon Slept Yebi.

Tuesday 11th.Left Yebi at 0730 hrs for Lumbi and Mendi. Completed Census etc. for Lumbi and departed for Mendi. Arrived 1430 hrs.



NATIVE AFFAIRS:

The Native affairs situation in this Census Division is quite sarisfactor there is no sign of unrest likely to cause serious trouble between any of the people residing in this area.

Kowever the attitude taken by the people living in the near vicinity of the Mendi Station is quite disappointing. Although these people have had the longest and closest contact with the government of any of the people of the area they have developed a 'dont care' attitude. This is clearly indicated by their approach to any schemes put forward by the Administration - for example the new Primary T school at Wag-Wag. The efforts made by these people to construct these buildings which will be for their own benefit, is pathetic.

They are continually ready to accept and take advantage of the government for their own benefit but are usually unwilling to co-operate in a give and take attitude with the government. Surely this will be to their detriment in the long run.

Further from the station the attitude shown towards the patrol was more pleasing. At Yebi we were warmly received and the headmen of the groups stayed at the rest house for a long time discussing various things from the purchase of cattle to the construction of a new Medical Aid Post.

The people of the Omai and AisAisa groups, despite their previous trouble with a police party, are quite settled now. The Omai people have only one reason for unrest, this being over ground which is situated in the Ialibu area. The full story of this dispute is on file in the Mendi Sub-District Office ref. 37-3-1. and an accompanying appendix concerns this matter. I would strongly suggest that a Lands Claim be registered either from this or the Pangia Sub-District Office in order to have this matter resolved and the situation further settled.

At Limbialiand Pundia the situation is very pleasing. these people are on the fringes of both the Islibu and the Mendi Administrative areas and as such they are not in very frequent contact with Patrols. Nevertheless their attitude is far superior to those groups close to the station. Ifeel that this is due largely due to the Village Constablefrom Pundia, a very influential man with a shrewd head.

Census Rovision/Tax Census Sheets.

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The main purpose of this Patrol was to revise the Census and to complete the compilation of the Tax#Census sheets for this Census Division.

Generally the people presented themselves well and where it happened that a family was absent due to sickness of there was usually some sort of representation made.

It is interesting to note the large number of male and female migrations out of the Villages and also out of the Census Division. This is due mainly to the sickness in the area. Widows and widowers, after the death of their spouses seem to migrate out and go back to the Village of their birth. Also, families fearing sickness are leaving, where a family asked to have its name removed from the Village Book due to this illness I made every attempt to disuade them, the reason being that I felt that after the sickness was finished they would most likely migrate back to their Village thereby causing confusion to future officers revising the Tax Ragister Census Register.

The Census Revision and The Tax Census Sheets are now complete.

MEDICAL and HEALTH.

The haelth of the people in this Census Division is far from satisfactory. They are at present suffering from an epidemic of what appears to be influenza complicated with some form of Malaria. The sickness attacks people of all ages and the number of dead and sick from this is quite alarming. While I was camped at Yebi Dr. C.L. Mathews visited there and made an investigation, however this was a little too late as these people had allready been suffering for some two months priop to his visit. Figure of the amount dead and sick are shown below, these concern only the most hard hit Villages.

At Yebi a new Aid Post is under construction and the people seem quite enthusiastic towards it this Post was started during this Patrol.

AGRICULTURE.

It is pleasing to see that the seeds distributed on Mendi Patrol 2-63/64 at Yebi and Lumbi are now bearing well, further seeds were distributed at Tutama Aisaisa and Pundia on this Patrol.

It was also made known generally that it is possible for these people to purchase yearling steers fr om D.A.S.F. at Mendi, this caused much interest and two men have allready approached the District Agriculture Officer with this in mind.

ROADS and BRIDGES

The Mendi Ialibu road runs allmost the entire length of the Patrol Route hence a fairly good idea of its condition was gained.

The road as far as Lumbi is reasonable, but past here and on the descent into the Anga Gorge it is hopeless, requiring much work before it will be up to the standard usually required for Council Roads. On the far side of the Gorge it is stoned in some sections and in others remains as the original bench. All of the bridges are in good condition. in good condition.



Cont.

COUNCIL and COUNCILLORS.

The extension of The Upper Mendi Local Government Council to include three groups in this Census Division took place some four days prior to the start of this Patrol.

At this early stage no assessment can be made of its influence but the people do appear to be realising that they are now under a different set-up than they were before. The extension has also increased the desire for those not included in it, to gain admittance to its ranks as soon as possible.

Conclusion.

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The patrol was interesting and due to the influence of Senior Constable Pikiaora several relatively new policemen received sound training in the Patrolling aspect of their duties.

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Monday 25th May. Departed Mendi at 1000hrs for HOMAIP in the Lai Valley Census Division. Arrived Homaip at 1530 hrs after a fairly hard walk contact was made with the Village Constable and through him food etc was brought to the Patrol. Asked to see Iol and he duly arrived. Warned is him not to go anywhere as he would be wanted for questioning tomorrow.

Tuesday 26th Today began questioning Iol about the murder of Wemia-Pagirip. This lasted for four hours on and off with no success. Asked Iol whether he would accompany me back to Mendi and he agreed. Late in after-noon a complaint concerning a stolen pig brought to my notice. Const Kamangru sent to investigate and was assaulted by the owner of the pig.

Wednesday 27th. Today left HOMIAP for Mendi at 0700 hrs arrived there at 1200 hrs. Patrol stood down.

The purpose of this patrol was to contact Iol-Halt and investigate several accusations that had been made against him by Tabiri-Wesal, in connection with the murder of Wemia Pagirip.

Contact was made and on the following day I began questioning: Iol. Iabiri had said that he had seen Iol kill Wemia the questions directed to Iol were all in connection with this accusation.

Iol made no confession nor did he at any time give any indication that he knew anything more about the matter than what he had already said at the Court of Petty Sessions in Mendi. Due to this the matter was dropped and Iol agre d to accompany me to Mendi for further discussion.

a recent Pig theft in connection with this I sent Const Kamangru to see the Father of the theif and to bring him and one pig back to the rest house so that the matter could be straightened out.

The constable was assualted and abused by the owner of the pig and was also threatened by him and his relations, hearing this I went to the mens house and apprehended the man and his son. They accompanied me back to Mendi for prosecution and are now serving time in the Mendi Corrective Institution. Corrective Institution.

Concerning the Murder Investigation, I would sugg st that any officer who investigates this matter further start from scratch as the has allready been looked into by two different officers and things are no doubt bedoming a little confused.

The purpose of this patrol was to investigate one area for a land purchase and also complete a purchase for a second. The investigation at Pingirip was successful but the purchase Pasurin was not successful as the people demanded shell and not eash. This is rather common in this sub District.

The disturbance at PEMBI took place about a month ago and 34 men were apprehended and are serving gaol sentences. It was thought that more may have been implicated but there was no direct evidence to suggest this. Mr Corvhill was instructed to endeavour to ascertain if any more were involved and if so to arrest them. The people were wary of being implicated and numbers were temporarily hiding in fear of a general wound up. I regard the matter as being closed now.

Left Pembi for PASURIM. Councillor reported that many of the Pasurim land owners had not assembled as they were weary of my intentions in connection with the Pembi brawl. However, a group of old men present said that payment of £11.10.0 offered was not sufficient for the land: they wanted M.O.P. Shell anyway, and not money. Some of the younger men were prepared to accept the money offered. I was not able to effect purchase.

Midday I returned to Mendi, leaving patrol gear with Police at Pasurim.

END OF PATROL

Patrol gear and Police returned Mendi per tractor on 4th June.

NATIVE AFFAIRS

About a month ago there was a brawl at Pembi over an area of land. The main participants in the brawl were from two clans within the Pembi group. I found it most difficult to investigate this as most of the Pembi and Pasurim groups were very weary. 30 men from Pembi and 4 men from Pasurim are already serving gaol sentences for their parts in the brawl. Many Pembi and Pasurim men have temporarily taken to hiding in the bush for fear of being implicated. I made nothing more than discreet enquiries. I have found that rounding people up in the bush is a futile operation, and such action would further intimidate them.

My coming to the area within a month of the brawl rather set them on edge, and I feel that this had an adverse effect on my attempts to purchase Pasurim Land. This was not possible to effect as some of the owners were 'in hiding' and some old men persisted in with their demands to be paid in M.O.P. Shell. I did not press the point in view of the weary nature of the people at present. An attempt could perhaps be made in a few months time when the people are more settled. Should this meet with failure then the Mission will perhaps have to find land elsewhere. Should we tender payment in M.O.P. Shell, we shall be faced with the problem of having to give shell for all future Mission Leases in the area.

The 'edgy' atmosphere at Pembi and Pasurim should gradually return to normal within the next month or so. The Pasurim Land file is best & put aside till then.

VI have conducted an Investigation into Pingirip Land. The Pingirip men say that they will accept payment in cash.

The patrel was mounted for the sele purpose of completing a short acction of road on the Komis - Tambul road which will link the Southern Highlands with the Western Highlands District. This portion of the road was left uncompleted by a previous patrol as there was some dispute over land boundaries and the people were not keen on continuing.

However at a meeting of the Upper Mendi Local Government Council it was decided to make this a community effort and finish this portion of the road as soon as possible as the people do realise that benefits will accrue to them from this important road link.

The job was satisfactorily completed but before the road can be used ontinuously gravelling will have to be done as the heavy rainfall on the slopes of Mt. Giluwe make the road surface slippery most of the time.

There were d'fficulties in supplying the people from distant villages with food but despite this the job was done.

O800 hrs: Word sent throughout the Upper Mendi Local Government area for those who had agreed to work on the road to converge on Komia. Self to KOMIA rest-house in tractor with patrol equipment. Workers arrived from most villages in afternoon.

Tuesday 9th June

Patrol left Komia for the Mount Giluwe road-head. Tractor pushed much of the way up the steep ascent. Camp made on the upper-slopes 8 miles from Komba. The road-head is 2½ miles further on; mm most of the villagers chose to build their bush houses here.

Mr. Blaikie, A.D.O., visited Patrol in Landrover.

Wednesday 10th June

Supervision of roadwork. Names of all workers recorded (270). Only a few men thought of bringing spaces with them. Everyone put to clearing the bush in the road area.

Thursday

Public Works officials arrived on inspection. They did not bring any spades with them, and as yet work has not got properly underway.

Self to Mendi in Landrover to organise spades and supply of sweet-potato. Slept Mendi.

Friday 12th June

Organised 120 spades from P.W.D. and a promised supply of sweet-potato. Returned with spades in tractor to Komia, but tractor unable to manage the Mt. Giluwe ascent. Spades dumped at base of mountain.

Saturday 13th June

40 workers sent to pick-up the shovels and other materials. 8 labourers sent to camp at the base of the mountain and straighten out the road there. Supervision of road work. Approximately half the work force have returned to their villages to get food.

1430 hrs: 2 tractors brought 20 bags sweet-potato.

Sunday 14th June

Observed. Approx. 150 men chose to work today.

Monday 15th June

Inspection of work. Four LandRovers to road-head to pick-up footballers returning from Mount Hagen.

Tuesday 16th June

Supervision of roadwork.

Wednesday 17th June

Supervision of roadwork.

Thursday 18th June

Supervision of roadwork. 180 men put to work on the Little Kondo bridge.

Friday 19th June

1500 jards of road to Minibil Creek completed. Little Kondo bridge completed. Approaches to Big Kondo Creek straightened out. Most workers returned their villages today.

END OF PATROL

NATIVE AFFAIRS : ROADWORK

The main purpose of the Patrol was to complete 1520 yards of road to Minibal Creek, which is the unofficial Southern Highlands/Western Highlands boundary. 270 natives were employed for two weeks, under a roster by which most village groups contributed a force of 8 - 10 men in a community effort. This section which we have just completed is 11 miles from Komis, the nearest Southern Highlands village.

The weather was fine throughout, and the labour line worked keenly, often for 10 hours a day. Workers from the nearby villages of Komia, Egari, Birop, etc, had relatives bring them food; and employment of this labour on the road presents few problems. But workers from distant villages were unable to supply their own food, and I received many complaints concerning the food supply. The scheme proposed of their relatives preparing food which was to be transported by tractor to the road-head did not work out very satisfactorily when put into practice. Over the week-end many workers went to Tambul villages and bought food with their own money. I think that should we desire to continue employing people from distant villages in the gravelling and maintenance of this road, then an improved supply system will have to be instigated.

A proper supply is further hindered by the ascent from Komia. I had 8 workers permanently stationed at the base of the mountain to effect repairs and push Landrovers and tractors up parts of the 4 mile climb. I think that gravelling and maintaining this section would not be economical: many of the steeper grades should first be re-routed, and most corners properly formed.

Though the section within the Southern Highlands is now complete, the gravelling and future maintenance of the Mount Giluwe part will present a future problem as far as labour is concerned. I particularly refer to feeding labour, as sweet-potato will not grow at this height.

All employees have been paid for their labours per Mendi V/R 2205 of 22.6.64.



Further, whenever any such reports are made by a Cadet Patrol Officer, a senior officer should go and investigate ismediately, letting the station remain in the charge of the Cadet Patrol Officer, if necessary.

Keep a record at your Sub-District Offices of all land disputes in a book in order that I shall be in a position to estimate difficulties arising from such disputes. When the situation appears critical you, or one of your senior officers, should investigate and advise on a subject file.

Don't press too hard for further Local Government Councils where the people are not demanding them. Our resources are already stretched in meeting demands from people pressing for such establishments.

Attached hereto please find two copies of a report on above patrol as submitted by Mr. P.A. Briggs, Cadet Patrol Officer.

The patrol was a routine census and administrative patrol conducted to the Lai Valley Census Division. Mr. Briggs refers to the Upper Lai Census Division whereas the Division if now correctly termed the Lai Valley Census Division.

The presentation of this report is poor and Mr. Briggs should pay more attention to his typing, spelling and punctuation.

Mr. Briggs states that as far as the native situation is concerned the situation in the Lai is akin to sitting on the top of a volcane but beyond giving a few individual cases he does not carry this sweeping statement any further. The land disputes mentioned are well known and claims have been registered with the Lands Commission.

The people of the upper portion of the Lai Valley belong to a language group akin to the people of the Kandep area in the Western Highlands and have little contact with thes of the Lower Lai. They are also much closer to Kandep Patrel Post than they are to Mendi but as far as is known and without ah actual survey and star fixes being taken they are in Papua and therefore will continue to be administered from Mendi.

Mr. Brigg's investigation into the murder at SOBA was quate well done and as a result a native TOLI has been committed for trial on a charge of wilful murder.

The matter of the health of the people in the Lai Valley has been brought to the notice of the District Medical Officer on numerous occasions but it appears that the Public Health Department just has not got the staff to cope with the problem.

I will discus with the Patrol Officer in Charge at Nipa concerning the M.Ph. Bol. ple working on the HHUMBI road.

Mr. Briggs states on page 1 of the report at paragraph 3 that he recommends the appointment of a further Village Constable at PELEFOI whilst on page 2 at the last paragraph he recommends the appointment of one POKO as Village Councillor as PELEFOI. I am not satisfied that POKO is a bona fide resident of the PELEFOI area and hence do not recommend the appointment.

This is a disappointing report by Mr. Briggs and it is quite obvious that he completed it in a hurry in order to have it completed before his recent transfer to Pangia. The Lai Valley has been visited by eleven patrols in the past two years and will continue to receive regular visits and the native situation should improve with requirements. continued visits.

Please prepare to depart on a patrol of the Lai Valley Census Division. You will be accompanied by one N.C.O. and five Constables of the Mendi Detachment of the Royal Papuan and New Guinea Constabulary, one interpreter PUNGU and a Native Medical Orderley.

Your first task is to fully investigate the facts surrounding the double murder at HOMAIP with which the youth IABIRI has already been committed for trial. As you are aware there are several facts of this case which are unsetisfactory and Grewn Law is not me happy and I also am not completely satisfied. Other officers have already investigated this murder but you may be able to unearth fresh evidence. Spend three or four days on this if you think it necessary.

The patrel to the Lai Valley is mainly for the purpose of census revision and compilation of tax census sheets for the Division. Please prepare this as carefully as possible following the standing instruction on the matter of tax census sheets.

In addition please also carry out the usual native administration in the area. Listen to all complaints and if you consider any need Court action then forward the parties concerned to Mendi with all necessary witnesses.

You should also follow up the recent House of Assembly elections and the propogenda which preceded this. Advise the people carefully who was the successful candidate and just how he stands in relation to them. Just because the elections are over we should not drop political education.

Please advise me immediately should you strike any trouble or difficulties.

You will also be accompanied by Mr. J.K. Karukuru, Assistant Patrel Officer. The District Officer has no objection to Mr. Karukuru accompanying you on this patrel.

Thursday 25thDeparted Kema for Enjel at 0845 hrs arrived at 0945hrs all o.k.Census revised and T.C.R. completed 2 Census evaders apprehended and all native complaints settled. Slept Enjel

Priday 26th:Left Enjel for Mapkebol at 0815 hrs arrived Mapkebol at 0845 hrs and Census and T.C.R. completed. Rest house excellent discussion re road work and all native complaints settled. Slept Mapkebo

Saturday 27th:Left Mapkebol for Kip at 0730 hrs arrived at 1010 hrs CEnsus and T.C.R completed and all complaints settled. Slept Kip.

Sunday 28th: Today departed Kip for Tugup at o830 hrs work begun and fin finished by 1100 hrs then started negotiations to buy the land for the M.O.M lease completed this and then a discussion with the men from Mil and Kamb about their land dispute. Two native complaints settled. Slept Tugup.

Monday29th: Today departed Eugup for Tumia arrived at 0930 hrs Census revised and T.C.R completed. Complaints settled Slept Tumia.

Tuesday 30th: Today to Kuianda arrived at 1030 hrs and work begun finished at 1300 hrs and Complaints begun and settled. Slept Kuianda.

Wednesday 1st July: Left Mulanda ato730 hrs for Tulum arrived at 1010 hrs and met Mendi vehicles. Proceeded then to Mendi arriving at 1145 hrs, reported to A.D.O. Patrol stood down.

End of Diary:

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NATIVE AFFAIRS:

The Native Affairs situation in this Census Division is not as good as it could or should be. I refer to a comment in the Tugup Village book made by Mr. C Sanderson P.O. " one gets the feeling of sitting on top of a volcance". I too have noticed this and have mentioned it to the Assistant District Officer several times in conversation.

The attitude of the people towards the Patrol was very gratifying, one is treated with respect and usually receives a hundred percent cooperation from the people, the feeling I mentioned previously is more on a village-village basis. I feel that whatever trouble occured would be between the people themselves and not between the people and the government.

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It is true that fighting has long since ceased, but the issues over which they fought are still prominent in their interclan relations, and in three particular cases could flare up at slight provocation, I refer to the Tugup - Tumia land dispute, the Mil - Kamb land dispute and general relations between the large Pelepoi groups. It is for this reason that I have recommended the appointment of a third Village Constable for here.

The people of the Pelepoi, Winja, Wariba and Semaip groups have expressed a feeling of being left out. The matter was be brought up by the Village Constables of the respective groups, the main theme of the complaint being that Mendi is a distance of two days walk from them while Kasdep and Magarima are only a matter of hours, for this reason most of their sick people go to Kandep hospital and a good deal of their complaints also. They did not express a desire to be administered from there but it is possible that they are thinking seriously about it.

At several different places during the Patrol I brought the subject of a Local Government Council up, however it was received with very little enthusiasm the main reason being that at this stage they would not be able to meet the tax requirements, to this end several requests were made for a tractor to come once a week and collect the produce of the area for sale in Mendi iIt was pointed out that before this was possible the road to the places concerned would have to be completed and far improved.

The Census revision and the compilation of the Tax-Census Register proved no difficulty due to the cooperation of the people, throughout the patrol there were only two blatant Census evaders both of whom are now in the Mendi Corrective Institution.

Puchase of the land at Tugup for the M.O.M was successfully completed, after a rather prolonged discussion on whether the owners would accept money instead of M.O.B. shell in payment.

Native complaints were many and were mainly to do with unpaid bride prices, also adultery plays a major part in the social life of these people action was taken against these people as it a appeared necessary. During the patrol there was a murder at Soba, an investigation was carried out and a youth apprehended and charged he will later go before the Court of Petty Sessions. Generally the peoplewere willing to bring the complaints up for discussion and appeared happy with the decisions.

There are at present two major land disputes in the area, one at Tugup, the other at Kamb, however both of these disputes have been brought to the A.D.O's attention previously.

In conclusion I feel that the Native Situation in this area would benefit greatly from more intensive administration and patrolling.



HEALTH:

The health of the people of the Upper Lai area is far below that standard set in the Mendi Valley and other Census Divisions in the Mendi Admin Area. During the Patrol I saw 11 cases of yaws and 14 cases of leprosy all of which were in a fairly a vanced stage. The number of children suffering from malnutrition is to say the least alarming.

Throughout the Census Division of over eight thousand people there is only one Medical Aid Post needless to say this s inadequate. There has never been a medical patrol in the area and this perhaps accounts for the number of advanced leprosy and yaws cases.

I recommend that at least two Aid Posts be established here as soon as circumstances permit, one at Mapkebol and one at Marisere, also some effective medical patrols into the area would be a great help.

AGRICULTURE:

There is no doubt of the potential for Agricultural enterprise in the area, allmost all European type vegetables grow in profusion and the sweet potatoe here is far superior to that grown in the Mendi Valley.

Coffee plots have been established at 75% of the area's rest houses. The trees are in general doing very well despite half hearted attempts by their caretagers to maintain them.

ROADS and BMIDGES:

The Mendi-lai Valley road is open as far as Homaip, approx 24 miles from Mendi, even so it is still not finished to the degree that is usually required in the Sub-District and in some places it is dangerous, work is still being carried on on the sections past Homaip and in places the bench is very good indeed.

At Pelepoi there are at present three roads, that mentioned above, one going to Kandep and one to Magarima. I advised the people to complete the main road to Mendi first and then to start on the two new ones.

The people at Mapkebol and Kip express discontent at x having to work on the Mendi Nipa road, this follows an enquiry by myself due to a letter received by the A.D.O from the O.I.C. Nipa (ref 10-4-3.). They point out that the portions on which they are working are well inside the Nipa admin Area and that they have no claim whatever to the ground as far as gardening and hunting rights are concerned. They say that they are more than prepared to make and maintain that portion which passes through the their own clan boundaries. I instructed them to continue working as they have been inthe past until they receive some other instruction from the Assistant District Officer

Village Officials:

Generally the Village Constables and Councillors in this area are doing their jobwell and have their people under control with regard to the laws of the Territory. They are helpful and in

all cases pro Administration.

I have recommended the appointment of POKO-ELEDEBE as Village Councillor of Pelepoi as I feel that this group will benefit from his influence as would the Native Situation there.



The Census revision for the Upper Lai CensusDivision is now complete as is the new Tax/Census register. There has been a substantial increase in births while deaths remain fairly even as compared with previous figures.

Migrations shown are those within the Census Division itself eg.from Village to Village and also from other Censu Divisions in and

vice versa.

Politacal Awareness.

At all rest house, a talk was given on the duties of the electors towards their representative in the House of Assembly and conversely the representatives duties towards his electors, the right to elect another representative if the present one does not suit the electors

was emphasised.

It appeared that these talks were understood but this is rather hard to asses due to the people's reluctance to ask questions if they did not understand. However when a question was asked it was an intelligent one and showed that the person who asked it had grasped the theme of what was being said. Whether the mass comprehend or not will be demonstrated in the next elections be demonstrated in the next elections.

I feel that this sort of practice should be carried out more often as it appears to help the people and it certainly binds their interest, for the period of the talk anyway.

Conclusion:

For the duration of the Patrol Mr. J.K. Karkuru A.P.O. accompanied this was Mr. Karukuru's first patrol on this kind of work and in this area. He proved to be a valiable assistant and the best company that one could wish for on patrol. I trust that he gained someknowledge that will be of future use to him.

again stress the need for future intensive patrolling into the area and more care for the health of these natives.
