Mahler Returns to S.D. After 9 Years

The La Jolla Civic-University Orchestra and Chorus will give San Diego concert-goers a rare opportunity to experience one of the great classical works, Mahler's Symphony No. 3. Romantic, rich in material, immensely powerful, and physically challenging, Mahler's Third Symphony is a work of genius. Thomas Nee, Music Director and conductor, commented that "the piece calls for a massive orchestra, women's chorus, children's choir, and a mezzo-soprano soloist. It requires intense physical and mental concentration, and incorporates an exciting, expansive, musical range."

Performances will take place on Saturday, February 18, at 8 p.m., and Sunday February 19 at 3 p.m. at Mandeville Auditorium.

Seldom attempted because of its level of difficulty, Mahler's Third Symphony was last performed in San Diego nine years ago by the San Diego Symphony. Written in 1895 when Mahler was 35, this symphony attempts to encompass all of nature. The composer informally names several of the movements: "Summer Marches In," "What Love Tells Me," and "What the Creatures Tell Me." All reveal Mahler's intent to capture the intricacies and magnitude of nature through music.

The guests will be two strippers from "Fantasy Gram" and three comedians from "The Comedy Store," and they will discuss why they picked such unusual careers and just what it takes to work in their field. "We want the students to ask a lot of questions and really get involved", said Barbara, "This is a great chance for them to discover about alternative careers."

Future topics planned for "Afterwords" are equally as informative, and will cover diverse subjects, from substance abuse to psychics. The program is unique in that it gives students the opportunity to discover for themselves these topics that interest them close up without having to go through some other medium such as radio or newspaper articles.

enthusiasm for contemporary music and thoughtful programming.

It is impressive that, in a group of almost 250 people, no one receives any compensation. Rather the members are motivated through the joy of making music and exploring musical repertoire under the direction of these gifted conductors. Having a great deal of artistic innovation and talent, the organization is recognized on its own merit rather than its economic impact. Eric Bromberger, a 9 year violinist with the orchestra, explained, "This orchestra allows me to play music many orchestras are not capable of playing. Mahler's Symphony No. 3 is one example." In this light, the orchestra has grown to over 95 members, and the chorus to over 120. The season has expanded to 6 concerts repeated in pairs.

The La Jolla Civic-University Symphony Orchestra and Chorus originated in 1954 under the direction of violinist Peter Nicoloff. During the 1966-67 season, the orchestra formed an association with the Music Department at UCSD. Today the name reflects this joint venture of the University and the community. Tickets for the concert are: \$8 for general adult admission or \$6 for seniors and students, and are available from the UCSD Box Office.

One Flu Over the Cuckoo's Nest

That notorious, unwanted and persevering creature, the *FLU*, has struck UCSD with a fury. Students, staff, and even the omnipotent faculty have fallen victim to the wily virus. Like cold viruses, flu viruses have the ability to mutate or change rapidly, which means that the antibodies that you develop when you first get the flu will not protect you from a different flu strain.

So what can you expect? Fever, sore throat, muscle pain, joint pain, fatigue, cough, congestion, and nausea are common symptoms which normally last from seven to ten days. Flu symptoms are much like cold symptoms, with fever, aches, and nausea added. For both ailments the treatment is:

Get plenty of rest.
Drink lots of fluids to soothe the throat and loosen secretions. Avoid alcoholic beverages, as they will only dehydrate you.

Gargle with salt water to reduce the swelling in your throat (dissolve one teaspoon in a large glass of warm water). Lozenges or hard candies will also provide temporary relief.

Take acetaminophen (like Tylenol), or ibuprofen (like Advil) for fevers, aches, and pains. Avoid aspirin due to its association with Reyes Syndrome, a rare disease that can be fatal.

For coughs, take a cough syrup containing Dextromethorphan DM.

Congestion can be managed with an over-the-counter medication containing

antihistamine and/or decongestants.

To combat nausea, sip clear liquids such as water, ginger ale, or Gatorade. As nausea lessens, add in bouillon soup, juices, jello, and gradually add solid foods.

When should you see a medical practitioner? If you experience the following symptoms, go to Student Health Urgent Care for evaluation:

Painful swelling of the neck glands or a stiff neck.
Cough with the production of colored mucus.

Wheezing, shortness of breath, or pain when breathing.
Severe headache.

Fever greater than 100 degrees for more than 24 hours.

White patches on the back of the throat or tonsils, or an extremely red throat.

Chronic, unusual fatigue.

Catching a cold or flu is particularly frustrating for busy students who have heavy class loads, midterms, and often hold jobs as well. The trick is prevention. Try to keep your stress level low, eat a balanced diet, avoid prolonged contact with infected individuals, and do not share glasses, towels, or toothbrushes.

Finally, wash your hands frequently, because colds and the flu are spread by hand-to-hand contact after rubbing the eyes or nose. And if all that seems nearly impossible, a prayer or two to the Sun God couldn't hurt!

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Commuter News:

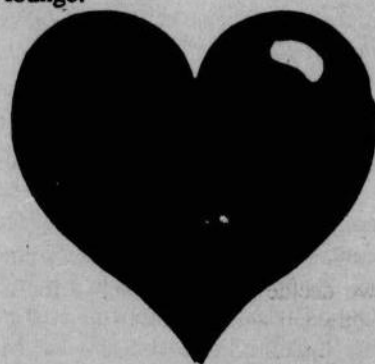

Where Relationships Come From

THE "W" GRADE:

A student may drop a course before the end of the ninth week of instruction by filing the appropriate form with the Registrar, after first notifying the instructor and/or department.

If you drop a course after the end of the fourth week of instruction and before the end of the ninth week of instruction, the Registrar will assign a final grade of "W" for that course.

You may not drop a course after the end of the ninth week of instruction.

DECLARE YOURSELF!

If your transcript still reflects an "Undeclared Status" you may face unnecessary delays in enrollment for future classes. You need to declare major course of study as soon as possible, especially if you have junior or senior

status. We encourage you to make an appointment with an academic counselor to help you in your decision making process.

Language proficiency exams will be given in French, German, and Russian on Saturday, March 11 at 9:00 a.m., in USB 2722. The written exam will be followed with oral interviews scheduled March 15 and 16, 1989. 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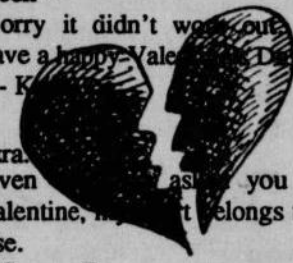
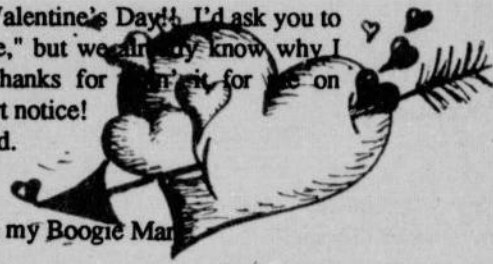
