PATROL REPORT DREIKIKIR No 4 of 1961-2.

conducted by T. P.O. Mulcahy in the Urim area for the purposes of Tax Colection, Census Revision and General Administration. The patrol was accompanied by Mr. C.P.O. J. Field who wrote the narrative report.

The patrol appears to have been well carried out and the report by Mr Field is a good effort for his first report. The area is still in the stage where movements of villages takes place towards a central area and this reflects that the people do not feel that isolation is necessary to their safety.

There is little cash cropping activity in the area. D.A.S.F. do not wish to expedite this unless a genuine interedevalops when of course assistance will be given. However field agricultural staff in the sub district have as much if not more than they can cope with at present in less remote areas. I anticipate however that desire for cash permanent cropping will arise in this area within the next eighteen months when the first returns from the Wom and Albiges are made known to the Urim people. In the meant: these people are reliant upon the exportation of labour for their cash income. The figure of 38% absentees in this regard is not regarded as high and no recommendation regarding closure to recruit; is considered necessary or adviseable. The area is quiet and there appears no serious signs of cult activity.

The attitude to land settlement mentioned by Field is general throughout the area. There would appear little hope that any land leases will be available in this area for some considerable time and the talks given to the people by the patrol in this regard are fully approved by me.

The figures show a increase of 16 over the past twelve months for the II villages of 1% per annum. This is not sufficient to maintain the population at its present figure. It should however increase with the presence of the SSEM at YAKRUMBOK who assist in provi ing medical services and ensure that those requiring medical aid are sent in to Dreikikir.

Tax collected in the area is down on last year's collection and no increase on this can be expected for at least three to four years.

END OF DIARY

INTRODUCTION.

The aim of this patrol was to collect taxes and revise census figures in the URIM Census Division. Also routine administration was carried out in the area.

The area patrolled lies to the west of Dreikikir station and is populated by some 1680 natives. The topography of the area consist of rather heavily timberedy ridges. The ridges, although rising to no great hieghts, are in many cases steep. The area is drained by numerous small streams and two large rivers - the KORP (just prior to YAUATONG village) and the SIKAU (just below YAGRUMBOK 2). The villages are reasonably close together and the walking is not difficult.

NATIVE SITUATION.

The area was last patrolled by a Dept. of Native Affairs officer, during May 1961, the officer conducting the patrol being Mr. P.O. Mulcahy.

The native situation at the time was reported to be satisfactory and this and this appeared to be the same during this patrol.

Only one case of a breach of the Native Administration Regulations was brought to the notice of the patrol. The offender was convicted and sent to the Corrective Institution at Dreikikir.

Other minor complaints were heard and settled at the time of hearing. These minor complaints mainly concerned problems arising from marriages but one case of dispute over usufructary land rights was investigated. This had been previously been settled by Mr. Mulcahy on his previous patrol and on this accassion his previous settlement was upheld.

On two occassions permission was given for the removal of villages to new sites. The first village to ask permission was WINYAMON - a village which is situated on land belonging to another group, namely the inhabitants of KILMANGLEN village. They had been using the land for some time with permission of the Kilmanglan people but of late disputes had arisen and these combined with the fact that gardens were becoming unproductive, decided the people to move. The area to which they have moved is closer to LAWINGUAP. The new village is situated on land which they claim is theirs by inheritance and as no other claims were heard to the contrary it appears that they are in the right.

The other village to ask for permission to move was PINANG which is situated well down off the main ridge on which the other villages are found. They wished to move because of the inaccessibilty of their present site. The new site is closer to

to the main pad and is higher than the previous site.

It was noticed that a large number of young men had left the area to work at labour outside the district. Absentee labour amounted to 38% of the potential labour source. This is a large increase on last years figure of 23.8%. It was learnt that a large number of the absentees had travelled to NUKU patrol post and thence to other areas. The patrol proceeded to NUKU to discuss this problem with the officer-in-charge, and the possibility of curbing the exodus of Dreikikir labour. Maprik labour not being in demand maybe the vause of Dreikikirs offering for work at NUKU more.

Of late many enquiries have been received at

the Patrol Post at Dreikikir, from young men wanting work. They don't seem to be in any real hurry to get out of their villages but appear to be more interested in just obtaining money. Many of these enquiries have concerned recruitment into the Royal Papua and New Guinea Const. but in most cases the education qualifications have disqualified the applicants. As the URIM area is more or less isolated from Dreikikir - the URAT Census Division lying in between - the people of this area have only a limited source of finance. The distance is too great for them to supply native food or building materials to the Administration and their only source of income appears to be from returning plantation labourers.

The area has had mild cargo cult activity in past years but no cult tendencies appeared present on this patrol. Most of the villages were in good condition and the people apparently contented. Particular attention was shown to PAKILO village where cult activities were noticed last year. A complete and thorough inspection of the village and hamlets was made and questions asked but the village appears to have settled to a normal routine.

Enquiries were made by the patrol concerning damage caused by the severe earth tremor in the area on the 23rd March 1962. No damage was reported although the tremor was felt in the whole area.

A more or less friendly attitude was shown towards the patrol by the inhabitants and no animosity towards the Administration was apparent. Except for minor bickering amongst each other and also their old cry for 'business', the inhabitants appear to be quite content.

The patrol was asked by numerous village official if land, with similar conditions upon it as those on the recent SOWAN lease, would be opened up in the Dreikikir area. It appears that some men were interested to try such work, but when offered application to the Lease at 'SOWAN', refused because they thought it was too distant from their home villages. The two applicants that

did go to WEWAK to inspect the blocks came back with the same idea. The conditions applicable to the blocks were explained to them along with the fact KKAK of the improbability of a similar lease being opened at Dreikikir in the near future. The hardships of transporting any crops which they may grow and the fact that a considerable amount of hard work is necessary to successfully operate such large areas of crops as 15 -50 acres as were available on the 'SOWAN' lease. It is hard to say what steps should be taken in the economic advancement of this group, but it should be handled with care because any failure of a plan suggested by the Administration would only result in a loss of confidence. Maybe with the advent of a road their problem may be lessened.

HEALTH.

Health in the area appears to have improved generally from when the last D.N.A. patrol occurred. This is probably due to the warning given by Mr.Mulcahy previously, and the fact that the European Medical Assistant had patrolled the area 5 months previous.

Death in the 0-1 year age group were 15 or 28.8% of the total births within the period.

Numerous skin complaints and tropical ulcers were treated. One female with cataracts on her eyes was sent to the Native Hospital at Dreikikir for the E.M.A. to examine, with possible chance of an operation. A male adult was brought before a Court for Native Affairs for neglecting to obtain medical aid for his child who had a malignant tropical ulcer upon her ankle.

The Aid Post at LAWINGUAP was inspected by the patrol. Some of the buildings were in poor condition and instructions were given for the necessary repairs to be made immediatly. The Aid Post had numerous patients, most of whom were suffering from skin complaints.

ROADS.

The present foot pad that allows access to the area is in good condition and provides for reasonable walking.

Due to the steep terrain the future building of roads in this area will be difficult and if carried out, much initial survey work will be necessary. In patrol report DRE. No. 2 1958/59, Mr. P.O. Hanrahan gave a detailed account of a survey he carried on the possibility of a road from NUKU

There is little cash cropping in the area - some rice being grown at LAWINGUAP for purchase and milling at Dreikikir. Some enquiries were received from various natives concerning the purchase of coffee.

Cash cropping in the Urim seems impractacle at the moment due to marketing sources and transport difficulties but due to some genuine interest snown by some villages a decision should be made soon as to the question of whether coffee is to encouraged or not.

At YAGRUMBOK two applications were received for entry into the Extension School at Bainyik Agricultural Station, Maprik. Although cash cropping is not encouraged in this area at the moment, these two applicants appeared worthy of a chance of entering the School. One had been to a school in the Highlands and spoke English very well. Both were sent to the Officer-in-Charge at Bainyik for him to interview.

VILLAGE OFFICIALS.

There is a full complement of officials in the area and in most cases are doing their work to the best of their ability.

VILLAGES.

There are 11 villages in the division and most were in good condition. In two of the smaller villages - MIMBIOK and KILMANGLEN, sanitary conditions were poor and instructions were given for remewal and initial building of more toilets.

The rest houses slept in were reasonable.

MISSIONS.

The S.S.E.Mission at YAGRUMBOK is the only mission in the area and appears to be doing well. They have received their mission lease and have commenced on a building

programme.

They have voluntary adult literary classes in progress and these appear to be bearing fruit going by the impression the patrol received upon inspecting the school.

Continued hard work by Mr. Burgess on the Cessna airstrip at Yagrumbok has brought the strip up to first class condition.

TAXATION.

The head tax of 5/- was collected without incident. A total of £40.10.0 was collected - this being a decrease of £6.5.0 on last years figure. This can be attributed to the fact that a large number of males were absent from their village this year.



DREIKIKIR PATROL REPORT NO. 5

Recoipt is acknowledged of the above Patrol Report prepared by Mr. Cadet Patrol Officer Field.

NATIVE SITUATION - I presume the initial cersus referred to applies to those willages for which tax registers were forwarded to Wewak and which were not received. Surely the old village books would have shown all the people of each village now of adult age - and thus the absentee labourers.

The officer-in-Charge, Dreikikir, should be fully aware of the Area Administration policy for the Dreikikir area. I have discussed it with him fully on past inspections and, I believe, you have done to also. Is there any real confusion?

HEALTH - The goitre cases in the URAT area have been sent to Dreikikir for examination by the Bedical Assistant by almost every patrolling officer in the last ten years. They have also been seen by Medical Officers. They may be growing tired of exhibiting themselves.

AGRICULTURE - I suggest you take up the matter of coffee seed direct with the Officer-in-Charge, Bainyik - seed is not in short supply now.

The question of favouritism in distribution by the Agriculture trainee should be thoroughly investigated by the officer-in-Charge, Dreikikir.

I would like to see det lied statistics on the economy of each area patrolled - inco & from coffee, food crops, labour etc. This will provide good background information for later Local Government Surveys.

CEMERAL - Mr. Field has reported the scope of patrol quite well and adequately presented his observations, and in this field his training is progressing well.

However, training in reporting is often marred by poor presentation. In this report there are numerous typographical errors, many of which have been crossed out with xxxs, which immediately gives he reader a poor impression. Neatness is essential for favourable comment. When typing errors occur, as they will for some considerable time, they should be erased and retyped.

PATROL REPORT DERIKINIR No. 5 -1961/2.

Attached please find report of a patrol in and Field. The report was complied by Mr. C.P.O. Field.

The area is quiet and shows signs of awakeni With regard to the Maprik Councillor tilling these people they will eventually be included in the Maprik Council there is no truth in this as no suggestion of such a course has ever been made. This is a typi example of the misunderstanding which exists when these people communicate with other groups. The Councillor evidently told the peo that eventually they would have their own Council but was misunderstanding structure to the request for a plan for the development of Council Administration in the Dreikikir area it is of course planned for the BUMBITA MUGIANG WORA and ALBIGES areas to be combined this year. Now with regard to the KOMBIO URAT URIM WOM and GAWAGA areas it is planned to bring these into a Dreikikir Council area within the near future. No set date of course can be set at the moment as to just whe these peoples by way of propoganda into a receptive mind towards Councils. The policy in this regard is I take it that the establishm of Councils including the Dreikikir one is to be along the LUMI road and the OIC at Dreikikir can plan that the Dreikikir Council will be established before the road recepts breikikir and possibly quite some time earlier if Mr Pegg's committments allow this.

With regard to the shortage of coffee seed should be available within the coming quarter. It is very unlike that any considerable amounts o coffee will come out of this area for three to four years so we have in fact ample time in this regard. I do not think that there is any worry in this regard.

when they are used more frequently. However here again there is little necessity to use these roads at the present and we cant use them just to encourage maintenance. I appreciate the desire on the part of the O.I.C. to get ahead with development but the fact is that this in such areas must come behind the more progressive areas and that the machinery available to keep pace with present development is fully engaged. With regard to dissatisfaction over the distribution of available seed at Dreikikir by the agricultural trainee at Dreikikir this is a matter which the O.I.C. himself has a reasonable amount of control over. There is no possibility of Agricultural Officers from Bainyik supervising such distribution from this end. The O.I.C. will be instructed to ensure that a just distribution is made if in fact this is occuring.

INTRODUCTION.

Dreikikir Patrol No. 5 of 1961/62 was carried out to collect tax, revise census figures and carry out routine administration in the URAT Census Division. The area is inhabited by some 3583 natives.

The Census Division more or less encircles the station and most of the villages lay in close proximity to the station and with each other. The topography of the Division is hilly in the Nor'East and Nor'West corners, whereas the lower areas to the south find the ground levelling out.

The area is drained by XXX a branch of the MIHAMBON and the NANHU Rivers in the north and the SARONG Creek in the South.

NATIVE SITUATION.

The officer-in-charge, Mr. Mulcahy last patrolled the area during June 1961. He reported the native situation in the area at the time to be normal and the area trouble free. The situation does not appear to have changed.

Due to the fact that the area patrolled is in close proximity to OREIKIKIR Patrol Post, most disputes are immediatly brought to the station for settlement by the officer-in-charge., and not kept till a DNA patrol passes through. Still, numerous minor complaints were heard and settled by the patrol - these mainly concerned maritial KK strife, usufructory rights to land etc.

has fallen by 2% to 32.4%, since the last patrol. It is not certain if the total given as being absent is correct or not as on the latter part of the patrol an initial census was carried out, and it is doubtful whether all names of those absent were recorded. Although this percentage is considerably high, only one complaint was received from village officials concerning shortages of manpowerix in the villages. This was at MULENGEI village which has only a small

population of 72, and would naturally tend to miss the labourers more than a larger village. As indentured labour is a source of finance for these people and as no village has been seriously over recruited the labour situation can be said to be at a satsfactory level. But, I feel that any further recruiting from this area could impose hardship on these villages.

Economical the people appear to be some of the most stable and advanced in the Dreikikir area. Although the amount of rice grown by these people has fallen consiberably, their efforts now appear to be channelled into the production of coffee. At this stage most of the coffee plots are not in production. Thought will have to be given to the problem of transporting the coffee means to a market once the plots commence to produce. Because of the early stage at which the coffee is at, about two years remain before this problem becomes really acute. With the advent of the new road, now being constructed by the Australian Armym reaching Dreikikir the problem should be less—ened as this will provide for cheaper and quicker transport between Dreikikir and Maprik.

Due to the fact that they are in close walking distance to the station, the villages of the Urat Census Division have a steady source of income from the sale of native food and supply of building materials to the station. The 5/- head tax can be met by all without undue hardship.

Peoples attitude to having a council in this area. Although talk was heard in some of the other villages, this was the only place which actually made a point of bringing the topic into open discussion with the patrolling officers. The whole Division appears to be cold to the idea of a council being inaugurated at Dreikikir. In P/R DREIK 6 of 1960/61, Mr. Mulcahy gives their reason for disliking councils as, that the elders thought that the younger weren't advanced enough for council work and also the fact that they prefer to pay their tax to a patrol officer stationed at Dreikikir.

On this patrol, village officials claimed that the

reason why they disliked councils was because they had their time taken up with the planting of coffee. They felt that in about 5 years after the coffee had started to produce then they could start thinking of commencing a council. They also brought up the question of paying tax to a council rather than to a patrol officer at DREIKIKIR. They were all in agreement that they remain under the direct supervision of a patrol officer. I think the problem is that they are still uncertain about the previsions for tax under a Local Government Council. This has been repeatedly explained to them by previous officers but they still have not grasped the idea.

What brought this topic into the minds of the inhabitants again, was the fact that just prior to the arrival of the patrol, a Councillor from Maprik Local Government Council had spent two or three days visiting at MISIM village. He had evidently touched on the topic of the Dreikikir population being eventually included in the Maprik Council and paying tax to that Council. I feel that although the councillor may not have actually suggested this, the the locals themselves, misinterpreting XNX him, appear to have become more set against councils. Such rumours spread very quickly and could prove quite harmful to future work in XX. the field of councils in this area.

HEALTH.

Health in the area is good, due to the close proximity of the villages to the hospital at Dreikikir. Also at MISIM, Mrs. Watts of the SSE Mission tends to some of the minor ailments of the locals.

The BRUGUM Aid Post was inspected by the patrol on its way to EMUL from MUSENDAI. The Aid Post was in reasonable condition - most of the patients being treated for skin complaints and other minor ailments.

During the patrol the Hospital Orderly who accompanied the patrol treated forty inhabitants - mainly for sores. Eight were dispatched to the hospital at Dreikikir. These eight consisted of cases of bad tropical ulcers and also KAKKK two cases of premature babies. Two mases of reasonably advanced goitre were seen - these were sent to breikikir for the E.M.A to examine.

The area is very well off for native XXX vegetables and in most places a reasonable amount of fresh meat is available to them.

ROADS AND BRIDGES.

along a road which is capable of carrying transport of medium size. This road is in fair condition but it is not used very often. It can be taken for transport that the local inhabitants don't spend as much time on its upkeep as they would if there was more traffic. Should it happen, that at for some reason this road should be used often by motor transport, it would necessitate only a feasonable amount of work to bring the road up to secondary road standards. The road traverses a ridge for most of the way and little trouble is encounted with bridges

or too steep grades.

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From NANAHA to MIHWAK to TUMAN the route is followed along a foot pad. This is little more than a native path and because of the precipitous courseit follows, I think it is useless to ask the population to improve it to any great degree.

From TUMAN to MUSENDAI, the 'alternate' road from Dreikikir to Maprik is followed. This is in good condition but this is due to the fact that it has witnessed little or no trffic at all in the last few months. This road was constructed to the pass the steep inclines which are experienced on the other road.

From MUSENDAI the patrol proceeded to EMUL along a native path. The path is overgrown due to XXX lack of use but provided good, cool walking conditions.

In the latter part of the patrol the route took the officers along the main Dreikikir - Maprik road. This is in good condition. During the last two months, villagers have been building covers over the drains in the road. Particular care was taken in the building of them and the time spent has proved worthwhile as drivers of Administration vehicles have been able to shorten the time of travel between Maprik and Dreikikir with less wear on the cars. All drains in the road from BALI to Dreikikir have been treated in this fashion.

AGRICULTURE.

Some quite large coffee gardens were inspected. Most of the gardens have only the shade planted as yet but in a lot of cases the owner s are only waiting for coffee seed or seedli ngs. Most of the gardens are set out well - this being due mainly to the efforts of Joseph Lamborie the farmer trainee stationed at Dreikikir.

Because of the increase in coffee grown in the area

and the growing importance of agriculture to the Dreikikir people as a whole, I feel that consideration should be given to the ev tual stationing of an Agricultural Officer at Brikikir, or, at least, for more attention to be given, in the form of agricultural patrols, to the Dreikikir area.

The only other cash crop grown is rice. The production of rice has fallen considerably - during 1961 26,8121bs were purchased whereas in 1962 purchases totalled only 6229 lbs.

Many of the coffee growers are becoming discouraged due to the manner in which coffee seed and seedlings are distributed. It appears that many have been waiting for some time for these items, but have missed out due to shortages at Bainyik or because they have not been on good relations with the agricultural trainee at Dreikikir. Evidently he has been providing seed to his friends but not others. Some villagers have had their shade in for some considerable time and have been looking after them quite well but have not been able to obtain seed, whereas others, who have only relatively new gardens which aren't in the best condition, have obtained seeds or seedlings. I think that the method of distribution should be selective so that those who have shade and who have had sufficient interest to keep their gardens in good condition, should be the first to receive the seed.

VILLAGE OFFICIALS.

There is a full compliment of officials in the area and in most cases are doing their work to their best of their ability.

VILLAGES.

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Most of the 20 villages were in reasonable condition and only in few tere houses or sanitation at a low standard. In such cases instructions were given to improve such defaults and later, after sufficient time has elapsed, another inspection will be

made to see that these instructions were carried out.

At BEREMBIL village a group informed the patrol that it had moved to a new site. Their reason for moving, they claim was that then present site of the village is subject to severe movement during earth tremors. This is probably true as the village is situated on a high, sandstone ridge - and also the group substantiated their argument by showing the officers fissues in the sandstone outcrops which they claim were caused by receny tremars.

All of the rest houses slept in provided reasonable accommodation for both officers.

MISSIONS.

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There are three missiom stations in the Division - S.S.E.Mission at BRUCUM and MISIM and the Catholic Mission at Dreikikir.

The station at Misit XX is staffed by Mr. Watts and family - they appear to be doing reasonably well. The station has a European native material house and some minor out-housing. Mr. Watts had no XXXXXXX complaints and had no comments to offer on the native situation other than that all was quiet.

Mr. Mulcahy payed a visit to the S.S.E.Mission at BRUGUM and here again, all appeared satisfactory.

The Catholic Mission at Dreikikir has progressed well - lately the school operated by the preist Fr,0'Toole, underwent an inspection by the District Education Officer. He praised the standard of the school and it is thought that the school will be given recognition in the near future.

TAXATION.

The head tax of 5/- was collected without incident, a total of £134.15.0 was collected. This shows an increase of £20.15.0 on last year's collection. The fact that new Tax Registers

were compiled maybe the reason for this increase.

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Due to the loss of some of last years census figures and the fact that an initial census was necessary in nine of the villages, this year's figures will not balance with last year's.

An increase XX in the population of 232 persons since

last years was recorded.


