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

KARCAR PATROL No. 2/59-60

Even before the War there was a marked difference between the degrees of initiative displayed by the WASKIA, and the TAKIA of KARKAR island; it is difficult to account for the character divergence unless there was an influx of migrants at any particular stage. The Officer-in-Charge, Karkar, might find it an interesting exercise to account for this state of affairs, and I would appreciate his opinion in due course.

"Sister Exchange" was the m bject of some discussion at the recent Hisdon Conference, but more in relation to purpoly populated areas.

It is agreed that the people thomselves are probably responsible for their own less times, if any, in view of the fertility of the volcame soil.

Nortality Batio remains uniformly good over the Divisions.

The fact that the people are aid Post conscious is a tribute to the patrolling officers of both Departments.

The matter of an Agricultural Officer for the Island should be handled at District Level through the District Agricultural Officer.

Receipt is acknowledged of your memorandum 30/8 of the 5th. October, 1959, together with the above Patrol Report and attachments.

With reference to Mr. Johnston's remarks concerning the Waskia people, Mr. Parr ish has visited the area since the conclusion of Mr. Johnston's report and held meetings with these people, and I do not con-sider that the situation is quite as black as Mr. Johnston paints it. Undoubtedly, these people need a patient approach and should be given full explanations as to what we are trying to accomplish, the workings of Native Local Government Councils, and objectives.

Undoubtedly the Waskia people lack the drive of the Takias but this is not something new and has been the subject of remark by all patrol officers since the end of the war.

With reference to your remarks under the heading of Census, I think that a check of your computations wil' reveal that at the present rate of increase the people are likely to double their population in approximately 22 years and not 40 years. This is another instance of the benefits of good medical services; a T.B. survey of the whole population of the Island is due to commence within the next 10 days. the next 10 days.

Unfortunately, once again no funds have been forthcoming for a new hospital at Kar Kar this year, the Officer in Charge at Kar Kar will be forced to continue to patch the very dilapidated native material buildings already existing. The problem of accommodating the expected large influx of T.B. patients following the T.B. Survey, is under the notice of the District Commissioner and he is endeavouring to find ways and means.

I agree with your remarks concerning the age of students at Mission schools, however this is a private matter for the Missions concerned. It is hoped that Councils will be able to expand the educational facilities in the near future to cope with the young children of Kar Kar.

The report is a good one and Mr. Johnston is to be congratulated on a job well done.

Submitted herewith in duplicate is the Report of KARKAR Patrol No.2/59-60 to the TAKIA and WASKIA Tax/Census Divisions. Village Population Register forms are submitted in triplicate. Also submitted is a Camping Allowance Claim for Mr. J.A. Johnston, Patrol Officer who conducted the patrol.

Native Affairs:

I agree with w. Johnston that the difference in attitude between the MASKIA and TAKIA groups is most noticeable. I feel that the WASKIA group will need to be watched carefully as they tend to give the impression that they have a sultist outlook with regard to Native Local Government. Intensive education and propaganda concerning the aims and objects of area administration would serve to overcome any such tendencies. Such education and propaganda would not go astray in the TAKIA, N.L.G.C. area either.

Agriculture:

It is expected that an Agricultural officer will take up duties at KARKAR next month. Following upon this it is hoped that an overall improvement in the general agricultural situation on the island will soon be noticeable.
This, I feel sure, will mean a consequent expansion of economic development as the Agricultural Officer will be able to easily the people to overcome and/or resolve the difficulties and problems with which they are now faced in the agricultural field.

Census

The census figures are evidence that the population on KARKAR Island is rapidly expanding. If the present rate of increase is maintained the population of the island will double in 40 years. The present rate of natural increase is 2.85% for the TAKIA Tax/Census Division and 3.55% for the WASKIA Tax/Census Division.

Medical and Health:
The Administration hospital at KINIM is in a very dilapidated condition. However, Assistant Medical Pactitioner Kahu Sugoho is a tireless worker and appears to do everything

possible while working under extremely poor and primitive conditions, to bring the benefits of medicine to as many persons as possible. It is planned that a new hospital will be built at MIAK but I have not heard anything to indicate that the work might be commenced in the immediate future. Such a new hospital is urgently required.

The Department of Public Health keeps close watch on all hospitalized T.B. cases. T.B. is rife on KARKAR but it is hoped that the efforts of both the Administration and the Lutheran Mission will soon enable the disease to be overcome.

I consider it disappointing that the Missions are enrolling a large proportion of students in the 16-20 age group. I feel that their efforts would be best concentrated on the young children as is done in the Administration and Council schools.

An officer of the Department of Forests is proceeding to KARKAR in approximately two weeks time to conduct a survey of the timber potential on the island. It is hoped that this survey may result in the establishment of a timber industry on the island.

I am not in agreement with the numbering of villages, e.g. KAUL No.1, KAUL No.2, etc. Each of these has its own native name and I think that should be the name by which it is known officially.

This was a good patrol, ably and competently conducted by Mr. Johnston.

KARKAR PATROL REPORT NO: 2 of 1959/60.

Introduction:

This patrol was for the purpose of carrying out a census check and making up lists from which to compile both the Council Tax Registers and Government Personal Tax Registers.

All villages were visited and censused by the writer except for 8 in the Waskia Division. These were Buson, Keng, Kulkul, Kurumlang, Kurumtaur, Marangis, Mater and Mom. These were censused by the OIC Rarkar, P.O. Edwards at an earlier date, but pressure of work in connection with the two Councils prevented him from carrying on with the census of the island and thus this patrol was undertaken.

All census figures are included with this report.

Native Situation:

With every village on the island accessable by vehicular road at most times of the year, a constant watch can be kept on the people and a matter quickly investigated if trouble arises.

While the Takia people appear to be taking an interest in what work is going on in their Council and will discuss matters and follow advice given them, the Waskia people present a rather contrasting group. They mostly seem to be a listless lot, showing little care for Council matters and at times a general disregard for Administration law. While the writer was on Karkar Izland, a run of events occurred, all involving breaches of the law and these were handled by the OIC Karkar.

However, it is thought that the Karkar people, especially the Waskia group, will have to be watched and guided carefully and made to realise that because they are now part of a Local Native Government Council does not mean that they can take everything into their own hands and do as they like. Quite a few of the councillors need this impressed on them.

The "sister-exchange" marriage system which has been mentioned in previous reports seems to have resolved itself gradually to some extent at least. The exchange still occurs quite often, but where one or another of the parties concerned has objection to it, proceedings are usually dropped and the position settled amicably between the parties.

Arricultural and Economic Development:

Subsistence agriculture is generally sufficient and the people usually well fed, although it appears that on occassions some villagers on the coast do have a slaghtly lean time. However this would appear to be only the peoples' own fault in not having enough foresight to plant up big enough gardens.

New coconuts continue to be planted from time to time in most areas and cocoa is being planted here and there in sometimes large and sometimes small numbers.

Because of this it is believed that there are still many people with plantings of less than the required 500 trees and evidently showing little intention of bringing them up to the number needed for registration on a permanent basis.

Also, many new plantings of cocoa, and also coconuts, were seen to be put in badly. Trees too close together and in some-what indiscriminate lines are common.

In view of this and also in view of the previous requests that have been made, urgent consideration should be given to the appointment of a permanent D.A.S.F. officer to Karkar Is-Land as soon as possible.

It is common knowledge that the richest soils in this area are on Karkar Island and that there is the opportunity for relatively large scale economic development, but without an efficient officer to supervise and guide such development effectively, it will only continue as it is now in a rather haphazard way.

The benefits that a permanent D. 1.S.F. officer could bring to both the native and European inhabitants of Karkar Island are obvious.

Census Statistics:

Census figures show that the population in both divisions continues to increase at a steady rate.

In the Takia division there was an increase of births over deaths by 367, with an overall increase in the total population of 387.

In the Waskia division births exceeded deaths by 388, with an increase of 399 in the total population.

This shows a total increase of 786 on the island, this being over a 2 year period.

An increase is shown in the number of men absent at work; quite a large increase in those working inside the district and a minor increase in those working outside the district.

Of the number working inside the district, at least half and an example on plantations etc on Karkar Island itself, many of them only being absent from their village during the day and others often returning each weekend.

There is also an increase in the rumber of children absent at schools (see education).

Medical and Health:

Generally, the health of the people was very good, being free from sores etc. This is no doubt the result of two good hospitals.

The N.M.A. at Kinim does regular tours of the villages and aid posts on the island, thus keeping a fairly constant watch on the people. The people themselves however are quite hospital and aid post conscious and readily bring their sick forward.

Further aid posts have been built and others are now being Luilt by the Councils giving better facilities to the people.

The government hospital at Kinim is falling into disrepair all the time and much work is involved in trying to keep the buildings in reasonable order. The conditions available for treating the sick are rather poor and the erection of permanent type buildings and the provision of better facilities would seem a must in the near future.

It was noticed that a large incidence of tuberculosis was prevalent amongst the people. No actual count was taken, but the number would be quite high. Both the horpitals on the island are doing a lot of work in trying to combat this disease and the Lutheran

Mission also sends many of its patients to Yagaum Hospital, Madang.

Education:

This is provided largely by the Lutheran Mission who have quite big schools at Narer and Anul.

The Catholic Mission has a small school at Tabel and the Administration now has a school operating at Miak.

There are also the usual mission village schools.

As well, the two Councils are getting school building projects under way and it will only be a short while before these are ready to accept pupils.

Quite a large increase in the number of children attending schools has occurred, most of them attending the Lutheran Mission schools on Karkar Island. Also, it was noticed that a large proparate -ortion of those newly enrolled at schools were in the 16 - 20 age group. Whether this is a genuine enthusiasm for education or just a means of escaping from paying the tax to the Council cannot be determined.

Villages and Housing:

Villages were generally found to be in a reasonably clean state.

Houses were usually of a good design, but in many cases the state of repair was rather poor and in several instances instructions were issued for repairs or replacements to be effected.

Conclusions

Generally, the position on Karkar appears to be fairly good.

These people have better natural resources than most others in the District and if they were prepared to work more and help themselves, their position and future would be quite bright.

With the introduction of Local Native Government Councils, a big step has been taken and they will undoubtedly help to develop the people along the many different avenues. However the handling and guiding of the people within these Councils will have to be carried out very carefully and with much consideration from all angles, in order that troubles and headaches do not arise, and that the people work with the Administration and not against it as some tend to be doing now.


