JOHN SEARLE DELIVERS UCSD HUMANITIES LECTURE OCTOBER 15

John R. Searle, the Mills Professor of the Philosophy of Mind and Language at UC Berkeley, will give a public lecture on "The Construction of Social Reality" presented by the UCSD Center for the Humanities Thursday, Oct. 15 at 8:00 p.m. in Room 108 of Peterson Lecture Hall on the La Jolla campus.

Searle is a leading philosopher "world famous for his work on speech act theory" (Oxford University Gazette) whose most recent books are The Mystery of Consciousness (1997) The Construction of Social Reality (1995) and The Rediscovery of the Mind (1992). His contributions to the field of philosophy include his 1980 "Chinese Room Analogy," a much-discussed refutation of the idea that the human brain is a computer and the mind is a kind of software.

Searle also has won renown as a provocative lecturer. The Times Higher Education Supplement states, "Wittgenstein once remarked that a philosopher who doesn't engage in public debate is like a boxer who never enters the ring. By this standard, John Searle is a true prizefighter."

Searle's lecture will be followed by a panel discussion of his views by three UCSD professors: Roy D'Andrade of Anthropology, Richard Arneson of Philosophy and Ronald Langacker of Linguistics.

The UCSD Center for the Humanities lecture is free and open to the public.
