- 7) Point of information: to request information on the motion being discussed.
- 8) Discussion must be limited to the question on the floor.
- 9) Try to keep comments on the question short and to the point.
- 10) Respect the chairpersons of the conference when you are called out of order. remember they must do their job to assure a successful conference.

 - a. All other organizations (community or otherwise) must have formally requested a literature table from La Raza Mecha Bay-Area Central prior to the conference and must distribute their literature from a literature table.
 - b. Literature that attacks the conference, its unity, its structure, and/or its participants will not be allowed. This is a conference where we can collectively strengthen our existing unity, not to divide or to create an atmosphere or suspicion or mistrust.
- 5. This is a conference to promote our Raza Student Unity. All those who have differences of opinion of any political point within the conference must adhere and respect the principles untiy of the Mecha conference itself. These principles are: a. The theme: "MEChA IN '83 UNITY & ACTION FIGHTING FOR OUR EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS".
 - b. La Union Hace La Fuerza: Our strength is in our spirit of unity, our unity is in our diversity!
 - c. We are all Mechistass regardless if our respective campus organization is named Mecha, La Raza, Mer, Umas, Mayo, Masa or Oer. The fact remains that we are here to do and to promote Mecha work, Mecha orgainizing, mecha issues, Mecha spirit and Mecha Unity.
- 6. All participants must be willing to engage in democratic discussion and adhere to majority decision. All participants must adhere to and respect the conference chairpersons.

What is M.E.Ch.A.?

M.E.Ch.A. is the first step towards uniting the student groups throughout the Southwest into a vibrant and responsive network of activists that will respond as a unit to oppression and racism.

It is the function of M.E.Ch.A. to further socialization and and politicization for liberation on all campuses. The political sophistication of our Raza must be raised so that thet do not fall prey to opportunists and vendidos, whose sole interest is in their personal career and fortune. In addition, the student movement is more than a political movement; it is cultural and social as well. The spirit of our M.E.Ch.A. is one of hermandad and cultural awareness.

M.E.Ch.A.'s goal is to bring awareness to young Chicanos that the liberation of our people from prejudice and oppression is in our hands. We are the liberators. It is our responsibility to bring about these needed changes!

Here in Aztlan, we must move head on with accuracy and trucha. There are no personal merit badges to be won in this social revolution! The ethic of profit and competition which the Anglo Society offers, must be replaced by our ancestral communalism and love for beauty y carnalismo. San Diego M.E.CH.A. Central believes that allowing more than one Chicano/Raza student organization is wrong.

This action invites disunity. First it reverses all past decisions and traditional ways for handling these problems. By allowing a college or university to have one vote for every Chicano group on campus, would create and unfair representation situation. It would permit a much larger representation for a small faction-ridden school than a largely united University. Furthermore, there is no way that one could prevent college groups from creating "false" factions to gain a greater representation than they would otherwise be entitled to. Not only could this not be prevented but it would be almost impossible to detect afterwards. Under the traditional method for dealing with this problem campuses with divisions are not allowed to vote in state-wide meetings. This prevents any moves to gain extra votes and does not allow unequal representation. It does not penalize people for their unity, it rewards them!

Besides the obvious benefits of the traditional way for handling these problems there is also a need for <u>unity</u>. If M.E.CH.A. at the statewide level is ever to be effective it must have unity. Unity is impossible if the foundations and basic operating procedures of M.E.CH.A Statewide are changed at every meeting. We need unity, we cannot affford to have the rules changed at every state meeting, depending on the location. San Diego Central, therefore, has decided that in case of a split (more than one Raza student organization on campus) that they unite and select one person as their representative. If this cannot be accomplished we feel that the campus should not have a vote.

HERMAN BACA

Herman was born in New Mexico, and has been in National City since 1955. His involvement includes MAPA in 1968, Raza Unida county organization and Casa Justicia. He was instrumental in the forming of the coalition of community groups who came to be known as the Ad Hoc Committee on Chicano Rights. In 1976 it became a regular membership organization known as the Committee on Chicano Rights (CCR).

CCR works with issues dealing with police brutality, immigration, law and justice. The CCR has advocated an independent line and has always received the support of the community. One of the main issues CCR is working with a national campaign to stop Carter's Immigration Plan. Herman Baca is the Chairperson of the Committee on Chicano Rights.

VICENTE DE BACA

Vicente, originally from New Mexico was raised in San Diego and has been active in the Chicano movement for many years. His involvement includes MAYA, M.E.CH.A. as well as work with the Chicano Federation-San Diego in the Law and Justice Committee and the Mid-City regional advisory Board.

Vicente currently works within San Diego Equal Rights Congress (ERC) which is an umbrella organization which includes Mechas, Texas Farmworkers, Upac, and other organizations concerned with eliminating discrimation in education, jobs and any other type of discrimination.

ERC is actively involved with the Texas Farmworkers movement, the struggle of the Coalminers in Kentucky, and other significant luchas.

CARLOS VÁZQUEZ

Carlos is from San Diego, "National City" graduate of San Diego State University. He was director of CASA Justicia where he did all immigration work.

Carlos was instrumental in the organization of The Raza Unida Party and worked with M.E.CH.A. in his student days.

He has been involved with the Committe on Chicano Rights since its inception where he implements his knowledge dealing with paralegal and legal aid matters. Mr. Vázquez is the head of the Immigration Committee of CCR.

- 1. Roberts Rules of Order
 - a. All voting is binding on M.E.Ch.A. participating in the Statewide M.E.Ch. A. Conference, (U.C.L.A. - resolution).

2. Berkeley Precedent.

- a. Only one person from each M.E.Ch. A. will be recognized as the spokes person
- b. Each M.E.Ch.A. will have only one vote to be cast by the recognized spokesperson.
- c. Only Mechistas can present proposals or make motions.
- Only one spokesperson will be recognized from each non-M.E.Ch.A. organization.
- e. Anyone wishing to address a motion must go through their respective organization's spokesperson.

H. Reports:

South Bay Central;

They are habing problems of retaining Chicano faculty. Need for Chicano activities center - problems of funding are to be solved. They would like a sponsor a Chicano symposium with the objectives to keep community informed of political issues.

San Diego Central;

Their main concern is how to deal with immigration problems and the KKK. As a central they are pressuring the Migra Officials. They made accusations against S.W.P. - as being racist and intimidating the Chicano Communities of San Diego.

Sacramento Central;

They have been working on conference. Also on individual campuses. Their is work being done to strengthen ties with other Third World student groups. Anti-Bakke Forums and discussions held on various campuses.

Santa Barbara Central;

Moorpark representative talked about police brutality becoming more and more frequent in the Camarrillo and Oxnard areas.

Fresno Central ;

An ABDC representative reported the Central as being weak due to lack of communication between schools. He stressed the fact that he was not a representative. Also that the next conference should be in Fresno.

Chico Central:

They are not a Central yet. They feel uninformal of up-to-date political issues that affect the Raza. They feel a need for improvement communications between all M.E.Ch.A. Centrals.

East Los Angeles College;

Raza Faculty held a conference on the issues of BAKKE. They have held workshops on the problems of Chicano gang warfare - emphasis was how to recruit Chicanos into the post-secondary educational institutions and get the vatos off of the streets. They are also concerned with KKK, immigration and relocation of a "Mall" for raza acitivities.

Cal State Los Angeles;

They have also been working on the problems of BAKKE, the Migra, KKK.

San Francisco State;

They will have a rally on the issue of a racist report on illegal aliens in the San Francisco State School newspaper.

Butte College: .

They have been very active in community affairs but they lack involvement in political issues because of lack of communications. They would like to get involved in a Central.

Humboldt:

Active with the Anti-BAKKE case. They have a suit against CSU Humboldt in regard to Affirmative Action. Problems with racism on campus. Positive results from sit - in demonstrations to protest phasing out of ethnic studies.

Speakers С.

Raquel Arias - Berkeley U.C. maticionaly

In the press, Mario Obledo and Richard Alatorre have been linked to the Mexican -Mafia. Raza Women - sterilized without their consent in Los Angeles. Emphasis was on laws of public health (Hilbirlon regulations) for free hospitalization are not being implemented. These hospitalization codes are oriented for the poor.

Carmen Martel Los Angeles Police Brutality

Macklemay - a police officer accused fo murder. He murdered a Chicano youth with several firearms. Evidence proves that the murdered, Seventeen year old youth was savagely and brutally murdered. He was shot several times at two minute intervals. MacKalmay was convicted of this ruthless murder but he has filed an appeal. The question was raised thot granted, Macklemay was guilty.

Frank Bustos - Report on Immigration Issues

Living conditions on farm - labor camps are unsanitary and not suited for humans. There is no minimum wage. There is a need for M.E.Ch.A. Centrales to unite in an effort (together with the campasinos) to fight for better wages and mainly letters of living conditions. The Carter Plan on Immigration suggest that the Bracero program is an effective one. This Carter Plan is nothing more than a "Buttered - up operation Wetback".

Will deal with formulating a statewide structure to be binding once passed in the general session - on all Raza Organizations in the statewide M.E.Ch.A. movement. This workshop is mandatory and requires one representative from each organization.

2. Greivance

3. Communications

This workshop is mandatory for each Raza organization. The workshop will deal with the statewide newspaper and the statewide directory.

4. Anti-BAKKE

Will deal with the future plans deon by ABDC Conference October 29, 1977. To discuss and plan M.E.Ch.A.'s role in these mobilizations against hational oppression. This workshop is optional but we urge all schools interested in this workshop to send enough representatives to cover this workshop.

5. Immigration

Will deal withplans decided on by the Chicano-Latino Immigration Conference October 28, 29, 30, 1977, in San Antonio, Texas. We will discuss M.E.Ch.A.'s role in these decisions. Again this in not mandatory workshop but because the issue is so crucial, it is necessary to plan actions to oppose the blatant froms of oppression faced by our people.

E. Resolutions

CONSTITUTION WORKSHOP

1. That each campus meet to develop an outline to be prepared with a. principals of unity; b. Binding laws and regulations; c. and Common basic issues that unite us to develop the constitution.

2. That we set a two day Constitutional Conference, where people can bring their own constitution and principals of unity and that we base ourselves on a written paper presented by San Diego M.E.CH. A. Central (November 12, 1977) with two reps. from Central and one rep. from independant campuses and that we try to broaden participation from colleges throughout the Nation and the Southwest.
