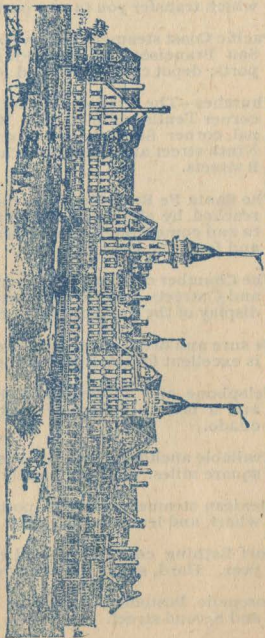

CAN READILY VISIT

The Museum, containing 10,000 interesting specimens, is quite near and opposite to the Hotel. It has undoubtedly the best collection west of Philadelphia.

The Company's Botanical Gardens and Nursery, on Third street and D avenue; also Miss Sessions' and Blaisdell's Nurseries, Third street and B avenue, are very fine and worthy of a visit

A run over the National City and Otay Line to the great Sweetwater Dam, by National City, Chula Vista and Paradise Valley, is very picturesque and beautiful.

A trip on the Motor Line around the Bay to San Diego, and return by the street car and ferry system is an interesting excursion.

La Jolla Park has charming scenery and is noted for its wierd caves, variety of beautiful shells and pretty mosses. By carriage.

The Ostrich Farm, corner of Tenth street and B avenue. Many ostriches and Australian emus: odd and interesting to look at.

Golf is a special feature of the out-door amusements. The Links and Club House are near the Hotel.

The Company's Electric and Ice Works, near the Hotel, are seen to fine advantage in the evening.

Fishing—Deep sea fishing; also from the pier and shore at all seasons. Fish are very abundant.

Point Loma, with its fine light-house — the highest in the world — over 500 feet above sea-level; or the new light-house, recently built, can be reached by carriage or by small boat to Ballast Point; thence the walking is easy.

Hot and Cold Salt Water Plunge Baths and Swimming Tanks, for ladies and gentlemen. The largest and most elegant in the world. Hot and cold salt water constantly flowing in and out.

Length of the Bay, 15 miles. It was discovered by a Portuguese navigator, Juan Roderignes Cabrillo, in 1542. The harbor is said to be the best and safest betwixt Callao and Puget Sound.

The Old Town; the Presidio; remains of Fort Stockton; the venerable Palms, being over 112 years old; the ruins of the Old Mission Church, established 1769 by Padre Junipero.

El Cajon Valley, with its wonderful productions, presents ample scope for study and admiration. Trains go here daily from San Diego. The Lakeside is an excellent hotel.

The management will be pleased to send a guide with guests who desire to be shown through the buildings, including the kitchen, bakery and cold storages.

Hunting—This county is the Paradise of sportsmen. Abundance of Quail, Curlew, Plovers and Geese. Deer can be found in the mountains.

An excursion to the Coronado Islands, which belong to Mexico, can be enjoyed either in a yacht or by a small steamer.

Play-grounds for Children—Unlimited scope on the sandy beach, besides acres of ground close to the hotel for children's use.

A trip by the motor to Tia Juana in our sister Republic of Mexico is rather a pleasant change.

The Boat House, where row and sail boats, also steam yachts, can be had at any hour.

On visiting San Diego from Coronado, take the electric cars, which leave the hotel every 20 minutes, then the ferry across the bay, where electric cars take one up D and H streets, all of which transfer you to any part of the city.

Pacific Coast steamers call every four days from San Francisco, for San Francisco and way ports; depot corner of L and Fifth streets.

Churches—The Graham Memorial Presbyterian, corner Tenth and B streets; Methodist Episcopal, corner Seventh and E streets; Episcopal, Ninth street and C avenue; Catholic, Sixth and B streets.

The Santa Fe R. R. Depot, at foot of D street, is reached by electric cars and ferry. Trains go to and come from Los Angeles twice daily, to and from the East daily.

The Chamber of Commerce rooms, corner Fourth and C streets, San Diego, where there is a fine display of the products of the county.

Be sure and drink plenty of Coronado Water. It is excellent for the kidneys and is a fine tonic.

Available anchorage in San Diego harbor is six square miles. It is completely land-locked.

Mexican steamers, while in port, lie at Santa Fe wharf, and leave twice a week for Ensenada.

Surf Bathing can be enjoyed every day in the year. Hard, sandy and gently sloping beach.
