

Paul Anderson, science fiction writer, to speak

Paul Anderson, science fiction writer and winner of the Hugo Award for the Best Science Fiction Novel, will be presented on the San Diego campus of the University of California by the Guest-in-Residence Committee on Tuesday, January 14, and Wednesday, January 15.

Anderson, who holds a B.S. degree in Physics, will deliver his major speech, "Science Fiction, Science and Society," at 8:00 p.m., January 14.

Anderson wrote his first science fiction story about 1945 and by 1950 was a well-known writer of technically accurate fiction.

His major novels include: No Truce With Kings (which won him the Hugo Award), Satan's World, The Long Way Home, Ensign Flandry, The Star Fox, The High Crusade, and Shield. He has written hundreds of short stories, but the two best-known are "Sam Hall" and "Call Me Joe."

Anderson will hold informal discussions over coffee at 10:00 a.m., 2:00 p.m. and 9:30 p.m. on January 14; and at 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. on January 15. These will be held in the Beagle Hall Guest Apartment on Revelle Campus.

He will also hold dinner discussions at 12:00 noon and 5:00 p.m. on both days in the South Dining Hall in Revelle Commons.

All functions are open to the public.
