






















Route No. 1: The North. Route No. 2: Arragon. Route No. 3: Madrid. Route No. 4: Andalusia.



THE PATH OF WAR IN

Battlefields are places where the tourist lays aside mere curiosity and pays homage to the heroic deeds of the fallen. Thus, the Thermopylae, Rocroy and Waterloo; thus the hills, trenches and fields of the Somme and Verdun still preserved and shown by France with legitimate pride.

National Spain is the first country that has organized visits in Wartime to battlefields which are not only the scenes of recent strife but famous in a struggle that has filled the world with its echoes.

Four War Routes will be successively opened to traffic:

No. 1, THE NORTH; No. 2, ARRAGON; No. 3, MADRID; No. 4, ANDALUSIA.

One of the maps included herewith shows the itinerary of each Route. The large map gives details of Route No. 1 (THE NORTH OF SPAIN) which will be opened on the 1st of July, 1938.

For the time being the Routes must be travelled over exclusively by parties accompanied by authorised Guides, in tours organized by the National Spanish State Tourist Department. Comfortable motor-coaches of the newest type, bought specially for the purpose will take visitors along each Route, meeting them at the Irun frontier, which will also be the last stage of the Tour.

Parties will be accommodated at first-class hotels, provided with every modern requirement. (One of the photographs published here shows the Hotel Real at Santander, which will accommodate travellers visiting the Northern Route.)

The National Government has adopted Summer Time (which the Republic had abolished), so that clocks in Spain synchronise with those of other Western European countries.

Route No. 1 (marked in red on map) has a total length of 1,101 kilometres and will be covered in 9 days.

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

SPAIN

The "War Route of the North" is chiefly remarkable for the beauty, varied in tone but constant in structure, of its marvellous setting. As the road winds on, striking discoveries are made at every turn. Here it runs along the coast, forming a wonderful long "corniche"; there it is imprisoned between steep mountains; elsewhere, it climbs up to seemingly inaccessible passes; then it descends into deep valleys, passing through villages, every one of which is a picture in itself, as are the skies at sunset, streaked with silver clouds, and the green moss and ivy clinging to the dark walls of romantic houses.

Neither are there wanting outstanding sites with a character of their own.

Above all, the capitals of the four provinces:
San Sebastian, the fashionable cosmopolitan seaside resort; Bilbao, which has been called the wealthiest city in the world; Santander, another smart seaside town where golf, fly-fishing and chamois stalking may be indulged in amidst unsurpassed natural beauties; Oviedo, the invincible city which by resisting a desperate siege of fifteen months' duration did so much to decide the war in the

Besides the capitals, there are attractive seaside resorts such as Zarauz, Zumaya, Deva, Castro Urdiales, Laredo, Santoña, San Vicente de la Barquera, Llanes, Ribadesella, Gijón, Avilés or Luarca, and romantic and picturesque villages like Motrico, Ondárroa, Lequeitio, Bermeo, Torrelavega, Cangas de Onis, Colunga, Infiesto, Pravia or Villaviciosa.

And, finally, there are tourist centres such as Altamira with its prehistoric caves containing the most remarkable rock-paintings in the world; Covadonga and its valley, famous in Spanish history; and Santillana del Mar, a perfect gem of medieval architecture.
