

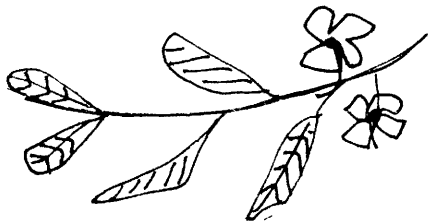

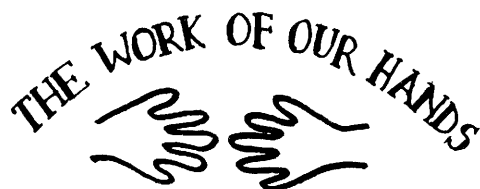

## NEW PATIENT CARE FACILITY

### COMING TO CAMPUS

A new patient care facility is currently under construction on the UCSD campus. The facility, the UCSD Internal Medicine Group, is being built to help meet the needs of UCSD and Veteran's Administration Hospital personnel - both academic staff and non-academic staff and their families - as well as those of residents in the surrounding communities.

John G. Sholl, M.D., of the University Hospitals of Cleveland and Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine; and Steven R. Selzer, M.D., formerly of the Rees-Stealy Medical Group of San Diego and staff member of University and Mercy Hospitals, have been recruited by School

of Medicine Dean, John H. Moxley, III, M.D., and Helen M. Ranney, M.D., Chairperson of the Department of Medicine, to head the new facility.


The need for high quality, accessible health care on the UCSD campus was recognized by members of the School of Medicine's Department of Medicine, and in parallel to a nation-wide concern, decided to take doctors where the patients are, rather than requiring patients to travel long distances for ambulatory, non-hospital care. Due to the fact that UCSD's University Hospital is located in the Hillcrest section of San Diego, members of the clinical faculty with offices there have not been able to conveniently offer patient care for patients in the La Jolla area. Creation of the UCSD Internal Medicine Group should significantly improve this situation.

The new facility will have a clinical laboratory and X-ray room, facilitating patient needs in obtaining diagnostic information, as well as treatment in one place. One of the goals of the group is to avoid hospitalization for diagnostic purposes by offering excellent and speedy ambulatory diagnosis and treatment.

On-call care will be available to patients (children and adults) on a 24-hour, seven-day basis in the soon-to-be-completed facility. The physical structure will be relatively small with specific emphasis on developing a warm and quiet atmosphere. In addition, ordinary ailments will be evaluated and treated with the same respect and patience as unusual ones, at the same time maintaining a high quality consultation system for difficult diagnostic and therapeutic problems, backed by the expertise of members of the faculty of the Medical School in special fields.

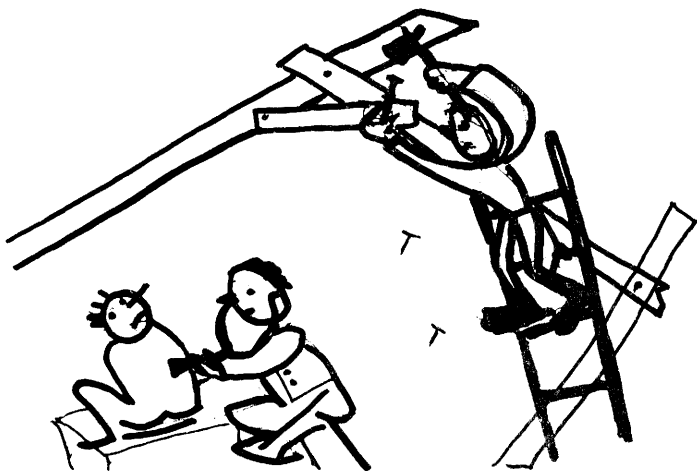
The new building will be located north of La Jolla Village Drive on the south side of the campus, between the School of Medicine and the VA Hospital. Parking is available, and a campus luncheon area, open to the public, is located within walking distance.

UCSD WOMEN

SYBIL YORK



"You may pass right on by with the cock-tails - I get high on people," Sybil York has been heard to say, and after you've known her for just a short time you suspect that contained in her slim but sturdy package is an unstoppable fountain of energy and enthusiasm. Those who know her well will testify that an inner glow shines out even when her skies are stormy.

Statistics on Sybil York are interesting - born in a small, northern California town with the quaint name of Button Willows, she grew up with two brothers - one who would become an attorney, the other a physician. Her undergraduate education included University of California, Berkeley where she met her now World Famous American husband, Herb York. Sybil and Herb raised their family in various parts of the country. Presently, son David lives and works in the San Francisco Bay area, not far from their daughter Cynthia, who is married and attends the School of Veterinary Medicine at UC Davis. Their multi-lingual daughter Rachel combines marriage with career in London, England.

Asked once if she did not feel something was missing in her life by not earning a salary all her own, Sybil responded "not in the least - I just think back over Herb's lifetime earnings, divide that in half, and think hmmmmmm, how well I've done!" And that she has. From giving birth to babies while Herb had to be out of the country, to negotiating bids for a roof leak, to making draperies for their ocean-front La Jolla home, to reupholstering the furniture, to having the house ready to entertain 25 scientists from Mexico City on a moment's notice, to responding to an alert to be packed for a Washington, D.C. trip the next morning, listing just a few items from her job description.

Sybil learned to speak Spanish after taking up residence in La Jolla when Herb became the first UCSD Chancellor. This led to an interesting club affiliation in Tijuana and the establishment of many Mexican friends with whom she still keeps in touch.

Sybil was a charter member of WASI, the Salk Institute women's organization and was an early president. Oceanids has benefited from her active support for many

years. The bridge groups have boasted of her participation and Sybil's two parrots and canary led her to be active with the birdwatchers.

Sybil loves vigorous activity. During her second period of being a chancellor's wife (1970-72), she took up fencing and practiced it daily on campus, insisting that the student team members show her no mercy. The University House staff love to recall seeing Sybil and Herb return home early from a morning's bike ride - their springer spaniels leaping high into the air to welcome them home. After a quick shower, faces gleaming with exhilaration, their busy day would commence.

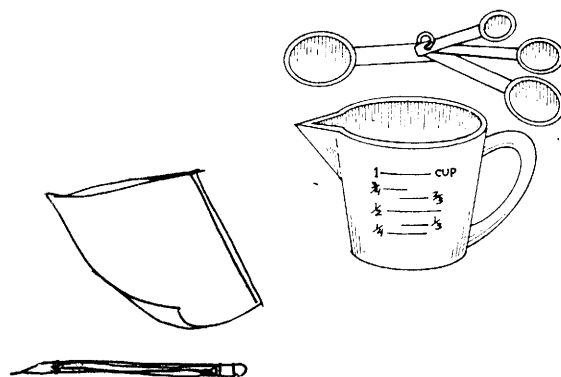

This is just a brief glimpse of Sybil York - blithe spirit - an inspiration and joy to those whose lives she touches.

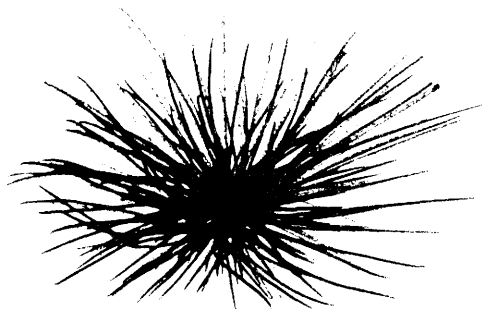

## TRIBUTE TO ARNOLD BAINBRIDGE

Arnold Bainbridge, an oceanographer who held the position of Academic Administrator of the Ocean Research Division and Marine Life Research group at Scripps Institution of Oceanography, died on Tuesday, February 27 in Texas. He was attending a scientific meeting there. He was 48.

Arnold Bainbridge was a native of New Zealand and, before coming to La Jolla (or S.I.O.), he was a research scientist with the New Zealand Department of Scientific Research, Institute of Nuclear Science, in the field of isotope geology, radiocarbon and natural tritium. It was at this Institute that he met his future wife, Janet. Janet has been a very valued member of the Newcomers Committee of Oceanids and, in Del Mar where they lived for many years, she is known for helping to organize the series of programs "Friday Evenings in Del Mar." Recently, the Bainbridges moved to Solana Beach to cater to the love of horses of their three daughters Penelope, Susan and Jennifer.

In 1960, Arnold Bainbridge came to SIO to work with Hans Suess in the carbon dating laboratory. Commenting on his career, SIO Director William Nierenberg said that he had the great pleasure of watching Arnold Bainbridge develop into one of the most important and respected sea-going scientists. His ability to develop and use advanced technology, especially data handling, was uncanny, and he was one of the few responsible for keeping the U.S. Oceanographic effort in the advanced technological state.

In 1962, he went to Boulder, Colorado to serve as a staff physicist in the National Center for Atmospheric Research.

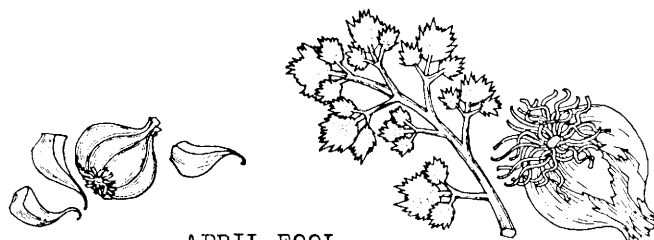
In 1966, he returned to Scripps and was instrumental in 1971 in the formation of G.E.O.S.E.C.S., a program to investigate the physical and geochemical properties and pollutants of the Atlantic, Pacific and Indian Oceans, a wide ranging scientific effort that involves ten institutions in the United States, as well as six foreign countries, as part of the National Science Foundation's International Decade of Ocean Exploration program. Scripps Institute has served as coordinator of operations and Bainbridge was director of the new Physical and Chemical Oceanographic Data Facility, a combination of G.E.O.S.E.C.S. and D.C. .G.

Professor Harmon Craig, a geochemist and a scientific director of G.E.O.S.E.C.S., who worked closely with Bainbridge, says he was a very special kind of scientist - equally at home in the laboratory, doing the most difficult radioactive measurements, or at sea, directing the operations of sampling systems, computers and complicated array of analytical equipment. In New Zealand, he participated in the development of the modern technique for measuring radiocarbon dates by analyzing carbon dioxide rather than solid carbon.

He was a pioneer in developing the study of tritium, the radioactive hydrogen isotope produced by thermonuclear bombs, and applying it to problems of oceanic circulation. His work is increasingly important because he has data taken in 1962 and from the same area of the ocean in 1972, and had plans for sampling 10 years later, giving a precise picture of the settling of pollutants in the oceans. His G.E.O. S.E.C. expedition program ultimately covered the Atlantic, Pacific and Indian Oceans. For this work, Bainbridge developed a system of using delicate sensors on the wires that hold bottles for collecting water samples at various depths. The sensors measure varied characteristics of the water. Scientists in the shipboard laboratory monitor the readings and any given bottle on the line can be triggered shut to capture the water sample at any time. So superior to the previous "blind" sampling. Bainbridge also set up a shipboard computer to handle the mass of data collected on the research vessels of the Atlantic and Pacific expeditions.

Professor Harmon Craig said, in his closing remarks at the Memorial Service held in Sumner Hall on March 7, "His loss is a severe one to modern oceanography. We hope that the example he set and the results he produced will encourage the development of future scientists with his special capabilities."

SEE SAN DIEGO AND HAVE  
A PICNIC - NATURALLY!

Whether it's with a glass of crisp Chablis and cold chicken Kiev or beer and hot dogs, natives and visitors alike love to picnic in San Diego. Enjoying good food and fresh air while the sun is reflected off a glassy Pacific or sifted through stately pines is a mini-vacation in itself.

Where will you find just the right spot for a day of feasting and fun? Visit Balboa Park. Overlooking San Diego's skyline, it's the home of the San Diego Zoo, various museums, arts and crafts displays, and theaters. Cottages of hospitality in the House of Pacific Relations give the area a cosmopolitan atmosphere as music from the "old country" mingles with the Sunday organ recitals held nearby. While Pepper Grove, the official picnic area, has plenty of tables and a playground, most prefer to eat on a patch of the more than 100 acres of lawn spread before them.

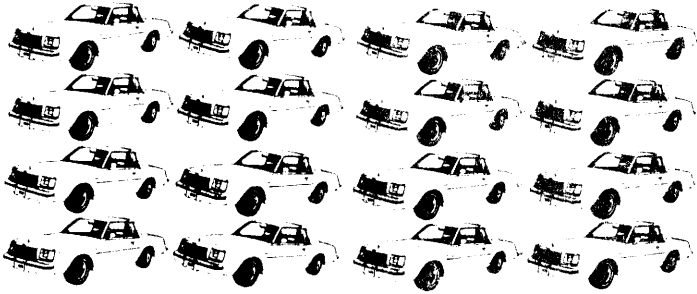
Presidio Park is reminiscent of a great emerald set between fashionable Mission Hills and Old Town. Its rolling lawns cascade down steep slopes and on to the flatlands below. Although there are a few tables, most simply spread their picnic cloth on the grass. A major attraction is the mission-like Serra Museum with its exhibits of early California history.

Torrey Pines State Reserve and Beach offer the startling beauty of rare dusty-green Torrey Pines rambling above sandstone cliffs and the glistening Pacific between La Jolla and Del Mar. These gnarled and twisted pines are found in only one other location in the world.

To walk one of the reserve's many trails past rare foliage and local wildlife is to hike through history. The story of the Torrey Pine, nature walks, and a small museum are located in Torrey Pines Lodge. Here tips on whale watching are given during the migration of California's proud gray mammals.

As at all California state parks, there is a \$1.50 day use charge. Picnicing is limited to Torrey Pines Beach. There are a few tables in the parking lot, but it is much more pleasant to sit on the sand and enjoy this unusually clean and clear beach.

The quiet water of Mission Bay offers the nation's largest man-made aquatic park. It is a collage of hundreds of picnic tables, barbecues, paths and bands of grass ringing



the bay, and plenty of play areas and ball fields and courts.

The Silver Strand State Beach has both beach and bay. Picnic areas are on both sides of the strand south of Coronado, giving a choice of surf or harbor viewing while swimming and relaxing. There are tables, barbecues, fire rings, showers, and snack stands.

San Dieguito Park, between Solana Beach and Rancho Santa Fe, encircles fields heavy with the aroma of chaparral, alive with rabbits and squirrels, and criss-crossed by walking paths. To protect fragile slopes and sandstone cliffs, a unique system of wooden suspension bridges, ladders, and steps, designed to blend with the environment, give a modern appearance to an old land. There are play areas, ball fields, tables, and barbecues among the shady eucalyptus.

El Capitan, in the Cuyamaca Rancho State Park, offers the chance to climb a good mountain. Its trail is steep enough to be challenging yet wide enough to take a breather. There are two formal picnic grounds in this oak and pine covered mountain park on Highway 78. Green Valley Falls is known for its waterfalls and natural swimming holes for kids. Paso Picacho borders the Pacific Crest Trail, a walk which takes you past ancient Indian basins and mortars once used for grinding acorns. The trail meanders through fern glens and up among wild roses into the hills and on to Canada.

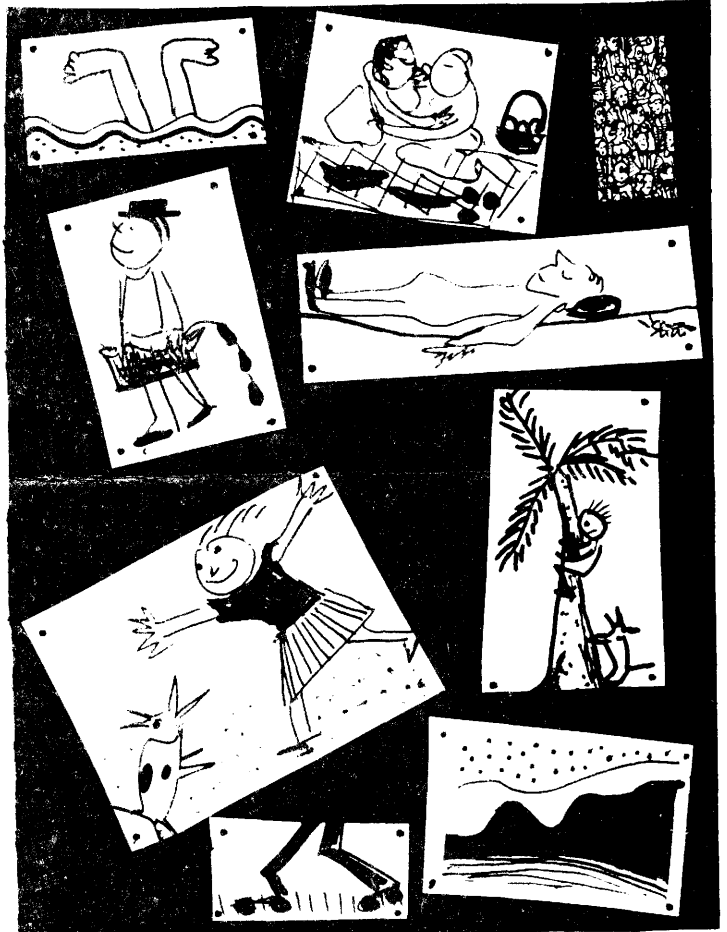
The county historic park in Julian reflects the town's rustic atmosphere, reminding one of its gold mining days a century ago. The museum displays memories of yesterday. Occasionally there is a huge fire in the massive stone fireplace to warm hands on crisp autumn afternoons. Just up the hill is the old Santa Ysabel School. Built in 1888, it was recently refurbished and now houses the library. Even though there are a few tables and barbecues, they are seldom full.

There is a 375 year old Incense Cedar at the Palomar Mountain State Park. You can sit at one of the numerous tables under it and other nearby cedar and oak trees. Wonder about the lives of the Indians who once lived on the ledge about 100 feet away, their grinding tools left to warm in the sun. Fishing and hiking are here too. Palomar Observatory is only a few minutes drive away.

The Anza-Borrego Desert State Park lies at the base of stark purple mountains. The clear silent aura of the desert and spring's multi-colored carpets of wildflowers bring visitors to enjoy the sights and fragrances of the seasons. The large picnic area's palm covered tables are near the park entrance. No fires are allowed. To one who is patient enough, and a hardy enough hiker, may come the reward of seeing one of the park's famous bighorn sheep.

The places to picnic are plentiful - so enjoy them. You'll see San Diego the way it was meant to be seen. Naturally!

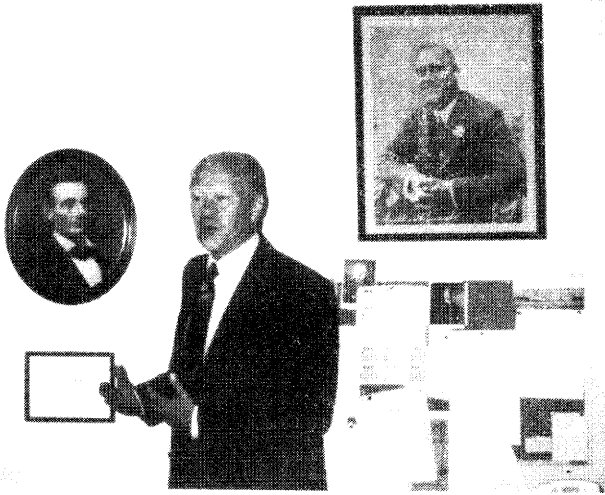


## THEATER PARTY

## PORTRAIT OF A PRESIDENT



Others who attended the lectures given by former President Ford on his recent visit will cherish memories of his public appearances. There were amusing moments, such as when he declared that the Rhodesian conflict was "not a black and white issue" and was taken aback when the students roared with laughter. And there were serious moments, such as when he explained, at a meeting with members of the faculty, why he pardoned his predecessor.

For me, however, the highlight of the visit was a small off-stage episode that took place shortly after he arrived on campus. Promptly at 8:45 AM, Mr. Ford strode through the door leading to the offices of the Department of Political Science. Moments before, his impending arrival had been signalled - not by a fanfare of trumpets but (how else in this unromantic age of technology?) by a few squawks emitted from a Secret Service walkie-talkie.

As chairman of the department, I felt a little like Hudson the butler inspecting the staff prior to a downstairs visit from a royal house guest. And as Hudson too might have done, I winced as I reviewed my troop. Two of my faculty colleagues were dressed in their usual scruffy style: tennis shoes, sweat socks, slacks, t-shirt, and faded pullover. Nor were my feelings assuaged when they assured me that this was their idea of formal attire.

Our guest's warm and friendly manner banished all anxiety, and made it easy for me to request a favor. Would he mind, I asked, posing for a picture between the campaign photos of two illustrious fellow presidents that hang on the wall behind my desk? "Not at all," he replied, and into my office we went. Betsy, my A.A., whipped

out her trusty Instamatic and was about to do the honors when suddenly he had a moment of hesitation. "Say," he said, "I wonder if you'd mind if I got closer to Lincoln. I think I'd feel more comfortable next to him."

That explains why the picture we took shows him a little off-center and decidedly closer to Abraham Lincoln than to Franklin Roosevelt. It is certainly possible that he meant this request to be taken only as a pleasantry. A moment later, he was bantering with Betsy, who owns a Golden Retriever, about all the puppies with which he and Betty have lately been blessed by their own specimen of the breed.

But we political scientists have learned to pay attention to what politicians say in their unguarded moments, especially now that their public statements are so often fabricated by image makers and designed to be bland and noncommittal. Mr. Ford, I reflected, is widely regarded as a retired president, and he has often said he has no intention of running for the office. Why then should he hesitate to put partisanship aside and take his place in the pantheon of presidents? Perhaps he does not really intend to stay a retired president. Perhaps he still prefers to be identified as a staunch Republican, ready as ever to heed his party's call. Time will tell, of course, but if he should again become a candidate - despite all the disclaimers we have so far had from him - I for one will not be altogether surprised.

## INTERNATIONAL CENTER SPANISH DINNER

The food of Spain will be featured Sunday, April 22 at the fourth of this year's ethnic dinner series being presented by Friends of the International Center. Guest chef will be José Manuel Roldán, a biologist from Seville, Spain.

Dr. Roldán, who arrived at UCSD last September to begin a two year period of research in the area of plant physiology, has planned a menu that will treat guests to some of the most popular and well known dishes from Spain.

These will include gazpacho soup, sangria and paella. Gazpacho is a chilled tomato soup, sangria is a red wine and fresh fruit punch, and paella - Spain's single most famous dish - is made with saffron rice, chicken and seafood.

The tapas (hors d'oeuvres) will be calamares fritas (fried squid) and tortilla de patatas (an omelette of potatoes and onions). The dessert will be naranjas al kirsch (fruit soaked in kirsch).

Following the dinner there will be musical entertainment provided by the Flamenco Association of San Diego.

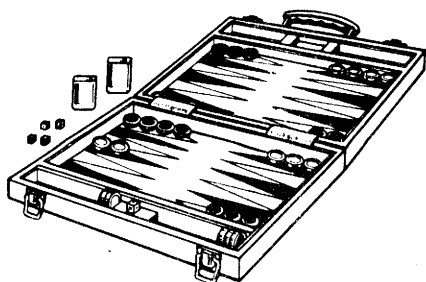
Friends assisting Dr. Roldán will be Sandy Swarbrick, Dottie Conway and Elizabeth Hansen.

Friends of the International Center will sponsor a program on "Physical Fitness Training for the Olympics" with Dr. James R. White, Supervisor of Physical Education at UCSD, on Wednesday, April 18 at 7:30 PM.

The talk, open to the public, will be held in the International Center, Matthews campus. Audrey Swartz, president of the Friends, will welcome guests, and the speaker will be introduced by Marilyn Johns, program chairman.

Dr. White is currently on the committee concerned with developing training and exercise programs for the U.S. Olympic Fencing Squad. He served in a similar capacity for the Canadian Olympic Committee during the 1976 Montreal games.

His field of interest is exercise physiology which he teaches along with courses in kinesiology. Dr. White came to UCSD in 1969 from UC Riverside where he taught from 1965-69. He received his Ph.D. from the University of Southern California.

During the last eight years, Dr. White has conducted research in the areas of adapted physical education and rehabilitation, electromyography, exercise programs for the aged and cardiovascular fitness.

He also has probed preventive health, nutrition, human sexuality and tobacco smoking. His researches include collecting data on more than 5,000 subjects in an effort to determine coronary heart disease risk factors.

This is another in a continuing series of Friends' programs focusing on matters of international interest.

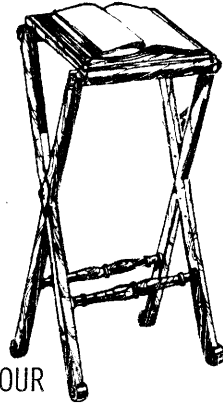

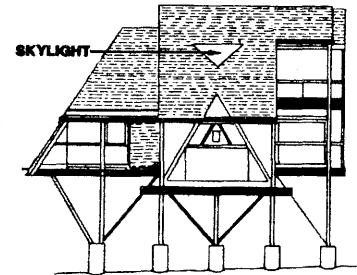
1 large head romaine lettuce  
salt and garlic powder  
1-2 scallions, sliced  
2 tsp light soy sauce, or more  
1-2 tsp sugar  
2 tsp rice wine vinegar, or more  
1/4 cup corn oil  
1 tsp sesame seed oil  
Chinese peppercorns  
garlic powder (additional)

Wash lettuce and break into large pieces. Blanch in hot salted water for 30 seconds. Strain and cool immediately with cold water. Sprinkle lightly with salt and garlic powder. Sprinkle soy sauce, sugar, and vinegar over lettuce and toss.

Heat oils and peppercorns in small sauce pan until it smokes. Pour over salad and toss. Add more garlic powder to taste. Chill until ready to serve.

INGREDIENTS

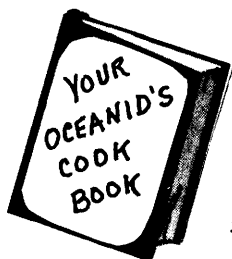
- 32 dedicated good cooks
