UCSD WINS HIGHER EDUCATION AWARD

The "Automated Merit Process System", custom designed by UCSD to eliminate the forms required for manual merit calculations has garnered a second place award of \$7,500.

UCSD's achievement has improved the quality and reduced the cost of this higher education program by \$42,500 annually, said Steven W. Relyea, vice chancellor, Business Affairs. It has built-in mathematical calculations and edit features which significantly reduce the process time of merit increases.

The award was presented by the National Association of College and University Business Officers (NACUBO), which had received 79 submissions. §

NEW ADMINISTRATORS ANNOUNCED FOR SIO

"Their combined strategic planning skills and worldwide experience will make them valuable assets to Scripps' growing research efforts. I am extremely impressed with the experience and talents of our new administration team," said Scripps Institution of Oceanography Director Charles F. Kennel last July.

Dr. William S. Hodgkiss and Dr. Lisa R. Shaffer have now joined SIO, UC San Diego as top administrators. Hodgkiss, with SIO since 1978, will oversee internal research collaboration for scientific programs as the new Deputy Director, Scientific Affairs and Associate Vice Chancellor-Marine Sciences.

Dr. Shaffer is the new Director of

International Relations for SIO. Shaffer will be responsible for the establishment and management of new international programs designed to position SIO at the forefront of major international scientific initiatives. She will be based in Washington, DC, collaborating with government agencies, scientists, and institutional leaders around the world to advance the concept of an integrated global observing strategy and to promote international scientific programs. §



DEDICATION OF JOHN DOVE ISAACS HALL

When John Isaacs, died in 1980, the University of California, San Diego, and the Scripps Institution of Oceanography lost one of its most distinguished scientists, as well as one of the shapers of the modern Scripps.

One of the many projects John conceived was to establish a network of stations to measure water temperature, wind and other variables across the northern Pacific ocean. Out of this idea came the North Pacific Buoy program. The facility looking out on the ocean built, in 1975 to house the oceanographers engaged in the project, was known as the Norpax building. It was therefore fitting that we gathered at 11:00 AM on the 10th of September, to dedicate the Norpax building as John Dove Isaacs Hall.

The morning overcast had dissipated when we gathered and the sun shone brightly-perhaps more brightly than the unshaded audience would have preferred. On the speakers dais, before the newly painted building, were SIO Director Charles Kennel, Senior Vice-Chancellor Marsha Chandler, Professors Walter Munk and Paul Dayton, Director Emeritus William Nierenberg, long time Oceanids member Mary Carol Isaacs and daughter Professor Ann Kathryn Isaacs.

After the program, Mary Carol unveiled the building name plate, accompanied by the release of symbolic white doves. The group then had lunch on the second floor deck of the building. The lunch, served by Campus Catering, under the direction of SIO Special Events Director Jill Ives, was enjoyed by all except those of us who had to leave for the first meeting of the Oceanids Board. My husband, Richard Rosenblatt, tells me the food was excellent. §

ROSWITHA ENRIGHT RECEIVES MAXINE E. WHITE OUTSTANDING SERVICE AWARD

The Maxine White Outstanding Service award is given each year to one of our members for accomplishments that are usually behind the scenes. Roswitha has been a loyal and dedicated Oceanid for several years. She has often held a leadership position in one of our Interest Groups, particularly the Walking and Hiking Group.

Roswitha was a Co-Editor of BEAR FACTS for four years, working with Rosemarie Lugmair, Heleen deHaas and Netty Paar.
