The San Francisco Tape Music Center will present the third program of its current series on Wednesday, December 15, at 321 Divisadero Street. This program will begin at 8:30 p.m.

Scheduled for performance are two electronic compostions from the Milan Electronic Studio, <u>TRAIETTORIE</u> by Gino Marinuzzi, and <u>GIROTONDO</u> by Valentino Bucchi. Also planned is an unusual performance of Robert Schumann's <u>MELODRAMAS</u> for piano and voice. These pieces, which are text declamated by the singer, will be staged and accompanied with visual projections by Anthony Martin.

Morton Subotnick's <u>SERENADE #3</u>, commissioned by the Aeolian Chamber Players and premiered this summer at the Contemporary Music Festival in Bowdoin, Maine, will receive its West Coast premiere. It is for flute, clarinet, violin, piano and electronic tape. Receiving its local premiere will be a work by Barney Childs, <u>MUSIC for VOICE and PIANO</u>. Concluding this concert will be a work by Richard Swift, <u>CARMINA ARCHILOCHI</u>, commissioned by the San Francisco Tape Music Center. It is scored for flute, clarinet, cello, percussion and voice. The composers of these three previous works will be present at this performance. The performers will include Jean Cunningham, flute; Morton Subotnick, clarinet; Nathan Rubin, violin; Sally Kell, cello; Naomi Sparrow, piano; Jack Van Der Wyk, percussion; and Anna Carol Dudley, voice.

Program Notes

MEL POWELL: After establishing a reputation as an accomplished jazz pianist, Ir. Powell's interests led him into composing works for chamber groups and to electronic realization of works at the Columbia-Princeton Electronic usic Center. Tis instrumental compositions have been widely performed, and he is currently Director of the Electronic Rusic Center at Yale University.

GERALD SHAPIRO: Mr. Shapiro has been studying with Darius Milhaud for the past year, and also working at the Tabe Lusic Center. Antibonies is his first work in the redium. He is one of the Fulbright Award recipients for 1965-1966 and will spend the year in Paris.

FOLKE RABE: There is a strong bond between a number of young Scandanavian composers and members of the Tape Lusic Center. Folice Rabe is one of the reasons. Currently in San Francisco on a Swedish Government grant, he has been rehearsing with the Dancers Jorkshop with whom he will tour in Europe this fall. Mr. Rabe has the following comments regarding his two pieces on the program:

"'ARG' is a tape montage, a compression of one hour of JABC-New York broadcasting plus a few other materials. This radio station seems to me to be one of the greatest in the world. The about compositional structure of the programming was an overwhelming in pression when I first came to the United States.

"The Impromptu is one of the 149 Impromptus in a series which were composed between 1939 and 1963. Life many kinds of music this piece should not be understood the way it sounds, but appreciated in about the same way you appreciate a Bagatelle by Joaclim A. Krenz."

RAI III JENDER: In The Garden is a blatently allegorical work. Its sounds begin with unshaped, raw noise which contains the potentials for all rusics. The two live instruments are synchronized to their respective channels of prepared sounds for the first half of the work, and only gradually does their relationship change to tape versus tapeperformer from tape-performer versus tape-performer. The rest of my programmatical intentions are best left unexpressed, so that the listener is free to roam at will in the sound-visual landscape.

PAULINE GLIVEROS: notes on Pieces of Eight:

"As a wedercok that turneth its face with every wind." Chaucer

"A Double Curtaille: This is double the bigness of the single mentioned in charvi n.6 and is played 8 notes deeper. It is as it were 2 pines fixed in on(e) thick bass pipe, one much longer than the other, from minimum the top of the lower comes a crooked piece of brass in which is fixed a reed, through it the wind passeth to make the instrument make a sound. It hath 6 holes on the cutside and one on that side next the man or back part and 2 brass keys, the highest called double La Sol Re, and the other B Mi." The Academy of Armory by Randle Holme (sometime before 1688)
