

## **Fourth annual U.S.-Mexican Studies briefing session for professional journalists to be held**

### NOTE TO EDITORS

The fourth annual U.S.-Mexican Studies briefing session for professional journalists, scheduled for Monday and Tuesday, June 18 and 19, at the University of California, San Diego, will offer several sessions that should be of interest to the general public.

The 9 a.m. session on Monday deals with immigration and features a discussion between Dr. Wayne Cornelius, director of the center, and James Fallows, Washington editor of *The Atlantic Monthly*. Given the current consideration of the Simpson-Mazzoli immigration legislation in Congress, this debate is particularly timely.

Of interest to business and financial writers will be an analysis of the Mexican economy and its enormous debt by Alan Robinson, Latin American reporter for *Euromoney* magazine, and Luis Rubio, executive director of the Instituto de Banca y Finanzas, Mexico's most prestigious private sector business research organization. This session will meet at 10:30 a.m. Monday.

Carlos Tello, former minister of planning and budget and ex-director general of Mexico's Central Bank, will be the keynote speaker at lunch on Monday. He will talk on Latin America's debt and what we should do about it.

Langhorne A. Motley, assistant secretary of state for inter-American affairs, will discuss "U.S. Interests in Central America: What's at Stake?" at noon on Tuesday.

The panel sessions will meet in Conference Room 111A of the Administrative Complex. The luncheon sessions will be in the International Center.
