Area Patrolled. MAIPUA, IARI and part of KORIKI Census Divisions.

Patrol Report No. 1 1061-62.

DIARY.
Patrol left Baimuru at 8.30 am. Arrived at Apiope Village 1500. Made camp and inspected village.

Proceeded on foot to KAPAI Village, Wwo hours walk away. Spent day revising andisers census and attending to general matters.

Census revision at APIEqF.
Patrol travejIed to RAVIIMVAU No. 2. Census and general matters attended to. Obsierved.

Moved to 0ld Iari group of villages. Villages inspected and general matters attended to.Discussions with various groups re village improvements.

Census revised. On completion patrol moved to MAPAIOvillage.

Census and geneal matt rs attended to In Ravikaupara, Ravikivau, and Onoporavi. These are three of the five groups which make upMAPAIO. Later, info mal discussions held on varigus matters.
Auguct 31 st. Census revision.
Gagtember 1st. Revision finished and minor matters including saveral petty disputes attended to. Patrol left during afternoon.

Sept. 2nd. Patrol at MAIPRNAIRU.Census and general, later informal discussions on copra production and attendance in village school.

Sept. 3rd. Observed.
Sept. 4th. Patrol at AKOMA.Day spent inrevision of census and attention to minor disputes, snquiries etc. Village inspected.

Sept. 5th. Patrol at IKINU. Census and general administrajive matters atcended to.

Sept. 6th. Patrol to KINIPO.Census revision and general inspection of village and surrounds. Several minor disputes settled and informal discussions on topies ranging from Agricultare to a simplipied explanation of democracy and the making of laws.

Sept. 7th. Patrol returned to Baimuru Station.

The objects of the patrol were to revise
the Tax/census Registers, to inspect improvements to the villages and housing resulting from orders issued by the previouswaner patrol, and to carry out general administrative duties.

The patrol relied on an outboard engine and canoe for transport. Surprisingly ono ugh, little trouble was experienced with the engine.

The area $\infty$ vered included the Maipua, Iari, and partb of the Koriki census divisions.

## NATIVE AFPAIRS.

The native sicuation in the area is good. There is no evidence of disturbing $t r e n d s$ of thought, wir nor, of course is there any trace left of the semi-cultism which prevailed during the regime of the notorious TOMIY-KABU. The area is in fact remarkable only for the general feeling of apathy towards lifewhich these people share 由odia most of the other Deita peoples.

One cannot help feeling, thotigh, that the enthusiasm for $a^{\prime \prime n} n$ way of life", for want of a better description 7hich these people demonstreated during TOMYs abortive regine, must, in some measure, still lie dormant. Although there is no overt evidence of these feelings on the part of the people, I am sure they are there. I feel that if these people are not given a chance to air their aspirations in some way or another, there is a good chance that at some future date they may channel their desires into cultism of some sort. Since the completion of this Patrol, the new Kaimare Native Society has been formed, and I feel that this this type of enterprise is the best vehicle for the dissipation or consummation of the peoples desire to better themselves. Even if such a venture fails the participants realise that the failure is due solely to falts of their own and not to outside agenczes.

Since the first proposals were made regarding the formation of the Kaimare Society, another tribal group, the Waroi, have asked to be allowed to form a Society, and they are at present building up share capital to an mimount suitable for flotabion of such a venture. The Assistant Registrar (Papuan Region) hopes to be able to form this Society on his planned vist early next year. It is reasonable to expect another group to make a similar request in the near future, thus, enabling the eventual formation of an Association.

During the patrol the usual large number of petty disputes were aired. These people have a penchant for petty litigation, and the involved and long-standing nature of many of these can prove very frustrating to anyone attempt--ing to sort them out. This characteristic, one might almost call it a "bush-lawyer" complex, is what dereate many proposals for economicysumat or social betterment made by the people at village level.

The patrol was accorded a better reception than previously, that is to say all Village officials, were in attendance on the patrols arrival, rest houses were in readiness for occupation with supplies of water, firewood etc., and presents of food including fowls, crabs, fruit and fresh eggs were found awaiting us in the rest houses.


The London Missionary Society have a lease (DA 964) in the centre of the island, betwe en the two villages. Thore is a coccout plantation of sorts on the lease, and TomiY KABU has been employed there for the last two years as boss-boy of a very small lebour line, making copra for the Mission.

From AKOMA the petrol proceeded to IKINU and KIKNIPO villages and thence back to BAIMURU.

NATIVE AGRICUETURE AND LIVSSTOCK.
During the past few months a number of groups have erected new hot air dryers, and sey they intend to produce copra. Aside from this there is nothing of note to report. These people are poor agriculturalists, as thetr staple food is sago, and there has never been a shortage of this. They supplement their main diet of sago,crabs, and fish with a few bananas, taro, sweet potato and manioc.These vegetables grow well in the inland areas despite the haphazard manner in which they are plunted.

Pigs are mainly kept in special small "pig villagets", usually some distance away from the main village。

## MEDIGAL AND HEALTE.

Generel health is good. This is due largely to the efforts of Drs. Calvert of Kapuna Hospita J. The area is relatively well served with aid posts, botii Admin. and Mission.

The patrol attiended to the usual number of minor illnesses, cuts and contusions, atc..

A plesing change in the attituie of the people is the evident in the increasing number of women who go to hospital to have their babies.

EDUCATION.
Most viliages have an elementary
school of low standard run by a native Pastor of the L.M.S..
At Mapa? there is an unusually well run S.D.A. school, and there are Admanistration assisted Mission sehcols run by Samoans at Mapaio and Urika.

The Primary "rr" schbol at Beara,
arollment of 86 . under Mr.Briggs,E.O., has an enrollment of 86 .

## MISSTONS.

Mission activity, apart from the medical work carpled out from Kapuna Hospital is in the hands of two Samoan and numerous native Pastors. There is very little European supervision due to shortage of Mission staff.

## VILLAGE OFPICIALS.

There are no outstandingly gocd men in the ares visited. All are of average ability and carry out their duties accordingly.

HOUSING.
It was pleasing to note the improvement in the general standard of village housing made over the last few months. Orily two of the villages seen had completed all the tasks allotted by tre previous patrol, but a great improvement, in general cleanliness an in the previously extremely poor housing had been effected. The pun to maintain a house in good condition ratror than allowing it to deteriorate to the stage when wt was no longe. habitable was stressed.

Many of the new houses are very well

PATROE REPORT - BAIMUKU NO.3/61-62.
I enclose copy of a report of Patrol conducted by M. Fowke P.O., to the upper Purari area.

The area, being extremely remote from the coastal etations. has lacked ciganized patrolling in the past and considering the lapse of time since the last visit, the situation is extremely good.

It was unfortunate that $t r$ - present patrol spent such 2. comparatively short time in the area. This was caused by the necessity for Mr. Fowke to return to familiarize Mr. Kahler, with the Baimuru area, and finalize matters before proceeding on recreation liave.
Natice Affilis The settled nature of the peoples visited, and the consolidation of the WEIJANA population on the river, indicates a peacerul state exists in the area. It would further appear that consolilation of the remaining smaller groups is being sought by the main Pauaia villages.

Administratively this should allow for easier and bet+er contact, and as affiliations appear close, no problems shouid be encountered.

The possibility of presently supplying anything in the manner or services (e.g. Health) is remote - access being an unavaidable difficuity.

The encouragement given to the inland people to visit Baimuru sesulting in such numbers accompanying the patrol back to the coasi is ncted. However such visits must be sporadic when one considers the treselling time (at least a week each way) invulved in the trif.

At present our aim shiould, and will be for more regular contact by patrol from Baimiru - if possible at least twice annually.

In respect to the groups mentioned on p. 2 (Native Affairs) para 2 , they may well be more conveniently covered from Karimui Iatrol Post. I have already had correspondence with District Officer Goroka in respect to Village Constables irom ANABAI and PGRANI in the Masi area (Upper Pirari) whose aieas are quite close to the Karimui. Post. mere could be from the groups refersed to oy Mr. Fowke.

There are cevtainly no objections from this side as it makes for far better administration coverage than can be provided from here.

It is hoped later patrols may again contact the groups reported between the Pura:i and Kikori Rivers.

Information in respect of the departments of Health, Education, and Agriculture has been extragted and passed to them.

Recommendations in respect of Vjllage Constatles goes forward under separate memorandum.

The area covered was that inhabited by the PAYAIA people, in other words the middin and upper PURART. This is an ixafrequentiy vistted area, ithough it has seen periods of intersive aetivity on the part of the 011 Companies, true firet person to contact th se people was the explorer Bevait He was followed ky Sir william MeGregor who travelled upstrean for an astimated one hundred melas In 1893. Before the was the area was visited by patrols from ritori, but the only record I have actually seen is that of a patrol in 1938, led by Mr.J.R.Folai, which corered the whole of the Upper Purari area.

Sinced the war there have been cengus and administrestive pairols to the area in 1948,1954 and 1957. In 1958 a patpol vialted tho two lowest villages which were not visited by the 1957 patrol.

The Purari is very - ant flowing, and is an arduone and often dangerous stream to navigute. Laumahas Ith powerrtul enough ongines ean peach WA'APO oreol, but a pilot who knows the piver is nesessary, as thet is a rook bar at Bevan Rapide. The beat means of travel on this and mont of the other blg pirors in this Distpiot in in a large aingle cance powered by a $40 \mathrm{M} . \mathrm{P}_{\text {. outboard mot }}$ as used by the 011 Companies.

The patrol was orighmally pouted through tho Upper BRA area, to UNASIAB om the Purapl, to aroia the Iong trip ath the $\quad 211$ cathoard ongine availaile to the patrolozthe was provented ey plociling in the RRA and MBMA pivers, and the patrol returaed to BAIIURS and contimued up the PURAEI.

## MATTVS AFPATPS.

During the whole of the patrol only ono complaint was made. This concermed threats of soreery againat OROI Fillagers by a man from IAUDA Village on the lower Purari,This miter van dealt with in the Court for Faitve Matters at Bajmaru.

Although there are no census or other record portaining to the Purari apea at Batraru, I beleive that this is fonow officially an the TUROZA census division. This is scmemhto of a midmomerpas TuroriA is actually the clan name of the people of YoinI and umasIAI villages,Although the people of the area all speats the came language with mo apparent aifference betweel viliages, they are split up into seven groups. These are as follows.

The introduction of graded walking paths, and the cooperation of local natives to carry the project through is most heartening. I have already seen sections which have been completed, and whilst gradients are extremely steep in places, the tracks make for eaijier communications and are an indication of Government progress.

The ridge over the Tauri River has since become impassable and an approach has already been made to the District Commissioner for funds to erect a permanent wire bridge. Funds have been made available and some equipment has, at this stage, reached Kaintiba. The matter of further permanent crossings of this river will require close consideration in the near future to allow full coverage of the East and West of the Tauri.

Missions have been showing an increasing interest in the area since air communications have been established. To date no applications for land have been received at this office, though I believe such applications to be iminer.t. I believe that Missions In the area could do much to break down the typical kukukuku reserve and would no doubt fill an important link in the educational field.

Camping Allowance. Claim for camping allowance submitten by Mr. Heriot for the period covered by the report is forwarded for your certification please.

I consider that both officers manning the post should be entitled to Patrol Allowance at least for the period ending on 5 th June, at which stage the strip was opened for category "D" aircraft operations. This, to a large degree, ended the isolation of the staff, at Kaintiba and heralded the completion of tho first stage of Administration consolidation in the area.

I forward herewith for your information, the report submitted by P.O. Heriot, covering the period list February 1962 to 26tk. June, 1962, in the establishment of the Patrol Post at Kaintiba.

The report was received in the Subdistrict office during August last, but was inadvertently filed and has only, now been located. Naturally, any descriptive value it contained at that stage has beer nullified by the period which has lapsed, This is regretted.

Mr. Heriot has produced a good report which has described, in diary form, the day to day tasks which are inherent in the building of a strip to consolidate a new Post. He has failed to mention the tedium involved in such tasks with a comparatively meagre labour force whose presence, day by day, is an uncertain quantity.

The construction of the strip has been responsible in bringing quite a large proportion of the local population into contacit with the Administration, whilst the medical facilities available at the Aid Post, coupled with an efficient and understanding Medical Orderly, has done much to win the confidence of the local people. A copy of the report has been forwarded to the District Medical Officer in respect of Laufa.

I agree with Mr. Heriot that the prime requisite now that basic communications have been established, is to put into effect a patrol programme in which the Adininistration will go to the people. The O.I.C. has been directed already to implement such a programme, though the building up of the post to provide reasonable

## KAINTIBA PATROL REPPORT No. 1 of $1961 / 62$.

INTRODUCTION.
This is a continuation to patrol report KER 14 of 1961/62. That report covered a period when base camp construction began at Kaintiba, together with the airfield investagation. During that time from mid October to the end of January, the base camp was completed and a 400 foot section of the airstrip was finished. Problems of labour, supply, weather and others became apparent and caused many setbacks.

The greatest problem was that of supply, for it, in turn, directly affected the number of labourers which could be employed, and to complete this task it was necessary to naintain a reasonably large and regular work force. Two highly successful airdrops by DC3 overcame this problem as well as giving prestige and morale to everyone at Kaintiba. These airãpops occurred during the period of this report.

The airstrip was prepared to a standard which was spproved for an inspection landigg, which took place on Friday, 18th. May, 1962. In its unfinished state, the airstrip was opened to categor "D" flights. The Department of Works has inspected rock outcrops on the airstrip site and has advised that these will be remeved with the use of explosives. The Depertment of Civil Aviation has surveyed the airstrip for the purpose of a design, which is at present being drawn up. A lot more wopk will be necessary, as soon as the design comes out, to complete the trip, and it is hoped that it can be brought up to a standard which will be approved for category "C" (Otter, flights.

Good relations have been maintained with the locel peoples with influence showing marked effect. People come in freely to sell fresh food, to work or inerely to pay a visit. Word was sent cut several days before the first plane came in and an estimated 300 men, women and children waited all day from early morning to see the plane land at 1715.

This report covers a period of five months, most of the time being occupied in airstrip supervision and construction. For this reason, and thus to avoid a monotonous repitition of similar diary entries, where necessary, days will be combined into periods giving general development for each period as well as brief mentions of matters of interest and importance.

DJ.ARY.
Thursday $1 / 2 / 1962$ to Sunday $4 / 2 / 1962$.
Work on airfield coastruction continuing satisfactorily. Part of this tims spent writing patiool report KaR 14 of $61 / 62$. Approximately 700 lbs. fresh food (sweet potato, cooking bananas, gabbage and sugar cane) purchased on Friday. This is of great assistance as a supplement to hard pations which are transported to Menyamya firm Lae by aireraft ans then have to be carried overland for thrie days to here. This meane of supply is very costly in this particular case.

All but six workers wished to finish on Saturday. These were all paid off. Apparently a distorted rumour had penetrated ffom the coast about an oncoming period of darkness. This was in fact an eclipse of the eun which was to take piace next Monday. All attempts to explain the harmlessness of this oncoining event failed. These people (locals as well as workers from the neighbouring Menyamya and Aseki areas) took the matter calmly, but they wished to return to their villages. A total labour force of nine worked on Baturday.

Monday $5 / 2 / 62$ to Sunday $11 / 2 / 62$.
The eclipse of the sun was observed on Monday Morning. Its effect was lessened by the presence of fairly heavy cloud
which partly obscured the sun most of the thine. A short period of gonsideracle darkness did occur at 0850. After the eclipse, 12 locals came to the base camp and asked to be"sirned on" as workers.

Airfield construction continued this week with the work force slowly building up in rumber. A small ine of carriers together with two police and an interpreter was sent to Menyamya with mail on Wednesday with instructions to try ani recruit carriers to carry stores from Menyamy to Kaintiba. Also, these may seek employment here. Carrier line arrived from Menyamya on Saturiay with constable Tore. Some of these carriere requested enployment.

## Monday $12 / 2 / 62$ to Sunday $18 / 2 / 62$.

This week the work force was increased cuasiderably from carrier lines arriving frot Menyamya with stores eic., and wishing to be employed. Also $u_{f}$ to 30 local people would seek daily employment.

Towards the top end of the airstrip site is a hill where "cut" of up to 12 feet is required. On the opposite side of the strip to, this hill is a creek running almost parallel to the strip. Much of this oreek requires "rill" of anything up to 16 feet in depth. This 300 feet section of strip vill require a tremendous amount of teady ani continucus work to complete it.

1245 on Monday, a carrier line arr a from Kereme. with constables Bunoda (ex leave) and Gelem, carnying mail, cash and police personal effects. On Tuesday, const. Yan arrived from Menyamya with stores. On Wednesday, Kerema carriers departed and another line of carriers arrived from Menyamy with a/Interpreter Patipanga.

Received word from the District Officer at Kerema that approval has been given for Kaintiba to be supplied by airdrop from Lae. The District Office at Lae, through Mr. Hicks CPO, aivised on 'Thursday that an airdrop was planned for within the next two weeks. This is what we have been waiting for.

Small amounts of fresh food purchased.

Mondsy 19/2/62 to Sunday $25 / 2 / 62$.
An average work strength of over 90 for this woek. Everything is progressing well. Cjent the time supervising vork and putting in surface level constriction marks. It is hoped to heve the airstrip ready for inspection by the end of April.

Radio contact with Mr, Hicks GPO in Lae on Tuesday who auvised that the alpdrop would take place tomorrow pending favourable weather, and that the plane would be here at about 1000. A long conversation with poilce at night to straighten out any problems they had, but nothing much was brought up.

On Wednesday morning all worked on airstrip until 1000. The Douglas DC3 was first sighted at 1052 . It mads 13 drop runs, dropping 105 triple bagged packages, and departed 1148. The items dropped consisted mainly of pice and meat ( $50 \% 112 \mathrm{lb}$. bags of rice and 10 cases of ti ed meat). The rest of the day was spent orting out and storing away these rations. The overall recovery tate was 96 percent which was very high considening the conditions under which this drop was made. Much oredit should go to those responsible for the packing of the stores and to the TAA pilot for his carerul positioning of the stores during the actual drop. All labour continued woricing on the airstrip in the afternoon. Result of airdrop reported to the Distilet orficer at Kerema.

Work on airstrip continued in.il coon on Saturday.

Weekly issues of tobacco, matches, razor blades, soap and newspaper given out in the afterioon. Sunday observed except for the purchase of a small amcunt of fresh food.

Monday $26 / 2 / 62$ to Sunday $4 / 3 / 62$.
Spent part of thit time during this week writing my Geography 2 assignment (ASOFA Correspondence course), in between supervising construction of the airstrip. The average daily work force for this week dropped to about 50, with a decine in the numbers or boich "permenent" and "casual" workers.

On Thursuay at 1830, constable Bumbu arived from Menyamua with supply carriers. Most of these wished to remain at Kaintiba and work on the airfield. The remainder returneo to Menyamya with constejle Felix on Friday. That night police and carriers arrived from Kerema with supplies and mail.

Weekly issues given out to police and labourers on Saturday afternoon and mail was prepared for Kerema mail muner's departure on Monday mornirg. 14: people arrived from the Aseki area looking for work.

Monday $5 / 3 \times 62$ to Sunday $11 / 3 / 62$.
On lionday a line commenced work on the bottom end of the ainstrip, on a section of about 400 feet in length. Mr. steen P.O. supervised ohis whilst the writer remained super-ising the top section. The work force varied from between about 80 and 110 this week and bith such large numbers, the joh started to speed uo considerably. With the increase in stremgth an aditional
 were alto built for labourers.

Kainiiba has been without a battery charger for some time and has relied on the portable A510 Transceiver for all radio communications. On Monday night at 1830 a line of carriers arrived from Menyamya with a new jatteny charger and for the next three days this was in continuous use charging batteries for the Cranmond transceiver.

On Thursday, a line of men from the Aseki area numbering 33 arrived and requested employment. These additional "signed" workers, together with 26 casual daily workers, brought the total number of workecs to 112. A small anount ni fresh food was bought during the week and weekly issurs were given out on Saturday afternoon.

Mondav $12 / 3 / 6=$ to Sunday $18 / 3 / 62$.
The work force was exirenely nigh this week, rising to a total of 152 ( 96 permanent and 56 cesuals). Most of thea labourers worked on both sections of the airstrip, whilst a few commenced the construction of another na/dive material. Europeen residence.

On the top oection, most of the hill, which was mentioned earlier, has been cui away: at least to the wiath of the strip. As much "fill" is still required for the creek on the opposite side of the strip, the hill is heing further cut into to ind this ground. The whole section is starting to take shape now.

A, complaint was made that children being looked ufter by members of the police detachment at Kaintiba have been itealing food from nearby village gardens. This matter was investifated. Carriers arrived from Menyamya with consteble Felix, interpreter Auwatogo and Aid Post Orderly Semabikam on Sunday.

Monday $19 / 3 / 62$ to Sunday $25 / 3 / 62$.
78 this week, witn 52 to 5. Actuall numbers of local "casual workers varying from presenting of no problems. The recent airdrop has overcome problems of supply and the airstrip construction is developing rapidy with the increased labour force. Kerema advised on Monday that extra VSC funds were in the mail for Kaintiba and these will be extremely handy, especially as another airdrop is planned to take place soon.

Menyamya carriers departed on Monday morning with constable Yan and a/Interpreter Patipanga. Wednesday, an investigation of an assault on a woman who had been struck on the head with a tomahawk and who had come into the aid-post for medical attention. Police runners arrived late on Thursday afternoon with mail, ete, from Kerema.

011 change and general overhall of battery charger on Friday morning. §aturday, constable Evovo departed for Kerema with carriers and a sick labourer who was to be carried to the Tauri river to a village below Hells Gate and then taken to Kukipi. by canoe. This labourer is from the Kwambega area (on the opposite side of the Tauri river) and proved to be of great assistance in making contact with the people during a patrol into that area which the writer accompanied eariy last year. He had previously spent a term in prison at Kerema for murder and during that time he had learnt to speak Police Motu. He was the first person from the other side of the Tauri river to remain and work here and he Was very popular with the people of this area. He had been sick. for about 10 days and had not responded to medical treatment at all. - (This man was diagnosed by the Doctor at Kerema to be suffering from a chronic heart complaint and it was stated that it was remarkable that he ever reached Kerema alive. He was continually being drainedof fluid from all parts of his body and although he improved considerably, he had little chance of survival and later died in hoapital).

A death by suicide was reported and investigecea on Sunday. This took place about one mile from here.

## Monin $\frac{26 / 3 / 62 \text { to Sunday } 1 / 4 / 62 .}{}$

Labour strength averaged about 80 for the week, but numbers of local daily workers showed a marked decrease. This week the final construction pegs were put into the top hill section of the airstrip. An extension of approximately 250 feet is possible past the top end of this near finished hill section, and this will require only the removal of tree stumps and top-soil and the levelling by eye of the surface. A lot more work is required to fill to the top of the level mar'ss on the oresin side of the previorsiy mentioned hill section.

On Monday Mr. Hicks again called from the District Office at Lae advising of the next airdrop to take place next week and on Thursday advice came through that it vould be the following Thursday.

On Monday a rumour was heard that natives from tha area between here and Kaingo were preparing to make an attack on the base camp. These people were sent for and a few that came in were spoken to and given a fireams demonstration. Necessary precautions were taken at night with the posting of police guards.

Carriers arrived from Menyomya on Tuesday with constables Yan and Nandokot(ex hospitalisation Lae) and three ii enyamya police. Word had been received at Menjamya of a disturbance in the Hamdei area, and the ADO at Menyamya saw fit to send the extra police.

Thursday, the Menyarya carriers departed with Menyamy police escorts and co stable Bunoda from this detachment. Issues given out on Saturday afternoon.

Monday $2 / 4 / 62$ to Sundey $8 / 4 / 62$.
The average daily labour force for this week was again above 100, and work on the airfield progressed well. At the top end of the strip, work continued on the hill section whilst Mr. Steen continued with construction and aupervision of the section at the bottom end of the airsteip.

The second airdrop to Kaintiba took place on Monday and this again showed a remarkable 96 percent recovery. This was fortunate though, as 9 bags were acciaentally dropped into the valley about $1 \frac{1}{2}$ miles from here and from a great height. These bags were brought in by locap people who had seen them fall into the thick bush, and practically everything was in good order (mainly fice and meat.). The airdrop took aimost half an hour from 0900, ia which the Douglas DC3 made 5 drop runs. The siores mainly conaisted of rice, meat and sugar and also badly needed items of trade sunh as tomahawks, large bush knives and giri-giri shell. The Agriculture Department at Kereme organised for English seed potatoes to be dropped for pianting, hut these were badly damaged and most rotted.

On Wednesday, a carrier line arrived from Menyanya and these carriers ¿eparted with constables Japi and Kekera on Saturlay. Weekly issues given out on Saturday arternoon to police and labcurers.

## Monday $9 / 4 / 62$ to Sundav $15 / 4 / 62$.

The average labour force remained at about 100 this week. Stump and top-soil removal and levelling began on the section at the top end of the airfield. This began on Wednesday and should not take very lung to complete. In fact, a few more weeks is all that will be required to have the airstrip ready for the inspection landing, that is if the labour strength is maintained.

A police party failed to apprehend tive male adult Aiworo of Haragini village who had struck the woman who had laid a complaint about three weeks ago when she came in for medical reatment. A number of people from Haragini village were brought to the base camp on Tuesday, and they admitted that diworo had struck the complainant on the head with his tomahawk during a heated arguément. These people were told that Aiworo would eventually be caught and that it would be better for them to bring him in now and divoid any further trouble. Aivoro was brought in on Thursday and he was sentenced to one moriths imprisonment in the Court of Native Matters (Case No. KAI 7:61-62).

On Monday, the battery charger was given an oil change. A large number of people came to the camp and these were given a talk on assisting the Administration and other matters. Constable Evovó arrived at 1400 with nail from Kerema.

A report had come in that the cane suspension bridge over the Tauri river, between Mambanya and Kwambega villages, was badly damaged. Two constables, Yan and Gelem, together with 4 lapourers (2 as interpreters) were sent to recruit people from m mbanya and Kwambega to repair the bridge. This party left on Chursday morning and the police were given trade items to pay labourers and rations for che week.

Constable Bunoda together with a/Interpreter Patipanda and 8 carriers departed for Kerema ot 0830 on Friday. Weekly issues were giver. out on Saturday afternoon. Small amounts of fresh food were pupchased during the week.

Mondey $16 / 4 / 62$ to sunday $22 / 4 / 62$.
This week saw a concentrated effort on the hill section filling in part of the creek which puns along the sise of the airstrip. The progress appears to be slow as "fill" ic requi/ed up to a depth of 16 feet, but this is she last major job to be complated oefore he uirstrip is opened for 1 pection.

With an average work force of over 100 again , and due to the fact that Mr. Steen had some of the polise and labourers on patrol over Easter, it was decided to work during this period, except for Good Friday, and to give police, etc., the equivalent number of days holiday at a later date. Many of the "signed" labourers work for only a week or two, so to give them almost a weeks spell would not be practicaj. Those labourers who have worked for a long time will be given time off later aiso.

On Monday, constable Kekera arrived from Menyamya at 1800 with a line of 13 carriers all requesting work. Constable $1 / 0$ Leusewa and constable Nandolot departed for Menyamya on Tuesday with a small line of 5 carriers, the latter policeman to return to Lae for further medical treatment for his cirrosis of the liver complaint. Light rain interrupted work on the airstrip a little on Wednesday. The a/District Orficer at Kerema advised by radio on Thursday that constable Bunoda had been troubled by natives on the road below Nangonai, on his way through to Kerema. Mr Steen at once prepared to proceed to the area and investigate.

Mr. Steen departed at 0930 on Good Friday together with 4 police, N.M.O., and 20 carriers. The line sent to repair the Tauri river bridge returned at 1800. They had been un ruccessful $\mathrm{n}^{t}$ repairing it as in its present state it was impossible to cross to the other side of the river and it we necessary to have another party on the other side to tie the cans. The flooded state of the river also prevented a safe crossing and the police had been instructed to exercise care and not to take any risks. As it is intended to put in two other bridges over the Tauri river at different points, it might be worth considering the construction of something of a more permanent design, perhaps by using wire instead of cane on the sections subject to the greatest strain.

A Iittle trouble experienced with constable Yan on Saturday afternoon. This matter will be left until Mr. Steen returns from his investigution and an orderly rocm charge will be laid against the above constable. Weekly issues given out on Saturday afternoon. Sunday observed.

Monday $23 / 4 / 62$ to sinder 29/4/62.
Labour strength again remained high at over 100 for the week except on Saturday when about 50 wished to be paid off. All of these labourers continued to fill in creek towards the top end of the airstrip.

Mr. Steen returned at 1515 on Tuesday from Nangonai.
One of the Yaba survivors contacted on Friday afternoon. He was questioned as to the whereabouts of the supreme Court witnesses. The four that will have to go to Kerema are Watama, Pungawagabu and Wawendo who can be found locally, and Hapigauwa who is living near Nangonai. There will be no trouble involved in locating these witnesses, in fact they have been continually coming to the camp and at times enquiring about when they are to go to Kerema for the Court. It is obvious that they. received the VIP treatment when they went to Kerema for the lower court hearing of the "Yaba massacre".

The airstrip is almost ready for inspection. The new "fill" has consolidated beautifully, but the strip wili remain closed for another two weeks to allow rurther consolidation, and to give time for the cleaning of the surface pebbies, etc., the removal of construction pegs, and the clearing of approaches. The clearing of the strips surface will be done almost last. It is not a big job, and the rubbish and pebbles help to preserve 1 m the surface by arresting water erosion which is severe due to the heavy rainfall and the steep shn of the airfield.

Monday $30 / 4 / 62$ to Sunday $6 / 5 / 62$. strength has reduced considerably. On Iuesday a line of 20 carriers went to Menyamya escorted by constable Bumbu to collect stores and 14 other labourers were paid off. Also there were very few local day workers. A few small jobs were done at both ends of the airstrip consisting mainly of levelling the ground.

Spent Monday and Tuesday supervising labour and also planted some vegetable seeds. At 1745 constable Bunoaq arrived with carriers from Kerema carrying mail and a few stores. Office returns on Wednesday as well as the supervision of labour.

On Thursday, commenced the chain and compass survey 0. the proposed Kaintiba station boundaries. This was curcinued i) $r$ the whole of the week, calculations and plotting being done daily for each section surveyed. In general, the survey follows the traverse cut hy Mr. Hicks CPO during December last year.

At about 1500 on Friday, the Menyamya carriers returned with mail and personal stores. Weekly issues were given out to police and labourers on Saturday afternoon. A small line of casuals working on the airstrip on Sunday.

Monday $7 / 5 / 62$ to Tuesdav $8 / 5 / 62$.
Completed eurvey of station land and spent Monday afternoon drawing plan. By careful plotting, the misclose in the survey was found to tee approximately one percent which is accoptable in such surveys. The necessary adjustments to the diagram were made. Including traverses, the land is onclosed by 32 sides, coisgisting of 6 main cut lines ana 26 traverse lines following creeks or ridges. The area of the land is approximately 93 acres and in general its boundaries follow well defined naturel features. Airfield extension and clearances have been considered and adequate provision made in this respent. An ideal station building site is situated in the south-east corner of the land.

Tuesdady spent measuring the airstrip and positioning it on the station ple. $\Omega$ and adding other relavent features.

Wednesday $9 / 5 / 62$ to Sunday $13 / 5 / 62$.
During this period all levelling jobs were sompleted and labour cut timber and cleared the area past the top end of the airstrip. It is oniy a matter f clearing the pebbies, etc., f.on the strip's surface now and rinoving the construction pegs.

Thursajy, the top of a large stone near the centre of the ai. 3 thip which was protruding above the surface by about six sipase was broken off by the use of fire and crowbars. The stone was "cooked" all night and broke easily in the morning.

Carriers arrived back from Kenyamya on Thursday. A conversation with the a/District Offiser at Kerema by radio on Friday oncerning the Tauri river briage. Nothing is definite yet, Dit the District Commissioner has been approashed and he is in favour of having something permanent put in. He has suggested $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wire cable.

A police party of six rationed to leave early on Saturday morning to attempt to locate a suspected murderer. 32 casual workers worked on Saturday afternoon and approximately the same number volunteered for work on Sunday. Weekiy issues given out tio police and labourers on Saturday afternoon.

Monday $14 / 5 / 62$.
All labour clearing surface of airstrip and adding finishing touches. Also the removal of construction pegs.

Conversation with the a/District Officer advising that the airstrip will be open for inspection as from tomorrow,
pending favourable weather. There has been no rain in the last five days and with windless and almost cloudless mornings, the condivions for a landing have been perpect. Mr. Carey quaried the slope of the strip. The hill section, towards the top end of the strip, is about 300 feet long and has an even gradient of 19 percent. This means that on this section, for every 100 feet in length, the strip rises 19 feet. In 1350 feet the strip rises almost 200 feet. This matter was cleared up. Mr. Carey also queried the condition of the "fill" at the point of "touch-down". It was pointed out that this ground had consolidated well and was very solid.

## Tuesday 15/5/62. $\frac{\text { Labo }}{}$

Labour working at the bottom end of the airilield but on a section outside the dimensions of the strip indicated for the initial inspection.

Mr. R.I.Skinner, Executive Officer, Policy and Planning Division of the Department of the Administrator, phoned to check a few points about the slope, condition and so on, of the airstrip. Mr. Skinner also gave instructions for the marking of rock outcrops on the airstrip and for the lighting of fires to indicate the direction of the wind.

## Weanesday 16/5/62.

Approximately 45 permanent and 50 casual workers continuing with yesterday's work. In the morning, 32 labourers taken off the strip to cut timber in readiness for building on additional roof over the residence/office/store. The original one, due to insufficient slope, was beginnirg to leak badly.

1000 Mr . Skinner again phoned to advise that the inspection would take place on Friday next, and the plane would anrive at about 1030. A DCA airport engineer, Mr. George Antcliffe, will carry out the inspection and he will be flown in by STOL airways cessna piloted by Ron Firns.

Weather conditions remained good, but the afternoons are tending to cloud over.

Thursday $17 / 5 / 62$.
A final clean-up of the airstrip today. Also the framework of the office roof almost completed.

Chit two 4 gallon drums to be used to kuild wind direction fires in. These were filled with dry grass and put under shelter for the night.

Word was sent out to the local peoples inviting them tc come to the base camp tomorrow and see the first plane land. Very few of these people have ever seen a stationary plare before, and their conception of such a thing is fascinating. Many men, women and children carrying personal possessions, food, small pigs, dogs, etc., arrived late in the afternoon prepared to sleep in houses near the station.

## Friday $18 / 5 / 62$.

Marked the ends of the airstrip with sisalcrafi and the rock outcrops with white calico. The labourers were given no regular work today.

By about 0930 approximately 300 local people had assembled, by far the most people ever seen at Kaintiba at the one time. These people were almost as excited as the station personnel at the thought of the plane coming today.

Word came through in the morning that the plane will be delayed due to mechanical difficulties at Port Moresby. EIRs were obtained at hourly intervals during the mfterno on until advice came through that the plane would be departing Moresby at 1500. An ETA at about 1645 advised that the plane had missed us and had landed et Menyamya to re-fuel. Then at 1715 the plane was sighted and after circling once it landed. Light rain had just started th fall. A trial takeoff and landing was performed and Mr. Steen and myseif were then taken up for a short ride.

## Messrs. Antciiffe and Firns remeined the night.

Sarurday $12 / 5 / 62$.
Mr. Antcliffe inspected the airstrip. He indicated a necessary improvement of placing "fill" to form a more even curve at the point of change in gradient between the sections of 11 and 19 percent slope. Plane departed 0900.

Labour cutting bush to the side of the airstrip and a line roofing office. 12 casual workers continued on roof in the afterioon. Constable Bumbu arrived from Menyamya with a smaj.l line early in the afternoon. Weekly isscies also given out in the afternoon.

Sunday $20 / 5 / 62$
Observed. Constable Tore arrived from Kerema soon after noon with a small carrier line carrying mail.

## Mondav $21 / 5 / 62$ to Sundar $27 / 5 / 62$.

An average labous force of about 50 this weeic, comprising about 30 permanent and 20 casual workers. All of these continued outting bamboo leaves for residence/office roof on Monday and half the line completed the job on Tuesday,

On Monday, together with three police, pegged out the surve at the join of the 11 and 19 percent slopes with pegs at a distance of 10 feet apart both along and across the strig. The length of the curve was made about 110 feet, with the maximum depth of "fill" required being only 10 inches. The half of the labour not working on the office coof on Tuesday, began placing "rill" to the top of the pegs in this curve. All labour continued with this job on Weanesday and completed it on Thursday.

The grass mentfoned in my previous report, KBR 14 of 1961/62 under the heading of 'Airstripa', is growing well. The grass is found growing on ridge tope surpounding Kaintiba. It is necessary to go anead with close planting of this giass now, to protect the surface of the strip from water erosion. Grass planting by all labourers on Friday and Saturday morning. Weekly issues given out on Saturday aft/sranon.

On Sunday afterncon a small girl was brought to the aid-post with a broken off spear inside her. She had fallen into a pig trap (pit) which had a spear stuas upright in the ground at its bottom. This spear enteres her anus and the point ended up just under the skin next to her spine and half way up her back before the shaft broke away. The father of the child had cut to the point of the spear with a razor blade, but when unable to remove it, had had the presence of inind to bring the child to the aid-post. Medical Orderiy Laufa did an excellent job in removing the spear, working confidentally under very hygienic conditions. A very capuble Medical Orderly.

The District Office at Lae enquired on Monday if Kaintiba will require another airdrop this financial. year. It is difficult to say at this stage for as yet the strip has not been approved for commercial flights. Also no regular supply service has been arranged. Another consideration is funds. present VSC
10.
funds would hardly be sufficient to fill a DJ3 for an alrdrop. The matter was put into the hands of the $a / D i s t r i c t$ Officer at Kerema.

Monday 28/5/62 to Sunday $3 / 6 / 62$.
An average labour force of about 40 spent till Wedneadey planting grass. This is a coarse couch type grass whish grows slowly in the unfertile soil of the airstrip which has had its top-soi.l removed. Clusters of grass were planted at intervals of about two feet.

At 1045 on Wednesday a Works Department representative, Mr. Ken Jarvis, came in by STOL airways cessna to inspect the rock outcrops on the airstrip. He advised that an operator with a compressor and explosives would be able to complete the job in about four days. He also advised that this could be done quite soon. It will be required to bring in four cessna loads of equipment. The new" ${ }^{\circ} 1111$ " at the curve put in last week has not consolidated properly as yet, so this will be done manually. The airstrip was closed for one week to allow time for this to be done.

Blocks with handles were made to pound the unconsolidated earth and this was very successful. This work continued from Thursday until yari the end of the week. The District Office at Lae had arranged for our stores, which had been left over from the second airarop, to be brought in by cessna, but with the strip closed, this movement was postponed for one week.

On Monday constable Nabo and a/Interpreter Patipanga escorted a line of carriers to Menyamya carrying a total of 100 copra bage done up in bundles and addressed to the District Officer, Lae, to be used in the event of snother airarop to here. On Tuesday a small line of labourers were paid off and these carried the remaining 40 bags. On Saturday constable Evovo arrived from Menyamya with stores and mail.

Eight of the owners of the Kaintiba land came in on Thursday and asked when they were to get paymert for their land. These men were told to come in again or. Friday together with all of the other owners to walk around the proposed boundaries. In the meantime the names of those that did come in were taken and matters concerning the purchase of land, food trees, gardens and improvements were discussed. The lsnd owners were not seen again this week.

Mr. Steen erected the wind sock near the bottom end and to the right of the airstrip on Friday. Weekly issues to labour and police on Saturday afternoon.

Monday $4 / 6 / 62$ to Sundav 10/6/62.
An average labour force of a little over 40 this week. Most of the time spent improving the track from Kaiatiba to Menyamya. This involves the cutting of timoer followed by the digging of a level pathway with spades, and the erecting of timber bridges at the crossing points of the numerous small creeks.

AVIAT advised on Tuesday that, as from now, the Kaintiba airstrip is officially open to category "D" aircraft. The strip remajin oper. subject to a daily pre-operational strip repont which is to be sent by radiogram addressed 'Collect, Weather, Aviat, Moresby' until a DCA aeradio crystal is obtained for us.

Seed potatoes and other seeds supplied by DASF being planted. A TAA cesana arrived from Lae on Thursday morning carrying stores (rice and meat) left over from the second airdrop. On Saturday morning a line replacing ground where rain has caused the washing of small watercourses across parts of the strip.

Monday, the queen's birthdiy holida, was observed with a small line of casuals working on the airstrip. A line of 15 carriers departed for Menyamya on Monday, escorted by constable Japi. Constables Kekera and Yan arriveã from Kerema at 1430 on Friday and a line arrived with constable Nabo from Menyamya on Saturday at 1500. Weekly issues were given out on satur afternoon.

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An average of 35 workers for the week, mainiy continuing with the Kaintiba-Menyamya walking track.

Mr. Ashton, $a /$ District Commissioner Morobe District, phoned on Monday to say that he will be coming in on Wednesday's flight from Lae, which will be carrying stores. Weather conditions on Wednesday deterioratad and the pilot was unable to locate the airstrip. Mr. Antciffe, the DCA airport enginear, phoned on Thursday to say that he will be coming into Kaintiba on Monday and with him will come a surveyor who will remain for about a week and survey the airfield for the purpose of drawing up a design.

Constable Bunoda escorted 10 carriers to Menyamya on Monday. Spent Friday working on final correspondence course assignment - Anthronology 3. A group of about 12 men arrived on Saturday afternoon from the Tauri river area below Hauwabanga, requesting work. Constable Japi arrived with cerriers from Menyamya on Sunday, accompanied by constable $1 / \mathrm{C}$ Gaiko who is required asta a Crown witners in the Supreme Court at Kerema, when the case of the "Yaba massacre" is heard.

## Monday $18 / 6 / 62$.

Crowley airways cessna came in at 1300 with cargo from Lae. Mr. Ashton accompanied the flight and made an informal inspection of the base camp and departed after about an hour.

At about 1430 , STOL cessna arrived with Mr. Antcliffe and Mr. Leke who will remain and survey the airstrip. Mr, Antcliffe brought with him a DCA aeradio crystal and tested it euccessfully. From now on, this will be used daily instead of having to send a radiogram through RTC.

Constable Tore accompanied 23 carriers to Menyamya.
Tuesday $19 / 6 / 62$.
Packing rations, etc. for journey to Kerema. A party sent out to locate witnesses, but returned only with Watama and Pungawagabu. The other two, Wawendo and Hapigauwa, were at Nangonai and the police sent on word for these to be ready to go to Kerema in two or three days time.

Purchased approximately 1500 lbs. of fresh foodstuffs during the day.

Mr. Leke surveying airstrip and being assisted by several police and labourers.

## Wednesday $\frac{20 / 6 / 62 .}{\text { Packin }}$

Packing stores and personal requirements for an early departure in the morning. Constable Kekera sent on in advance with two carriers carrying rice. An ex Kukukuku policeman, Mokekauwu, who was used as an interpreter in the lower court hearing of the "Yaba massacre" at Kerema, and who is required at the Supreme Court, complained during the afternoon that he hed developed a sick $g$ sickness and that he would be unable to walk to Kerema tomorrow. Prepared a stretcher and eventually found a line of 12 extra carriers to carry him. This extra line was issued with rations and plastic Js so that they could be independant of the main party.

Constable Konari and $a /$ Interpreter Patipanga are to accompany this line.

The main party consists of constables Evovo and Kanai (both required for the Coronial inquiry into the death of Patrol Officer Andereon), constable 1/C Gaiko and 5 other male witnesses (required for the Supreme Court), constable Nako, 10 carriers, personal servant and myself.

Trouble experienced by Mr. Steen with constable Kanai during the day. This policeman, although a good busnman and worker, is becoming an intolerable burden.

## Thursdav 21/6/62.

Stretcher case sent off at 0715. Constable Kanai decidef in the morning that he was not going to Kerema, but he was reminded that he is required for the Coronial inquiry and he proceeded to prepare himself.

Departed Kaintiba 0745, arriving at the pass above the two large peaked mountains, visible from Kaintiba, at 1100 and arrived at the Werr river camp below Nangonai at 1515. This is the site of the farst camp made by Mr. Carey ADO on his way to Kerema from Kaintiba after investigating the Yaba incident. Picked up witness Wawendo here.

There is evidence of a concerted eifort at improving the walkjng track between Kaintiba and the Werr river camp site. From where the station labourers finished working the the track at the Kaintiba end, the local people have continued it for quite a distance. In the vicinity of the peaked mountains, on either side, the clearing has only been done in small sectione, but near be Werr camp is a lengthy section of well cleared track.

15 men and 4 women came in with fresh food to trade. They reported that there is no trouble in the area. Constable Konari 0 did not reach the Werr river to camp. Stretcher bearing is extremely aifficult in this terrain, and Mokekauwu spent most of the day walking slowly.

Friday $22 / 6 / 62$.
Departed from the Werr camp at 0700 and clirabed to Nangonai arriving 0815. Witness Hapigauwa was not vaiting and so there was a delay whilst several locals went to find him. Constable Konari and party caught up at about 1200 a 2 d Mokekauwu reported that he felt much better now and that he would be able to walk. Eight of the careiers were sent back to Kaintiba with a note for Mr. Steen. Hapigauwa came in and after giving a present of tobacco to the old Nangonai councillor, departed at 1245 and arrived at Tuwin at 1645.

Small sections of cleared, road we eisin both wear Nangonai and Tuwin. Purchased a small amount of inesh food at Tuwin and gave a present of tobacco to the councillor. Spent the night in partly completed square type houses built recently by the people of Tuwin.

Saturday $23 / 6 / 62$.
Departed from Tuwin at 0650 and arrived at Kotai village, on the Tauri river and at the junction of the Kapau river, at 1730. As instructed, constable Kekera was waiting at this village. A present of money was giver to the councillor and his son for their assistance to police parties, over the past six months, in crossing the river.


## NA IVS AFFAIRS

(a) NATIVE SITUAMION

During most of tie e period of this report, there has been pressure on the recruiting of local labour for construction of the airstrip here at Iaintiba。Overail, the assistance given hr the local peoples was invaluable although at many times their strength in numbers was no ${ }^{+}$great.

C intact has ven maintained by the visits of the penile to Kaintiba to sell fresh food, to work or to come in for dis cushions, Carrier lines with police ese to have been continually moving between here and Menyamya and between here and Kerema. On occasions, these parties have brought in peon) le from distant village areas, but this is practically the only contact these distant villages have had. There is now a need for parole to enter these distant areas to commence a general consolidation of influence throughout the entire area which comes under the jurisdiction of Kaintiba. This work will be extremely interesting.

There is need or a patrol through the area between Kaintiba and the Were iver headwaters. Nothing serious has occurred to warrant a hurried movement into the area, but from a series of complaints and rumours, it appears that this particular area, in cants, is a little unsettled.
$t$ me and evert ar s and bad assault cases are reported from time to $t$ me and every att ot is being made to see that justice is done ar at the same taking into consideration the ignorance to the lew these people have shown in the past due to limited onntact. Most 0.) the preparganda talks given to the people have been based on the part the covenment is playing in the maintaining of 1 aw and order and hoy this will be carried out in this area. The advantages of a system f low have been explained and the people, in general, appear very entin aétio.

There have been several small incidents which suggest a slight resistance to he work of adiainistering this area. It is felt sure that this will b overcome when consolidation work begins with regular patroling. This, it is hoped, will begin soon, now that the emphasia has been taken off the construction of the airstrip.

An attempt has been made at improving the main walking tracks in the vicinity of the oblation, and the people have been encouraged to extend these tracks through their own areas. So far, from what has been seen, the people have, gone ahead considerably with this work and appear keen to do it prop dy. A number of re wests have already been received som different areas to borrow spades for this purpose.

In general, all maters being co sidered, the native situation is quite satisfactory and it will improve rapidly with the advent of regular patrolling.

## (9) GENERAL

Little work has been necessary on the base camp during these five months. Pit latrines have, from time to time, been re-built and repairs made on different buildings. The only new buildings have been an extra labour quarters and another European native material quarters.

The airfield was ap roved for category "D" aircraft during the period of this report and Kaintiba is now supplied by regular weekly cessna flights which are sufficient for the supplying of Administration personnel and general station requirements. Arrangements will be necessary to have udaitional means of supply when work commences on improving and extending tie airfield. These

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arrangements will have to originate with the Department of Works. It
might be some considerable time before the airstrip can be approved for categony " C " aireraft, and until such time, it is felt that Kain iba can only remain in its base camp stage. Conditions are gradually being impro a and the base camp is quite comfortable.

Some of the members of the police detachment have requested and have been allowed to construct for chemselves, in their spare time, their own houses apart from the two barracks built for the purpose of their accommodation. Although the writer was now enthusiastic about the matter at the time, it has since shown to have given the individuals a feeling of pride, as they have, without exception, kept these houres in a high standard of cleanliness.

## (c) POFULATION

As stated earlier, there is a great need for patrolling
to commence soon. At this stage it is thought that it wilj/be at least a year before an initial census can be carried out. In certain areas the census could be properly done now, but it if felt that influence must be consolidated before this task is cr rried out in the areas wnich have had the least amount of contact.
election.
The appointment of village councillors as spokesmen for particular grcups has begun and if suitable, these may be appointed as village constables. Once the areas are opened up in this wey, and the peoples' confidence is obtained, then they could be censussed. Firstly, it might prove advantageous to group the people into ijfferent divisions having a central administering point for each marked with a rest house.

## NATJVE AGRTCULIYURI AND LIVESTOCK

## These people remain as primitive subsistance

agriculturalists. They have an abundance of land, but their soil is extremely poor, or at least the soil in the vicinity of Kaintiba is. Methods of cultivation are not practiced. Food plants are merely thrust into a hole in the ground made with a stick and the surrounding soil is not broken. Perhaps cultivation has been found impossible due to the steep sloping country and an annual rainfall estimated to be about 200 inches.

Perhaps better yielding verieties of foodsturfs could be introduced, but it is felt that there is little scope for improvement for these people agriculturally. Domestic pigs are not plentiful and those that have been seen were very small.

## ROADS AND BRIDGES

It is hoped that improved walking tracks will be built throughout the antire area administered by Kaintiba. This will entail the clearing of bush on either side of the existing tracks to an average width of about 15 feet, and then with the use of spades, digging a narrow walking track with steps on the steeper slopes and bridges over the numerous creeks. Spades could be left undor the care of village officials, when they are appointed, foy maintaining these roads.

At present, such improved tracks have been started from K\&intiba by station labour. One follows the track to the Wert river headwaters (route followed when walking to Menyamya) for about $1 \frac{1}{z}$ miles, ancther in the opposite direction to the lower Werr valley (leeding to Kerema, via Koaru village on the coast) for about $1 \frac{1}{2}$ miles and the other 1 p the mountain to the west of Kaintiba for about $\frac{3}{2}$ a mile to IKOHEA village area.

## 3.

The people have already commenced to extend the latter two walking trackz and five spades were recently loaned to the people of IKOHEA for such work. Almost everyone visiting Kaintiba walks along these improved tracks and in this way they will see the advantages of such improvements. Also, together with the rest houses, they will symbolise a link between all areas and their administering centre at Kaintiba as well as assisting greatly in patrol work.

The cane euspension bridge across the Tauri river between Mambanya and $Y_{\text {wambega }}$ is badiy damaged, and it will be a fairly big job to repair it. As discussed in the diary of this report, it is hoped to be able to obtrin wire cable to use on the sections of this bridge which are subject to the greatest strain.

It is hoped to cut a shorter overland route to Kerena by crossing the Tauri river between the junctions of the Yaba and Werr rivers with the Tauri, and joining the existing Kerema/Kwambegay Kaintiba track at perhaps Paina or Ivana. It is believed that there exists a cane suspension bridge at this point on the Tauri river, built by village people living in that vicinity. If possible, it might be of great advantage to use wire cables to strengthen this bridge. Also a crossing point of the Tauri river is necessary between the villages of Hauwabanga and Pau(on the west side). The preaence of permanent bridges at these points would greatly assist the movement of patrols and would enable patrols so return to Kaintiba by a different route without difficulty and loss of time.

## MISSIONS

Up to date, correspondence has been reseived from the Now Tribes Mission of Bulolo, the New Guinea Lutheran Mission of Lae and Aseki and the Australian Lutheran Mission at Menyamya. These missions have recentiy been sending native mission workers to Kaintiba to contact the local people and to enquire about mission sites, etc. Other missions that have indicated their interest in the area, in different ways, are the London Xissionary Society at Koaru, the Roman Catholic Mission at Lae(it is thought that this mission now regards the area as being too faf otheir zone) and perhaps the Seventh Day Adventist Mission also of Lae.

The New Guinea Lutheran Mission appears to have done a good job at Aseki in helping in the develorment of that area. This is evident in the fine type of native which comes to Kaintiba from Aseki to seek employment. The mission has already sent in native workers and these, after seaking our advice and after gaining permission from the landowners, have constructed a temporary building for accommodation purposes. Several of their European missionaries will be visiting this station towards the end of August. This mission has its own lipht aircraft service.

## PURCHASE OF NATIVE FOODSTVMES



A considerable amount of iresh'food is being brought to Kaintiba to trade. It is apparend that the people have been growing extra foodstufts for this purpose. The averege amount brought in would supplement the issue of rice for about the equivalent of two days in each week. Matches, beads and girg-giri shells are the most common trade items used, but the people are beginning to develop an interest in cash payments.

## AIRSTRIPS

A considerable amount of work is required to complete

standard. From the comments voiced by the various pilots who have seen this airstrip, the general opinion is that an Otter aircraft could quite easily iand and lake off from it now, but the specifications of length and width are not sufficient for it to be approved for category " $C$ " opperations by the Department of Civil Aviation.
¢
An encileering survey of the airfield has been dond and further work on this rofect will begin as soon as a design has been drawn up and funds are made available. Aftur all of the rock outcrops have been exposed, the Department of Works interds to have these removed by the use of explosives.

Grass has been planted over the surface of the airstrip and although it is growing well, it has not grown quickly enough to prevent severe surface erosion. The grass is now holding the surface quite well and in 3 to 4 months time there should be little worry a of erosion.

The number of workers employed on both base camp and airfield works appears, from time to time, in the diary section of th this patrol report. In general, the numbers were sufficient, mainly because there was a shnrtage of spades and shovels for the airfield Work. Prior to, and during the period of thjs report, at least three requisitions for spades were non-stocked. Actually this shortage of tools began apparent only when the labour force exceeded about 100. Copra bage used in the airdrop were extremely helpful for making stre屯chers to carry the ground.

At this stage, the labour force, due to lack of runds and the discontinuation of the airfield construction, has been reduced considerably. As soon as work again begins, an endeavour will be made to recruit labour from the udjacent Menyamya and Aseki arpas as well as from local sources.

## CONCLUSION

Even though occasional murders are taking place in this area, the people, after less than twelve months of continuous contact, have reacted amazingly to the Administration's influence, and a bright future is predicted in this respest. Day by day the number of attendances to the aid-post is increasing, and the people ure benefiting greatly from the care which they are receiving.

They have assisted greatly in their own development, which is essential and which is to be encouraged ai this stage. They are now building improved tracks which will he of benefit to both the Administration and the people tinemselves. During aipfiela and base camp construction, the local people were invaluable in their. assistance by supplying labour and at times fresh food.

The owners of the Kaintiba land are willing to sell to the Administration. The area of the land is approximately 93 acres, which provides for the airstrip as well as for an excellent station building site at its south-east end. An investigation report has already been submitted on this 1 and and it was found that this land could quite easily be disposed of by the netive people. These same, people have indicated that they are willing to sell a small area, adjoining the southern bf ir of the station area, to the New Guinea Lutheran Mission, but th ses yet to be applied for.

There still remo is a lot of work to be cone here at Kaintiba and in the area administered by the Kaintina Patrol Post. The station work will continue steadily in conjunction with regaiar
patrolling throughout the area. The extension of the airfield and the eventual building of a permanent station are the two major tasks ahead of us, whilst in the field, patrols to open up the area with roads and to build rest houses, census patrols and then routine administration patrols will be necessary. Then it might not be long before a Local Government survey is carried out.

## Medical and Health

Medical Orderly Laufa Mrrasi from Kerema was stationed at Kaintiba during the pericd of the above report (February to June 1962). Iis monthly Aid Post reports were sent to Menyamya as required and supplies were requisitioned through the Public Health Department at Menyamya. Now, with a regular weekly plane service, Port Moresby/Terapo/Kaintiba, it is being organised for the requisitioning of supplies to be done through the PHD at Kerema to prevent difficulties in organisation arising out of having to have these stores carrieă overland from Menyamya.

Treatments of the major complaints were as follows (figures taken from the monthly Aid Post reports submitted by MO Laufa).

Cuts were shown as another common treatment, and there were some cases of malaria and a little diarrhoea. Practically all of the listed treatments were given to local village people and not foreign station and airfield labourers. An excellent means of contact was experienced in this respect and the Medical Orderly gave the people every encouragement to come in for treatment. He proved himself very popular with the people, by his willingiess to help them.

It has been noted that the Officer-in-Charge has, on many occasions by memo to PHD Kerema, praised the work of MO Lauta. He is a confientious worker who works under very hygienic conditions, he is capable of doing the work of a person more highly qualified, and what is more, he is a perfect gentleman. It is certainly hoped that approval was given to his receiving camping allowance for the period of his absence from Kerema.

## KAINTIBA PATROL REPORT No. 1 of 1961/62.

INTRODUCTITON.
961/62 This is a continuation to patrol report KER 14 of 1961/62. That report covered a period when base camp construction began at Kaintiba, together with the airfield investigation. During that time from mid October to the end of January, the Dase camp was completed and a 400 foot section of the airstrip was finished. Problems of labour, supply, weather and others became apparent and caused many sethacks.

The greatest problem was that of supply, for it, in turn, dipectly arfected the number of labourers which could be employed, and to complete this task it was necessary to maintain a reasonably large and regular work force. Two highly successful airdrops by DC3 overcame this problem as well as giving prestige and morale to everyone at Kaintibe. These airdrops occurped during the period of this report.

The aipstrip was prepared to a standard whioh was approved for an inspection landigg, which took place on Friday, 18th. May, 1962. In ite unfinished state, the airstrip was opened to categore "D" filghts. The Department of Works has ingpeoted rock outerops on the airgtrip gite and has advised that these Will be removed with the use of explosives. The Dopartment of Civil Aviation has surveyed the airstrip for the purpose of a design, whioh ie at present being drawn po A lot more wopk will be nececsary, as soon as the design comes out, to complete the strip, and it is hoped that it can be brought up to a standard whioh will be approved for category " $C$ " (Otter) Ilighte.

Good relations have been maintained with the local peoples vith influence showing mapk effect. peopie come in Pre 31. to sell fresh food, to work or merely to pay a visit. Word was sont out several days before the first plane came in and an estimated 300 men, women and children waited all day from eaply morning to aee the plane land at 1713.

This report covere a period of five monthe, most of the time being occupied in airstrip superviaion and construction. For this reason, and thus to avoid a monotonous repitition of similar diary ontries, where necessary, days will be combined into periods giviag general development for each period as well as brief mentions of matiars of interest and importonce.

DIARY.
Thuspar $1 / 2 / 1962$ to Surder $1 / 2 / 1962$ a
Wopl oi airicid construetion continuing actisfactopi1y. Part of this time epent writing patrol peport KRR 14 of 61/62. Approximately 700 1bs. fresh food (sweet potato, cooking bananas, cabbage and sugar cane) purchased on Friday. This is of great assistanco as a supplemont to hard rations which are tranoported to Menyamya from Lae by airspaft and then have to be capried overland for three days to here. This means of supply is very costly in this particular case.

All but six workers wished to finish on Saturday. These were all paid off. Appareatly a distorted rumour had penctrated from the coast about an oncoming period of daploness. This was in fact an eclipse of the oun which was to taice place next Monday. All attempts to explain the harmiesaness of this oncoming event failed. These people (locals as well as wopkers from the neighbouring Menyamya and Aseki areas) took the matter calmily, but they wished to return to their villages. A total labour force of nine worked on Baturday.

Monday $5 / 2 / 62$ to Sundar $11 / 2 / 62$.
The cellpse of the sun was observed on Monday morning.
which partly obscured the sun most of the time. A short period of cossiderable darknese did occur at 0850. After the eclipse, 12 locals came to the base camp and asked to be"signed on" as workers.

Airfield construction continued this week with the work force slowly building up in numbers. A smoll line of carriers together with two police and an interpreter was sent to Menyamyc with meil on Wednesday with instructions to try and recralt carriers to carry stores from Menyamya to Kaintiba. Alse, these may seek eniployment here. Carrier line arrived from Menyamya on Saturday with constable Tore. Some of these carriers requested employment.

Monday $12 / 2 / 52$ to Sundey $18 / 2 / 620$
This week the wopk force was increased considerably from carrier lines arriving from Menyamya with stores etc., and wishing to be employed. Also up to 30 local people would seek daily amployment.

Towapds the top ond of the alrgtrip site is a hill where "cut" of up to 12 leet is required. On the opposite gide of the trip to, this hili is a oreek running almost parallel to the strip. Mued of this ereck requires "1211" of anything up to 16 feet in depth. This 300 feet section of stpip will pequire a tremendous anount of steady and continuous work to complete 1 t.

1245 on Monday, a carpior line arpived from Kerema with constables Bunoda (ex leave) and Gelem, earpying mail, cash and polise personal offests. On Tuesday, const. Yan aprived from Menyamya with stores. On Wodnesday, Keroma carriers departed and another line of carpieias aprived from Menyamy with a/Interpretoz gatipanga.

Received word from the District officer at Kerama that approval has beon givcis for Kaintiba to be suppiled by aipdrop from Lae. The Dietriet Office at Lae, throuen Mr. Hicke CPO, adrised on Thurgday that an aipdrop was planned for within the next two weeks. This is what we have been waiting for.

Small amounts of freeh food purchased.
Mondar $19 / 2 / 62$ to sunday $25 / 2 / 62$ e
An average work strength of over 90 for this week. Everything is progressing well. Spent the time supervising work and putting in surface level construction mapiss. It is hoped to have the aipstrip ready for inspection by the ond of April.

Radio contaot with Mr, Hicks GPO in Lae on Tuegday Who advised that the aipdrop would take place tomorrow pending favourable weather, and that the plane would be here at about 1000. A loag convorgation with poileo at night to straighton out any problems thoy had, but nothing much was brought up.

On Wednesday mornirg all wopked on aipotrip until 1000. The Dougias DC3 was first sighted at 1052 . It made 13 drop rans, dropning 105 triple bagged packagen, and departed 1148. The items dropped conalsted mainiy of plec and meat ( $50 \times 112 \mathrm{ib}$. bags of pice and 10 cases of timise meat). The pest of the day was spent sorting out/ and storing away these rations. The overall recovery rate was 96 forcent whioh was vory high congidaring the conditigns under which this drop was made. Muoh orodit should go to those respenaible for the packing of the stores and to the TAA pilot for his earetul pesitioning of the stopes during the actual drop. All labour continued working on the aipatrip in the afternoon. Result of airdrop reported to the District Officer at Kerema.
'Work on airetrip continued until noon on Saturday.

Weekly issues of tobacso, matches, razor blades, soap and newspaper given out in the afternoon. Sunday observed except for the purchase of a small amount of fresh food.

Monday $26 / 2 / 62$ to cundav $4 / 3 / 62$.
Spent part of the time auring this week writing my Geography 2 assignment (ASOPA Correspondence course), in between supervising ecnstruction of the airstrip. The average daily work force for this week dropped to about 50, with a decine in the numbers of toth "permanent" and "casual" workers.

On Thursday at 1830, constable Bumbu arrived from Menyampa with supply carriers. Most of these Wished to remain at Kaintiba and work on the aipfield. The remainder returned to Menyamya with constable Felix on Friday. That night police and carriers arrived fror Kerema with suppiles and mail.

Weekly issues given out to police and laboureps on Saturday afternoon and mail was prepared for Kerema mail runner's departure on Monday morning. 14 people arpived from the Aseki are. looking for work.

Mondey $5 / 3 / 62$ to sunder $11 / 3 / 62$.
On Monday a IIne commenced work on the bottom ond of the airatrip, on a section of about, 400 feet in length. Ho. Steen P.O. supervised this whilst the writer remained supervising the top section. The work fosce varied from between about 80 and 110 this week and with such large numbers, the job started to speed up considerably. With the increase in strength; an aditional laboun quarters was built to accommodate them. New pit latrines were also built for dabourers.

Kaintiba has been without a battery oharger for some time and has relied on the portable A510 Tranecelver for all radio communications. On Monday night at 1830 a line of cappiers arpived from Monyamya with a new battery charger and for the next three days this was in continuous use oharging batteries for the Crammond transceiver.

On Thursday, a line of men from the Aseli area numbering 33 arrived and requested employment. These additional "aigned" workers, together inith 26 casual daily workers, brought the total number of workers to 112. A small amount of freeh food was bought during the week and weekly issues were given out on Saturday afternoon.

Mondey $12 / 3 / 62$ to Sunday $18 / 3 / 62$.
The wopl force was extremely high this week, pising to a total of 152 ( 96 permanent and 56 easuals). Most of these labourers worked on both sections of the airstrip, whilst a few conmenced the construction of another native material European residence.

On the top section, most of the hill, which was mentioned earlier, has been cut away, at least to the width of the strip. As much "rill" is still required for the oreek on the opposite side of the strip, the hill is keing further out into to find this ground. The whole section is starting to take shape now.

A complaint was made that children being looked after by members of the police detachment at Kaintiba have been itealing food from nearby village gardens. This matter was inventigated. Carpiers arpived from Menyamya with conotchle Psilx, interpretar Auwatogo and A1d Post Orderiy Semabikem on sunduy.

Nopity $19 / 3 / 62$ to sunday $25 / 3 / 62$ e
The total iabour strength varied from between 146 and 78 this week, with numbers of local "casual" workers varying from 52 to 5. Actually the labour situation is excellent now and is presenting 6 no problems. The recent alrdrop has overcome problems of supply and the airstrip construction is developing rapidly with the increased labour force. Kerema advised on Monday that extra VSC funds were sia the mail for Kaintiba and these will be extremely handy, especielly as another airdrop is planned to take place soon.

Menyamya carriers departed on Monday morning with constable Yan and a/Interpreter Patipaaga. Wednesday, on investigation of an assauit on a woman who had been strucis on the head with a tomahawk and who had come into the aid-post for medical attention. Police minners aprived late on Thurscay afternoon with mail, etc., from Kerema.

011 change and general overhall of battery charger on Friday morning. Saturday, constable EvGvo departed for Kerema With capriers and a sick labourer who was to be capried to the Taupi Piver to a village below Hells Gate and then taken to Kukipi by canoe. This labourer is from the Kwambega area (on the opposite side of the Tauri piver) and proved to be of great assistance in making contact with the people during a patrol into that area which the Writer accompanied early lust year. He had previously spent a term in prison at Kerema for murder and during that time he had learnt to speak poilee Motuo He was the firgt person from the other side of the Tauri piver to remain and work hore and he was rery popular with the people of this area. Ho had been siok for about to daye and had not reaponded to medical treatment at a11. - (This ran was diagnosed by the Doetor at Kercma to be suffering Proc a chronic heart cosplaint and it was stated that it was remarkable that he ever repched Kerema alive. He was continue ally being drainedof fluid frci all parts of his body and aithough he improved considerably, had little chance of survival and later died in hospital).

A death by suicide was reported and investigated on Sunday. This took place about one mile from here.

## Mondey $26 / 3 / 62$ to Sundey $1 / 4 / 62$ e

Labour streng th averaged about 60 for the weak, but numberg of local dally workers showed a marked decrease. This week the final construction pegs were put into the top hill section of the airstrip. An extension of approximately 250 feet is possible past the tcp end of this near finished hill section, and this will require finly the removal of tree stumps and top-soil and the levelling by aye of the surface. A lot more work is required to fils to the top of the level marics on the oreek side of the previously mentioned hill section.

On Monday Mr. Hicks again called from the Distriet orfice at Lae advising of the next aipdrop to take place next week and on Thursday advice came through that it would be the following Thursday.

On licnday a rumour was sard that natives from tha area between here and Kaingo were preparing to make an attack on the base camp. These people were sent for and a few that came in were spoken to and given a firearms demonstration. Necessary precautions were taken night with th posting of police guards.

Gappieps aprived from Menyamya on Tuesday with constables $Y$ an and Nandokot (ex hospitalisation Lae) and three Menyamya police. Word had been reseived at Mosyamya of a disturbance in the Hamdel area, and the ADO at Menyanya saw fit to send the extra police.

Thursday, the Menyamya carriers departed with Menyamya police escorts and constable Bunoda from this detachneat. ${ }^{0}$ Issues given out on Saturday afternoon.

Mendey $2 / 4 / 62$ to sunday $8 / 4 / 62$.
The everage daily labour force for this week was again above 100 , and work on the airfield progresued well. At the top end of the seri?. Wcric continued on the hili section whilat Mr. Steen conktrued 1 ith construction and supervision of the section at the bottom ond of the airstrip.

The second airdrop to Kaintiba took place on Monday and this azain showed a remarikable 96 percent recovery. This was fortunate though, as 9 bags were accidentally dropped into the valley about $1 \frac{1}{2}$ miles from here and from a great height. These bags were brought in by local people who had seen them fail into the thick busb, and practically everything was in good opder (mainly pice and meat). The airdrop took almost half an hour from 0900, in which the Douglas DC3 made 5 drop runs. The stores mainly consisted of pice, meat and sugar and also badly needed items of traie such as tomahawks, large bush knives and giri-giri shell. The Agriculture Department at Kerema organised for English seed potatoes to be dropped for planting, but these were badly damaged and most rotted.

On Wednesday, a carrier line arrived from Menyamya and these carriers departed with constables Japi and Kekera on Saturday. Weekiy issues given out on Saturday afternoon to poliee and labourers.

Monday $9 / 1,62$ to sunder $15 / 4 / 62$
The average lakour force remalned at about 100 this week. Stump and topre011 removal and levelling began on the section at th top end or the ailpfield. This began on Wednesday and should not take very long to complete. In fact, a few move weeks is all that will be required to have the airstrip ready for the inspection landing, thut is if the labour atrongth is maintained.

A pollce party failed to apprehend the male adult Aiworo of Haragini village who had struck the woman who had laid a complaint about three weeks ago when she came in for medical treatiment. A number of people rrom Hapagini viilage were brought to the base camp on Tuesday, and they admitted that Aiwozo had struak the complainant on the head with his tomahawk during a heated arguément. These people were told that Aiwore would oventually be caught and that it would be better for them to bring him in now and avoid any further trouble, Aiwora was brought in on Thursday and he was sentencsd to one months imprisomment in the Gourt of Native Matters (Case No. KAI 7/61-62).

On Monday, the battery charger was given an ail change. A large number of peopls came to the camp and these were given a taik on assisting the Administration and other matters. Constable Evovo arrived at 1400 with mail from Kerema.

A report had come in that the cane suspersion bridge over the Tauri river, between Mambanya and Kwambegr villages, was badly damaged. Two constables, Yan and Gelem, together with 4 labourers (2 as interpreters) were sent to recryit people from Mambanya and Kwambega to repair the bridge. This pariy left on Thursaay morning and the police were given trade items to pay labourers and rations for one week,

Constable Banoda together with a/Interpreter Patipanga and 8 carriers departed for Kerema at 0830 on Friday. Weokly issues were given out on Saturday afternoon. Small amounts of fresh food were purchased during the week.

Kondar $16 / 4 / 62$ to sunder $22 / 4 / 62$.
This week saw a concentratsi effort on the hill section filling in part of the oreek which runs along the side of the airstrip. The progreas appears to be slow as "rill" is required up to a depth of 16 feet, but this is the last major job to be completed before the airstrip is opened for inspection.

## 6.

With on average work forse of over 100 again, and due to the fact that Mr. Steen had some of the police and labourers on patrol.
over Easter, it was decided to work during this period, except for Good Friday, and to give police, etc., the equivalent number of daye hollday at a later date. Many of the "signed" lubourers work for only a week or two, so to give them almost a weeks spell would not be practical. Those labourers who have worked for a long time will be given time off later also.

On Monday, constable Kekera arrived Prom Menyamya at 1800 with a line of 13 carriers all requesting work. Constabie $1 / \mathrm{C}$ Lausewa and constable Handokot departed for Menyamya on Tuesday with a small line of 5 carriers, the latter policeman to return to Lae for further medical treatment for his cirposis of the liver complaint. Light rain interrupted work on the airstrip a ilttle on Wednesday. The a/District Orficer at Kerema adviaed by redio on Thursday that constable Bunoda had been troubled by natives on the road below Nangonai, on his way through to Karema. Mr steen at once prepared to proceed to the area and investigate.
ur. Steen departed at 0930 on Good Friday togethiv with 4 police, N.M.O., and 20 carriers. The line sent to repais the Tauri pirer bridge returned at 1800. They had been unsuccessiul at repairing it as in its present state it was imposaible to cross to the other side of the river nd it was necesaary to have another party on the other side wo tie the cane. The flooded state of the rives also prevented a sape orossing and the polise had been instructed to exercise care and not to take any risks. As it is intended to put in two other bridges over the Tauri river at different points, it might be worth conaldering the construction of something of a more permanent desigm, perhaps by using wire instead of cane on the sections subject to the greatest strain.

A little trouble experienced with constable Yan on Saturday afternoon. This matter will be left until Mp. Steen returns from his investigation and an orderly room charge will be la a againat the above constable. Weakly issues given out on Saturday afternoon. Sunday observed.

Mondar $23 / 4 / 62$ to Sundar $29 / 4 / 62$ a
Labour strength again remained high at over 100 for the week except on Saturday when about 50 wished to be paid off. All of these Labourers continued to fill in oreek towards the top end of the airstrip.

Mr. Steen returned at 1515 on Tuesday from Mangonad.
One of the Yaba survivors contacted on Friday
afternoon. He was questioned as to the whereakouts of the Suprame Court witnesses. The four that will have to go to Kerema are Watama, Pungawagabu and Wawendo who can be found locally, and Hapigaura who is living near Nangonai. There will be no troulie invilived in locating these witnesses, in fact they have been continually coming to the camp and at times enquiping absut when they are to go to Kerema for the Coupt. It is obvious that they received the VIP treatment when they went to Kerema foy the lower couct hearing of the "Yaba massscre".

The airstrip is almost ready for inspection. The new "I:: 2 " has consolidated beautifully, but the strip will remain clesec for another two weeks to allow further consolide.tion, and to give time for the cleaning of the supface pebbles, eto., the removal of construction page and the clearing of approaches. The clearing of the strips suriace will be done almost last. It is not a big job, and the rubbish and pebbles help to preserve 15 the surfaci by arresting warer eposion which is severe due to the heavy rainfall and the ateep slope of the airfield.

Monday $30 / 4 / 62$ to Sunday 6/5/62.
This week the labour atrength has reduced considerably. On Tc.esday a line of 20 carriers went to Menyamya escorted by constrble Bumbu to sollect stores and 14 other lavourers were paid off. Also there were very fow losal day workers. A fev mall jobs were done at both ends of the airstrip consisting msinly of levelling the ground.

Spent Monday and Tuesday supervising labour and also planted some vegetable seeds. At 1745 constable Bunoda arrived with carriers from Kerema sarrying mail and a few stores. Office returns on Wednesday as well as the supervision of Labour.

On Thursday, cormenced the chala and sompase surrey of the proposed Kaintiba station boundaries. This was continued for the whole of the week, caloulations and plotting being done daily for each sestion surfeyed. In general, the survey follows the traverse cut by Mr. Hisks GPO during December last year.

At about 1500 on Filday, the Menyamya cacriers returned with mail and personal stores. Weckly issues were given out to police and labourers on Saturday afternoon. A small ilne of casuals working on the airstrip on Sunday.

Mondar $7 / 5 / 62$ to Tuesder $8 / 5 / 62$ e
0.
completed survey of station land and spent Monday afternoon drawing plan. By careful plotiling, the misclose in the survey was found to be approximately one pereent which is acoeptable in such surveys. The necessary adjus tmonts to the diagram were made. Including traverses, the land is enclosed by 32 sides, consieting of 6 main out linea and 26 traverse lines foliowing creeks or ridges. The area of the land is approximately 93 acree and in general its boundaries follow well dorined natural features. Alpfield extension and clearances have been considered and adequate provision made in thia respect. An ideal atation building site is situated in the south-east corner of the land.

Tuesdaly apent measuring the airstrip and positioning it on the station plan and adding other relavent features.

Wednesdav $9 / 5 / 62$ to Sunday $13 / 5 / 62$.
During this period all levelling jobs were uompleted and labour out timber and cleared the area past the top end of the airstrip. It is only a matter of clearing the pebbies, eto., from the strip's surface now and removing the construction pegs. On Thursday, the top of a large stone near the centre of the airstrip which was protruding above the surface by about six inches was broiken off by the use of fire and urowbars. The stone was "cooked" all night and broke easily in the morning.

Carriors arrived back from Menyanya on Thuradey. A
 Friday concerning th Tauri river bridge. Nothing is derinite yet, but the Distriet Commissioner hus been approsched and he 18 in favour of having something permanent put in. Ile has auggeated $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wire cable.

A police parti" of six rationed to leave early on Saturday morning to attempt to locate a suspected murderer. 32 casual worisers worked on Saturday afternoon and approximately the same number volunteered for worls on Sunday. Weekiy issues given out to police aad labourers on Saturday afternoon.

## Monday $14 / 5 / 62$.

All labour clearing surface of airstrip and adding finishing touohes. Also the removal of construction pegs.

Conversatioa with the a/Distriet Orficer advising that the airairip will be open for inspestion as from tomorrow,
pending favourable weather. There has been ro rain in the last five days and with windless and almost cloudiess mornings, the conditions for a landing have been perfect. Mr. Carey queried the slope of the strip. The hill sestion, towards the top end of the strip, is about 300 feet long and has an even gradient of 19 percent. This means that on this section, for every 100 feet in length, the strip rises 19 feet. In 1350 feet the strip rises almost 200 feet. This matter was cleared up. Mr. Carey also queried the condition of the "fill" at the point of "touch-down". It was pointed out that this ground had consolidated well and was very solid.

Tuesday $15 / 5 / 62$.
Labour working at the bottom end of the aipfield but on a section outside the dimensions of the strip indieated for tise initial inspeotion.

Mr. R.I.Skinner, Executive Officer, Polioy and Planning Diviaion of the Department of the Administrates, phoned to check a few points about the slope, condition and so on, of the airatrip. Mp. skinner also gave instruetions for the marizing of rock outcrops on the airstrip and for the lighting of fipes to indieate the direction of the wind.

Wednesder $16 / 5 / 62$.
Approximately, 45 permanent and 50 easual worzers continuing with yesterday's work. In the morning, 32 labourers taken off the etrip to out timber in readiness for building an alditional roof over the residence/orfice/store. The original one, due to insurfisiont sloge, was beginning to leak badly.
1000 Mr. skinner again phoned to adp-.. that the
inspection aould take place on Priday hext, and the yiane vould
arrive at about 1030. A DCA airport engineer, Mr. George
intoiliffe, will corry out the inspection and he will be flown in
by STOL aimaye sesena plloted by Ron Fims.
Westher conditions remained good, but the afternoons
are tonding to cloud over.

## Thuraday $17 / 5 / 62^{2}$

A final elear-up of the airstrip today. Also the framework of the office roof almost completed.

Gut two 4 gallon drums to be used to build wind airection fires in. These were filled with dry grass and put under shelter for the night.

Ford was sent out to the local peoples inviting them to come to the baso camp tomoprow and see the firet plane land. Very ? ew of these people have over seen a stationary plano berore, and their concoption of such a thing is fasoinating. Many men, women and ohildren carrying personal posisessions, food, smail. pige, doge, etc., arpived late in the afternoon prepared to sleep in houses near the station.

Friday $18 / 5 / 62$.
Marked the ends of the airstrip with gisaleraft and the rock outorops with white calico. The labourers were givem no regular work today.

By about 0930 approximately 300 local poople had assembled, by far the most people ever seen at Kaintiba at the one time. These people Fere almost as excited as the station personnel at the thought of the plane ocming today.

## 9.

Word came through in the morning that the plane will
be delayed due to mechanical difficulties at Port Moresby. EIIPs were obtained at hourly intervals during the mfternoon until advice came through that the plane would be departing Moresby at 1500. An ETA at about 1645 advised that the plane had missed us and had landed at Menyamya to re-fuel. Then at 1715 the plane
as sighted and after ciraliag orse it landed. Light rain had just started to iall. A trial takeoff and landing was performed. and Hr. Steen and myself wre then taken up for a short ride.

Messrs. Antelifie and Firns remained the night.

## Saturdey $19 / 5 / 62$.

Ir. Antcilife inspected the airstrip. He indicated a necessary iraprovement of placing "fill" to form a more even curve at the point of hange in gradient between the sections of 11 and 19 percent slope. Plane departed 0900.
a line roofing office. 12 basual workers continued on roof in the afternoon. Constable Bumbu aprived from Henyamya with a small line early in the afternoon. Weekly issues also given out in the afternoon.

## Sunday $20 / 5 / 62$.

Observed. Constable Tore aprived from Kerema soon after noon with a emall carrier line carryips mail.

Mondey $21 / 5 / 62$ to sundey $27 / 5 / 622$
An average inbour foree of about 50 this woek, comprising about 30 permanent and 20 casual workers. All of these nontinued eutting bamboe leaves for residense/office roof on Monday and half the line completed the job on Tresday.

On Yondeyg together with three police, pegged out the curve at the join of the 11 and 19 percent slopes with pege at a distance of 10 feet apart both along and acrose the etrip. Fhe length of the curve was made about 110 foet, with the maximum lepth of "fili"" required being oniy 10 inches. The half of the labour not werking on the office poof on Tuesday, began placing "fili" to the top of the pege in this eupre. All labour comtinued with this job on Wedaesday and sompleted it on Thupaday.

The grase mentioned in my previous popost, KMR 14 of 1961/62 under the heading of 'Airetripa', ic growing well. The grass is found growing on riuge tops surrounding Kaintiba. It is necessary to go ahead with close planting of this grass now, to proteot the surface of the strip from water erosion. Grass planting by all labourers on Friday and Saturday momilng. Weekly isaces given out on saturday afternoon.

On Sundey afternoon a mall gipl was brought to the aid-post with a broken orf spear inside her. she had fallem into a pig trap (pit) which had a spear atuck upright in the ground at its botiom. This spear entered her anus and the poin), onded up just under the skin next to her spine and half way up her back before the shaft broke awcy. The father of the child had out to the point of the spear with a rayor blade, but whon unable to remove it, had had the presence of mind to bring the ohild te the ald-post. Medical opderiy Laufa did an excellent job in pemoving the epear, worlsing confidentally under very hygionic conditione. A very capable Meüiasl orderly.

The Distriet Orfice at Lac onquired on Monday if Kaintiba will require azother airdrop this finaneial year. It is diffieult to say at this stage for as yot the strip has mot beem approved for commereial filghts. Also no pegular mupply service has been arranged. Another consideration 20 sunds. present VBC
funds would havdly be sufficient to fill a DC3 for an alrdrop. The matter was put into the hands of the $a / D i s t r i c t ~ O f f i c e r ~ a t ~$ Kerema.

## Mondar 28/5/62 to Sunday 3/6/62.

An average labour force of about 40 spent till Wednesdey planting grass. This is a coarse couch type grass which grows slowiy in the unfertile soil of the airstrip which has had its top-sodi removed. Clusters of grass were planted at intervals of about two feet.

At 1045 on Wednesday a Worics Department representative, Mr. Ken Jarvis, came in by STOL airways cesana to inspect the rock outcrops on the airstrip. He advised that on operator with a compressor and explosives would be able to complete the job in abovit four days. He also advisec that this could be done quite soon. It will be required to bring in four cessne loads of equipment. The new"fill" at the ourve put in last week has not consolidated properly as yet, so this will be done manually. The airstrip was closed for one week to allow time for this to be done.

Blocks with hanciles were made to pound the unconsulidated eapth and this was very successful. This work continued from Thursday until yain the end of the week. The Distriet Offise at Lae had apranged for our stores, which had been left over from the subond airdrop, to be brought in by cessna, but with the strip closed, this movement was postponed for one weok.

On Monday constable Nabo and a/Interpreter Patipanga escorted line of carriers to Menyrmya carrying a total of 100 copra bags cone up in bundies and addressed to the Dintriot Officer, Lee, to be used in the event of arother airdpop to here. On Tuesday a small line of labousers were paid off and these carried the remaining 40 bags. On Saturday constable Evovo expived from Menyamya with stores and mall.

Eight of the owners of in Intiba land oame in on Thursiay and anked when they were to goo payment for their land. These men were told to come in again on Friday together with all of the other owners to walk around the proposed boundaries. In the meantime the names of those that did come in were taken and matters concerning the purchase of land, food trees, gardens and improvements were discussed. The land owners were not eeen again this week.

Mr. Steen ereoted the wind sock near the bottom end and to the right of the airstrip on Friday. Weekly issues to labour and police on Saturday afternoon.

Monder $4 / 6 / 62$ to sunder $10 / 6 / 62$.
An average labour force of a little ever 40 this week. Most of the time spont improving the track from Kaintiba to Menyamya. This involves the cutting of timber followed by the digging of a level pathway with spades, and the ereeting of timber bridges at the opossing points of the numerous amell ereeks.

AVLAT advised on Tuesday that, as from now, the Kaintiba airstrip is officially open to category "D" airorait. The strip remains open subject to a daily pre-operational strip report which is to be sent by radiogram addressed ' Oollcot, Weather, Aviat, Moresby' until a DCA aeradio erystal is obtained for us.

Seed potatoes and othor seeds supplied by DASF being On Saturday morning, line replaoing ground where rain has caused the washing of smail watercourses across papts of the strip.

Monday, the Queen's birthday holiday, was observed With a small line of casuals working on the airstrip. A line of 15 carriers departed for Menyamya on Monday, escorted by ronstable Japi. Constables Kekera and Yan arpived from Kerema at 1430 on Friday end a line arrived with constable Nabo from Menyamya on Saturday at 1500. Weekly issues were given out on flaturday afternoon.

Monday $11 / 6 / 62$ to Sunday $17 / 6 / 62$.
An average of 35 workers for the week, mainly continuing with the Kaintiba-Menyamya walking track.

Mr, Ashton, $a /$ District Commissioner Morobe Distriet, phoned on Monday to say that he will be coming in on Wednesdey' flight from Lae, which will be carrying stores. Weather conditions on Wednesday deteriorated and the pilot was unable to locate the airstrip. Mr. Anteliffe, the DCA airport ongineer, phoned on Thureday to say that he will be coming into Kaintiba on Monday and with him will come a curveyor who will remain for about a week and survey the airfield for the purpose of drawing up a design.

Constable Bunoda escorted 10 carriers to Menyamya on Monday. Spent Friday working on final corpespondence course assigmment - Anthropolngy 3. A group of about 12 men aprived on Saturday afternoor. from the Taupi piver area below Hauwabanga, requesting wopk. Constable Japi arrived with carriers from Menysmya on Sunday, accompaniod by constable $1 / \mathrm{C}$ Gaiko who is required asa a Crown witness in the Suprome Court at Kerema, when the case of the "Yaba massacre" is heard.

## Monday $18 / 6 / 62$.

Crowley aisways cessna came in at 1300 with eargo from Lae. Mr. Ashton accompanied the filght and made an informal inspection of the base camp and departed after about an hour.

At about 1430, sTOL cessna arpived with Mp. Anteliffe and Mr. Leke who will remain and survey the airstrip. Mr. Anteliffe krought with him a DCA aeradio erystal and tested it successfully. From now on, this will be used daily instead of having to send a radiogram through RTC.

Constable Tore accompanied 23 carpiers to Menyamya.

Tuesday $19 / 6 / 62$.
Packing rations, etc., for journey to Kerema. A papty sent out to locate witnesses, but returned oniy with Watama and Pungawagabu. The otiner two, wawendo and Hapigauwa, were at Nangonal anu the police sent on word for these to be ready to go to Kerama in two or three days time.

Purchased approximately 1500 lbs. of fresi foodeturfs during the day.

Kr. Leke surveging airstrip and being assisted by several pollee and labourers.

Wednesdey $20 / 6 / 62$.
Packing stores and personal requirements for an early doparture in the morning. Constable Kekera sent on in advaree with two carpiers carrying rice. An ex Kukukuku policeman, Mokekauma, who was used as an intespreter in the lower court hearing of the "Yaba massacre" at Kerema, and who is required at the supreme Court, complained during the afternoon that he had developed a siol siekness and that he would be unable to walk to Kerema tomorrow. prepared a stretcher and eventually found a line of 12 extra carriers to carry himo This oxtra ine was issued with rations and,

Constable Konari and a/Interpreter Patipanga are to accompany this line.

The main party consists of constables Evovo and Kanal (both required for the Coronial inquiry into the death of Patrol Officer Anderson), constable $1 / \mathrm{C}$ Gaiko and 5 other male witnesses (required for the Supreme Court), constable Nabo, 10 earriers, personal servant and myself.

Trouble experienced by Mr. Steen with constable Kanal during the day. This policeman, although good bushman and worker, is becoming an intolarable burden.

Thuradey $21 / 6 / 62$ e
Stretcher case sent off at 0715. Constable Kanal decided in the morning that he was not going to Xerema, but he was reminded that he is required for the Coronial inquiry and he procesded to prepare himself.

Departed Kaintiba 0745, apriving at the pass above the two large peaked mountains, Visible from Kaintibs, at 1100 and arpived at the Werp piver camp bGlow Mangonai at 1515. This is the site of the first camp made by Mr. Carey ADO on his way to Kerema from Kaintiba after investigating the Yaba incident. pieked up witness Wawendo hore.

There is evidence of a concerted offort at improving the walking track between Kaintiba and the Werp pirer camp site. From where the station labourers finished working the track at the Kaintiba end, the looal people have continued it for quite a distance. In she vioinity of the peaked mountains, on either side, the olearing has only been done in mall sections, but near the Werp camp is a lengthy section of well cleared track.

15 nen and 4 womon came in with fresh food to trade. They reported that there is no trouble in the area. Constable Konari is did not reach the Werr river to camp. stretchor bearing is extremely difficult in this terpain, and Mokekauw spent most of the day walking slowly.

## Friday $22 / 6 / 62$.

Departed from the Werr camps at 0700 and olimbed to Nangonai arpiving 0815. Witness Hapigauwa was not waiting and so there was a delay whilst several locals went to find him. Constable Konari and party caught up at about 1200 and Mokokauwu reported chat he felt much better now and that he would be able to waik. Eight of the capriers were seat back to Kaintiba with a note for Mr. Steen. Hapigauwa came in and after giving a present of tobacco to the old Nangonal councillor, departed at 1245 and arpived at Tuwin at 1645.
srall sections of cleared road were seen both near Nangonal and Tuwin. Purchased a mall ampunt of freeh food at Tuwin and gave a present of tobaceo to the councillor. Spent the night in partiy completed square type houses built recently by the people of Tuwin.

Saturday $23 / 6 / 62$ e
Departed from Tuwin at 0650 and al cived at Kotal village, on the Taupi piver and at the junction of the Kapau river, at 1730. As instrueted, constable Kekera was waiting at this village. A present of moneg was given to the councillop and his son for their assistance to polise parties, over the past six months, in erossing the river.

Sunday $24 / 6 / 62$.
The entire party is together now. Departed Kotal at

0730, travelling downstream by canoe for one hour and then walking over comparatively level sountry to reach Didigaina at 1515. This village has a Kukukuku population of 53. It has only recently shifted from where the Koaru people are now growing coffee and it is a very clean and tidy village situatedon the Maiporo oreek. Gave a present of money to the Lil3 misøion pastor who has been of great assiatance to police parties moving through the area. A smull rest house was built by the people to give these parties somewhere to sleep. Listened to a marriage complaint at night.

Monday 85/6/62.
Departed from D1digaina at 0730, erpiving at the Koaru coffee area at 1040 and Xoazu village at 1310. Spoke with Mr. and Mrs. Yates, LMs missionapies at Koaru, and thos proceeded to Karama village, arpiving 1605. Here met Mp. A.B. Wales of the Agriculture Department at Kerema.

Tresday $26 / 6 / 62$.
Kereme at 1300 . pod from Karama village at 0730 and arriva a the Kerema Bub-Distriot.

Attended to carpiers, witnesses and pollee.

> - End of Diayy --

During most of the period of this report, chere has been pressure on the recruiting of local labour for construction of the airstrip here at Kaintiba. Overall, the assistanae given by the local peoples was invaluable although at many times their strength in numbers was not great.

Contact has been maintained by the visits of the people to Kaintiba to sell fresh food, to work or to come in for discussions, Carpier lines with police escorts have been continually moving between here and Menyemya and between here and Kerema. On occasions, these parties have brought in people from distant viliage areas, but this is practically the only contact these distant villages have had. There is now a naed for patrols to enter these distant areas to commence a general consolidation of insluence throughout the entipe area which comes under the Jurisdiction of Kaintiba. Thic work will be extremely interesting.

There is need for a patrol through the area between Kaintiba and the Werp piver headwaters. Nothing sepious has occurred to warpant a hurried movement into the area, but froun a series of complaints and rumours, it appears that this particular area, in parta, is a $1 i^{*}$. unsettiled.

Muricis and bad assault cases are repopted from time to time and every attempt is being made to see that justice is done and at the same time taking into consideration the ignorance to the law thess people have shown in the past due to 1 imited contact. Most of the properganda talks given to the people have been based on the part the Govenment is playing in the maintaining of law and order and how this will be carried out in this area. The advantages of a system of law have been explained and the people, in general, appear very enthusiastic.

There have been several small incidents which suggent a slight resistance to the work of administering this area. It is felt sure that this will be overcome when consolidation work be is with regular patroling. This, it is hoped, will begin soon, now that the emphasia has been taken off the construction of the airstrip.

An attempt has been made at improving the main walking tracks in the vioinity of the station, and the people have been encouraged to extend these tracks through their own areas. So far, from what has been seen, the people have gone ahead considerably with this work and appear keel to do it properiy. A zrmber of requests have already been received from differens eress to borpow spades for this purpose.

In general, all matters being considered, the native situation is quite satisfactory and it will improve capidiy with the advent of regular patrolling.

## (b) GEMGRAL

Little work has been necassary on the base camp during these five months. Pit latrines have, from time to time, been re-built and repairs made on different buildings. The only new buildings have been an extra labour quarters and another Eupopean native material quarters.

The aipfield wae approved for categozy "D" aircraft duping the period of this report and Kaintiba is now supplied by regular weekiy cassna flights which are sufficient for the suppiying of Administration personnel und general station requirements. Arrangements will be necessary to have additional means of supply when work commences on improving and extending the airfield. These
arrangements will have to origirate with the Department of Works. It might be some considerable time before the airstrip can be app oved for category "g" aireraft, and cmtil such time, it is felt that Kaintiba can only remain in its base camp stage. Conditions are gradually being improved and the base camy is quite comfortable.

Some of the members of the polioe detachment have sequested and have been allowed to cor truct for themselves, in their spare time, their own houses apart from the two barracks built for the purpose of their accommodation. Although the writer was not enthusiasicic about the matter at the time, it has singe shown to have given the individuals a feeling of pride, as they have, without exception, keyt these zouses in a high standard of cleanliness.

## (c) population

As stated carlier, there is a gre t need for patrolling to commence soon. At this stage it is thought that it will be at least a year before an initial census can be carried out. In ceptain areas the census could be properly done now, but it is felt that influence must be consolidated before this task is carpied out in the areas which have had the least amount of contact.

The appointment of village councillors as apokesmen for particular groups has begun and if suitabio, these may be appointed as village constables. Once the areas are opened up in this way, and the peoples' confldence is obtained, then they could be censussec. Fipstly, it might prove advantageous to group the people into different divisions having a central administering point for each marked with a rest house.

## NATIVE AGRICULTURE AND LTVESTOCK

These people remain as primitive subsistance
agriculturalists. They have an abundauce of land, but their soil is extremely poor, or at least the soil in the visinity of Kaintiba is. Methods of cultivation are not practiced. Food plants are meraly thrust into a hole in the ground made with a stick and the surrounding soil is not broken. Perhaps oultivation has been found impossible due to the steep sloping country and an annual painfall estimated to be about 200 inches.

Perhaps better yielding verieties of foodetuffs could be introduced, but it is felt that there is iittle scope for inprovement for these people agriculturaily, Domestie pigs are not plentiful and thuse that have been seen were very small.

## ROADS AND BRTDGES

It is hoped that improved walking tracks will be built throughout the entire area administered by Kaintiba. This wild entail the clearing of buah on elther side of the existing tracks to an average width of about 15 feet, and then with the use of spades, digging a narpow walking track with eteps on the steeper slopes and bridges over the numerous Greeks. Spades could be lert under the care of village officials, when they are appointod, for maintaining these roads.

At present, such improved trauke have been started from Kaintiba by station labour. One follows the track to the Wers river headwaters (route followed when walking to Menyanya) for about $1 \frac{1}{\frac{1}{8}}$ miles, another in the opposite dipection to the lower Wers valley (leeding to Kerema, Via Koaru village on the coast) for about $1 \frac{1}{2}$ miles and the other up the mountain to the west of Kaintiba for about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile to IKOHEA village area.
two walkin The people have already commenced to extend the latter ag tracks and five spades were recently loaned to the people of IKOHEA for such work. Almost everyone visiting Kaintiba walk's along these improved tracks and in this way they will see the advantages of such improvements. Also, together with the rest houses, they will symbolise a link between all areas and their administering centre at Kaintiba as well as assisting greatly in patrol work.

The cane suapension bridge across the Tauri piver between Mambanya and Kwambega is badly damaged, and it will be a fairly big job to repair it. As discussed in the diary of this report, it is hoped to be able to obtain wire cable to use on the sections of this bridge which are subject to the greatest strain.

It is hoped to cut a shorter overland route to Kerama by orossing the Tauri river between the junctions of the Yaba and Werr rivers with the Tauri, and joining the existing Kerema/Kwambegad Kaintiba track at perhaps Paina or Ivana. It is believed that there exists a cane suspension bridge at this point on the Tauri piver, built by village people living in that vicinity. If possible, it might be of great advantage to use wire cables to streng then this bridge. Aleo a orossing point of the Tauri river is necessary between the villages of Hauwabanga and Pau(on the west side). The presence of permanent bridges at these points would greatly assist the movement of parrols and would enable patrols to petupn to Kaintiba by a different route without difficulty and loss of time.

## MISSIONS



Up to date, correspondente has been received from the New Tribes Mission of Bulolo, the New Guinea Lutheran Mission of Lae and Aseki and the Austrailan Lutaerar Misaion at Kenyamya. These missions have recently been sending native mission workers to Kaintiba to contact the local people and to enquire about mission sites, etc. Other missions that have indicated their interest in the area, in different ways, are the London Missionary Society at Koaru, the Roman Catholic Mission at Lae(it is thought that this mission now regards the area as being too far their zone) and perhaps the Seventh Day Adventiet Mission also of Lae.

The lew Guinea Latheran Mission appears to have done a good job at Aseki in helping in the development of that area. This is evident in the fine type of native which ccmes to Kaintiba from Aseki to seek employment. The mission has already sent in native workers and these, after seeking our advice and after gaining permission from the landowners, have constructea a temporary building for accommodation purposes. Soveral of their European missionaries will be visiting this station towards the end of August. This mission has its own light aireraft service.

## FUZCHASE OF NATIVE ROODSTUFPS

A considerable amount of fresh food is being brought to Kaintiba to trade. It is apparent that the peopie have been growing extra foodstuffs for this purpose. The average amount brought in would supplement the issue of rice for about the equivalent of two days in each week. Matches, beads and girg-girl shells are the most common trade items used, but the people are beginning to develop an interest in cash payments.

AIRSㄱTRIPS
A considerable amount of work is required to complete the airstrip for the purpose of trying to oring it up to eatepryy " C "
standapd. Frai the comments voiced by the various pilots who have seen tnis airstrip, the general opinion is that wh Otter aiperaft could cu'te easily land and take off from it now, but the specifications of leng th and width are not sufficient for it to be approved for category "C" oppivations by the Departnent of Civil Aviation.

An engineering survey of the airfield has been done and further work on this project will begis as soon as a dosign has been drawn up and funds are made avillable. Aftck ail of the rook outcrops have been exposed, the Department of Worics intends to have these removed by the use of explosives.

Grass has beed planted over the suriace of the aipstrip and although it is growing well, it has not grown quickly enough to prevent severe surface arosion. The grase is now holding the aupface quite well and in 3 to 4 months time there should be little worry of eposion.
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## LABOUS

The number of workeng eroployed on both b,ise camp and airfield works appears, fro. the to time, in the ditary section of th this patrol report. In geweral, the numbers ware sufficient, mainiy because there was a shortege of spades and shovels for the aipileld wosk. Prier to, and during the peried of this ropopty at least thres requisttions for spades were non-stcolsad. Aetually this shortage of tools began apparent only when the labous force exceeded about 100. Copra bags used in the airdrep were ext-amely helpful for making stretehers to carry the ground.

Kt this stage, the labour forse, due to lack of fands and the discontinuation of the aipfield construetion, hes been reduced considerably. As soon as wark egein begipsg oin enieavour will be maca to recruit labour from the actacent Menyamya and Aseki areas as weli as from local soupe 3 .

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## SONCLUSIOK

Even though occasional mupders are taking, place in thas area, the people, after less than twelve months of ountinyious contac i, have reasted amazingiy to the Adminiatration's influence, and a bright future is predieted fa this respect. Day by day the number of attendances to the aid-post in inereasing, and the penple are benefifing greatly from the sare which they are peceivirg.

They have assisted greatly in their own developrent, Which is essential and which is to be encouragod at tris stige. They ure now building improved tracks which will be of benefit to both the Adrinistration and the poople theraselves. During aiopield and base camp construction, the local people worv invalusiole in thoip aesistance by supplying labour and at times firesh food.

The ownere of the Kaintisia 1 and ire willing to 1011 to the Administration. The area of the land is approximately 93 aeres, which providea for the air crip as well as for an axcellent atation building site at its southreast ond. An investigation report has already been submitted on tins lana and it mas found that this 1 and could quite easily be dispored of by the native people. These same people have indicated that they are willing to sell a small arya, adjoining the southern borior of thr station area, to the Hew Guineu Lutheran Missisn, but this has yet $t$ be agplied for.

There atill remains a lot of wevk to be dono here at Kaintiba and in the area administered by the Kaintiba Patrol yoatThe station work will continue steacily in conjunetion with peguiar

## Medical and Health

Medical Orderly Laufa Korasi from Kerema was stationed at Kaintiba during the period of the above report ( February to June 1962). His monthly Aid Post reports were sent to Menyamya as required and supplies were requisitioned through the Public Health Department at Menyamya. Now, with a regular weekly plane service, Port Moresby/Terapo/Kaintiba, it is being organised for the requisitioning of supplies to be done through the PHD at Kerema to prevent difficulties in organisation arising out of having to have these stores carried overland from Menyamya.

Treatinents of the major complaints were as follows (figures taiken from the monthly Aid post reports submitted by mo Laufa.).

Guts were shown as another common treatunent, and there were some cases of malaria and a little diarxhoea. Eractically all of the listed treatmente were given to local village people and not roreign etation and airfield labourers. An excellent means of contact was experiencod in this respect and the fedioel Orderly gave the people every encouragenent to come in for treatment. He proved himself very popular with the paople, by his willingness to help them.

It has been noted that the officer-in-Charge has, on many ocoasions by memo to PHD Keroma, praised the work of MO Lauta. He is a coridentious worker who worke under very hygienic conditiona, h.e is capable of doing the work of a person more highly qualified, and what is more, he is a perfect gentleman. It is certainly hoped that approval was given to his receiving camping allowance for the perind of his absence from Kerema.

Your memo 67-2-23 of 7 th November 1952 para 5 refers.
On my inspections of the station, police discipline has been strictly maintained. Police daily parades and roll calls are held and periods of drill are undertaken at regular intervals. At least half the detachment were, at their posting, trainees with ar average of less than 2 years service and considering this factor, plus conditions encountered, I feal that the detachment has put up a reasonably good performance. The lack of married accommodation precluded, in these early stages, the advantages of an experienced N.C.O. and the present Countable $1 / \mathrm{C}$ in charge of the detachment has lacked experience.

In respect Const.GELEM, action was taken by the O.I.C., Mr . Steen, in the Court for Native Matters and he was fined £2 for the assault. Constable KANAI was fined one months pay in Orderly Room proceedings and subsequently transferred to Moresby by order of the Commissioner of Police.

Married accommodation for police is being constructed and it is hoped that a necleus of married police can be posted to Kaintiba. The first married Constable is presently awaiting movement there from Kukipi.

I have every faith in Mr. Steen as a field officer, and in his capabilities of maintaining an effective an efficient detachment at Kaintiba.

## PATROL DIARY

## 3/5/62 Thurs. Construction of a light aircraft landing field

 at this base camp of Raintiba being coritinued.The complevion of this airstrip to a sufficient standard to allow an inspection aircraft to land now estimated to be in two weeiks time if the gradient, measurements and other conditions as set out in my previnus patrol report (\%erema 16/61-i/a). Mr . Carey, $a /$ District Officer, informed by my memo $4-1-1$ of today's date.

27 permanent labourer/carriers from Asekj and Menyamya areas working on airstrip. No local people offered for work today. (From the point of view of supply, these local workers, employed on a daily casual basis and returning each night or every few days to their homes to obtain their own food supplies. since not being dependent on government rations, are preferred to the "migrant" labourers from the Aseki and fenysmya areas in the neighbouring Morobe District who are paid a lower rate than the casusl rate paid to locais but are provided with full rations. However these local workers are rather inconsistent in their attendance with as many as 66 offering for work on one day while none at all may present themselves the next day. The construction of the airfield could not be efficiently crarried out if the local labour force were relied upon. Fortunately with the extra supplies obtained by airdrop, able to empluy most of the Meny anya and Aseki men who arrive here looking for work.)

Radio conversation $4-15 \mathrm{pm}$ with Menyamya re supplies from that point - asked to call back tomorrow after arrival of aircraft.
$4 / 5 / 62$ Frid. 25 Aseki and Menyamya labourers worrang on airstrip with no locale offering for work again today. Completion of rubbie underground drain $62^{\prime} \times 4^{\prime} \times 4^{\prime}$ filled with stones carried from nearby creeks or dug up from airfield to drain off spring towards centre of airfield. Radio conversation with District Office, Keremay and reported on airstrip progress. Constable JAPI arrived with carrier line from Menyamya with 14. earrier leads of supplies previously flown to Menyamya in T.A.A. Otter air chasters from Lae Government Stores. 1. 21/5/62 Frid. Mr. Heriot and self supervising in two sections work on airiteld with a labour force now supplemented by the extra carrier/labourers returned from Menyamya and today making a total work forse of 105 males. Radio conversation with District Office at Kerema and spoke to Mr. Carey to confirm estimate by my previous memo that airfield would be ready for inspection $b_{v}$ aircraft next Wednesday or earlier.
$12 / 5 / 62$ Sat. A total of 114 workers or airstrip work in morning and 32 of these working on voluntary overtime in afternoon in view of closeness of first plane flight in. Daily and weekly issues.
$13 / 5 / 62$ Sun. Some lajourers who volunteered to work on the Sunday for extra pay and to take advantage of the good weather while it held working on the airfield with Mr. Heriot to prepare for opening of strip in fortheoming week. Carriers arrived from Meny pmya.

14/5/62 Mon. A totel of exactly 100 men working on the dirfield. District Officer advised by radiogran that, if measurements and conditions as quoted in my previous patrol report and above memo scceptabie, as from tomorrow the airstrip ready for the initial filight for inspection purposes.
15/5/62 Tues. A very good number of 66 local men in for work on airstrip boday - probably the record for the number of locals working on strip. These locals employed on casual basis working with 25 "contract" or permanent carrier/labourers on airstrip. Radio/telephone call from Mr. R.I. Skimrer, Executive Officer, Policy and Planning Division of the Department of the Administrator, following his being advised by the District Commissioner, Mr. Murphy, of the airstrip progress. Informed by Mr.Skinner that he wovila advise further after this conversation if the Department of Civill Aviation (D.C.A.) able to insfect by flying in. Ir flight possible then fires to be lit at each and and a radio report on strip and weather conditions to be given on tine morning of the flight. If the strip closed then white crosses to be marked on airfield.
$16 / 5 / 62$ Wed. A total of 78 airfield wonkers working under usual supervision on airfield. Mr. Skinner advised by radio a D.G.A. airports engineer, Mr. G. Antcliffe, would be flying in next Friday (18/5/62) by Stol Air Services Cessna aircraft.

17/5/62 Thurs. 50 "foreign" (from Menyamya and Aseki areas) permanent workers and 53 local casual wovkers preparing airstrip for tomorrow's initial and inspection flistut.
18/5/62 Frid. Following word having been sent out in the week a large number of men, women and children in to the camp to watch today's initial landing of aircraft on Kaintiba airstrip. Weather and pre-operational strip report given through Mrs.Born, Port Moresby R.T.C. operetor.

Landing of first aircraft on Kaintiba airstrip in late afternoon carrying Mr. G. Antcliffe of D.C.A. and piloted by Mr. Firns of Stol Air Services. Both inspected the airstrip and made furiher test landings. Messrs. Antcliffe and Firns re:ained overnight.

The 30 permanent labourer/carriers left after this line departed for Menyamya put on station work such as the repairing of roof of patrol officer residence. 22/5/62 Tues. 30 pemanent and 26 casual workers working on station building repairs and re-levelling of small section of airfield urder usual supervision.
23/5/62 Wed. A total of 55 labourer/carriers wofkig on airfield and station. Hew pit latrine for police barracks constructed and re-rooling of housc completed. Raado conversation with Mr. Wright at Kerema re cash remimbursement. Office duties.

24/5/62 Thurs. 31 permanent an*. 28 cusual workers working on airstrjp. Grassplanting commenced in top section of airstrip to check eresior starting to develop. Kadio conversation with Menyamya concerning supplies.
25/5/62 Frid. Total of 29 workers planting grass in marked rows on airstrip.
26/5/62 Sate Half-days work on airstrip, self and Mr.Heriot Working on a section each as previously. All police and station personnel in the camp given day off in observance of Queens Birthday. Local casual labour unable comprihend "holiday" still offered for work and employed as on other days. Police parade at flag-raising and short speech. Investigation by Mr. Feriot allegation that airfield labourers damaging and stealing from local gardens. Garden owners compensated.

Total of 43 labourers on airfield and station work After clearing level pegs from airstrip and inspection of Mr. Heriot and self D.C.A. advised that airstrip again open to aireraft. Commenced planting of potatoes received overland from Menyamya after being sent in byethe Agrioulture Department. Radio conversation with District Office.
$6 / 6 / 62$ Wede 24 permanent and casual labourers (17) preparing station gardens for planting of potatoes and vegetable seeds. Lae advised by radio that stores ex-Lae to be flown in tomorrow by m.A.A. Cessna.
$7 / 6 / 62$ Thurse Total of 46 workers, most of them coumencing the cutting and grading of a better track to Menyamya for some distance from station similar to the walking track cut partially along the Kerema-Kaintiba route. Small line with Police working on repair and maintenance of station buildings. Native foods purchased. More local people - men, women and children in to station.
2/6/62 Sate Work on minor aipfieid and station maintenance and Wenyamya track by today's totel cf 28 labour. Weekly and and daily issues. Carrier line from Menyamya with Constable NABO.

## 10/6/62 Sune Observed.

$11 / 6 / 62$ Mon. Self and Mr. Heriot on usual supervision of 32 .one workers on airfield, station buildings and Menyamya track. Small carriar line of 10 to Menyamya for supplies with Constable BUNODA.
$12 / 6 / 62$ Tues.
Total of 35 workers working as yesterday under supervision of the writer with Mr. Heriot and police and

[^1]$\frac{13 / 6 / 62 \text { Wed. }}{\text { CrowZ }} 27$ labourer/carriers working as yesterday. Crowley Airways Cessna with a/District Commissioner, Lae, aboard attempted to fly into station here from Lae but unable find airstrip due cloud. Possibly this aircraft that one we sighted kimost overhead flying east to west at 9-35 am. Conversation with Mr. Sullivan at Native Affairs Headquarters re stores required from Port Moresby as instructed by the Districi officer's radiogram 624 of yesterday's date. Advised by Mr. Wearne, District Officer, that plane service of stol Air Services Cessna coming from Port Moresby thiough the new airstrip at Terapo near the goverment station at Kukipi on the Gulf Distriet coast to conmence soon.
14/6/62 Thurs. 17 "contract" or permanent workers and 27 local casual :7orkers again working on gardens, station buildings
 and interpreters. Advised by radio conversation from Port Moresby that two D.C.A. officers flying in next Monday. Radio conversation with menyamya concerning supplies. (No further stores ordered through enyamya eince last month in order to ensure adequate forward laoding for any aircraft flights in to Kaintiba now that the airstrip open to air traffic. However still a backlag of stores some of which ordered $2 \frac{1}{2}$ months previously and still accumulated at enyamya owing to difficulty of now and in the past finding sufficient carriers to carry these stores overland.)
15/6/62 Frid. Now a total of 42 workers after additional ones taken on following adviee that D.C.A. officers coming in next week to work on the airstrip. Labour employed as for rest of week.

16/C/62 Sat. Lebourer/carriers working in the morning on airfiead, sta $t i o n$ buildinss, gardens and the Menyamya track. Those labourers and police working on the Menyamya track and who had camped vut during this work on the job returned at midday. Daily issues of rations and weekly issues of tobacco, matches, soap, kerosene, etc. made by Mr.Heriot.

## 17/6,62 Sun. Observed.

Constable JAPI arrived with line of carriers from Menyamya. Constabie 1/c GAIKO of the Menyamya Polise Detachment en route to Kerema as witness in Supreme Court hearing of Yaba massacre trial arrived with this line. GAIKO to proceed to Kerema with other witnesses accompanying Mr. Heriot to Kerema for the Supreme Court sittings due there soon.

18/6/62 Mon. Labour with police and interpreters on station gardens and construction of station buildings. Line to Menyamya with Constable TORE for stores. Mr. Ashton, District C:ficer, Lae, flew in and out with Cessna piloted by Crowley with supplies from Lae. Self to Menyamya following breakdorm or radio communications With Menyamya to straighten out stores and cash position, returning on the return aircraft to Kaintiba after approximately one hour at Menyamya. Messrs. G. Antcliffe and G.Lecke of D.C.A. flew in by Stol Cessna aircraft piloted by Mr. Firns. This aircraft returned to Port Moresby with Mr. Antcliffe after inspection while Mr. Lecke remained to carry out survey of airstrip to enable D.C.A. to draw up a final design for the completion of the airstrip.

19/6/62. Tues. Mr. Lecke working with some of the police and labourers on the survey of the airstrip. Balance of the 45 workers working on the track to Kerema and station gardens. Conanencement of giving pre-operational strip and weather reports by radio using the new D.C.A. Aeradio orystal received yesterday by hand of Mr. Antcliffe.

21/6/62 Thurse Airstrip closed and Mr.Lecke proceeding with survey of airstrip levels for D.C.A. Total of 30 labourer/ carriers assisting with police with survey and working on station gardens and Kaintiba to Kerema track. Mr. Herjot departed early morning with police and carriers and witnesses for Supreme Court sitrings and coronidl enquiry (presumed drowning of Mr.F.D. Anderson) at Keremi.
$23 / 6 / 62$ Frid. Mr.Lecke completed D.C. . . survey and airstrip opened. Total of 30 labourers on station work. Stol Air Services Cessna heard overhead in late afternoon but unable land due weather conditions.

23/6/62 Sat. Stol Cessna arrived by way of Menyamya and with supplies from Menyamya and Mr. Lecke departed by this aircraft for raturn to Port Moresby. Surplus carriers sent back by Mr. Heriot after "stretcher case" interpreter witness decided to walk rather than be carried to Kerema. 25 carriers arrived with stores escorted by Constable BUNODA.
24/6/62 Sun. Observed.
25/6/62 Mon. The 20 workers left after remainder paid off at their own request working on station and airfield. Constable BUMBU to Menyamys with 16 carriers for supplies. Flight into Kaintiba by Mr.Crowley with 600 lbs. of stores from Lae.

26/6/62 Tues, Police and labourers working on Kaintiba-Kerema track with small line of youths working on gardens. Locals from two native groups in for visit - one party with native foods for sale. Discussion with some of the Kaintika landowners as ${ }^{\circ} 3$ the possibility of the Administration buying the land on which the camp and airfield is situated. These people still very vague and nen-committal but believe making some headway towards acquiring this Kaintiba land if required.
27/6/62 Wed. 20 labourers working on station gardens and Kaintiba-Kerema track. Line of carriers arrived from Kerema with police personal effects, mail and cash.

28/6/62 Thurs. Same number of carriers/laboursrs working as yesterday. Carriers recently returned from Kerema after morning spell put to cleaning up camp. Radio conversation with Mr. Carey, Assistant District Officer at Kerema, re complaint (disciplinary) against Constable KANAI. Most of morning spent $\overline{\text { i ith Kaintiba }}$ jandowners. Now feel making soine real progress. Walked around the proposed station boundaries with most of these landowners accompanied by Constable 1/c LAUSEWA and Interpreter DENAI. Nineteen clainants as Kaintiba landowners listed (c.f. file 34-1-1 minutes). The twelve of these present today agreeable to any land purchase. (At date of writing all but two of the total of nineteen owners have been interviewed anu are agreeable to the purchase. The remaining two are at present absent from the immediate Kaintiba area.)
29/6/62 Frid. 28 workers on station work such as digging rubbish pits and station gardens and on the Kaintiba-Kerema track.
$\frac{30 / 6 / 62 \text { Sat. Labourers working as yesterday for the morning. }}{\text { Neetchy }}$ 1ssues of tobacco, tic. Line of carriers with supplies Weekiy issues of tobacco, etc. Line of carriers with supplies and mail approxinately $1-30$ pm from lienyanya escorted by Constable TORS.
