Crown Point July 11. 1776

The 5 day of June I recd 3 letters from you Capt  
Brown & Saml & some for Henry by which I understand  
you are all well which ever gives me joy to hear  
I wrote to you about the middle of June from Chamblee  
the 17<sup>th</sup> of May I was inoculated for the Small Pox at  
Sorell Leonard the 26 & Henry the 27 We had it lite upwards  
of 400 Hundred men in the Regt have had it the greatest  
part of them were inoculated we have lost 7 men since the  
13 of June Ensign Cox Died June 25 a good officer  
the greatest part of the Regt had it lite but some of them  
are left in a poor state of health Capt Cook and Craft  
have a furlough to come Whome I shall refer you to them  
for an account of what has hapned since we came into  
Canada which will <sup>make</sup> any body share the army left Sorell  
~~from~~ the 14 and came to Chamblee June 17 we left Chamblee  
burnt the Garrison and Publick Buildings & the army  
repaired to St Johns, June 18 left St Johns burnt the  
building adjacent retreated to the gisle aux Noix, June 21  
3 Capt<sup>s</sup> 4 Sub<sup>s</sup> & 5 privates of the 6 Pennsylvania Battallian  
Went down the River about a mile from the Island without  
their armes to a House in sight of the gillland the Indians  
came upon them killed one Capt one Lieut & 2 privates  
and scalped them Took 1 Capt 2 Lt and 3 privates the same  
day 3 batteaus were atacked within 6 miles of the Island  
by the Indians killed 3 men & wounded 5 the rest of  
the men brought off the batteaus the water at this Island  
is very bad it gave the dissentary to almost the <sup>whole</sup> army  
June 26 the army left this Island and came to the Island  
mott June 28 the army left the gillland of mott  
July 1 we arrived at Crown Point the army were all  
most beat out having had very little <sup>else</sup> about Salt Pork  
and Wheate meal for 6 weeks the army recruits and  
grows stronger every day the army is moving to  
Siconduaga which makes the officers very uneasy what  
will be the event of this summer we do not we hear  
Shirley's army at Newyork we have had 8 Generals  
to Command the army since we came into Canada,



I am now in a good State of health Henry  
and Leonard are well

Henry remembers his Deanty to you and love to  
his Brothers and Sisters
