

A. 1 This patrol conducted into the Lai H/Waters and upper Lai census Division carried often Area Study. As per instructed.

> The Lai H/Waters and the Upper Lai census Division are stiuated due west of Wabag Sub-District Headquarters. It stretches up the Lai valley following the Lai River for approximately 30-40 miles. The width of the valley varies from steep slopes which follows right through to Sirunki.

Vegetation varies throughout the area to Kunai grass covered side of hills to steep slopes covered by high allitude fainforest around Lagulas.

The Lai river is a swift flowing midd liver fed by numerous samll streams rising in the valley sides.

The Lui river H/Waters and the Upper Lai Census Division are connected by the secondary all weather Highlands Highway which stretched through to Laisgam and Kandep.

Local Government was introduced in the area as part of the Arbag Local Government Council.

The main creak with law and order is the occassional fights and killings over land disputes.

POLULATIONS DISTRIBUTION AND TRENDS.

The last census revision into the area was conducted in 1970 by Grahm Tuck.

The population register is included on patrol jacket.

SOCIAL GROUPINGS.

There are 16 Districts Social groups in the Lai H/Waters and 45 groups in the Upper Lai Division.

The extended family simmering between clans and Sub-Clans in the area which accassionally erupt with fighting. Nost of them are mainly open lands and pig and will not be settled fro sometime.

Land Demarcation Committee doesn't Lean to exist in the area as there seem to be more land disputes now and then.

Language in the area is another social group. Enga is the only language spoken throughout the whole District.

The new Radio Station for the District was to be established in debag late this year or early mext year. Only 14 Radio Receivers are owned by the Local people of the area patrolled.

G. 7 STANDARD OF LIVING

Housing is typical Nabag style with thatches roof of Kunal grass and the alls made of planks and pandanus leaves.

European style clothes are acrn by a large number of people but these clothes are normally dirty and half torn in a state of repair.

The staple food is sweet patotoes which occassionally is supplemented with mig mest tinned and kumus or greens.

H. 8 MISSIONS

Lutherans are mostly around Sirunk' and Tambitanis areas, Seventh Day Adventist ran a hospital and a primary schools eround Sepas.

The hospitals at Sopes employs quite a number of people including 27 trainees nurses, of which 6 are males and the rest re females.

The students cone mainly around New Irelands, B.S.I.F. as well as the local themselves.

Gathelic Missions operates around Mari.

There seems no conflict of churches faith in the area and the ales and the general feeling is guite good.

Theres the all westher highlands highway which runs through to Lalagan and Kandep. The Highway is upgraded from time to time as potholes appear on the surface.

Chits a number of person's in the area have had some training in the Technical fields. If these, there are some 27 Brivers, 10 Carpenters, 1 Clerk, 7 ex-plication 7 ex-storeion and 6 ex-warders in the area under studied.

L. 12 STAGE OF POLITICAL EDIGATION

No ill feelings were in the area and no complaints were taid on the counciliors.

The attitude towards Local Officers and employs is not quiet as good as their alitude towards expatriate officers.

The political exareness of the area is practically confusing and doubtful.

The majority of the people are inorant and efinitely need concentrated political solucation to improve their ignorange.

O. (15) ATTITUDE TOMARDS LOCAL GENERIAMENT

I have not ween in the Council area long enough (about 2 makins only) to form any opinion or strong impressions of the people's attitudes towards the Council.

Nowever, during the patrol I observed seems to be quite satisfactorily and favourable.

There were no reports of any anti-Council feeling over the past financial year. There is no field of resentment or ill will towards the Council as the most of the people appuar to show that the Council system is a favourable institution.

P. (16) ATTITUDES TOWARDS CENTRAL GOVERNMENT

The attitudes towards Central Government seems quite good. They do regard it as good, worthwhile helpful and necessary.

Note. That the writer is talking about stated and colleved attitudes only. However, unfavourable Law and Order situation practically in the area is another question. Most of the vegetables and other foodstuff grown occassionally they sall them to make a bit of money. Gabbages, potstors, carrots are mmetimes seld to local Market or alongside the road for any bypassers.

Some pyrethrum is grown in the area but not to an expert have they made any altempt to improve it.

Something could be said of coffee which is scarce. Waybe the soil is not suitable or the people are too lazy to plant then remains unknown.

Public Works 24 labours of the area at \$1.00 per week.

Host of the youngsters of the area have left the area and moved to towns lighting for jobs and a propertion have been working on bocks at Kindeng.

A number of 100 trais-stores are operated in the area of which meanly half of them were out of stock. This is due to Samtok System which is common everywhere. These tra stores sell mainly foodstuffs, tinned fich, tinned meat and other necessaries.

POSSIBILITIES FOR EXPANDING THE ECONOMY.

There is no Sufficient arable land in the Area. The area is under Cultivation intensively and parts Unused are pretty ragged. Concoquently the land disputes are fairly Common.

Market gardèns (English Poteto Préducation) with regard to Marketing Auxilabity can be increased to an almost inlimited degree due to the fact that Wabag Station is improving and need more staff which means more staff will buy potatoes, Cabbages and Vegetables in the near future.

However, it is Auticipated that there will be a rash of Land disputes when plantings come to maturity.

The Area is dominated by grass and Could possibly have potential as cattle grasing lands, however there is a shortage of land.



. At approximately mid-day on Sunday 3rd November, 1974 the councillor for HE in the Wabag C/D (David Ago) was murdered through axe wounds to the back of the mack.

- 2. Inspector Jack Gumea was advised of the incident and a pulice truck was sent out to ascertain the seriousness of the report .
- 3. At 2:45 p.m. the police truck returned to Wabag and the Police Inspector and Assistant District Commissioner mere advised that flighting had broken out between the YIBINI - LIMAPIN (DIMAPIN) and the PUMPLINI - TIMALAPINI sub-class.

3:30 p.m., Assistant District Commissioner and Assistant Patrol Officer Mapah drove to IMI with three armed police while the Police Inspector with two police trucks went to ME.

Sorveral arrests were made, and the situation eventually quictened down by itOOhis.

After the day of fighting, two men had been killed (councillar David Ago of WE and TALA TAROS of INI) and one ex-councillor KAMPI of INI seriously wounded and taken to hospital at Wabag. A report that one man from Ini had been wounded in the forehead by a shotgun blast was reported during the afternoon. However the man had gove into hiding and could not be located. One of the two shotguns in the area have since been confiscated and enquiries are still being conducted regarding the incident. Over thirty houses belonging to the LIMAPIN sub-clan were destroyed by fire through retaliation measures from the TINALAPINI sub-clan. LIMAPIN gardens were also destroyed, yar trees ring-barked or chopped down and small trade stores broken into.

7. During the evening, the Assistant District Commissioner, two D.D.A. officers (Mr. A.P.O. MAPAH and Mr. A.P.O. FEGEM) and seven members of the R.P.N.G.C. set up a camp at WE, while a further two D.D.A. officers (MR. A.P.O. ABA and MR. A.P.O. SIORI) who had been recalled from patrol established a base at IMI with six members of the R.P.N.G.C.

Land known as SAKANDA and which is disputed by both groups has be surveyed and an application to the L.T.C. will be lodged to have land adjusticated upon as soon as possible.

Councillor DAVID ACO was one of the more progressive of the MARAG Gouncillors and whilst such men goin continual fears of their live proper development of the area will continue to be retarged.
