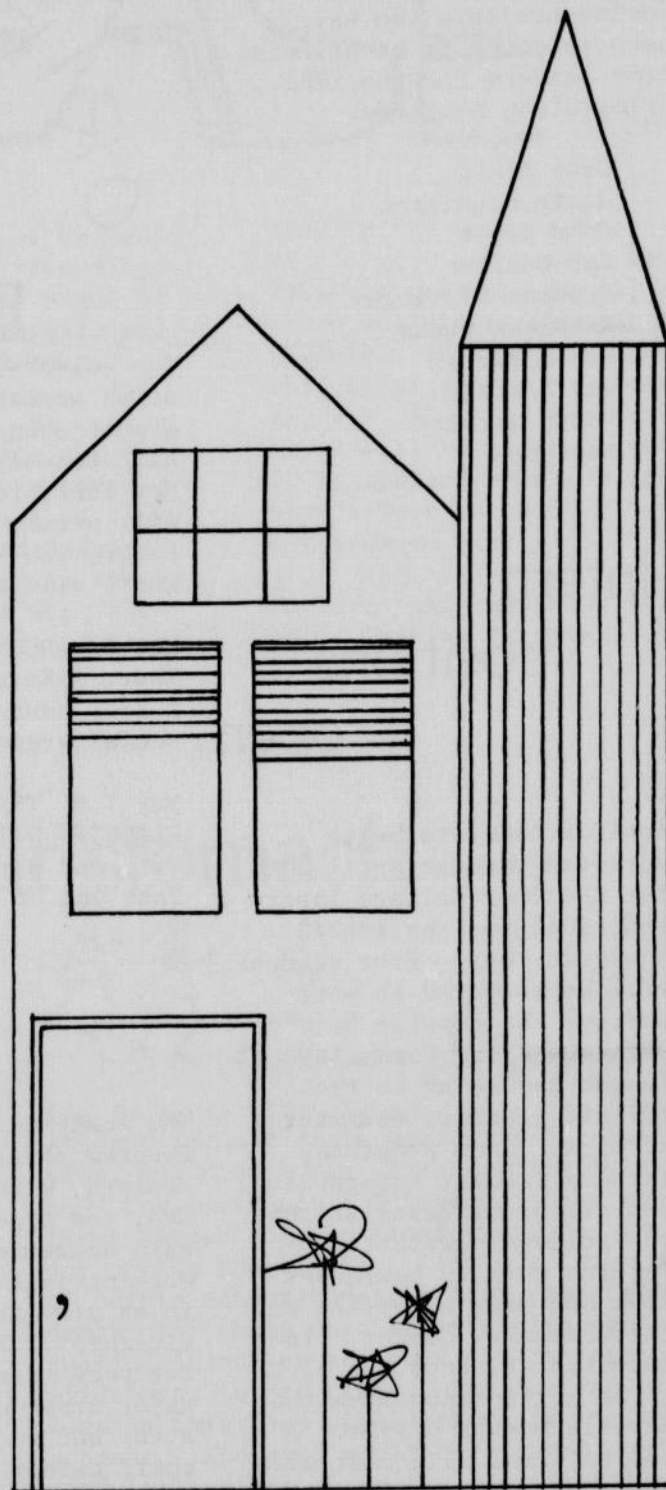
Parents' weekend

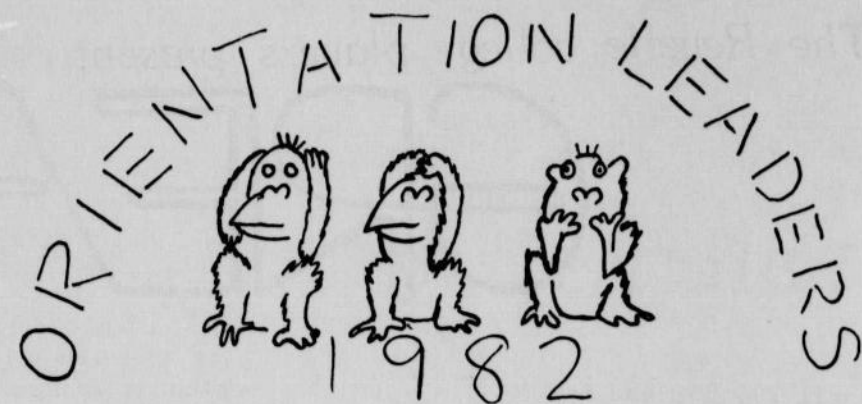

Run for your stomach

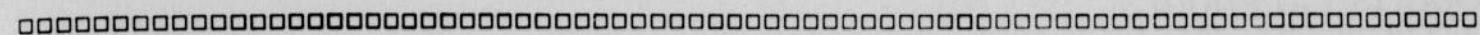
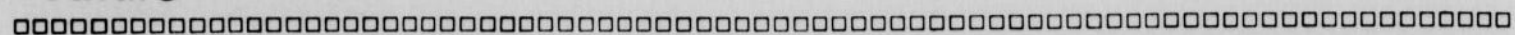

Another critic raved: "The decor creates a serene seclusion for each diner's culinary experience." The name of this home for the Galloping Gourmand? Well it ain't the Revelle Cafe.

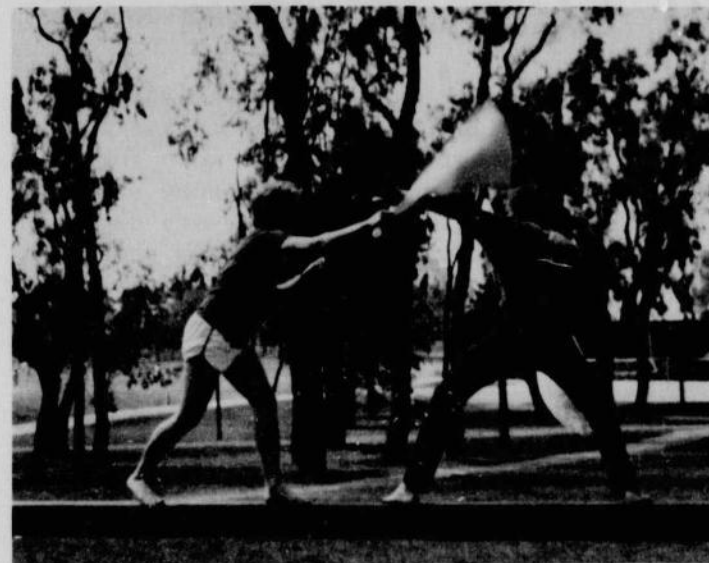


A puppet gives a show.

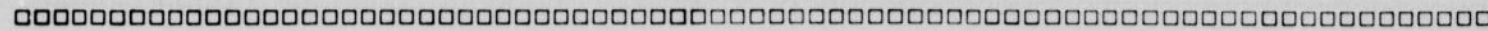
humanity will be necessary to balance an understanding of science.

A sport for all seasons

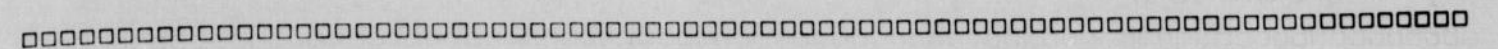

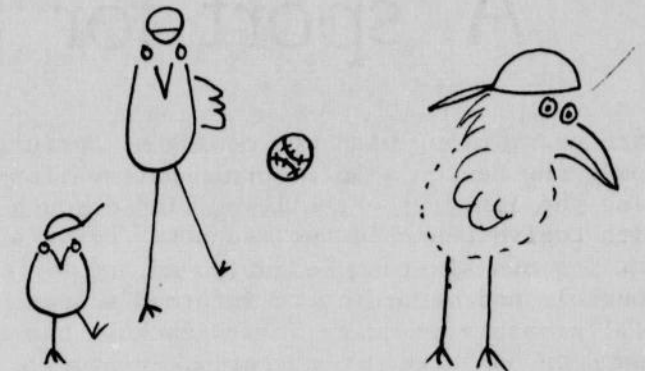

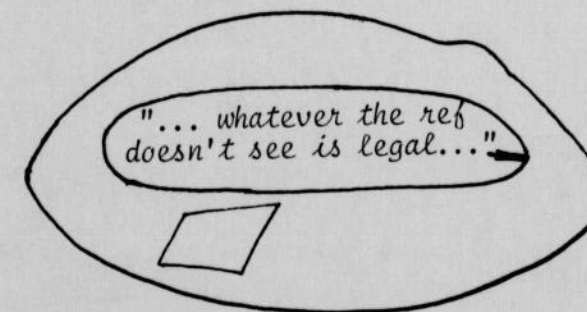


The Revelle Dodgers

"Have aggressive girls on your team; it will make scoring a lot easier."

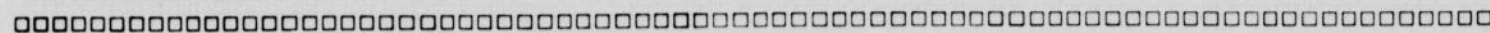
Well, there you have it, so put on your suit and join the fun.

The first game will be held April 18, with the games tentatively scheduled for 11, 12 and 1 o'clock. For more information, students should check with their RA.



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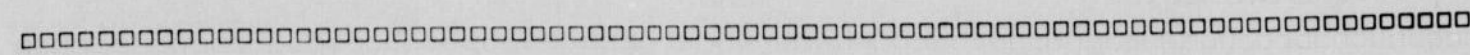
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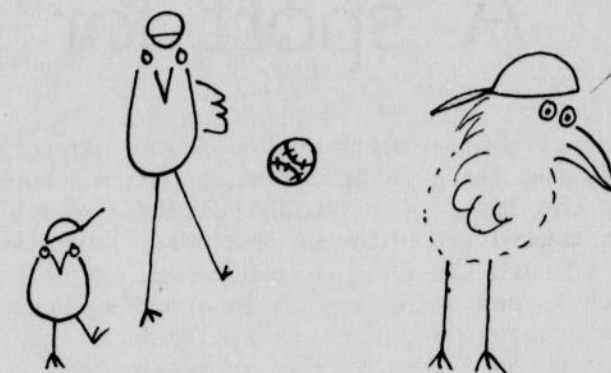
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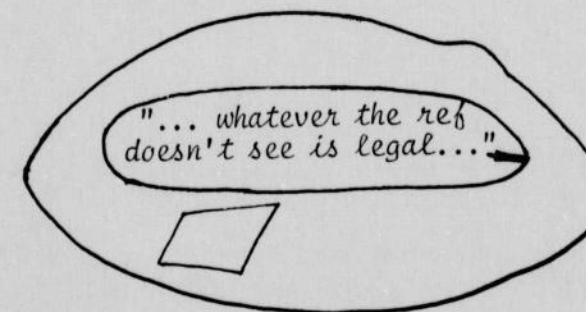
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Ravings from Revelle
