

The Sixth Annual Chamber Music Series at UCSD sponsored by the University Events Office

September 10, 1981

Featuring some of the most famed classical musicians in the world, the sixth annual Chamber Music Series will be presented by the University of California, San Diego.

Performing at UC San Diego in the coming months will be the Guarneri String Quartet on Sunday, October 25, 1981; the Julliard String Quartet on Saturday, January 30, 1982; the Glinka String Quartet on Thursday, February 4, 1982; the Bartok Quartet on Thursday, March 4, 1932, and the Beaux Arts Trio on Saturday, March 13, 1982.

All concerts will begin at 8 p.m. in the Mandeville Center Auditorium. Plenty of free parking is available.

The Guarneri String Quartet was founded at Vermont's Marlboro Music Festival 17 years ago by four musicians who already had established themselves as accomplished soloists. The New York Times states the group "has no superior on the world's stages."

The program at UC San Diego will include Haydn's "Quartet in D Minor, Opus 76, No. 2," Schubert's "Quartet in A Minor, Opus 29" and the "Quartet in G Minor, Opus 27" by Grieg.

The Quartet-in-Residence at the Julliard School of Music, the Julliard String Quartet is known as "the first family of chamber music." Since its founding in 1946 the group has played before sold-out concert halls throughout the world.

In its UC San Diego appearance, the Julliard will perform Haydn's "Quartet in B Flat, Opus 64, No. 3," "Quartet by Morton Subotnick," and Schumann's "Quartet in A Minor, Opus 41, No. I."

Making its American debut will be the renowned Glinka String Quartet, a group that has come back together after its 1978 defection from the Soviet Union.

The Glinka program will include Webern's "Quartet, Opus 28," Wolf's "Quartet (Italian Serenade)," Mozart's "Quartet in F, K. 590" and "Quartet No. 2, Opus 59" by Beethoven.

Formed in Hungary in 1957, the Bartok Quartet is one of the most acclaimed chamber groups on the international scene. All of the group's members are graduates of the Franz Liszt Academy of Music in Budapest, where they began playing chamber music together at an early age.

The UC San Diego program will include Mozart's "Quartet, K. 458," "Quartet No. 3" by Bartok, and Beethoven's "Quartet No. 1, Opus 59."

The Beaux Arts Trio, founded in 1955, is perhaps the best known chamber music trio in the world. "An inspiring experience," was the late Arturo Toscanini's verdict after hearing the trio play, "fine chamber music with impeccable taste and musicianship."

The program for the Beaux Arts Trio is yet to be announced.
