Look who has turned 40

Carol Schultz' and Helen Raitt's baby, the Oceanids Newsletter BEAR FACTS has reached the big 4-0!!!!

Helen writes in a 1969 issue about its conception:

"That year (1962) we were told by Public Relations director, Lon Manar, that cultural programs planned by the administration would not receive financial support if attendance was not improved.

We believed this to be a failure in communication, knowing that husbands usually do not take their notices home. We decided to try and remedy the situationj by putting out a news sheet, BEAR FACTS (named by Dottie Forbes), with Carol Schultz the motivating force and first editor. This paper would be mailed directly to the homes instead of going to husbands through intercampus mail."

Carol Schultz reminds us in the February 1992 issue of Bear Facts (30th year)

"It was in the fall of 1960 that the first of UCSD's departments was established, and UCSD accepted its first class of graduate students. There were no undergraduates yet, and the campus was still at the location of the Scripps Institution of Oceanography. Bear Facts was UCSD's first newspaper. In its first year [1962] it was distributed not only to all the women associated with the University, but also to all the students, faculty and staff members.

...There are now many other newspapers and newsletters on campus, but I, along with most of the Oceanids, welcome my monthly issue of Bear Facts, and I am very proud to have played a part in its beginning."

And in the March issue of 1992, Elibet Marshall contributed a very funny overview of the editors of BF she had known as arts editor (excerpts):

"Sometime in the year A.D. 1972 I became cognizant of the fact that there was life after P.T.A. The last of my four children became fully competent and could find and match her own pair of sox. Looking about, I found a fun and easy job to take up the slack in my days: I offered to make small line drawings to enliven the pages of Bear Facts.

From time to time an editor would ask if I could find my way to her house, so as to help paste up an issue and fill an empty corner with a small sketch. This gave me an easy in into their private lives. ... I was thus placed into a position of power, and the mere hint of blackmail kept me on top of things, and editors cowering. The house was usually sanitized of husbands by the time I would arrive, except possibly one spouse whom I shall call Roger (fictitious name to protect his real identity). He was hidden by the newspaper he was reading in the very room we worked in. His wife Ellen (fictional name...) had become quite permissive over the years. I had an easy time with her.

Then there was one I shall call Julie (not her real name) whose son had recently acquired a pet chameleon. There was an undercurrent of worry whenever Arnold (not the chameleon's real name to protect his whatever) had somehow gotten out of his cage and could not immediately be found. I am terribly fond of chameleons and not at all afraid of them. It was just that I was fearful of sitting down on him, in case he had been on the seat of my chair long enough to have metamorphosed its color to blend into the upholstery.

Another fascinating person to work with was one I shall call Marie (ficticious name...), who was most economical of both time and paper. My Scottish nature was quite at home there. She collected lots and lots of stuff: people, plants, rusty antique nails, glass shards and books. There was a worse pack rat than I--- I great comfort to me.

With editor Judy (not her real...) I found myself in a grandmotherly slot. She was a gay vibrant butterfly sort of person, attacking each issue, breathless, relieved when it was done. I always felt I must fly out of the house fast or else be incorporated into the next project.

Cool calm efficient Beth (fictitious...) was so orderly

and efficient that my silly line drawings seemed out of place for not being Rembrandt or Botticelli enough.

Alice (not her real...) was also a joy to work with. Quiet and unassuming, with a serious sense of humor , one could work laughing and moaning at the same time.

Next I had the privilege of working with someone I will call Evelyn (f.n.t.p.h.i.). We could spend a good part of worktime discussing the possibilities of almost anything. Long before the issue was complete and ready for the printers, Evelyn was already lost in thoughts about doing something more interesting.

Shirley (not her...) was almost the last of the "cut and paste crowd". After that producing Bear Facts became a whole different ball game. Roswitha, Heleen and Netty (I have substituted names here) appeared to zip through work, leaving me way behind.

[Note from the editor: Elibet, your drawings are great. Unfortunately with the advent of the pagemaker program and lacking a scanner, we cannot incorporate them anymore. What we can and would love to incorporate in future issues are articles, notes, short observations by you. Your writing always, always leaves me laughing.



Getting to know Judy

Since probably not too many in our Oceanids community know very much about our new president, I sat down with Dr. Judy Vacquier one day after the board meeting. And while we were munching on leftover fruit from the meeting I tried to find out more about this woman who had agreed to lead our organization into the future.

Already on the outside Judy is very handsome, tall and slender with beautiful blue eyes and short wavy brown hair. She comes across as calm, as intelligent, is able to listen and gives well thought-out answers. During the course of the interview I was absolutely amazed how very interested and concerned Judy is with many aspects of our life on this planet, in this country and in our communities. And she is not only interested but she wants to do something to help, wants to use her experiences and expertise in so many different areas for the better of our surroundings and build hopes for the future. I came away feeling like a lazy useless hedonist (almost), too concerned about my own little life to give much to the world at large. Anyway, what I want to say, is that Oceanids can be very happy indeed to have such a dynamic, interested and interesting woman at the helm.

Judy was born in Orange, California and grew up in Newport Beach as youngest of three children. Her father was an art professor and archeologist and took the family with him on his study trips. Judy therefore spent two years in Mexico, when she was 5 in Oaxaca and when she was 16 in Mexico City. To this day Judy has retained the Spanish language and is chairperson of the Café Español interest group.

Judy spent two years at Muir College as a biology major. During that time, as only a sophomore, she was doing independent research at the Scripps Institution of Oceanography for she was determined to become an oceanographer. Sometime during those months she met her future husband Vic Vacquier, one of the promising young post-docs at that institution. Judy nevertheless went to the University of Sussex in England on the Education Abroad Program. After her return she and Vic got married, and Judy moved to Davis with him, where she finished her bachelor's degree and pursued her PhD studies in microbiology, working on her thesis primarily with the mouse mammary tumor virus. At this point her area of interest had shifted somewhat from oceanography to the study of infectious deseases which became the focus of her career. But she nevertheless took the time to later work as an educational docent (English and Spanish) at the Birch Aquarium for 5 years.


Vic became a faculty member at Scripps Institution in 1978, and Judy secured a postdoc position for 2 1/2 years in the UCSD biology department. She worked as a scientist for Hybritech in research and development, later headed the clinical and regulatory operations there, for a total of 11 years before she became director of clinical affairs at Gen-Probe for 3 years.

In the meantime their 2 boys had been cared for at UCSD daycare before they moved on to La Jolla public schools. Judy decided to quit her job and do consulting in the clinical and regulatory area on a private basis. She did that quite successfully for 5 years before deciding that it was time to move on to other things. She considers herself retired as of now and is playing with the idea of a second career in environmental conservation, preferably on a binational basis with Mexico. I have no doubt that she will have an impact.

Our new president has big plans for our organization. She realizes, as many of us have as well, that we have to try to make Oceanids more attractive for working women and women with children. She has all kinds of good ideas about evening and weekend interest groups (amateur musicians- Judy herself has played the piano off and on for many years; raquetball- her favorite excercise and many more) and wants to make sure that we support newcomers more than ever, that we become even more a welcoming organization, since the future for UCSD holds enormous growth.

Finally I asked Judy about some of her personal likes. She enjoys playing classical music but also listening to Latin-American rhythms. One of her favorite books is Garcia Marquez' "Love in the Time of Cholera". She remembers fondly the movie "Il Postino" and admires actors Alan Bates, Richard Burton, Meryl Streep and Glen Close.

And, yes, she considers her biggest challenge in life so far the dealing with her aging parents and in-laws, no doubt while at the same time still worrying and caring for her sons of whom the younger is still in high school. I think many of us can relate.


