

Dr. Eugene Braunwald is PILS lecturer

Dr. Eugene Braunwald, professor of medicine and chairman of the Department of Medicine at the UCSD School of Medicine, will deliver the sixth lecture in the Professors' Inaugural Lecture Series at 4:15 p.m. on Thursday, February 13, in the Humanities-Library Auditorium, Revelle College.

Dr. Braunwald's topic will be "Failure of the Heart."

A graduate of New York University School of Medicine, he served his internship and residency training in internal medicine at Mt. Sinai Hospital in New York and at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. He had postdoctoral training in cardiology at Mt. Sinai Hospital, Columbia University and the National Heart Institute.

Prior to his appointment at UCSD in 1968, Dr. Braunwald served as clinical director of the National Heart Institute and as clinical professor of medicine at Georgetown University School of Medicine.

His research at UCSD includes studies on the regulation of the circulation, myocardial contractility, the control of anginal pain by means of carotid sinus nerve stimulation and the role of the carotid sinuses in circulatory control.

His activities off the campus include service as vice president of the American Heart Association, president-elect of the American Federation for Clinical Research, chairman of the Publications Committee of the American Heart Association and co-editor of Harrison's Principles of Internal Medicine and of the Yearbook of Cardiovascular and Renal Diseases.

The lecture will be free and open to the public.
