PATROL REPORT - SPECIAL No. 1 SE

Mr. Whitlock has submitted a well written and interesting report.

Having a Government Station staffed in the Ben Valley seems to have paid dividends. The road from Unyag should help greatly in the patrolling of the area. The 500 yards circuit should be sufficient for some considerable time to come. Are the approaches closed?

After reading the "postcard" regarding the Tabakona people, I would say that patrolling in that area is a two-man job. That also applies to the area north of the Elean River. It is also noted that you have a Police Post at Kiginoo, a matter of a few miles away from Tabakona. In my opinion, I do not consider this safe and the police should be withdrawn. It is evident that you need more police stationed at Kiginoo, as only three police accompanied this patrol. They were very fortunate that the Tabakona people did not carry out their threat. Thirteen additional police are being transferred from the Gordon Depot within a course of days.

Foreword herewith is report submitted by Mr. C.W. Whitehead, Patrol Officer, of his initial census patrol of the Upper San Valley and exploratory patrol of part of the Lower San. This is the first patrol during the current year in the KOMPILAN Area, as the Post was not manned during the absence of Mr. Whitehead on leave.

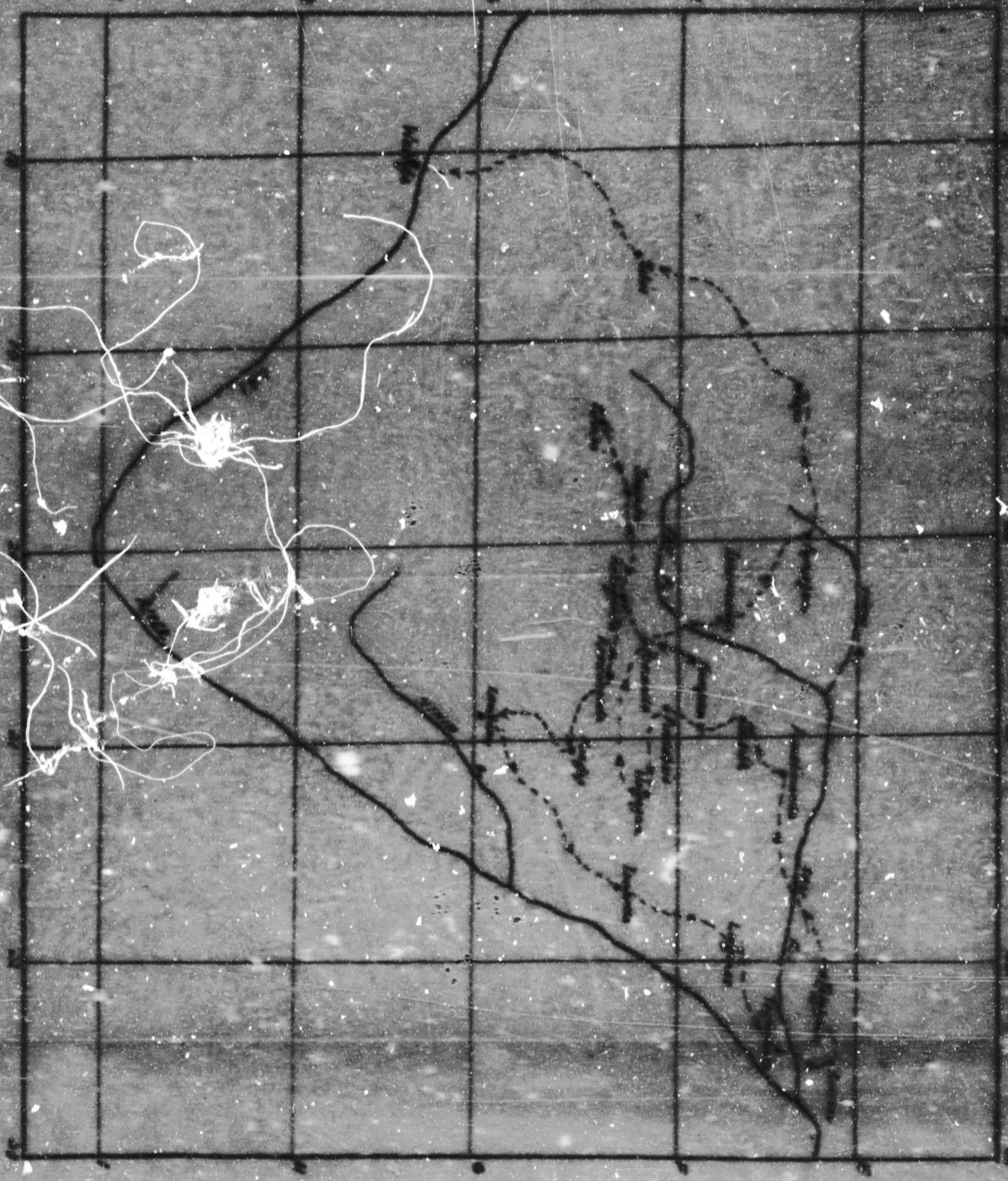
2. The patrol was well conducted and the census figures recorded agree with estimates previously made, although there will no doubt be subsequent increases as it cannot be expected that a completely accurate census will be compiled in a new area on the first occasion. The fact that a number of natives were absent at Moga ceremonies supports this.

3. In common with the rest of the Mabag Sub-District, the Administration sponsored work on roads and airstrips and the consequent gathering together of traditionally hostile groups has had a remarkable stabilising effect and has done much to hasten the process of bringing the people under good control.

4. The establishment of contact with the groups to the north of the San will be a slow process, as the staff position does not permit any extension of our sphere of influence at the moment.

5. A recent inspection of the KOMPILAN Post revealed the excellent work which had been done in airstrip and road construction.

INTRODUCTION

This patrol conducted the initial census of the Upper San Census Sub-Division. <sup>517</sup> Census were recorded, which conforms to previous estimates of the Upper San areas' population. The lower San area, towards the junction of the Lal and Sui Rivers, was also explored on this patrol - no census being taken in this area. A European Medical Assistant from WABADI also accompanied the patrol.

DIARY :

Tuesday 1st February :

Departed KIMPIAN Patrol Post 0845 hrs for SIKUNYI Police Area Camp at head of SAN Valley. Arrived 1400 hrs. Made camp and purchased food. Talk with local natives.

Wednesday 2nd February :

At SIKUNYI. Census of WAI and WIGAI groups. Joined by B.M.A. Mr. T. Sources from WABADI at 1230 hrs.

Thursday 3rd February :

Departed SIKUNYI 0830 hrs for WABADI Medical Aid Post, arriving 0930 hrs. Made camp and purchased food. Census of WIGAI and KIBIBI groups.

END OF DIARY.

NATIVE AFFAIRS :

The native situation in the SAU Valley is quite good. Since the establishment of the KOMPIAM Patrol Post in October 1953, the natives of the Upper SAU area have been in continuous contact with the Administration, and as a result, they are living peacefully. All groups in this area volunteered to work on the Kompiam airstrip, and the motor road from Kompiam to Wabaga.

A total of ~~5140~~ names were recorded in the Upper SAU Census Sub-Division, but there was a large percentage of absenteeism due to the MOGA gift exchange ceremonies, and it is possible that the actual total would be nearer six thousand.

All the groups censused are living peacefully, and are co-operating with the Administration - the greatest concentration of population being around the Government station at KOMPIAM. Tribal fighting has become a thing of the past and all disputes are readily brought to KOMPIAM.

There are no Government-appointed Village Officials in the SAU Valley - each group has its own headman, who in actual fact is very little more than a figure-head, as there are very few

headmen who have any real authority within their own group. It is expected that some provisional appointments of Ialuisia will be made when the Kompiam airstrip and the motor road have been completed.

The work on the airstrip and road have also had a stabilising influence on the population - groups that were previously antagonistic towards each other are now working together towards a common goal.

Several new groups in the Lower Sau area were contacted for the first time - they were all <sup>apparently</sup> friendly towards the Administration, and had heard of the Government station at KOMPIAM. However, although this area is not restricted, it is my opinion that it is not yet safe for Mission or other Non-Government personnel to move about in this area.

Information was gathered concerning other uncontacted groups - native reports indicate a large population north of the SAU - TIMUN Rivers junction, whilst other groups were reported in the area north-east from LINGINAS. The M.C.A. - D.B.S aerial survey of 1953 also reported heavy population in this area north of the SAU - TIMUN junction. Future patrols will endeavour to contact these groups.

A Police Base Camp is maintained at LINGINAS, and several useful contacts with little-known groups have been made through this establishment.

There are only scattered groups in the area of the LAI - SAU junction, but heavier concentrations of population are found in the area around the SAU - TIMUN junction. It is estimated that the total population of the entire SAU Valley would be in the vicinity of 10,000 natives.

ROADS & BRIDGES :

Apart from the motor road which is being built from WABAGA to KOMPIAM, there are no other roads worthy of the name in the whole valley. The native foot tracks at best are hard walking, and at this time of the year, continuous heavy rain turned the tracks into quagmires.

The WABAGA - KOMPIAM motor road is progressing well. It is now possible to drive 19 miles from WABAGA - to WABUKIN at the head of the SAU Valley. Construction has also been commenced from KOMPIAM - at present, about a mile of road has been completed, and the bridge across the ARUBARE River south of KOMPIAM is under construction. It is estimated that approx. 15 miles of road remains to be built, and the road should be completed this year.

AGRICULTURE & LIVESTOCK :

As usual in this Sub-District, sweet potato is the staple diet, supplemented by sugar cane, bananas, taro, yam, pit and cucumbers.

European-introduced vegetables that are doing well include tomatoes, potatoes, beans, peas, pineapples, peanuts and papaya.

The mound method of planting sweet potato is carried out in some parts of the valley, but it is not universal, and this method is the only type of fertilization practiced by the natives.

The agricultural methods in use by the natives naturally leave much to be desired. The principles of soil erosion and contour planting have been explained to the people, but in most cases they are content to follow the old methods.

MEDICAL & HEALTH :

European Medical Assistant Mr. T. Soumess from WABAGA accompanied the patrol and carried out inspections of the old posts of the area, besides carrying out a medical check-up on the people censused.

The health of the peoples visited appears to be remarkably good. Very few tropical ulcers, yaws etc. were seen even in the Lower SAU area where these infections could be expected.

because of the low altitudes. There is malaria in the area, but the natives appear to have built up resistance to the disease, and suffer only mild attacks.

Medical Aid Posts are maintained at SAUANDA, KOMPIAM, LEMBIEM and LINGINAC, and it is expected that another Aid Post will be opened in the area of the SAU - TIMUN Rivers junction, and these posts will adequately serve the SAU Valley.

AIRCRAFT & AIRFIELDS :

The airstrip at KOMPIAM was commenced on 14th April 1954, and is now in the final stages of completion. When completed, the dimensions of the airstrip will be 2400 ft. by 200 ft., which should allow operations by Cessna, Korocean, Dragon and other light aircraft.

An additional 1500 ft. can be added to the present length, but this would entail a tremendous amount of work as there are four large gullies to be filled, and at the present rate of hand labour, this task would take another 4 - 5 years. It is hoped that mechanical assistance will be available to construct this extra length, which would probably allow D.C.3 operations at KOMPIAM.

The KOMPIAM airstrip will be a great boon to both the Baptist Mission and the miners on the TIMUN River. At present, the Mission carry their supplies overland from BAIYER RIVER, whilst the miners' supplies are carried in from WARAGA.

REST HOUSES :

Rest Houses are situated at SHIMONKI and LINGINAC, and both are in good condition. At both these places, ample accommodation is available for police and carriers. It is intended to establish Rest Houses both in the Lower SAU area, and also the area of the SAU - TIMUN Rivers junction.

FORESTRY :

The entire SAU Valley is very narrow - the valley walls are very steep and are formed by razor-back ridges.

The upper part of the SAU Valley consists mainly of sharp kungai ridges, with isolated patches of timber on the lower slopes, with the crests of the ranges heavily timbered. Further downstream, the terrain changes to heavily forested slopes, with only isolated patches of open kungai.

The only reasonably large flat piece of land in the whole valley is the KOMPIAM plateau, and this is very lightly timbered.

The Lower SAU area is almost entirely covered with heavy rain forest and secondary growth, with only isolated patches of open kungai.

MISSIONS :

The only Mission body in the area is the Baptist Mission at LIABUS, some 20 minutes walk from KOMPIAM. At present, the Mission staff consists of Mr. and Mrs. C. Craig, and Sister M. Shaw.

The natives in the immediate vicinity of the Mission station are quite co-operative towards the Mission, and quite a few youngsters attend the Mission school. The Mission's medical work is also progressing satisfactorily.

MINING :

There are three European mining camps in the SAU Valley, and all are situated on the PINUR River. At present, Mr. M. L. Wilson is on leave, and Messrs. A. E. Wilson and E. Re-lands are in the area.

POST SCRIBE :

NATIVE AFFAIRS :

Since this report was written, information has been received that plans were made by natives in the YABAKENOS area to attack the patrol.

The plan was apparently a very detailed one - various men were marked to hold the Europeans and police, whilst others were detailed to do the actual attack with tomahawks. When staff and time are available, a strong patrol will again investigate this area.

Although the attack did not eventuate, this further emphasises the point made previously that the Lower SAN area (although not restricted) is not yet safe for Mission or other non-Government personnel to move about in.
