As per your telephone request of this date, we herewith submit a typical analysis of our refined bismuth:

By selection, we can pick lots which will assay as follows:-

The silver assay of such a selected lot would be of the order of .01 oz. per ton of .00003%.

Our present quotation for 100 lbs. of selected low silver bismuth from regular production is \$1.25 per pound, F.O.B. New York.

We can reduce the silver content of selected lots of bismuth to say .0008 oz. per ton of .000002% by a three or four stage crystallization. This operation also will reduce the copper, lead and zinc content of the resulting bismuth well below the figures listed above.

The cost of this specially purified bismuth will be about \$2.50 per lb. F.O.B. New York.

We have on hand a few pounds of bismuth having a bismuth content of 99.9999 plus % in which only spectroscopic traces of silver, copper and lead can be detected. This
