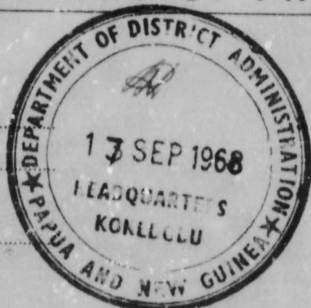

PATROL REPORT - SEHULEA No. 67-68

OFFICER CONDUCTING - D. J. YOUNG, P.O.

The above report covering the Duau Local Government Council elections is submitted together with camping allowance claim. Camping Allowance claims in respect of James Puritara and Constable Puiyu are not to hand.

2. Whilst I realize that the officer concerned is a newly appointed Patrol Officer and that he is keen, energetic and inexperienced, I am in two minds as to whether I should return the report for re-submission or forward same to your office. During a recent inspection visit of SEHULEA Patrol Post I drew Mr. Young's attention to the necessity of submitting accurate and neat documents. He continues to mis-spell village names despite previous comment from myself.

3. Punctuation, spelling and grammar are poor and I consider the report to be sub-standard.

4. On the other hand Mr. Young seems to have some appreciation of the problems obtaining in the area patrolled. It is unfortunate that the Duau area has suffered greatly in the last year from staff changes and the posting of inexperienced Cadets to SEHULEA.

5. Further comments:

Outline of Political Situation: Mr. Young has had little or no experience in road work and is not qualified to comment to any great extent on the feasibility of road construction in the SEWATAITAI to SEWA BAY area. I know nothing of the promise of a Public Works team plus tractor for this particular project. In the whole Sub-district at the moment there is a definite need for D.D.A. staff to ensure that road projects commenced are completed within a period of months. What incentive and enthusiasm the local people possessed has been negated by lack of follow up action and staff shortages.

From diverse sources I hear that there is a gradual swing away from the matrilineal system in favour of a patrilineal system. A further report will follow as a result of the Sub-district wide patrols to be undertaken in July and August.

Agriculture, Commerce & Industry: This section in Mr. Young's report provides a fair assessment of the current situation.

The fact that individual ownership is not recognized is expressed in language usage: e.g. Dobi language - if someone has a betel nut and I want it, my request takes the form of already owning it, "Gosiyagu, agu magi nina" (My friend, my betel nut..).

The European residents in the area with, perhaps, the exception of Mr. Wilkinson at Sewn Bay, appear to contribute proportionately less than those in other Districts.


DIAN L.G.C. Elections: Regarding the statement of 23 polling places for 27 Wards the following is extracted from the Diary section of the report:

It would possibly have been more convenient to all if the LOMITAWA and SIGASIGA people had assembled at MEUDAN/.. The average absenteeism figure of 43.7% for the seven Wards in which elections were contested denotes a lack of interest in Council affairs. It should be remembered here that Council elections closely followed House of Assembly elections.

6. It is anticipated that Mr. Young's presentation of future reports will show a considerable improvement and I feel that, if Mr. Young is permitted to spend a full term at SEHULEA, the area will benefit greatly from his enthusiasm and application to Council and other developmental projects.

Conducted election Mwalukwasia Ward and a man named John Nemia was elected councillor (new) unopposed. Departed Mwalukwasia at 11-15 am and walked to Kwanaula village arriving 12-50 pm. END OF PATROL.OBSERVATIONS AND COMMENTS.1. Reception of Patrol.

The Patrol received a friendly reception from all villages. Some rest [^] being colourfully decorated with flowers.

2. Standard Type of housing.

Generally the standard of housing in the area was very poor with the exception of a few villages on the South Coast of Southern Normanby Island between villages of Sibonai and Kasikasi where the houses are of a fairly good standard.

3.

Water Supply

Generally water supplies in all villages were very good with fresh water being readily available from fast flowing streams. Even villages who are exceptions to this, fresh water is available but must be fetched from the source to the villagers's houses which are situated in different hamlets which are at ~~very~~ varying distances from the water.

4. Outline Of Political Situation.

The current situation in the Duau area is that the people

attitude towards the Administration is very good, although as it was put to me by two prominent people in the area that people will not believe what the administration says in regards to village and Council projects unless they have proof (see something with their own eyes) that the work will be carried out and finished so that their efforts are not wasted. The reason for them saying this was in regard to the road projects put into action by the Administration for the past four years (with the main one being a road from Esa'ala to Sehulea and one from Esa'ala to Bunama village via Sawataitai village to Sewa Bay route). Examples of this are Sawataitai road to Sewa Bay (should not have been started in the first place as country too rugged and would cost fortune to put road through and this cost would not warrant the road being constructed as it would be of communication value only) where the people voluntry worked for a number of weeks (1967) to construct a semi-track-road over the mountain range between these two places with the promise of a tractor and Publics work team being sent thereto finish the road in the near future. ~~THESE PROJECTS WERE NEVER COMPLETED~~. This promise was not fulfilled and is not likely to be in the near future. The other example was the road between the villages Sibonai (Sewa Bay) to Bunama (16 miles approximately). Most of the preliminary work of flattening the ground for a road was done by the people (1965) again voluntry working for a number of weeks with the promise of Government supervision for the bridges (which again never eventuated) which would be needed to be constructed for the road to be a success. This road is quite feasible and could be completed by the people themselves (with supervision) and would be of great use to them for transporting their cash crops to Bunama where there is good anchorage as this coast is subject to South East season (rough seas). The Duau Local Government Council proposes to buy a tractor for transporting produce (mainly copra) to Bunama for shipment early next year, and I shall be going to supervise these bridges construction at the end July 1968, so as to complete the road and restore faith of the people to the Administration.

The peoples attitude towards local government councils is generally very good with interest shown in elections by all people. Although there is a tendency of people to be frightened of the position of councillor especially the younger people who are apparently still frightened of black magic. However at the last general election of the Duau L.G.C. (April 1968) six young people under thirty years of age were elected showing a change from people electing older people to the position of councillor (decline in old influential leaders).

In regard to interest shown by people seeking election in House Assembly. There was one candidate from the Duau area a Mrs. J. Wilkinson a mixed race woman from Sewa Bay who however was unsuccessful.

The effects of Europeans and Missions to the Duau area has brought two noticeable Social problems. One is the problem of Adultery which is very prominent throughout the Duau area. In older times before the advent of Missions and Government Law introduction committing this offence would mean the penalty of death. But now a small jail sentence or fine has replaced this penalty and people are no longer frightened of committing adultery. Divorce usually occurs after adultery has been committed by either spouse and quite often the care of the children is left to the mother (Matrilineal).

The other problem is that of land again due to the influence of Europeans and missions. There are many disputes today over land mainly due to people squatting on other peoples land during the last 50 or 60 years. Again the old traditional penalty for this would mean death or warfare between clans. As the government law prevented this happening the people resorted to Black magic to rid these squatters which sometimes took a number of years and possibly some of the

squatters had died and where buried on that land thus relatives of the squatters today are claiming ownership of this land due to this fact against the original owners relatives .

Another reason for the land problems is that 30 or 40 years ago the Duau area was patrolled by a Mr. Bibian and later another Patrol Officer who apparently tried to change the land system from Matrilineal to Patrilineal . The majority of people did not do this but a few did thus conflicts occur over land due to this misunderstanding . Also several years ago an agriculture officer apparently visited some villages and told the people grow more cash crops (Coconuts) telling them that if a man was not using his land (ie. growing cash crops) the other people could go and grow their cash crops on this land (Contrary to the Law) , thus more land problems .

The attitude of the people towards missions, europeans and other natives from outside areas is good . However these people are not completely excepted or adopted into the Duau society as if any problems social or economic arise immediately these foreign people are rejected whether they be from outside areas or from outside clans in the Duau area .

5. Agriculture & Commerce & Industry.

In the Duau area the main cash crop is Copra , with a little coffee grown mainly in the mountain region . The majority of peoples attitude towards growing cash crops is very laxidative. With people only wishing to produce sufficient cash crops to buy a few necessary items from the stores . There are possibly two reasons for this attitude . One is that by custom these people use to a rather easy ~~going~~ going life, that is that they do as much work that is necessary for their every day needs and much time is spent in the custom of chatting and chewing beetle nut . Occasionally they shall spend a day working their garden crops or fishing but only when necessary. The other reason is that if people were to work harder on their cash crops thus getting more money; most of this money would be drained away by relatives who live by the old customs (refer previous reason) in which they have a right to each others belongings (money, food and land etcetera) Thus the people would be doing all that extra work for nothing . The above attitudes are slowly changing as the younger people with education are gradually discarding old traditional ideas and are trying to better themselves by planting more cash crops .

In some areas also there is a problem of transporting cash crops to main centres for selling. This is prominent on the South side of Normanby Island (Duau) , which for several months of a year the South East season prevails (rough seas) thus most villages are out of reach of coastal vessels for this period thus people do not produce much cash crops for fear of not being able to sell them.

The attitude of the people towards the organization of stores and other types of business is that much interest is found to be in the formation of Co-Operatives and other group enterprises (Agriculture Societies) . There however a number of private businesses in the area which are mainly run on a family basis . The attitude of the people towards businesses organized by Europeans is not throughout the Duau area . This attitude mainly depends on the europeans concerned . But on the whole the people believe that the europeans are extracting great wealth from this area and will do little to help them unless they receive payment (even for the smallest jobs).

6. Rest Houses

Most rest houses were in very good condition and some ~~are~~ colourfully decorated with flowers for the occasion . The exceptions to this were at Gulegule village (where new rest house is to be built) and Iaboda village (where rest house needs repairing) .

7. Roads & Bridges.

There is one vehicular road in the area that is between Pwanapwana village (J. Wilkinson Plantation) to Saribola Saw mill (both in Sewa Bay area) a distance of approximately 8 miles. Roads under construction are, one from Sawaitai village to Bunama village via Sewa Bay (see Political section)

8. Carriers

Carriers used on the patrol were very easy to hire and volunteered freely. The rate of pay was 1/- per hour.

9. Health

The health of the people in general was very good possibly due to the good ~~hospitalization~~ hospitalization services.

- a/ Methodist Overseas Mission, Hospital at Bwaruada, Staffed with European Sister and local nurses. They also have one Aid centre at Bunama village staffed with one local nurse.

In the Sewa Bay area many cases of whooping cough were reported to me mainly at Villages Pwanapwana (where two children were reported to have died) and Sibonai. This epidemic was reported to Hospital Assistant Thomas Andrew at Esa'ala who immediately went to Sewa Bay to treat the people concerned.

At Dawada village there are several families who have shifted to the foreshore in the past few years contrary to advice given to them by a doctor in approximately 1950 and by previous Patrol Officers. The advice was for them to shift their houses inland about $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ mile due to the presents of Philera carrying mosquitoes on the foreshore area ~~and~~ (case of the high death rate 50 deaths to 22 births between 1950 and 1956 total population being 140 then). These people will be shifting as advised very shortly.

10. Education

There are seven recognized mission schools and one Administration school in the area.

11. Missions .

There are three denominations in the Duau area . The Methodist Overseas Mission main stations at Bwaruuda, and other at Bunama village. At Bwaruuda there is a theological college and Hospital and also a school . The Roman Catholic Mission has one large establishment at Kurada with school and medical services . There other establishments are at Gesiwe (school), Kerorogeia village (school) and Barabara (school) The Seventh Day Adventist mission has two establishments in the Duau area one is at Binoa (Sewa Bay) where there is a school and Aid Post , the other is at Sawataitai (mission only).

12. Personel

Constable Puiyu (1448) conduct was excellent throughout Patrol and he was very efficient in his work .

13. Conclusion.Duau L.G.C. Elections .

There were 23 polling places used during the elections for 27 Wards and the elections were held over a period of 15 days (17/4/68 to 2/5/68). The reason for the elections being conducted so quickly was that in 20 of the 27 Wards there was only one candidate, thus duly elected unopposed (at Guleguleu Ward 2 candidates were nominated for election for two seats in the council thus again uncontested election). Approximately 32.5% of Males against 68.3 % of females required assistance in voting . In all Wards that elections took place scrutineers were nominated .

In regards to absenteeism , the only figures that were able to be taken were during the 7 elections that took place, (in the 20 other Wards columns 4 to 11 inclusive on Form 10 were not completed as the elections were uncontested) thus no figures obtained). In the 7 Wards where elections did take place these were the absenteeism figures, 40.5% males against 46.8% females were absent from the elections .

In the elections 15 of the old Councillors were relected (14 unopposed and 1 successful after an election). There were 13 new councillors elected with a trend towards younger men quite evident as 6 of the new councillors are 30 years or younger and 4 in their thirties.

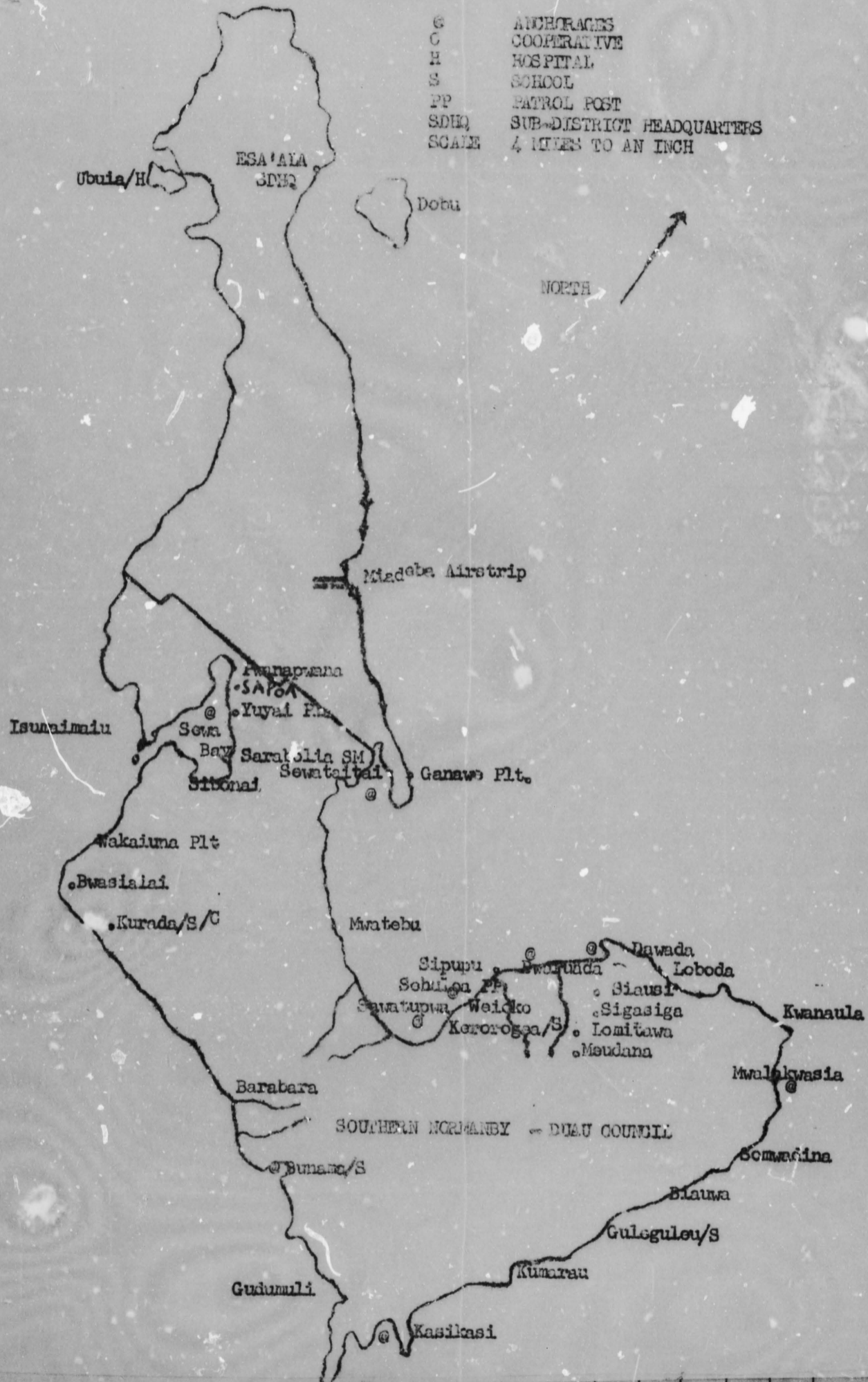
