

Richard Fagen to give Clark Distinguished International Lecture

Dr. Richard R. Fagen, Gildred Professor of Latin American Studies at Stanford University, will deliver the second annual Clark Distinguished International Lecture Thursday, February 9, at the International Center at the University of California, San Diego.

Fagen, an internationally recognized expert on Latin America, will talk on "Can There Be Peace in Central America?" The talk will begin at 7:30 p.m. and is free and open to the public. However, due to limited space at the International Center, ticket/ reservations are required. Tickets are available at the International Center on the UCSD campus.

Fagen has served as a visiting professor in Mexico and Chile and has conducted research in Cuba and Nicaragua. He is the author or editor of many publications on U.S.-Latin America relations, the most recent of which is "The Future of Central America: Policy Choices for the U.S. and Mexico" which he co-authored with Olga Pellicer and published in 1983. He is the recipient of a number of awards including fellowships or grants from the Ford Foundation, the National Science Foundation, Rockefeller Foundation and the Social Science Research Council.

The Clark Distinguished International Lectures honor a former Dean of International Education at UCSD, Phyllis Clark, and her late husband, Colonel Milton Clark, and was established by their three daughters. The first lecture in the series was given by Seymour Lipset of the Hoover Institution at Stanford, who spoke last April on American public opinion and Middle East policy.

The Fagen lecture will be followed by a reception sponsored by the Friends of the International Center.
