



#### A BRIEF HISTORY OF A.M.A.E.

#### The Association of Mexican American Educators. State of California, was founded in the early 1960s as a professional society dedicated to the mandate for quality education through equal educational opportunities for all students, especially for those of Chicano/Latino origin. In 1965 the Honorable Herman Sillas filed incorporation papers for A.M.A.E. The signers of the incorporation papers were Phil Montez, Richard Baca, Frank Armendariz, Art Palacios, Cecilia Suarez, and Leonard Pacheco. The leaders traveled throughout California to gain support for A.M.A.E. and organize educators of Mexican descent. A.M.A.E. grew and expanded throughout the years with the assistance of other leaders such as Marcos de Leon. Helen Diaz, Manuel Ceja, Armando Rodriguez. Manuel Banda. Rachel Montenegro, Uvaldo Palomares, and many more outstanding, nationally renowned educators. Throughout its history, A.M.A.E. has offered an annual conference that has obtained national recognition for its expertise in programming and offering quality workshops. A.M.A.E. has become a resource on Chicano/Latino affairs for two U.S. presidents and for various state departments of education, A.M.A.E. was the first educational organization to affiliate with the Forum of National Hispanic Organizations and has continued its growth and dedication to quality education in this country. Today, the State Association is comprised of numerous local chapters and is headed by a State Executive Board consisting of elected and appointed officers, Chapter Presidents, and State Committee Chairpersons involved in all areas of education: Higher Education, Primary and Secondary Education, Bilingual Education, Migrant Education, Compensatory Education and Parent Education.

#### A SYNOPSIS OF A.M.A.E.'S ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- A.M.A.E. has acted as a resource on education and Chicano/Latino affairs for the State Department of Education, the California State Commission for Teacher Preparation and Licensing, the Office of Education, President Carter, and the California Legislature. A.M.A.E. has testified during numerous hearings on bills affecting affirmative action, bilingual education and teachers licensing. The State A.M.A.E. Legislative Committee has been extremely active in Sacramento and in Washington, D.C. advocating for equal educational opportunity for Chicano/Latino students of all ages.
- A.M.A.E. recently entered a suit against the California State Department of Education for non-compliance in affirmative action and bilingual education which was filed in May, 1979. In 1973 A.M.A.E. joined a suit against the Los Angeles Unified School District in the "Aguilar" case alleging the district illegally discriminated in the hiring, promotion and assignment of Chicano/Latino teachers. The suit was recently settled in our favor.
- A.M.A.E. has sponsored a state-wide conference on an annual basis that has received national attention and recognition for excellence in the area of education for Chicanos/Latinos. No single conference dealing with Chicano/Latino education has more people with doctorate degrees making presentations in workshops, panels, and seminars than does the A.M.A.E. annual conference. In 1980 A.M.A.E. sponsored the Encuentro Internacional de Educadores in Mexico City.
- A.M.A.E. promoted the first bilingual

education bill in the early 1960s with the assistance of Mervin Dymally.

- A.M.A.E. has excelled in the area of research and has presented position papers on Bakke, bias in student testing, cultural pluralism, bilingual education, and access to higher education at numerous conferences and institutions of higher learning.
- A.M.A.E. has been active in promoting Chicano/Latino culture and art. In 1978, A.M.A.E. sponsored a premiere in Hollywood entitled "Only Once in a Lifetime" which depicts the lifestyle and sensitivity of the Mexican American in Los Angeles.
- A.M.A.E. has traditionally offered scholarships for Chicano/Latino students wishing to pursue higher education, and has acted as a clearinghouse for foundations and donors wishing to offer scholarships to students of Chicano/Latino origin.
- A.M.A.E. has been a training ground for outstanding leaders and educators who have obtained high posts in both education and government. A.M.A.E. members now determine policy at the Office of Civil Rights, the Office of Education, and the Office of Equal Employment Opportunities.
- A.M.A.E. has worked closely with other Chicano/Latino organizations as well as other educational groups. The Association has participated in national issues conferences and has been an advocate for Chicano/Latino educators in the National Education Association where A.M.A.E. members have served on committees and task forces.


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



- o importance of providing ethnic role models.
- o need to improve cultural sensitivity of prospective teachers (particularly non-minority teacher candidates).
- o given that existing methods of teacher training have proven to be a failure, opening the door to new, creative means to prepare individuals to meet the educational needs of minority students. (The Chicano Studies Dept should be involved.)
- o need to continue the effort to close the gap between school and home (make schools more friendly, non-threatening, and more responsive to parent concerns).
- o ensure that textbooks accurately portray achievements and contributions of Mexican-American and other minority cultures to American society.
- o long range plan must include emphasis on remediating the negative aspects of lower socioeconomic effects on primary age students.
- o short term efforts must focus on identifying Chicano students with potential to succeed in higher education though that potential may not ben evident from traditional paper and pencil tests. (Strongly suggest that the community-based counseling program at SDSU provide an excellent model to achieve this objective.)
- o improve articulation between university counselor and teacher preparation departments and local school districts.
- o use of university faculty with its prestige and influence to directly confront existing power structures in the community in an effort to debunk the myths that ultimately result in prejudice and discrimination.
- o elevate the status of the application of effective teaching strategies to a level commensurate with research methodology.

#### In conclusion:

Study after study have concluded that education is failing. Undoubtedly this is a complex issue that needs extensive research. However, in light of overwhelming evidence that suggests failure, shouldn't we, (elementary school teachers, secondary school teachers, counselors, public school administrators and faculty of teaching departments) acknowledge that perhaps the first step in correcting the problem is to listen more closely to the minority community.
