

Dr. Jackson appointed Associate Dean of Graduate Studies

Dr. Gabriel Jackson, professor of history and former chairman of the Academic Senate at the University of California, San Diego, has been named associate dean of graduate studies for the San Diego campus. The appointment was announced by Dr. Manuel Rotenberg, dean of graduate studies and research.

Jackson served as chairman of the San Diego Division of the Academic Senate from 1969 to 1971. His primary areas of responsibility as associate dean will be in developing new graduate research programs in the humanities and social sciences, and graduate student affirmative action programs including minority student recruitment.

Jackson joined the faculty at San Diego in July 1965 after three years at Knox College, Galesburg, Illinois, where he had been an associate professor of history. He has also served on the faculties of Wellesley College, Goddard College and the Putney School.

He received an A.B. degree from Harvard University in 1942, an M.A. degree in history from Stanford University in 1950 and a Doctorat de l'Universite in history from the University of Toulouse (France) in 1952.

The recipient of several fellowships, Jackson studied in Toulouse on a Fulbright Fellowship, in Spain on Fulbright Postdoctoral and Social Science Research Council Fellowships and in Mexico on a Sheldon Traveling Fellowship. In 1967-68 he held a Fellowship of the American Council of Learned Societies.

The author of numerous articles and reviews, Jackson published Spanish and Italian translations of his book, "The Spanish Republic and the Civil War," in 1967. He is the editor of "The Spanish Civil War: Domestic Crisis or International Conspiracy," an anthology of source readings in a series entitled, "Problems of European Civilization," published by Heath and Co. in 1967. His book, "Historian's Quest," an inquiry into the nature of a historian's work and moral commitments, was published in 1969.
