

## **Students from four UC campuses to present scientific papers May 4-5, at SD campus.**

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Current research on such geologic features as the Grapevine Mountains in Death Valley, the Mendocino Fracture Zone, and a series of beach ridges formed millions of years ago in the San Diego area will be reported by University of California graduate students at a symposium on the San Diego campus May 4-5.

Seventeen students representing four UC campuses-- Berkeley, Los Angeles, Riverside, and San Diego-- will present 14 scientific papers on work completed or in progress at the meeting.

The third annual Graduate Student Symposium in the Geological Sciences is co-sponsored at UCSD by the Departments of Earth Sciences and Oceanography. It is designed to allow students from different campuses to exchange reports of research, and to give them experience in presenting scientific work.

The papers will be presented in two Saturday sessions. Participants will spend Sunday at sea on a field trip aboard the Scripps Institution of Oceanography ship, Horizon.

Presenting papers from UCSD will be Wendell Gayman, William H. K. Lee, Robert D. Nason, and John Ritter. Nason and Dave Ross are student chairmen of the event.
