

Martin Shapiro to outline problems of Jimmy Carter in Public Events Series

Dr. Martin M. Shapiro, professor of political science at the University of California, San Diego, will outline some of the problems facing Jimmy Carter during the presidential transition for those attending the Public Events Series sponsored by the Friends of the UCSD Library.

The talk, "Presidential Transitions," will begin at 8 p.m. Thursday, January 20, in the International Center on the UC San Diego Matthews campus. It is the 10th program in the series which is free and open to the public.

Shapiro, a member of the UC San Diego faculty since 1974, will outline the President's problems in recruiting skilled persons for government service and the process of his gaining control of the bureaucratic apparatus of government.

Shapiro served as professor of government at Harvard University for three years before coming to San Diego. He is the author of several books including "Law and Politics in the Supreme Court" (1964), "Freedom of Speech: The Supreme Court and Judicial Review" (1966) and "Supreme Court and Administrative Agencies" (1968). He has also edited several books and is the author of numerous articles published in legal journals.

He has been awarded a Woodrow Wilson Fellowship and a Fels Dissertation Fellowship and is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, the American Political Science Association, the Law and Society Association and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

The Friends of the UCSD Library is an educational and support organization which brings together community members with a common interest in books, libraries and promoting the development of the UCSD libraries. Elizabeth Butler, assistant university librarian for public services and instructional services at UCSD, is chairperson of the Friends' public events series.

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
