Dear Thom

I had yours of Captain place of (some) &
 Mr Bowen came over here a Thursday night, and brought
 me an order from his brother at St. Paul for 2000 I have
 now at St. Paul yesterday at Savannah, sitting out for
 next day, but as I have decided off with Tappin and
 his negroes some of them hanging the small bag and
 found not well (appeal the bargain before I went to
 Town & not how what an I might have for money
 there. I did not ask him for it, but it will do as
 well to have an order for it altogether to Town which
 desire you will get as soon as you can get them
 delivered at least I stand want some sooner if
 you could get an order for 500 best soonest London
 would not be amiss. I purpose to set out from
 home here on Monday next stay 2 days at two at
 Luana & so proceed, where I hope you will let me
 hear from you as often as you ^{can}. I would not have you
 think of coming at. you'll self yet I hear the small
 bag & ages there much, if you should be wanted for
 a juror, I am confident I can get you excused
 beside I believe you'll be wanted much at home
 in my absence. I hope to yourself how to say later
 in days here or otherwise as he will give a drive
 for them. I must say I tried to do for the negroes, but
 of him had some more ago for a ^{man} but I shall
 I shall give him an order on you my agent & him
 was to say in some clauder and he expect a
 small ship that Mathison is to send there in two or

three weeks, I wish you could try if you could get
 some mahogany or fustic of Abbeille if you can may
 get it brought down of Sattans Schooner when she
 comes down perhaps Mahogany may be able to let you
 have some sugar of that kind at Harvey Abbeille owes
 me money & as long you may get some mahogany
 of him, I think Mr Geo Robinson as the Capt. Bay should
 give you a Band to bear it, perhaps he may get you
 a little further; Mr Paul Lawrence has got the set of
 Coppers here, I want to let him have either of the
 new Coppers at Brown to make up the set and a Peck
 there he had got three here, I believe in the progress
 of them perhaps he may assist you with some
 sugar, at Clark I believe is some ordnance and
 some an maffayuhar paper & libel for masons way
 which perhaps you may get something for if all
 day taken in sugar, by what you write you expect
 to make more, I cant hurry to ship much on
 him, and I want ship half a day at least on my
 own acct, to let him see for description, as I cant not
 get any thing here to ship by the Ruby, & I want
 if I could ship some of the Lucia. for admit we make
 35 kds more at Brown as I think you may if no accident
 of fair weather to get out of a day to Long Eaton with
 Georges Band, & to ship by him & by the Lucia,
 I hope we shall have enough to say before as I shall
 think hard to get nothing from any body else
 but the whole I refer entirely to you as

I have recd Jabs words from friends and it all
I have yett see here, I am well has become me
some part of allens Bond & his own Intest, but
Bowen did not see Hewitt as he came once, but
I expect to get him, as to some of the others I
shall give my self no further trouble about
them but pass them away when I go up.
Smith Dodge is taken. He says Smith had not
time for him, as soon as he is able will send him
back for I dont find it will be worth while to blow
up the stone. He tried one day, I am glad you have
hired a white man, I hear he is a Carefull Industrious
man if so I may encourage him.
I am very sorry to hear my D^r Sister is not well
but hope it was only the Effects of breeding Cuts
& soon she will come, an unending grief
which hope may be of service to her & your mother
I self is indifferent - well only the remains of one
cold which is still troublesome, If thing now I
have collected all my scattered thoughts can get
together, tho in a confused manner, and have
not told but my best wishes & tenderest regards
that I can. Dr Thom gave most affectionate
kind regards
