

Starting this quarter, the Pro-Choice movement has a new supporter in the UCSD campus—the Students For Pro-Choice organization (SFPC).

Already this organization has built a strong membership, with almost 300 people on the sign-up list and 80 people attending the first two meetings. One very encouraging fact about this organization is that almost 30% of its members are men. This proves abortion is an issue affecting all of us.

The goal of SFPC is very simple keeping clinics open, ensuring safe medical treatment for any woman seeking service. To date, the group has been very successful in achieving this goal. On Saturday, October 22, members of SFPC, along with several other Pro-Choice organizations, successfully prevented an Operation Rescue from blockading two San Diego clinics, allowing all patients safely to receive the medical services they desired.

Although it is obvious the Pro-Choice movement is gaining momentum, everyone's help is needed. SFPC is participating in a November 12 Pro-Choice march in San Diego, which will coincide with the national march in Washington, D.C. 

Surplus Repression in the 80's

-- It is 1944. As an American with good intentions, you are encouraged to make a contribution of some kind to the Russian War Relief, even as you're encouraged to contribute 'Bundles for Britain.' Three or four years later you find yourself subpoenaed before HUAC (House Unamerican Activities Committee) as a suspected Communist or Fellow Traveler.

-- When you protest that amity with Russia, our courageous wartime ally, was officially promoted, you are accused of being a 'premature anti-fascist.' This curious and detestable phrase, doubtless coined by some jingoist huckster, was very much in favor, especially in the early fifties.

--It is 1971, you occasionally smoke cannabis. Cannabis is an ally; the discriminating ingestion of cannabis and other psychtropic substances, as they were called then, is promoted by acclaimed writers and scholars such as Castaneda and Huxley and Norman O. Brown and Alan Watts and Theodore Roszak. The legalization of cannabis is a cause taken up even by eminently respected Americans.

-- But now it is ten or fifteen years later, and cannabis is under assault. You are subject to frequent, unannounced urinalyses. If cannabis or any other allied substance (excluding of course the commodified alcohol) is found in your system, you lose your job. In 1986, the coerced admission that he smoked cannabis a few times when he was a law student in the sixties is enough to bar Judge Ginsburg from his appointment to the Supreme Court.

--It is 1967 to 1972: sex is bountiful. Sexual how-to books and sexual counseling are bountiful. The admissable truth then (Foucault distinguishes between truth and admissable truth)—the admissable truth in that pastel time was that the more you sexed the better the citizen you were. Thus we were cued to admire John Kennedy and Warren Beatty and Hugh Hefner and Julie Christie and Jimi Hendrix and Brigitte Bardot and Strom Thurmond, Republican Senator from South Carolina, who at seventy-odd years old, married a beauty queen whom he promptly impregnated several times in succession

-- TRACK OUT, DISSOLVE. We are in the benighted eighties. Sex is our enemy. The very same sexual counseling industry that promoted polymorphous perversity and daily, or nightly, sexual congress now treats sexually active people as addicted deviants. Under the leadership of the inspired troika: Meese: millionaire evangelicals; and Fortune Five Hundred, sexuality has been transformed from grace to addiction.

-- Note: the figure is the same figure: political progressivism, sexual freedom, canabis smoking. Only the ground, or context, has been changed. It is like Marcel Duchamp removing a pissoir from the streets of Paris, calling it a 'fountain,' and having it displayed first in the Bourgeois Gallery in Paris and subsequently in prestigious museums and catalogues worldwide. In the Left Bank of Paris, men peed in it; in the Museum of Modern Art in New York, critics and art-savants oohed and ahhed

-- More than in any other 'First-World' country, Carnival and Lent succeed each other cyclically in the United States. Except the distribution of time is increasingly unequal: Lent is much longer; and Lent usually means a pious Crusade followed by an Inquisition. And it is precisely those people who celebrated Carnival who, come Lent, are likey to have their skin flayed, their minds bent, their thumbs screwed, their genitals attached with electrodes. I mean this in a manner of speaking.

-- The resigned CIA dissident Philip

Agee pointed out that by 1980 "antiterrorism was replacing anti-Communism as the justification for domestic political control."

-- Now, with the distressing (to the U.S. leadership) Glasnost and Capitalization of Eastern Europe and China, anti-Communism is pretty much moribund, whereas anti-terrorism is determined and widespread. Moreover, the signifier 'terrorist' has, for the dominant ideology, a much wider application than anytime before. (It is important in this context to recognize that in the U.S., political dissent has from the inception of the 'Republic' been ' confused with criminality.)

-- For the dominant ideology (which is an up-to-date way of saying The Bosses) in the U.S., the best news since the reign of that demon Stalin is AIDS. Regardless of how AIDS was generated (whether intentionally, or via the escaped microbes of CIA-sponsored chemical experimantation, or essentially by chance; that is, by the concatenation of particular circumstances), the fact of this sexual plague has permitted the dominant ideology to ratchet up their current repression.

-- Do you follow sports? It's virtually un-American in 1989 not to perform or at the very least to follow sports. Sport in the United States no longer signifies play so much as it signifies game and competition and control. There is a crucial difference between the aimless pleasure of play, and the competitive, commodified leisure of sport. And in proportion to the increase in the numbers of homeless, and the increasing isolation of the non-Caucasian poor, and the increasing on-the-job stress, we are presented with the illusory circus of competitive, commodified sport.

--Sports, then, have become infected with ideology. The gesture, the ritual, the purity language of sport are so interfaced with power, that the strut of the politician or the corporate executive has become an unwitting caricature of the strut of the



--We must understand that, as a dissident scholar recently put it: "The AIDS epidemic is simultaneously an epidemic of a transmissable lethal disease and an epidemic of meanings and

of course, largely controlled by the dominant ideology. Which means among other things, that through disinformation, and calculated mythmaking, the demonic black-plague-like associations of AIDS are foregrounded, whereas practical up-to-date information about how it's contracted and disseminated are wihtheld. We're given to understand, then, that AIDS is a species of retributive illness for our deviant ways, created by a righteous God in the storied tradition of Sodom and

-- I am suggesting that the unnatural, manipulated fear of the Communist contamination has been replaced by the unnatural, manipulated fear of the contamination of the Other who is a potential AIDS carrier. And who is this lethally deviant Other? Gay men, Haitians, black Africans, intravenous drug users, crack smokers, prostitutes, the careless poor, sexually unrepressed heterosexuals, and the ungovernable

-- And one needn't look far afield to see how this new ideology/propaganda is implemented. Racism is back; we find it everywhere: in the resurgent popularity of hate-groups and in the inclinations of

pages of our newspapers tend to mirror the dominant culture. These days, we read constantly of the dangers of cocaine (which is a shorthand way of saying black athlete). The white athlete who -- The meanings and significations are, drinks two or three sixpacks of Bud a day is rarely cited. And, increasingly, we read of university athletic programs that admit stupid young men who are athletic. These young men are nearly always black and their alleged stupidity is evidenced by their low SAT scores. The fact that so-called scholastic aptitude tests are themselves skewed to favor middle-class whites, and especially white males, while sustaining the marginalization of inner-city Blacks is never cited. In the sixties and early seventies there was serious, ongoing discussion about Black English as a viable synthesis of so-called standard Eglish and African linguistic influences. In 1989, Black English as a legitimate linguistic entity no longer exists, and if the black student athlete cannot easily make his way in so-called standard English he is labeled dumb, though no sustained attempt is made to interface Black English with the dominant culture's version of standard Engish.

--I'm still discussing the malignant influence of the AIDS propaganda. The recent congressional cowardice and withdrawal of funds from the Corcoran Gallery for sponsoring the Mapplethorpe exhibit, I believe would not have happened were it not for the

AIDS ideology. What is it about Mapplethorpe's photographs that so outraged the pious Helms? One: they are nude men. And two: they are black nude men and white nude men together. If the nudes were heterosexual and white, Helms would have been offended rather than outraged, and no restrictions would have been legislated.

-So too, the so-called pro-life forces have drawn from the AIDS propaganda since one of the crucial subtexts is that women who tend to get abortions, tend to be either sexually active, non-Caucasian, or poor; that is to say, dissident, against-the pious-Americannuclear-family; thus potentially infectious. This equation is not new; in the Fifties, for example, sexually independent women were associated with Communism; in opposition to the desexualized maternal mom of the nuclear family unit, which was of course white, Christian and middle-class, and which was associated with political

-- Besides the poisonous, pervasive, decentered, ideology, there are, in 1989, fundamental problems. Unlike the affluent fifties, the middle class is struggling to stay afloat. The MIT economist Lester Thurow has said that in terms of 'real value' of national currency, the United States now ranks ninth in the world, 'not including the Arab shiekdoms,' with the probability of olummeting even further. Radon. chlorofluorocarbons, the routine nstallations of unsafe nuclear power plants; chemical waste; the government's withdrawal of essential services; the realestating of the wilderness, along with the calculated isolation of the inner cities: these bleak realities and many others, people increasingly recognize as the business-as-usual of the dominant

-- What can we do? Well, organize, contest, strike back purposefully. But this would suggest that dissidents act in solidarity. And solidarity suggests both physical and imaginative, if I can put it that way, proximity. That is to say, dissidents, insurrectionists, revolutionaries, must touch each other; must, it can be argued, love each other in order to act in concert against oppression. Expect that AIDS ideology has repressed people, especially young people, from whom the information about AIDS transmission has been systematically withheld. AIDS propaganda has repressed young people of conscience from touching and loving each other in solidarity.

-- SURPLUS REPRESSION is what we're talking about, which like Surplus Value, strains every last once of blood to sustain the ideology of power and profit. And so the epidemic of AIDS significations has thus far at least aided in suppressing fruitful revolt.

--What you--WHAT WE--have to do is, one, train ourselves to see, to analyze, how the dominant culture is organized to hamstring, shackle, de-energized, de-sex us. And, two, disorganize the dominant culture by touching, and, yes, loving, daring to love, each other, in solidarity against oppression.

EASILY EXPLOITABLE

For these reasons, the Miskitu people of Nicaragua's Atlantic coast, have become a topic easily manipulated by groups on the anti-communist right (such as the U.S. State Department, the CIA, the Young Americans for Freedom and the Editors of The Daily Aztec.

Without telling us who these Miskitu people are, they tell us what alledged atrocities have been committed against them by the Sandinistas. For example, former US Ambassador to the United Nations, Jeane Kirkpatrick declared in a television interview that 250,000 (four times the total Miskitu population) had been herded into concentration camps. This claim grossly misrepresents the events that took place in the nothern border region of Nicaragua in January

This region of the world is only now a political focal point due to the surreptitious war being waged against Nicaragua by the US government. CIA and State Department officials were quick to recognize how easily the tenuous relationship between the peoples of Nicaragua's Atlantic Coast and the new Sandinista government could be exploited to serve US political interests. This was, in fact, part of the Reagan Administration's strategy to undermine the Sandinista government.

The focus of this article is to describe the complexities that have made it difficult for the Sandinista government to draw the indigenous peoples of the Atlantic Coast into Nicaragua's revolutionary framework. In doing so, we hope to refute the seditious lies fostered by the anti-communist right.

HISTORICAL FACTORS

Few countries in the world today are composed of a homogeneous, ethnosimilar people. Most have a collection of dissimilar types with wideranging cultural and ethnic backgrounds. Throughout the course of history, governing bodies have tried to unify their peoples in order to build stronger nations. This has proven to be a difficult task. The stumbling blocks include religious diversity, historical schisms, racism, incongruent value systems and xenophobia. Nicaragua's Sandinista government has been grappling with these circumstances in their efforts to unite western Nicaragua with its own Atlantic Coast.

To understand the present relationship between the Costeños (people of the Atlantic coast) and the Sandinista government, one must place it into its complex historical context.

The division of Nicaragua's Atlantic coast from its western interior is due, in large part, to the region's geography, which is composed of swamps, thick tropical rainforests and pine savannahs in the north. Streams and rivers, rather than roads, provide the main transportation routes for skiffs, dories and other motorized vessles into and out of the Atlantic coast region.

The Atlantic coast is difficult to access from the West, and the rough terrain has served to perserve the distinct cultures of indigenous people) have for centuries coastal peoples today are a result of the Events are selectively taken out of relationships the indigenos coastal African refugees. The coast is by no ethnic group in the north-east are the Miskitus (estimated at 67,000 in 1981). In the central Atlantic, Creoles, of Afro-European descent make up the largest ethnic group (26,000).

The Mestizos (Indian-European) are less numerous but do make up a large percentage of the population in the region's two major cities.

The Costeños (all coastal people) take great pride in having resisted Spainish colonization in the Sixteenth Century. Unfortunately, their resistance to Spanish Colonialism soon led them into the hands of the British Empire and later, the United States. Furthermore, many of the Costeños now see the Sandinistas as yet another 'foreign' power attempting to intervene into their community affairs.

PENSIVE COASTAL POPULATION

Prior to 1979, the Atlantic Coast was void of revolutionary activity. The Costeño's viewed the popular insurrection as an external war, fought on the Pacific side, with the 'Spanish' Somocistas attempting to supress a 'Spanish' popular front. Being so far removed from events, that led to a Sandinista victory, made it difficult if not impossible for the Costeños to share the revolutionary spirit that had swept over the West. At this point in time, neither the legacy of Sandino's antiimperialist patriotic ideal nor the Sandinista revolutionary philosoghy held the same historical and emotional relevance for the Costeños.


MISURASTA



> However, in their plan to provide health care for the Costeños, the Sandinistas failed to examine the already existing system established by th Moravian and Catholic chuches. Because the Somoza government failed to provide social services, the chuche took it upon themselves to provide the people with health care. Albeit often time inadequate, the people appreciated these services. In many cases, the Sandinistas came in and dismantled an existing health care program only to establish another. These new health centers were, in fact, better equipped, had many more medical supplies and were greater in number, both in location and in human resources. Nonetheless it was a mistake for the government to break up the Costeños' traditional method of health care so completely. Many Costeños were confused by this, others angered.

Later, government health officials learned to work more closely with the church and the people of each community in order to break throught the ethnic and cultural barriers that often kept Costeños out of these health care facilities.

Massive unrest in the so-called socialist nations is supposed to prove the failure of communism. Especially the exodus of 40-50,000 East Germans to the West supposedly proves everything that our government has always told us about those evil communists. Now this is ridiculous as we will shortly see. But on the other hand, we don't want to support massacres like Tienamen or the political oppression of East German or Romanian hardliners. So where does that leave us? Capitalists? Communists? Or something else?

Why does the question have to always be posed as either Russia or America? Our goal can be different than both. In the U.S. and the west we must take one path towards the goal and in the socalled socialist countries we must take another. In short, in the west formal democatic rights such as speech and press are stronger. However, in the east the economic equality is much greater. Why can't we construct a democratic socialism out of both?

In East Germany the exodus has already long been overshadowed by the demonstrations of those who are committed to staying in their country and trying to change it. But to understand this we have to take a step back to analyze what the situation is in East Germany.

The economic structure in East Germany has many positive sides. The unemployment is extremely low. Even though there is a housing shortage, there is no homeless problem. Job security is very good. The difference between the richest and the poorest is less than in the west. These advantages come about because profit is not the primary incentive of the economy. The bureaucrats who run a factory or a restaurant do not have to turn a profit. They have to fulfil a preplanned quota.

The minister of housing is not supposed to benefit wealthy developers like what happens at H.U.D. Here, rather, he is supposed to provide people with housing. When there is homelessness, he gets into trouble.

When a factory fires people, it is an indication to higher bureaucrats that something is wrong at the factory; it does not mean that they are making production more efficient or any of the other innumerable reasons capitalists use to fire an employee. In fact, a smart manager kepps and adds to the workforce at his location because this increases his (and it is almost always a he) weight in the bureaucracy.

The system becomes inefficient because filing a productivity report to the liking of a higher bureaucrat is much more important than filing a truthful one. By muzzling up to your bosses you move up, not by telling the truth. Thus, in reality, the state planning commissions have no idea what the actual state of the economy is and their plans too are just doctored and patched together to look good to the politburo. In the daily paper, you read almost everyday that such and such a sector of the economy has fulfiled the expectations by 102.3%, after minor adjustments. In school this 'after minor adjustments' means 'with some cheating.' This has greatly stimulated the development of a huge black market.

In East Germany, until recently, it was a life altering decision to decide to tell the truth instead of what your supervisor wanted to hear. The workers especially have no political freedom in their job, in their community, or on a national level. The working people are treated in an extremely patronizing way by the Party which always knows better what is good for you than you yourself. The Socialist Unity Party of East Germany claims it is the vanguard of the proletaroat, but in

fact it has put itself in the place of the working class who are supposed to run th nation under actual socialism. Everyday the paper 'New Germany' tells you how wonderful everything is in the German Democratic Republic and you see how untrue it is.

So in the place of an exploiting capitalist class the workers of the G.D.R. face a self-perpetuating bureaucracy. Many of the major problems such as housing and employment are not as acute, but they have been replaced by others such as a greater infringement on freedom of spech, press, and association.

So how does this explain what is going on in East Germany now?

The people of the G.D.R. always see West German television and see all the wonderful cars and homes on commercials, in Dallas, etc. and think the grass looks greener on the other side. It is difficult to explain the problems of the west to East Germans when they cannot come and look for themselves. They do not believe the TV and newspaper reports about the problems in their country. In fact, many who come to the west become very disillusioned and want to return.

The vast majority of East Germans would actually prefer to stay in their country. That is why only 40-50,000 left and hundreds of thousands and even millions are protesting for change. The most influential groups pushing for change, the New Forum and activists organized through the church, are not pushing for a reintroduction of capitalism. They want to keep the greater economic democracy of their society, but they want to increase the freedom of spech, press, and association.

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We are not witnessing the failure of communism, but its gradual development. Capitalism was built over centuries and had many setbacks such as the defeat of Napoleanic France and the reinstatement of the King, but this did not stop the course of history. Even now there are still nations which only since World War II have fully entered the world economy as capitalist nations (e.g. Mexico, Korea)--this is 500 years after the fall of Constantinople and the height of the renaissance. The first successful socialist revoulution was only 80 years

True, Marx did not talk about the bureaucratically deformed states but then again, did early Flemish merchants predict the non-capitalistic slavery which built up a determined fight against the capitalistic bourgeoisie of the North in the U.S. as late as the middle of the 18th century? We can make predictions

Ambasador to Chile

On Friday, October 27, the United States Ambassador to Chile, Charles Gillespie, came to speak at the Institute of the Americas here on the UCSD campus. Gillespie's topic centered around the up-coming elections in Chile and the economic and political change that would follow thereafter.

Gillespie brought with him a long personal history of diplomatic nvolvement in Latin America. He has held such posts as the first U.S. Ambassador to Grenada and the U.S. Ambassador to Colombia from 1985 to 1988. The U.S.'s intervention in Grenada "rescue operation." 
Going back to the topic of Chile, there have been events of great importance developing in this South American country that is attempting to return to its democratic ways of the past. Chile has not witnessed a democratic presidential election since the 1970 choice of Socialist leader Salvador Allende. The September 1, 1973 overthrow of the democracy by General Agusto Pinochet secured a stronghold that has lasted 16 long and painfull years. The October 1988 plebiscite that defeated the dictator, though, was a monumental turn-around that has set the stage for democratic presidential elections for the end of this year.

The December 14, 1989 elections represent for Chile a crucial step in the reconstruction of the democracy shattered by dictator Agusto Pinochet. There are three candidates running, and out of these, the contention is essentially between two of them: Patricio Aylwin Christian-Democrat that represents an opposition-coalition ranging from the Communists in the left to the Christian-Democrats closer to the center. Aylwin's chief adversary is Hernan Buchi, an ex-Minister of Finance under the rule of Pinochet. Hernan Buchi represents the

All polls within Chile seem to be giving the clear advantage to Patricio Aylwin, the opposition candidate. Aylwin is an experienced politician who gloomiest of all characters, Agusto Pinochet. A recent statement by Pinochet proclaimed, "If you touch one of my men, it means the end of a State ruled by law". A constitution created by Pinochet in 1980 will allow him to rule the army as Commander in Chief after the new president takes office in 1990. This means that Chile's relationship with the infamous dictator will not join the archives soon. Instead, it will continue into the next decade

One may wonder what Ambassador Gillespie and the U.S.'s policy will be to such a crucial period in the development of a country. Charles Gillespie insists that it will be of "strict neutrality." The Ambassador himself, though, is quick to admit to the U.S.'s "spotty" record in Chile., but he assures that the U.S. will not be involved this time around.

As spectators, we cannot always be so sure as the U.S. is presently involved in influencing the outcome of numerous power struggles and elections throughout Latin America. We can only hold our breath and see if Chile will this time be spared the intervention that has paralyzed its wings in the past and if a democracy can be re-established that will allow Chile to develop into the future.





Ethnicity and Gender

The Student Affirmative Action Committee (SAAC) organization is growing more dissatisfied with the administration's lack of interest in placing a greater emphasis on ethnic and gender studies at UCSD. At the annual SAAC dinner with the Vice-Chancellor of Undergraduate Affairs, Joe Watson, students confronted Watson with his intransigence. Molly McKay, of the Women's Resource Center, summarized that SAAC "had been more than patient in going through the system" and "came out of the meeting very frustrated."

Last June the SAAC organizations had a demonstration called the Cultural Unity Day of Awareness where they presented the inequitable situation of ethnic and gender studies at UCSD. They demanded the development of a mandatory class for all students that would teach the history and culture of ethnic groups other than the Northern European male culture that dominates such courses as the Revelle Humanities sequence. Also, they stressed the

importance of hiring ethnic and women faculty that would retain students with ethnic and gender studies interests; a priority the university has consistently dodged.

UCSD's attention to these issues has actually waned. Afro-American enrollment is dropping from already extremely low figures. The Chicano enrollment, while improving, still remains a lost figure proportionately in the general population. The severe attack on financial aid during the Reagan years, and continuing on with the Bush Administration, has more severly marginalized these populations. Youths from non-anglo communities have less and less opportunities to find a way out. Women, often having to take the responsibility of raising a child and working, also have a more difficult time achieving a higher education.

Cecilia Ubilla-Arenas, a staff member of OASIS, quoted Watson as commenting that increased recruitment of black students is undesirable because

it would make all the black students on campus look like they got here because of affirmative action instead of on merit. At the meeting with SAAC, Watson answered only that everything must "go through official channels." He further threatened the SAAC groups not to "jeapordize what they already have." Some SAAC participants interpret Watson's statements to mean that he is "defending the status quo," that is increased elitism and white-washing of the university.

On a broader scale, the SAAC organizations, have continuously criticized the predominantly anglo, male culture that dominates this campus. According to them, not only should ethnic and gender studies be offered, but they should be a mandatory part of an education. For instance, everyone learns about who George III was, but few learn about Hidalgo, Malcom X, or the collapse of the Chinese dynasty in the late 19th century. Also, the Women's Resource Center (WRC) has pointed to

Many of these issues were most seriously addressed by Lumumba-Zapata College (now called Third College) at UCSD between 1969 and 1972. At that time the Black Student Union (BSU) and the Mexican-American Youth Association (MAYA) largely structured the college to have a 1/3 Chicano and 1/3 Afro-American student body. In addition, they developed an ambitious curriculum stressing the culutre of the working classes and oppressed nationalities. This college was destroyed by the collective effort of its past Provost Joe Watson and Chancellor McElroy. (See the Articles of Lumumba-Zapata College also printed

At this point, the SAAC organization have not decided what action they will take next. Some members are preparing concrete proposals that they can focus on to implement their demands for more ethnic and gender studies. The possibility of more demonstrations has also not been ruled out. In fact, demonstrations were all that moved universities such as University of Wisconsin, Madison and University of Michigan, Ann Arbor.

Contradictions which sustained America in the past are now threatening to annihilate the entire societal edifice. Black slave labor laid the basis of the American economy. Mexican-Americans in the Southwest and Black people in the industrial cities and the agraian South continue to perform the dirty but necessary tasks of building a society of abundance, while sysetmatically being denied the benefits of that society. Therefore, we must reject the entire oppressive structure of America. Racism runs rampant in the educational system, while America, in a pseudohumanitarian stance, proudly proclaims that it is the key to equal opportunity for all. This is the hypocrisy our generation must now

Having been admitted to the University, some of us thought we had crashed through the barriers of racism and economic oppression. Instead, we found that we were accidently the chosen ones, the privileged few who, according to the powers that be, are the exceptions that challenge the rule - the existence of White racism.

This, however, is not the crux of the problem. The selfindictment of the American educational system lies not so much in the quantitative exclusion of people of color as in the quality of what is taught - to the White as well as to the Brown and Black student. If the high schools and colleges are not de-vising more efficient techniques of mystifying the students with irrelevant inanities, then they are consciously subjecting them to a cold-blooded and calculated indoctrination into a dehumanized an unfree society. This is the perversion called mind-raping. In the case of minority students, it is a miseducation which has caused us to unconsciously sever ourselves from our communal and cultural roots, if not to be seduced into the system which exploits our own community. Black capitalism, especially as formulated by the Nixon administration, divided the minority people into exploiters and exploited, the exploiting calss being the college-trained bourgeoisie. Each new Chicano or Black nessman has already been enlisted into the war army of exploiters.

Together with our American brothers in struggle - on the campuses and in the streets-and with our comrades throughout the Third World who are involved in wars of liberation, we refect a system which thrives on military technoloty and imperialist profit. At the University of California, San Diego,

we will no longer insure the undisturbed existence of a false institution which consistently fails to respond to the needs of our people.

Despite the Chicano rebellions in the Southwest and the Black revolts in the cities, the University of California, San Diego, which is part of the oppressive system, has not changed its institutional role. The puny reforms made so fare are aimed at pacifying the revolts and sapping our strength. We therefore not only emphatically demand that radical changes be made. We propose to execute these changes ourselves!

We demand that the Third College be devoted to relevant education for minority youth and to the study of the contemporary social problems of all people. To do this authentically, this college must radically depart from the usual role as the ideological backbone of the social system, and must instead subject every part of the system to ruthless criticism. To reflect these aims of the college, it will be called Lumumba-Zapata College. To enhance the beauty of the name, we demand that the architecture be of Mexican and African style; and that its landscape be of the same nature.

Since there has been and continues to be an overriding tradition of exclusion of minority personnel from the work force involved in planning and building of institutions, except on the most menial level, it is our demand that the architects, general contractors, subcontractors, and all supervisory personnel must be from the minority community.

The bonds for financing the construction of Lumumba-Zapata College must be held by minority financial institutions, and must be offered in such denominations that members of the minority community may participate in the funding fo the college.

average yearly income requirement of a college student at UCSD. 4. The student representative shall be given credit for one normal course per quarter for each quarter of service, which shall be applied towards graduation

Faculty Representation

 The faculty representative shall be elected by the faculty of Lumumba-Zapata College. He may be recalled at any time by a majority vote of the faculty of the college.

2. The faculty representative's service on the Board of Directors shall be equivalent toandtake the place of his normal teaching and committee responsibilities.

Provost

The provost will be the administrative head of Lumumba-Zapata College.
 The two students and one faculty representative shall make the final decision concerning the selection of the provost and shall have the power of recall ofer him.

In order to compensate for past and present injustices and to serve those most affected by white racism and economic exploitation, Lumumba-Zapata College must have an enrollment of 35% Blacks and 35% Mexican-Americans. Students must be selected on the basis of their potential by an admissions committee controlled by minority students. The University of California admission requirements must not be used as an instrument for excluding minority students from or limiting their numbers in Lumumba-Zapata College.

All minority students attending Lumumba-Zapata College must be fully supported with funds supplied by the University to the extent that they will not have to work or take out loans.

The following is a general outline of tareas to be studied at Lumumba-Zapata College. So far, what education the few minority students have received has been from a colonial perspective. We now seek to learn about ourselves from a minority perspective.

1.Revolutions

In the United States, minorities have been excluded from government decision-making and must now develop an original system of self-government and the means of actualizing them. Black and Brown people have become the vanguard of social change because they constitute the most oppressed sector of American society. It is within this framework that Black and Brown people must thoroughly comprehend the theory and practice of the successful as well as unsuccessful revolutions around the world. Reading material in this area will include such authors as Lenin, Nkrumah, Marx, Malcolm, Fanon, Padmore, Che Guevara, and Mariano Azuela.

2. Analysis of Economic Systems
The understanding of the economic exploitation of minority peoples in the United States will entail in depth analysis of the historical and contemporary development of captialism in the Western world, including the crucial roles played by colonialism, imperialism, slavery, and genocide. Only in this contextwill it be possible to arrive at the reasons why minority people serve as a special labor reserve or "fill", distinct from the white working class. Statistical research is needed to determine the economic condition of the minority community and also research application to guarantee sound community economy.

3. Science and Technology
In this field, emphasis will be placed on
the basic sciences as preparation for research in areas related to the satisfaction of
human needs. This obviously excludes the
theoretical inanities taught at Revelle College
as well as the military research conducted at
Scripps Institute.

4. Health Sciences and Public Health
Minority people in the United States have
a far shorter life-span than whites and suffer
diseases peculiar to eppressed people. In
tropical countries where people of color live,
research into the diseases peculiar to the
geopgraphical areas have been extremely in
adequate. Courses should emphasize this
long overdue research, as well as the social
application of this research.

5. Urban and Rural Development
Minority people have suffered much more
than whites in the American transition from
a producing agrarian to a consuming industrial society. The migration enmasse of minority people from country to city provides the
most important key to understanding the acute
contradictions today between urban and rural
life.

In the near future some fifty American cities will have a Black population of over 51% of their total and in the Southwest some five million. Chicanos will reside. These people live in the so-called inner city, the area of greatest exploitation and therefore greatest explosive potential. The problems of the inner city are so deep that only revolutionary change will create a just solution.

Among the topics to be coverred are housing, transportation, environmental control, nutrient procurement and elimination of wastes, and fair government.

6. Communication Arts
Black Arts have flourished in spite of protractedoppression, Deprived of native languages, Black people have developed new ways
of communication with words, gestures, new
music, employing the most diverse art forms.
This area should encompass all the performing as well as the fine arts including such
modern arts as film-making and being aware
of the beautiful creativeness of our Brown
forefathers, we demand that Indo-Hispanic

7. Foreign Languages
Of the European languages, we regard
Spanish and French as the most important
since they are the second language of most
people of African descent. The Chicano
people have suffered a great cultural deprivation by the down-grading of the Spanish
language by the Anglo teachers and administrators. We would, of course urge strong
emphasis on African, Indian and Asian

art be included within the Communication.

Arts program.

8. Cultural Heritage
This area will emphasize the rich cultural heritage of all people of color. Exploration will be made into the traditional roots of culture to uncover that which was buried under European assimilation. Black culture will be studied and appraised in its own frame of reference.

White Studies.
 Courses in this field will emphasize the negative as well as the positive elements of the history of Western civilization.



War on Drugs Is War on the Poor

Let us look at George Bush and the CIA's experience in this trade, which so obviously qualifies them to be in charge of its regulation. Cocaine is a reasonably recent plague in the US. From the fifties to early seventies, the illegal poison being pumped into our neighborhoods was heroin. Where did it come from? The scourge of heroin in our country began with the supply flights of the CIA to Chiang Kai Chek's army remnants and death squads on the Burmese-China border -the original contras-through which the US hoped to harrass, and if possible overthrow, the new People's Republic of China. The supply planes ran arms in secret, then brought back the only merchandise valuable enough to make it pay -- opium and heroin.

With the defeat of the French in Indochina and the full scale takeover of their role by U.S. special services ('advisors'), the stream of smack into the U.S. become a flood. Of course that 'aid program' was also said to be necessary to stop the 'Red Chinese Drug Pushers.' This is another example of the criminal blaming their victim. Opium was first introduced into China by the British. French, and U.S. capitalists. Britain fought two wars with U.S. and French support in the 1840's to force the Chinese government to allow the import of this most 'profitable' of 'goods' from 'British' India and 'French' Indo-China.

Imperialism has always brought the drug trade with it. Just as it has developed to the max the 'legal' drug trade in alcohol and nicotine (a fine business of addictive death with permanent 'customer loyalty' -at least unto death), it has also helped develop the 'illegal' drug trade. It is ridiculous to claim that the colonized countries have 'forced' this money-making trade on the imperialists. And as an example, even though there was almost no trade between China or Vietnam with the US, even though the only planes and ships coming back from the region were CIA and US military supply runs, still the drug flood got worse with every year of the war in South East Asia. The new national governments in Vietnam, Laos, and Cambodia wiped out the drug trade in weeks, as the People's Government had done before in New China.

The CIA withdrew, and changed the center of their activity to the new main hotspots of insurrection against Yanki colonial slavery -the Andes and Central America. Here the 'most profitable' crop available was coca leaf, turned into cocaine. And what do you know, suddenly the ghettos and barrios of the U.S. are full of cocaine, brought back on every plane returning from supply runs to the Contras in Nicaragua, and to the death squads in El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Colombia and Peru. The CIA has become the Cocaine Importing Agency, a U.S. government enforced monopoly on death, enslavement and terror, "guns to kill your peasants, narcotics to drug and control our poor"a most lucrative business which not only protected the 'national interests' of the US billionaires, but even better, threw all the cost of the search and destroy actions on the poorest neighborhoods, the ghettos and barrios in the U.S. There, many of our children were ruined for life, and the rest of us have to pay a terrible secret tax through the incessant robberies we face from desperate addicts. This most profitable business has the 'happy' effect -for the rich- of drugging unconscious or helpless the youth of the colonized peoples held in bondage in the U.S. The Peurtorrican, Afro-American, Mexican, and Native peoples, all who have been driven from the lands tilled by their ancestors, all

who suffer from the drug plague in their barrios, ghettos and reservations -the internal concentration camps and 'strategic villages' of US imperialism.

Here at the local level, the CIA's oversight of the drug trade is turned over to the vice squads & SWAT teams under the direction of the DEA. Those of us who have lived in the US slums these last three decades have experienced the protection of the drug & death peddlers by the police. Whenever the slaves have united & taken up arms to rid their communities of the death dealers, the police have savagely attacked the people to disarm them, & have assassinated in cold blood their leaders, like Fred Hampton & the other Black Panthers, or the leaders of the Puertoriqueño



nationalists in the 50's. What kind of 'drug lords' the police are really after is clearly shown by the 'accidental coincidence' of the new push in the 'war on drugs' & the assassination of Huey P. Newton in Oakland, followed immediately by a tremendous nationally coordinated campaign to portray this well known national leader as a 'drug user & pusher' who 'only got what was coming to him'.

As to what we can expect the US

government's secret police to do with their new powers & forces in Columbia & Peru, well, just look at the 'Justice' Department & FBI's use of the new RICO anti-'mafia' criminal conspiracy laws. The ink was hardly dry on these laws when the US, as part of its preparations for a 'free & fair' election in Puerto Rico on 'independence' or statehood, rounded up and kidnapped to the US all the leadership of the different Puertorriqueño nationalist & liberation groups. Without the slightest pretense of legality or any consideration of Puerto Rico's 'Constitution' (written in the US), all of the opponents of US colonialism in Puerto Rico were shipped out of that country in the middle of the night without any hearing before the officials of the supposedly 'independent' local government. They were brought in shackles to Hartford & held under maximum security lockdown for years while being denied bail or even the pretense of a trial. Why? -because according to the colonialist 'Justice' Department & US Federal Bureau of Intimidation, the Puertorrican independence movement was a criminal conspiracy!

Before this 'democratic' farce, totally outside all conceivable norms of any legality, the rich & their government put on a few 'show trials' of one or two actual gangsters (i.e. businessmen whose crimes have not yet been 'legalized'). This was to try to prove that the new laws were really meant to 'get tough on crime' and were both practical & necessary. Naturally these mass poisoners of youth, flesh peddlers & assassins received comparatively short & always

shortenable sentences -often lessened to 'public service'- (What service? - providing police parties with prostitutes?). And they are serving these 'stiff' sentences in 'country club' prisons, while the supporters of Puertorrican decolonization rot in the worst hell holes of the Federal Prison system without even the most basic human rights or medical attention.

This should prepare us for the US government's unbelievable new demand, that it has the right to order foreign countries to hand over anyone that the it considers a 'criminal' for trial in the US even for actions carried out in foreign countries, wholly outside the scope of US law. A few low-level 'Cocaine businessmen' from Colombia will be given huge media-event show trials -and then quietly shipped off to the Atlanta Federal Facility (known world wide as the Medellin Country Club) for a luxurious vacation with drugs & prostitutes supplied by the US government and paid for with our taxes. Then the real use of this openly colonialist law will begin: i.e. every fighter for Colombian independence, democracy,& 'progress' who can be found will be rounded up and shipped to the U.S. to face permanent imprisonment (and 'interrogation' -i.e. torture) without bail. Their crime? being part of a 'criminal conspiracy', i.e. defending their country's independence, stopping the terrorist death squads, and attempting to end starvation.

All those who believe in peace, all those in favor of democracy & peaceful prosperity, everyone in the US who opposes the criminal drug trade, in reality and not just in words, should speak out against the military occupation of Honduras by US troops, against the constant growth of the US colonial occupation army in Panama, and especially against the US military invasion of Colombia, Bolivia, & Peru. The sending of US 'advisors' is always a euphemism for US military officers (and CIA agents) assuming direct command of the local mercenary troops. It means that all the government's hogwash about not preparing to send in US troops is a hypocritical lie, it means napalm for the little children of the peasants rising up against being forced to grow coca for export to the US instead of food for their starving families, (which is deemed 'not

profitable').

Some so-called 'left' organizations claim that all that is going on in Colombia, Bolivia, & Peru is a struggle between the 'legal' and the 'illegal' bourgeosie. They tell us that the US & Latin American Left shouldn't concern themselves about it, that the battles may be a good thing if the narcoterrorists are wiped out, etc., etc. The U.S. has invaded the Andes with rockets, napalm, & Agent Orange -but, "Hey it's no big deal dude!"

Such are the 'ideas' that these addicts to US propaganda want to use to lower our vigilance and disorganize our struggle. According to these professionally naive liberals, we should trust the US government when it says it's sending troops to the the guerrilla strongholds to 'fight drugs' -or at least we should give them the 'benefit of the doubt'. These 'leftists' are being duped and refusing to see the hard lines of the Imperialist world.

In this real world, the Medellin & Cali cartels have always been integral parts of the CIA's network of terror & profit in Latin America. It was the CIA & those under contract to them who organized, trained, and armed the death squads of these criminal cartels. A huge to-do is being made that this work was really done by 'private' (?) Israeli contractors who just happened to be ex-special services agents. Such tales are fit only for those who still believe in the Easter Bunny. The ENTIRE budget of Israel's

military forces & secret services is supplied by the U.S.A., either overtly by congress or covertly by the CIA.

As for the theory that in Colombia the 'illegal' bourgeosie is being fought by the 'decent responsible bourgeosie' ,we would like to ask -What 'decent responsible' bourgeosie?!? The 'Emerald Lords' who enslave ten year old kids & force them to push carts of ore up the rails of their mines by hand all day long? The brutal overseers of the banana plantations armed with machine guns and whips who routinely murder the local union leaders? Or maybe those who make huge fortunes by having children work their coffee plantations? These are the 'decent responsible bourgeosie' who along with the emerald barons put Colombia at the top of UNESCO's list as the worst exploiters and abusers of children in the world. The 'illegal' bourgeosie have so much capital invested in all the 'legal' profitable businesses in Colombia that it is impossible to separate them.

The Colombian bourgeosie & feudal landbarons, under the direction of the US government, are a pack of savage inhuman parasites & slavers. All this talk of responsible capitalists, of decent wage-slavers, of responsible sweatshop whippers & legal starvers remind us of the socially conscious investment liberals and their call for socially conscious profit gouging & gentler, kinder scientific sweating. They have no doubt that these towering ideas will recieve the response due them from all lovers of democracy, peace, & self determination (a Bronx cheer). Everyone must get serious & oppose the new filthy crime of the US reactionaries.


