

Dear Sir:-

Mr. J.Leslie Cutler has requested me to take up with you the bill of the Cuyamaca Water Company against him in the sum of \$52. Up to June of 1917, his receipts show he paid at the rate of 55% a month. In that month, Mr. Cutler attempted to make payment for his water but was informed by the Company that it had nothing more to do with the matter, as all payments should be made to the Hawley Flume Company. The Hawley Flume officials then told him that they had nothing to do with the collection of rentals and suggested that Mr. Cutler pay Mr. Graves, who owned the water main which supplied his place.

Company until the receipt of your letter. The Company, until last month, had furnished no meter or other facilities for delivering water. No water had been turned from the Plume for Mr. Cutler's for use and the water which he has been using has been paid in full by Mr. Graves.

Mr. Cutler, furthermore, has used no water during the six summer months of 1917 and 1918 and would certainly have had the water turned off during such periods but for the disclaimer of the Company to any interest in the water after its diversion into the Hawley Pipe Line.

In view of these facts and the further fact that he has been accused of stealing water from your client, M cutler is unwill-

ing to pay the full amount of the bill. I am enclosing his check for twenty dollars to cover all charges set forth in the bill for thirty two dollars. If this amount is not acceptable, kindly notify me at once, and to avoid any possibility of having his water turned off, Mr. Cutler will immediately deposit with the Railroad Commission the full amount demanded, the same to be held until such time as the Commission can give its attention to this trivial dispute.

Gentlemen:-

The City of El Cajon, as you probably know, is not primarily a residence town as is La Mesa and East San Diego, but is built up, with the exception of approximately thirty homes, of small acre farms devoted to poultry, fruit, berry and vegetable gardening. These small farms are surrounded on all sides by similar emall farms which are supplied water by your Company at irrigation rates. The only difference between their use of water and the outside small farms lies in the imaginary lines of the city boundaries.

If your mains were already laid, these small city farms would come under your irrigation rates but it would not be sconomical for you to place such mains, as they would parallel the city lines and would run through too much non-consuming territory. It would be impossible for the owners to construct such a direct line as they will be heavily taxed to pay for the new El Cajon main which you are being called upon to finance. This new main, which you will lease to the city, will be ample to take care of all irrigation needs within the city.

In view of these facts and in order to promote the growth of this community by giving the farmers of acre tracts, or over, water rates that will allow them the use of flume water at a fair charge, the City of El Cajon suggests that the following modification of your water rates be made:-

You will bill the City of El Cajon at your established rates, or such rates as may be established, for all water delivered, and then allow a oredit of the difference between such rate and the irrigation rate on adjoining lands for all irrigation water used by city farmers, such irrigation water to be the water used by bona-fide farmers in excess of a monthly minimum of four dollars. In all cases your decision as to whether or not the irrigation rate should apply in each individual case is to be final, subject, of course, to change by the Railroad Commission, and you would have the right to supervise the meter readings. This arrangement would be of a somewhat temporary nature and could be terminated by you on reasonable notice to the city.
