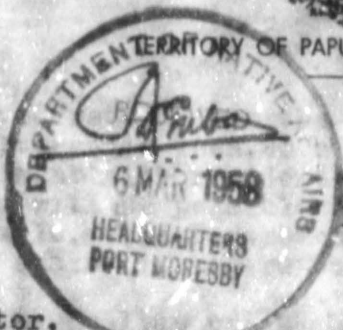

BUNDI Patrol Report No. 1 of 57/58

Enclosed herewith please find copy of the above report of a routine patrol by Mr. N. McNamara, Patrol Officer of the BUNDI Census Division.

The report indicates quite clearly that the situation is satisfactory in this Census Division. As mentioned by Mr. McNamara the people have been most enthusiastic about the establishment of the Patrol Post and have been consistent in the assistance they have extended to the Officer in Charge.

The Native Labour figures do not show any improvement over the past year, and several villages have numbers absent, beyond the desirable limit. However, the effect does not appear to have been serious, and I would still prefer, so far as this area is concerned, to see the Officer in Charge endeavour to contain the position without actual recourse to the powers under Sec. 101. of the Native Labour Ordinance. I say this because open recruiting does not occur in the area, the people offering themselves for work through the Highlands Labour scheme at Goroka. The Officer in Charge is aware of the policy in this matter.


Tultul appointments have been approved as recommended by the Officer in Charge.

Since the Post was established much of the Officer in Charge's time has been occupied with the construction of the station and the reconstruction of Bundi Airstrip. In both fields he has performed a most creditable task. The strip is now capable of taking Norseman aircraft and a well constructed pitsawn two bedroom home (currently occupied by P.O. Whiteoak and family) has just been completed. In addition, a pitsawn 36' x 18' office is now nearing completion and timber is being stockpiled now for the erection of a store.

I understand from the District Medical Officer that his Department is keen to see Sundi have a native hospital establishment with resident Medical Assistant and hopes that this will be possible within a few months. If staff is available, this Department will certainly do all in its power to assist in regard to essential buildings etc.

An Australian priest has now taken over charge of the Catholic Mission at Bundi and he plans to improve the teaching standards up to Department of Education requirements in the school at Bundi.

INTRCDUCTION

The main purposes of this patrol were to revise the census in the BUNDI Division and to carry out the anti-yaws campaign.

There were no outstanding incidents on the patrol which was welcomed by all the people. In this area they recognize the value of penicillin and even though there is practically no yaws in the area there are many tropical ulcers particularly in the villages of lower altitude and the injections did a lot of good in that way.

This report should be read in conjunction with BUNDI report No. 1 of 1956-57 which covered this area in greater detail than is necessary now.

End of Diary
 This year I have been living at two sites named GONABARA and KARIBOKO-KANABHA, the KARIBOKO-KANABHA at the former site, KARIBOKO-KANABHA and KARIBOKO-KANABHA at the latter. On this page I have up to _____ sites.

Native Affairs
 KARIBOKO-KANABHA and BAUI: previously the people living at BAUI have been included in MARUM. This year I have been looking for BAUI. Previously also some people living at KINDAROPA had been included in the MARUM book. This year they have not been included in the KINDAROPA book.

The BUNDI Census Division has been under Mission influence since 1932 when a station was established at GUIEBI and later at Bundi. Until last year when the patrol post was opened at Bundi patrols, not quite one a year, from Chimbu and Madang established administration influence. Now it is a remarkably well settled area and in the year I have been here the only wrongs committed by the people are minor ones. There was one case of attempted murder but the would be murderer immediately went to the bush and hanged himself.

The people have been most cooperative in helping to set up the patrol post but it has been harder to get them to cooperate with their own village officials in matters of housing, hygiene etc. and it was found necessary to imprison a number of people for neglecting to carry out the lawful orders of the village officials. As explained in my patrol report BUNDI No. 1 of 56-57, the officials and people have been constantly instructed in the duties and responsibilities of the officials and the people were warned that if they continued to neglect the officials' lawful instructions it would be necessary to send them to gaol.

There is still talk of SANGGUMA in the area and despite the mission and administration influence, all the people are convinced that certain women still have the powers and practise SANGGUMA though they say it is not as prevalent as some years ago. This has been described in previous reports but it may be of interest to go over it briefly again.

Only the women have SANGGUMA powers. Should a woman who has these powers wish to kill someone who has offended her, or the relative of a person who has offended her, then she conjures up the SANGGUMA which may take the form of a lizard or some indeterminate form in the womb of the woman. This is invisible to all except the woman concerned. It then goes and kills the victim and symptoms of the death may take any form which makes it easy for the people to accuse any woman of killing by SANGGUMA. One important point is that having killed the victim by SANGGUMA the woman responsible must, to prevent the SANGGUMA killing her, bury a small twig in the ground beside the body of the victim when it is laid out before burial. In any case of what is to the people a mysterious death there is always someone to watch beside the body to see if anyone does bury a twig. On this the people base their accusations of SANGGUMA.

CENSUS

In last year's census the total population of the census division was 5704 less the villages of FAITA and SAUSA (not included in the WUNDI census division now) totalling 113 leaving a total of 5589 for last year for the villages still included in the LUNDI census division. This year the total population is 5632 an increase of 43 accountable for by the difference between births (141) and deaths (101).

The matter of village groupings was gone into thoroughly in last year's report on this division. I will only briefly state here the amendments made this this year.

GOGANBAGU: This village was living at two sites named GOGANBAGU and KARISOKERE, the KARISOKO-KENDI at the former and KARISOKO-MIKEIMO and KARISOKO-KANARUA at the latter. On this patrol I made up two new books for the two sites.

MARUM, KINDAROPA and BAUI: Previously the people living at BAUI have been included in MARUM. This year I have issued a new book for BAUI. Previously also some GEGARU people living at KINDAROPA had been included in the MARUM book. These have now been included in the KINDAROPA book.

Migrations Nearly all of the migrations shown were internal and is accounted for by the breakup of the books and the gradual movement of the people into villages according to their correct groupings.

Absentees There were 74 people accidentally absent for the census but in most cases it was a case of visiting relatives away at work in the Eastern or Western Highlands Districts. As it had been particularly impressed on the people that their presence at the census was essential mainly because of the anti-yaws campaign, those who had no valid excuse for being absent and had been told to be present were charged under the Native Administration Regulations. There were only a few of these.

ANTHROPOLOGY

There is little that can be said here that has not been covered in last year's report.

The question of land ownership has come up in the past year partly through the purchase of the land at Bundi for the patrol post and also in general discussions in the villages. The amendment of the Native Administration Regulations to provide for judgements by patrol officers in court only as to rights to use land and not the actual ownership will make the task of patrol officers much easier in this area if disputes ever do arise. Movements of the people in the past have been many, some by whole groups and some by parts of a group and individuals. These movements have gone on after the cessation of tribal fighting and it would be extremely difficult to decide on actual ownership.

On this patrol I was shown a number of stone ceremonial axes similar to the well-known Hagen axes. I was told that these axes used to be purchased from the KUNO area at the back of Mt. Wilhelm and it seems likely that they came from the same source as the Hagen ones. In the early days it was considered an essential part of bride price payments.

I was also shown two stones by one very old man of KARISOKERA which he said were used in the days before the coming of the Administration and the Mission to prevent enemies (physical or spirits) and sickness from coming into a house. One stone consisted of a semi-sphere with the inside glazed and with scalloped edges. The other was cucumber shaped and very smooth but not glazed. The first (about 9 inches across) was buried in the track leading to the house and the other was placed inside with one end pointing to the direction ~~from~~ ~~which~~ away from the house and then all was covered with earth. The people claim that the stones were found in the state in which they were shown to me and that they had not been responsible either for the shape or glazing.

NATIVE LABOUR

There is a total of 398 males away at work mainly outside the Madang District and this is an increase of 17 over last year's figures. A few villages ~~with~~ have a high percentage of the male labour potential away at work. While some have finished their two years away at plantations and have returned to their villages many have gone to replace them particularly to the Eastern Highlands. Those villages with a higher percentage than 25% of the male labour potential away at work are shown below with the respective percentages.

BUNDI 29%, BUNDIKARA 43%, BCNONTI 42%, MENDI 45%
 KORINOGOBU 46%, KARISOKERA 48%, MOKINANGI 28%,
 YANDERA 29%, KINAROPA 33%, MENDINOGUI 32%

All figures are for the 16 to 45 age group.

Villages:

In this census division the people have two types of houses, the one in the village or hamlet proper and the other in the bush close to the gardens. In the villages most of the houses have been built off the ground which, I think, is a mistake particularly in the higher altitudes where fires have to be kept burning all night and the fire hazard is great. I have told the people that they should build their houses on the ground because of this but that they must keep them very clean and preferably have windows such that during the day the inside may receive some sun and light.

The garden houses are very low with no windows and an extremely small door. Many have the front half for the pigs and the rear half for the people to sleep. They become incredibly dirty, with a foul stench and could hardly improve the health of the people.

In general I must say that the housing does seem to be improving with the cooperation of the village officials and the people themselves.

The villages themselves were with the exception of TIGINA found to be clean at the time of the patrol but a few times in the past year when I paid an unexpected visit to some of the others, they also were found to be not so clean. I impressed on the people the need for regular cleaning of the villages.

Village Officials:

A list of village officials is shown as an appendix.

MOKINANGI: Tultul TAUI wishes to retire and I recommend that KUMBIET be appointed in his place. KUMBIET while not a pidgin speaker is a very hard worker and has a lot of influence with the people.

DINDINOGOI: Tultul NOIE wishes to retire and I recommend TIGA to be appointed in his place. TIGA is a good worker and has the advantage of speaking pidgin.

BAUI: I recommend GEBMA to be appointed as Tultul. The people wish that Luluai GENI look after this place and I agree with them. Later perhaps should GEBMA prove satisfactory he could be appointed as Luluai.

GOGANBAGU and KARISOKERA: Luluai KUNDA and Tultul DUTI originally appointed for GOGANBAGU are now living at KARISOKERA and I recommend that KOIMA be appointed as Tultul to help them. I recommend that Tultul POGI of GOGANBAGU be appointed as Luluai of that village.

My general remarks in Patrol Report No. 1 of 56-57 still apply. The Luluais and Tultuls try to do a good job and on this patrol I gave them court backing where warranted.

Native Agriculture:

This census division is very rugged and with heavy rainfalls there has been a lot of erosion and the soils, except on the few small gently sloping areas, are badly leached.

Until recently all crops grown are the subsistence sweet-potato, taro, banana etc. In a few areas now some European vegetables are grown but not nearly as much as I and the people would like to see due to the difficulty experienced in getting seed. This also applies to the growing of coffee which should do well in the area. Unless some vegetable and coffee seed can be procured soon, the wet season will be here and planting will have to wait for next year.

European Agriculture:

The only agriculture carried out in this field is at Bundi by the Administration and the Mission. I can not see that there will ever be any European development in the way of coffee etc. in this area due to lack of areas of sufficient size with good soil.

Livestock:

Pigs are plentiful in the division, so plentiful that it is the custom of the people to kill and eat a pig on such flimsy excuses as cutting your foot. They are not of a good type and a lot die from what appears to be pneumonia. The Mission at Bundi has a horse and some cattle and goats.

Forests:

The whole division is well supplied with timber and there are about 15 pit-saws operating in the area to supply timber to the Mission and Administration at Bundi. Any large scale development of the forests would be impossible at the present due to lack of roads and even if roads are built then lack of a cheap method of transport to market would rule it out as an economic possibility for Europeans.

Mining:

There is little mining carried out in the area. A few natives are mining for gold in the BAIA River and so far have brought me a 5c.c. bottle of the gold which has been sent to Madang. The return for the labour expended seems to be very small. There is now no sign of the trouble mentioned in my last patrol report in connection with foreign natives mining in the area.

Education:

There is, unfortunately, no Administration school in this census division and so the education of the children depends on the Mission schools where teaching standards are poor and attendance also is not the best. Lack of a trained European teacher in the Mission means that even the school at Bundi which would be the best in the area is of a poor standard.

Health:

Anti-yaws campaign: This was carried out in conjunction with the revision of the census. Full cooperation was given the patrol by the people as they have learned to appreciate the value of penicillin even though there is practically no yaws in the area. A full report of the campaign is shown as an appendix. In only one village was yaws found and that is at MARUM where some of the people censused there come from lower down the MARUM river towards the RAMU.

Aid-posts: There are four in the area; at Bundi, KORINOGOBU, KARAMUKI and BOGAI. All are now under the supervision of P.H.C. Madang. That at KORINOGOBU is new and replaces the old one at BONONI which was away in a corner and served only that village. The division is now fairly well catered for in the way of Aid Posts. The Orderleys in charge do a good job particularly SIKAPU at BOGAI and KOBENGI at KARAMUKI. The people cooperate well as regards bringing the sick to the Aid Posts though often they leave it too late to save the lives particularly of the children. On the patrol three people were charged under the N.A.R.'s for failing to obtain medical treatment for their children. The Aid Posts always send the more serious cases to Bundi where if they fail to respond to treatment they can be sent more easily to Madang.

Orderlies on patrol: On this patrol four N.M.O.'s sent specially from Madang, took care of the penicillin injections assisted by the local Aid Post Orderlies in the vicinity of their Aid Posts. The four were KAIKU, YETEN, TAI and MOMURI and they were competent, keen and willing workers.

General: The health of the people in this division is generally good though they suffer a lot from malaria, to which they are extremely susceptible, and pneumonia. During the past year there has been another outbreak of chicken-pox at BOGAI but not serious.

One leper was sent from KARISOKERA to Madang. Many more tropical ulcers were found on this patrol than on last year's. None had developed very far and all were sent to the nearest aid-post for further treatment.

Roads:

There are no vehicular roads in the division. Comments on the possibility of constructing these can be found in my last patrol report.

The walking tracks in the area are fairly well graded but have actually deteriorated over the past year due mainly for the major use of the labour available on the reconstruction of the Bundi Airstrip (six months) and on construction of the Bundi Patrol Post which entailed a lot of levelling and all this in addition to the work in the villages on gardens, houses etc. Some money has been made available for maintenance of roads and this will be spent mainly on picks and spades for which the people are always asking.

Mission:

The Catholic Mission has a station at Bundi with a European priest in charge. He supervises the mission activities throughout the division and has schools in all but two of the villages.

The ~~St~~ Lutheran Mission has ~~mission~~ native staffed schools at BOGAI, BUNDI and MOKINANGI. These are supervised by the European missionary at Chimbu.

Airfields:

The Bundi airstrip has been reconstructed so that it now measures 2200 by 130 feet. It is open up to and including Norseman aircraft but is used mainly by Cessnas.

When funds become available it is hoped to widen it to 150 feet, provide drains where necessary, cut away the hills on either side of the strip and plant grass over the whole.

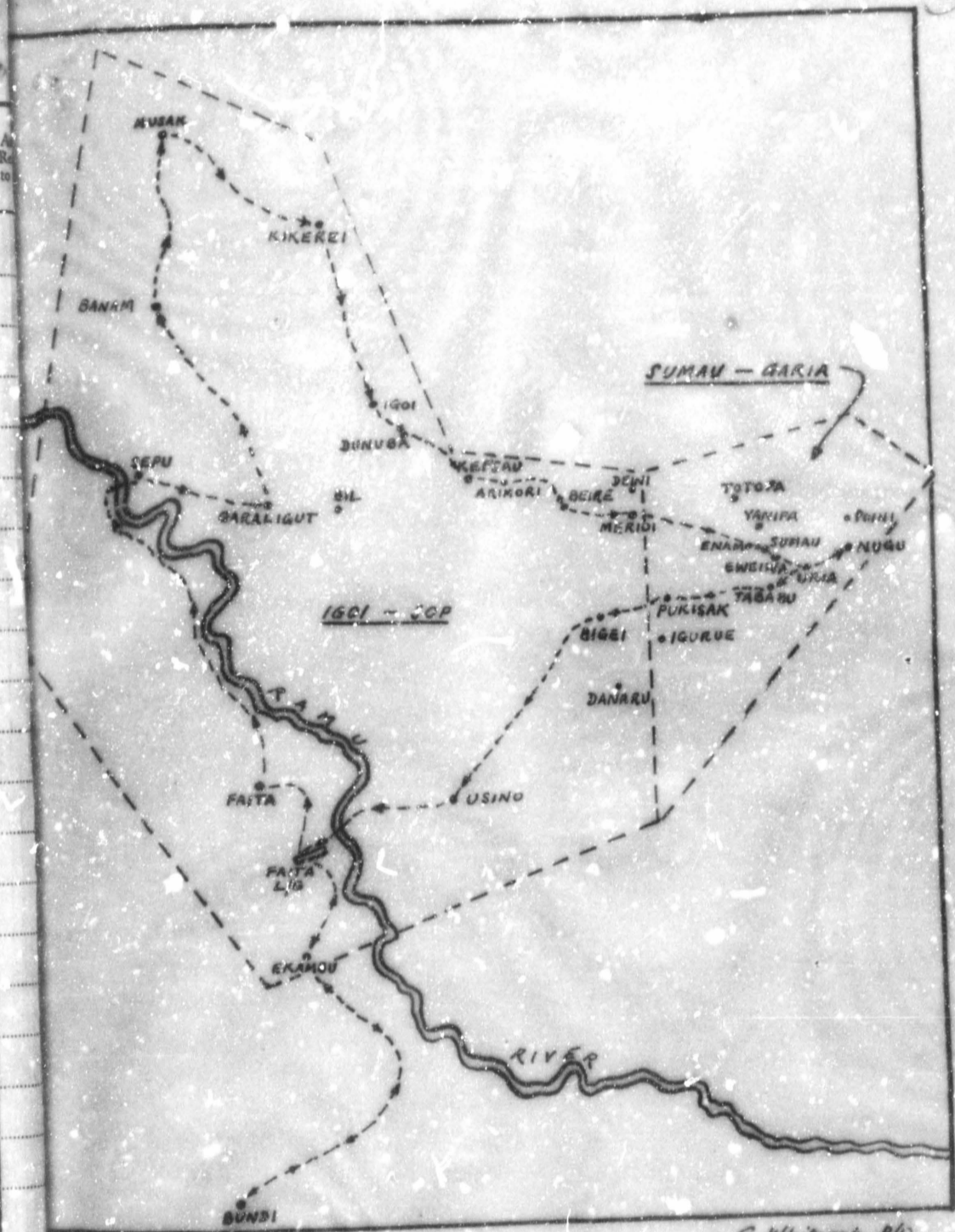

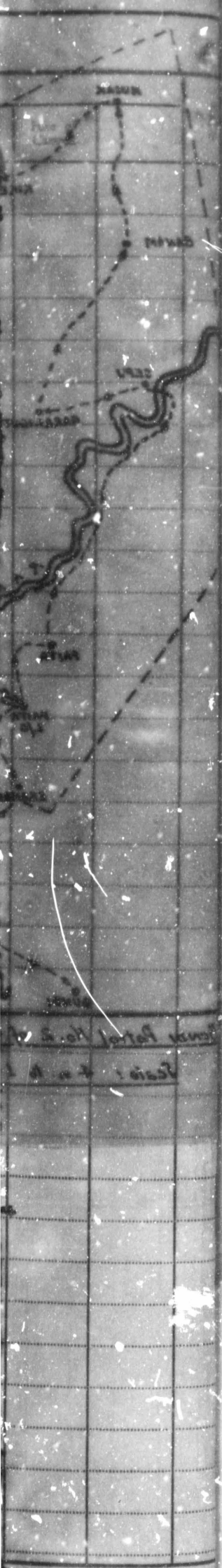

As usual Mr. Whiteoak has submitted a very neat and
businesslike report.

I have spoken to the District Medical
Officer concerning the preponderance of tropical
ulcers and yaws in this area and suggest that we
try and make arrangements for a follow up Medical
Patrol in the near future. With the recent posting
of a Medical Assistant to Bundi Station, it should
be possible to give closer attention to the health
of the people in this area in future.

With regard to the economic development
of this area, it has recently been decided that the
Administration will no longer continue to maintain
Faita Airstrip. At any rate, I agree with you that
Faita Airstrip is not very suitable for the back
loading of produce for the people from the Igoi-Sop
and the Samau-Garia areas. Unfortunately there does
not appear to be much prospect of economic develop-
ment in this area in the near future, it is fairly
inaccessable and a lot of the land is subject to
severe land slides, however, I agree with your suggestion
that you investigate the possibilities of finding a
suitable area for an airstrip.

Attached please find Memorandum of Patrol and diary submitted by Mr. G. Whiteoak, covering the abovementioned patrol.

A perusal of the diary reveals two salient points - poor health and the percentage of able bodied males absent from the villages.

There is constant reference in the diary to tropical ulcers and yaws, this in spite of last year's anti yaws campaign. It seems to be a generally unhealthy area.

Closure of these two census divisions to recruiting appears to have done little to restore the balance of able bodied males in the villages and is not the immediate answer to the problem.

These people are keen to plant rice as an economic crop, but they are so situated as to render it almost impossible to market anything they may produce. It has been suggested to use Faita airstrip to backload produce on return Bundi - Madang flights. This is feasible but involves long cartage with inadequate transport and there are no doubt times when a crossing of the Ramu could be hazardous.

Motor roads will not be built through this area in the foreseeable future. Investigations will be carried out to see if another airstrip can be built on the north bank of the Ramu River to make this marketing proposition more feasible.

The patrol was a routine tax census one and all tax was paid without incident. The patrol was well carried out.

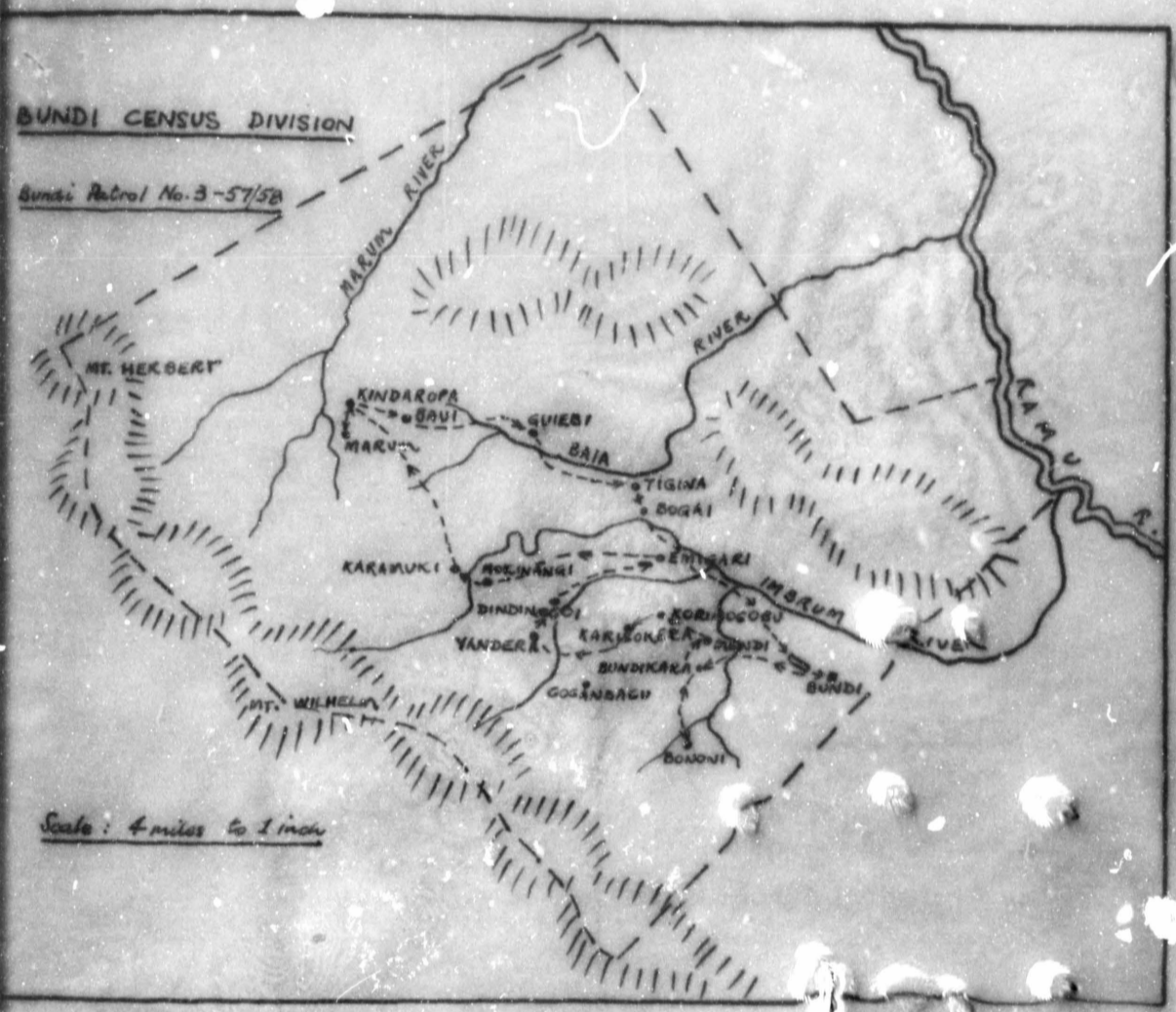
