

Sir

Westmoreland Jamaica 25th September 1767

This brings you the melancholy account of the death of our late
Worthy father in Law Colonel Barclay, who departed this life the 22^o. of August last,
and that with a amiable and unblemished a character as any man could possibly
have had, He has left you and me his Executors, and for Your satisfaction, and that you
might see in what Manner he disposed of his Estate, I thought proper to send You
a Copy of his Will, which is where inclosed; Upon his Death, I immediately sent over
to Mr. Kerr, and acquainted him thereof, and tho' he could not conveniently come to
the Funeral, Yet he sent to Mr. Cleland who came over in four or five days, and took
a particular Account of all the Negroes &c. at Kirkpatrick Pen, which I doubt not
he will transmit to You in a short time, and let you know every thing else proper
or relative to your Interest there; I had an exact Account taken of the plate
marked HK, and delivered a Copy of it to Mr. Cleland, The Breast Buckle I shall
take Care of, till I have your Orders concerning it, and if I do not hear from you
before May or June next, hope to have the pleasure of delivering it with my own
hands, as I then purpose taking a trip off, and that Chiefly on Account of my Sons
already gone, or of some other part of my Family I purpose carrying with me —

As I would willingly pay all due respect to the memory of our
deceased friend, I must request that you'll give Directions for such a Tomb Stone to
be made, as you'll judge proper for him, and have whatever Inscription made thereon
as you'll think fit, and due to the memory of so Worthy and good a man, and let it
be sent out here as soon as possible, whatever the Expence amounts to I shall desire
Mr. Cleland immediately to discharge it, as I purpose writing to him on the occasion
by the same opportunity I now write to You —

Mr. Bowen and his Wife are greatly uneasy at Col. Barclay's
Will, and have express'd themselves in such high Terms of Resentment both to me
Mr. Stone and several others, that I think it greatly to their discredit, they have
taken away their Daughter from Mr. Stone's Care, however I hope they will soon
think better and cool upon the Matter.

As I hope you will undertake the trouble of getting the Tomb
Stone for Colonel Barclay, I request you'll likewise oblige me in bespeaking one from
the same hand to be put over my little Girl Bonella Stone who dyed the
day of January 1763 aged and send both by
the same ship, and I shall write to Mr. Cleland to pay the Expence of that and Col. Barclay
together.

You'll please to observe that Col. Barclay by his Will —

Directs the purchase of Col. Caulfield's Interest at Savannah all have to be
made agreeable to the Instructions he gave you concerning it, which if not
already compleated, I would be glad that the Title should be taken in my Name,
to prevent any disputes.

If you think it will be proper that Demmy & and Billy Williams —
should be put into Mourning for their Grandfather, Please to Order what is necessary,
and I will write to Mr. Moore to defray the Expence, and give me leave at the
same time to request you'll accept of Mourning suitable to the Occasion, and
whatever charge attends it I will with the greatest pleasure pay it

I have spoke to Mr. Kinloch in regard to the Expences attending Mr.
Williams's three Sons, and he assures me that he will, early in the next Crop, make
proper Remittances on that Account.

I have been lately applied to by Mr. Raby Williams on Account of the
Claim his Father laid to Carawina, I therefore thought proper to let you know it,
and to inclose you Copies of two Letters I received from him on the Occasion, I thought it
likewise proper to send you Copies of the Cases formerly laid before Mr. Ryper and
Mr. Lutwyche, with their Opinion thereon, and apprehend it would not be amiss
to have Copies of the same Cases forthwith laid before one or two of the best Council
in England, (One of which I take to be Mr. Wilbraham,) I have sent to the Secretary's
Office, for Copies of the Lease Release &c. from Williams & wife to Chase, which I hope
have been drawn in an Effectual Manner, and shall if I receive them in time —
forward them to You, but therefore please to let me have your Sentiments in this
Affair as soon as possible, with your advice and direction how I shall act, for
I think it is a Matter of the Utmost Concern to Mr. Williams's Children, and
a thing that the sooner it is looked into the better.

Mr. Stone and family desire a Tender of their Love and Compliments
to you and yours, and hope you all Enjoy your Health — I remain with the
