Dear Professor Szilard:

Today, we received a statement signed by Arthur Lincicome, Assistant Comptroller at the University of Chicago. This letter contained a record of his examination of your 1947 passport, which lists your date of birth as February 11, 1898. This date is in agreement with that on which your retirement annuity contract No. A-49903 has been based.

However, inasmuch as your contract was issued December 1, 1946, we are unable to accept the record of your 1947 passport as satisfactory proof of age. For this reason, we would suggest that some additional evidence be forwarded to our office at your convenience.

The Association fully realizes the difficulty which some Annuitants face in attempting to procure satisfactory proof of age. Moreover, we would like to be of as much assistance to you as possible in obtaining this necessary documentary proof. Perhaps the enclosed leaflet, listing various forms of acceptable evidence of age will be of some value to you. May we suggest that you attempt to provide us with a school or college record, a naturalization record, a driver's license or an employment record. Each of these records should be dated at least one year prior to 1946.

If we can be of any further assistance to you in this matter, please do not hesitate to let us know.

SUGGESTIONS AS TO RECORD OF AGE

MORE SATISFACTORY RECORDS

One of these records should be sufficient if it is at least 5 years old; otherwise two records should be submitted. See instructions as to how to furnish records to TIAA on the other side of this leaflet.

Birth Certificate

A certified copy can be obtained from the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the city or county in which the annuitant was born.

Baptismal Certificate

A copy can be obtained from the church where the annuitant was baptized.

Family Bible

A copy of the entire page upon which the entry is made may be furnished, together with a certification by a notary public or college official stating (a) that he has examined the Bible, (b) the apparent age of the Bible, (c) the name of the person presumed to have made the entry, and (d) when the entry was presumed to have been made.

School or College Record

Such records may have originated while the annuitant was attending school or was teaching.

Life Insurance Policy

The policy may be in TIAA or another life insurance company. Ordinarily, an annuity contract is not acceptable as a record of age.

Passport

The original passport may be submitted or, if the passport has been called in, a statement may be obtained from the Department of State giving the desired information as shown by the passport.

Why TIAA Requires Record of Age

The annuity income provided by TIAA is based on the annuitant's age in years and months. A difference of even one month in age results in a slightly different annuity income to the individual. If TIAA pays a larger annuity in a particular case than it should, it results in discrimination against all other policyholders in order to favor one. And if TIAA pays a smaller income than is justified, it results in discrimination against one individual in favor of all other policyholders. It seems only fair to take pains to avoid any discrimination.

Most of the errors in age that occur are clerical errors. Occasionally, we find a person who for many years has been celebrating the wrong birthday and does not realize it until he sees his birth certificate. Hence, we have found that careful check must be made of this important factor in order to treat all policyholders equitably.

In comparison with other companies we are liberal in the type of records we will accept. Few persons have real difficulty in providing the necessary records from among the array listed on the opposite side of this page. If you happen to be one of the few who do encounter difficulty, please let us know and we may be able to offer suggestions.

Dear Mrs. Shipley:

In connection with the conversation which we had, the following case appears to be of interest as an illustrtion.

I was told last night that Dr. Brickwedde, an internationally known American physicist of the National Bureau of Standards, was asked by the Los Alamos project whether he would be willing to serve as a consultant. Dr. Brickwedde declined, and I understand that the main reason which induced him to do so was the apprehension that if he acquired special knowledge in the field of atomic energy, he might encounter difficulty when he wished to go to Europe. He was anxious to be able to visit laboratories in Europe, whenever he so desired, and thought that he might either be dissuaded from such visits, or be refused a passport, if he associated himself with a secret project.

This is the first clear-cut case of this sort which has come to my attention.

Dear Leo:

Since talking with you regarding Stadler, I have learned two facts from his son which have a bearing on the matter. First, Stadler was informed by his chief in the Department of Agriculture that the FBI had objections to his going abroad. Second, Stadler has no objection to the possession of knowledge concerning this matter by other people, and was not opposed to his son's disclosure.

On the basis of the second point, I have taken the liberty of sending a copy of the telegram from Miss Shipley to Stadler, principally because of the last sentence which commits the Department of State to giving him a passport in return for a \$9.00 fee; which he may well wish to have, and which he may not realize is available to him. If this is an indiscretion on my part, you may give me hell when you see me, but I am certain Stadler will be very grateful.

In some respects the information in this telegram seems to me to indicate more alarm than less, than a simple refusal by the Department of State, for I can hardly avoid the interpretation that either the USDA or the FBI has taken over this function of deciding who goes where and for what purpose. There may of course be other factors not yet disclosed, but if so, these would be highly interesting, to say the least.

I must warn you about Estes Park, it is a trap for eligible bachelors, since it is swarming - as you probably know - with attractive millionairesses.

Dear Mrs. Shipley:

- 1. I talked last night over the telephone with Dr. Robert Oppenheimer, Chairman of the Advisory Board to the Atomic Energy Commission. He knew something about expected participation at the November 7th conference in Paris on the part of British and Danish colleagues. Dr. Oppenheimer told me that he would be very happy to talk to you about this conference if you would care to call him over the telephone at the Institute of Advanced Studies in Princeton (Princeton, N.J. 2580).
- 2. I personally have come to the conclusion that American scientists ought to be encouraged to attend this conference whether or not they have special knowledge in the field of atomic energy unless special connections or other circumstances of the individual make his participation inadvisable.
- 3. The general question of travel of scientists to international conferences (in contra-distinction to the special case of the Paris conference) I hope to discuss with Mr. Lewis L. Straus or some other member of the Atomic Energy Commission at some later date. Mr. Straus is out of town at present.
- 4. I am leaving Washington today and if it will be possible for you to let me know by Monday night at my Chicago address that you will be able to issue a passport to me, I will cable to Paris accepting the invitation.

It so happens, however, that an article which I have written might be published in November and I shall know for certain by the 5th of November whether this is the case. Since it might be embarrassing if I were abroad at the time this article becomes public I would cancel my trip to Paris on the 5th of November if publication is decided upon.

5. If after consultation with Dr. Oppenheimer or others you should feel that my request for a passport in connection with the Paris conference will embarrass the Department, I shall be pleased to withdraw my application for the passport. It would be my hope that at some later date it will be possible to work out some informal procedure by which the Atomic Energy Commission can make available its advice both to the Passport Division and also to the individual scientists concerned.

Today at a luncheon at the faculty club the conversation revolved arpund the fact that L. J. Stadler, an outstanding geneticist, Professor at the University of Missouri, Columbia, Missouri, and member of the National Academy, is prevented from attending the International Congress of Genetics at Stockholm by the refusal of his passport.

I do not know Dr. Stadler, but several who were present at the luncheon, including H. C. Urey and Robert Boche, do know him. Dr. Boche, who knows him particularly well, was unable to think of any reason for refusing him a passport.

Someone suggested that Dr. Stadler may have belonged ten years ago to some anti-Bascist organization which subsequently was declared to be subversive by the Attorney General.

I wonder whether you had an opportunity to look into this case, and thought that you might wish to acquaint yourself with it. I do not know just what Dr. Stadler's plans for travel were, or at what date the Stockholm conference takes place, but perhaps it is not too late to correct what people seem to believe to be a serious mistake.

I feel certain that this case will cause much embarassment all a round, and repercussions can hardly be limited to this country alone, since at the time when the International Congress on Genetics meets in Stockholm, the reasons for Dr. Stadler's cancellation of his attendance cannot help to become known. Therefore, as soon as I learned of this case this morning, I thought that I ought to draw your attention to it.
